Social Security Increase Due

A cost-of-living increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered on July 1, according to Laura Peacock, social security district manager in Lubbock.

The increase will amount to 5.9 percent for most people getting social security payments. The automatic cost-of-living provision was added to the Social Security Law in 1972.

'People getting social security checks don't have to do anything to get the higher payments," Mrs. Peacock said. "The increase will be added automatically.

The increase is based on the rise in consumer prices from the first three months of 1976 to the first three

months of 1977. With the cost-of-living increase, average social security retirement payments to retired workers will go from \$221 to \$234 a month. Average social security disability payments to disabled workers will go from \$248 to \$262 a month. Average social security survivors payments to widowed mothers or fathers with two children in their care will go from \$517 to \$547 a month

Social security pays benefits to over 48,000 people in the Lubbock district, Ms. Peacock said. The payments are funded by social security contributions from employees, employers, and self-

employed people. Social security checks are usually delivered on the 3rd of the month. When the 3rd falls on Saturday or Sunday, the checks are delivered the preceding Friday. July 3rd is on Sunday this year and the checks will be delivered Friday, July 1.






Food Stamps Program At **Rotary Club**

tton industry. In recent years, some beneficial uses have been found for them, one ing a heavy application, 3-ton or more per acre, back to the land. The use of burr extractors cotton strippers should prove very beneficial in that burrs can be left in the blanks each ar the cotton is harvested. Research being carried out at the USDA Experiment Station in Spring shows that plots where burrs were used in the blanks doubled the pounds of lint facre on plots where the blanks were left bare. Production on the plots where burrs were ed produced 401 pounds of lint per acre in 1976 while plots with bare rows produced 190 ands of lint. This was the fifth year these tests had been run. Residue is a basic need of the nd if it is to remain productive for generations to come and cotton burrs is just one way to that residue.

Sherry Etheredge Says

> How To Make Jellies, Jams, and Preserves At Home

Jelly, jam, conserve, marmalade, preserves--any of these fruit products can add zest to meals. Most of them also provide a good way to use fruit not at its best for canning or freezing-the largest or smallest fruits and berries and those that are irregularly shaped.

Basically these products are much alike; all of them are fruit preserved by means of sugar, and usually all are jellied to some extent. Their individual characteristics depend on the kind of fruit used and the way it is prepared, the proportions of different ingredients in the mixture, and the method of cooking.

Jelly is made from fruit juice; the product is clear and firm enough to hold its shape when turned out of the container. Jam, made from crushed or ground fruit, tends to hold its shape but generally is less firm than jelly. Conserves are jams made from a mixture of fruits, usually including citrus fruit; often raisins and nuts are added. Marmalade

is a tender jelly with small pieces of fruit distributed evenly throughout; a marmalade commonly contains citrus fruit. Preserves are whole fruits or large pieces of fruit in a thick syrup, often slightly jellied.

Not all fruits have the properties needed for making satisfactory jellied products, but with the commercial pectins now on the market, the homemaker need not depend on the jellying quality of the fruit for successful results.

Reconstruction Scheduled For FM Road 213

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation and the contractor. Henry L. Stafford, of Lubbock have indicated that reconstruction work will begin on Farm to Market Road 213 during the coming week.

Work initiated at this time will be the lengthening of drainage pipe at numerous locations and the commencement of grading for the road bed. The grading operation requires the removal of existing base material and surface so that a new subgrade can be prepared. This grading operation is planned to start in the segment that is west of Wells.

Since heavy machinery and trucks will be working during construction, caution should be used at all times by those traveling through the project. Cooperation of the public is requested in obeying all traffic signals, warning signs, and speed limits.

H. C. Brown, Resident Engineer with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Brownfield, will be in charge of construction. Completion of this 9.6 mile project, from Terry County line to Wells. is expected in September.


