Jay Dee House, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Tahoka, announced this week that the Federal Land Bank of Houston will reduce the interest billing rate on variable rate loans to 7-3/4 %.

(cont. from page 1) The coal used at Harrington Station is low-sulphur western coal, mined and brought in by unit train from Gillette, Wyoming. The trains have about 110 cars and are designed and built specifically to haul coal. Each train brings about 11,000 tons of coal to the plant on a twice-a-week schedule

The design, engineering, and construction supervision was done by Southwestern's own generating plant design department, under the direction of Jim Matthews, manager, generation and design construction. Missouri Valley Constructors, Inc. of Amarillo was the mechanical and structural contractor and Budwine Electric Service Company of Carlsbad, New Mexico was the electrical contractor.

J. B. Bottoms was the resident engineer for Southwestern Public Service Company during the construction of the first unit, and Jerry Hermesmeyer is the plant manager. Bottoms vill also serve as resident engineer for construction of the second unit.

Harrington Station was named in honor of the late Don Harrington, Amarillo oilman, investor, and philanthropist. He served continuously on the SPS board of directors from the time the company was organized in its present form in 1942 until his death on April 27, 1974.

(cont. from page 1) authorizing a nationally coordinated research and information program to improve, maintain, and develop markets for cattle, beef, and beef products. It gave the Secretary of Agriculture responsibility for determining if cattle producers really wanted to establish, finance, and

operate such a program. 'Many of the cattlemen, on a national scale, who supported the program failed to take the time to register and vote," said George Strathearn, vicechairman of the National Beef Development Task Force. "Others voted no because they were told the government would run the program, which was false, or because they were told it would be difficult for those who did not want to participate to get a refund, which was also not true," he

The proposal was defeated in all key cattle-producing states except Oklahoma. where 75.2 percent favored the program.

A 66 percent approval was needed for the referendum to carry, and top producing states where the proposal failed were Texas, 61.6 percent; Kansas, 60.3; Nebraska, 63.7; Iowa, 41.2; and Tennessee, 18.8.

LOW-SULPHUR WESTERN COAL is the fuel for Southwestern Public Service Company's Harrington Station. Located northeast of Amarillo, Harrington is the newest plant on Southwestern's system and the first to burn coal. The fuel is mined in Gillette, Wyoming and delivered to the plant in 110-car unit trains on a twice-a-week schedule.



THE CONTROL CENTER at SPS's Harrington Station keeps the operators informed about every phase of the operation of the turbine-generator, boiler, and auxiliary equipment. Closed circuit television keeps an eye on the water level and the fire in the boiler. The entire plant is operated by the latest digital computers.



THE ELECTRIC GENERATOR at Southwestern Public Service Company's ne Station is rated at 356,700 kilowatts, the equivalent of 478,000 horsepower. The turbine rotates at 3600 rpm and its speed is controlled so that it is constant, within one revolution per day. This amazing accuracy keeps electric clocks on time and is used by industry for precision control of production operations. The generator output is 22,000 volts which is then stepped up by a transformer to 230,000 volts for more efficient power transmission.

Prescribed



In the past prescriptions were a deep, dark mystery. No longer. Once you know what to look for prescriptions are as easy to read as a recipe. It records your physician's name and address, your name, the date, the name of the drug, dosage form and strength, the amount to be dispensed, directions for use, the number of refills and the physician's signature at the bottom. Abbreviations are used: 'cap" - capsule, "el" elixir or "sy" - syrup. Do-sage is usually in metric measures. If the drug is to be taken 3 times a day for 7 days - #21. Refills are indicated . . "Refills 2x", the prescription can be refilled two times without a new prescription. Your pharmacist types all this information on the label. There is no longer a mystery. But if you do have questions, feel free to ask.


