The words of the song, "You've got to give a little, take a little...that's the story of, that's the glory of love," might remind one of the attitude had by retired District Judge and Mrs. Truett Smith toward the services rendered by blood

Every person has a favorite project and Lucille Smith says that for as long as a mobile unit of the blood bank has been coming to Tahoka, she has been a donor.

And it was not until December of 1967 that Judge and Mrs. Smith became acutely cognizant of the dire need for blood donors.

Smith was severely injured in a freak accident in Tahoka on December 6 of that year, and as a result of the accident, it was necessary that one of his legs be amputated. During the 72-day hospital stay, he

was the recipient of many units of blood. And more recently, he had

an aneurysm, an abnormal blood-filled dilatation of a blood vessel and a condition which called for more units of blood. So it is that she responds

readily when the call goes forth for donors to Blood Services, Inc., the administering agency in this area. Each year, in Tahoka,

Phebe K. Warner Study Club sponsors a drive for donors to the blood bank, and this year, the time is this Saturday, September 24, during the Lynn County Harvest Festival, at the Health Fair, all day.

The Smiths might wish to think of themselves as "ordinary citizens," and in a sense, they are. They're "ordinary" in that they've been in Tahoka a "few" vears, and extraordinary in that they have touched the lives of many people, being a positive influence therein.

He was the county attorney in Lynn County when he met Miss Lucille Hunt, a senior at Texas Tech, at a homecoming celebration in Lubbock, and the two of them were married in December of 1935 at Claude. By that time, she was teaching home economics at Panhandle and he was district attorney, having been appointed by Governor Allred to replace G. H. Nelson who was elected state senator.

In 1959, he became District Judge and served in that capacity for twelve years, hearing cases in six counties for some of the time, until the District was divided into only four counties.

Mrs. Smith has been a member of Phebe K. Warner Study Club since 1936 and has held virtually every office in the club, as well as having been honored by her fellow club members in various ways.

The Smith children are now grown up and have families of their own. Gordon, a Baptist minister, lives in Windermere, Florida and is the father of two children--Greg, and Carla, who is a student at Baylor University

rick, is a speech teacher at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater. She has two sons, ages five and seven, whom their Grandfather Smith describes as "real nice people." The Smiths are "semi-

retired" folks now and they spend most of the winter months in Florida. Although he doesn't "have to keep office hours," and she no longer watches for school to be out, they have a vital interest in the welfare of the other fellow. They, over the years, have participated in many worthwhile projects in their hometown and county, but as she is quick to say. "My pet is the blood bank."



Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, is scheduled to testify September 22 in Washington on a "Farm Production Protection Act" introduced by Representative Ed Jones of Tennessee.

The bill, says PCG's Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, would create a Farm Production Protection Corporation (FPPC) to insure crops against unavoidable losses.

"The information we now have," Johnson continues, "indicates that FPPC crop insurance coverage is meant to phase out both the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) and the disaster payment provisions of the 1973 and 1977 farm laws."

FPPC would be empowered, beginning next year, to offer a plan or plans of protection against loss of production due to drought, hail, wind, excessive rain, winter kill and other unavoidable causes. Loss coverage would be limited to the cost of crop production "for a representative period subject to such adjustments" as might be prescribed by the FPPC Board.

The Corporation's Board would consist of a manager; two other U.S. Department of Agriculture employees, one of which would represent the consumer viewpoint; one member with insurance experience and three active farmers. Members would be appointed by and hold office at the pleasure of the Secretary of Agriculture.

The premiums to be paid by farmers for FPPC protection would be set by the Board at rates sufficient to cover claims for "normal loss of production." Participating farmers would be paid for "catastrophic or disaster" losses from a Disaster Relief Fund established in the Treasury, and payment for such losses would Says... be excluded from the loss experience used by the Board to set premium rates.

Catastrophic and disaster losses under the Act are said to occur when production "falls below the normal production level for a given area or county as determined by the Board.'

Cost of production, which would determine the maximum allowable coverage, is defined in the Act as including variable, machinery ownership, general farm overhead, management and

PCG's initial statement in hearings on the bill, according to Johnson, of necessity will be generalized, but will contain a request for permission to submit more specific views either at subsequent hearings or in writing.

'We have just become aware of the bill's existence, and its language raises almost as many questions as it answers," states Johnson. "We have not had time nor will we have time to discuss the bill with our Legislative Committee or Board of Directors prior to the hearings."

Asked for his personal observation at first reading, Johnson said his feelings were divided.

"On the plus side, the protection described by the Act could well be superior to anything now available under current FCIC plans, and if so the improved coverage would certainly be welcome. On the other hand, High Plains farmers since 1973 have recouped about \$200 million of crop losses under the disaster payment program, and we will want to be very careful about endorsing anything designed to replace that program.'





Efforts will be made to determine each student's abilities with emphasis on individual ability. Art and Title I reading is being added in Junior High.

In high school, an academic center is being established so students with class conflicts because of band or athletic programs or for other reasons will have an opportunity to advance without delay. English will also receive special attention, and practical training will be emphasized in the vocational field such as office secretarial work. agriculture, how to apply for a job, etc.

## Steps Being Taken To Improve Academics In Tahoka Schools

Definite steps are being taken this year to improve academic excellence in the Tahoka school system, the new superintendent, Jim Coulston, and three school principals told Rotarians in talks before the Rotary Club last Thursday.

"We expect to have the best," Coulston declared in introducing the program, and the faculty is enthusiastic in a cooperative program for better academic effort and discipline. Tahoka schools have about 1,100 students enrolled, there are more than 100 employees of the district, and the system has a million-dollar budget.

Melvin Burks, Tubb Elementary principal, outlined some changes in the program for the lower grades, including kindergarten, where a music education program teacher has been added, where a better effort will be put forth to prepare students for further advancement, and where language difficulties will be given emphasis and both slow and fast learners will be given special attention.

Clifton Gardner, North Elementary principal, pointed out changes in a team effort to improve the migrant program in this agriculturalrelated community, improve the reading program and other basics, and to give students more persona!


Jim Marcus, Junior and Senior High principal, outlined a program for better academic excellence, raising the requirements for passing, and a requirement to add, in the next four years, 72 quarter units for graduation. Efforts will be made to determine each student's abilities with emphasis on individual ability. Art and Title I reading is being added in Junior High.

In high school, an academic center is being established so students with class conflicts because of band or athletic programs or for other reasons will have an opportunity to advance without delay. English will also receive special attention, and practical training will be emphasized in the vocational field such as office secretarial work. agriculture, how to apply for
