The Tahoka Bulldogs added another "notch-inthe-barrel" for their year of "firsts" last Friday night when they not only played in, but won their first regional championship.

The 'Dogs traveled to Andrews and met the Kermit Yellowjackets, and came out the victors, to the tune of 13 to 9, ensuring for themselves the right to play in state quarter-finals, the foe to be the Childress **Bobcats** 

The Bobcats had defeated Littlefield 41-7 in their regional contest, the game being played in Kimbrough Stadium at Canyon, the site of the Bulldog-Bobcat clash this week.

Tahoka started the scoring early in the first quarter last Friday night with the Kermit Yellowjackets. The Bulldogs were forced to punt, but Jerry Hatchett recovered a Yellowjacket fumble on the nine-yard line and four plays later Clifford Bailey scored on a one-yard line. Ed Roberson's extra point was

not good. The Bulldogs led 6-0 and it remained that way until the third quarter.

The Bulldog defense kept the Kermit offense outside the twenty-yard line until the fourth quarter. Bailey scored the Bulldogs' second TD with eight seconds remaining in the third quarter, the run being one yard. Roberson scored the extra point and Tahoka now led

Kermit then drove for a TD in the fourth quarter and scored on a three-yard dash.

The PAT was good. Coach A. D. Shaver later had Roberson to fall in the end zone for a safety which forced the Bulldogs to kick from the twenty-yard line.

The Bulldog defense held Kermit to two yards in four plays and then ran out the clock. Tahoka had two scoring drives thwarted by fumbles in the third quarter. but won the game 13-9.

Soil Test Now to Avoid Spring Rush

By submitting soil samples for testing now, farmers can avoid the spring rush and get spring crops off to a

Waiting until the last minute to send in samples for testing causes a log-jam at the soil testing laboratory and delays the results. By soil testing now and getting early results, producers can apply some fertilizer in the fall and make final plans for spring applications.

Fall soil sampling also gives a farmer a better chance to seek out the best

terms of cost and application. In some cases, fall application can be combined with tillage for important savings without sacrificing

Without a soil test, farmers are gambling on the amount and type of fertilizer to apply. With a spring soil test there may be frustrating delays. But with a fall soil test, plans can move full speed ahead for the coming crop year.

### Postmaster Cites Hints For Christmas Mail

'Why take a chance of dampening someone's holiday spirit by sending poorly wrapped Christmas gifts through the mail?" Postmaster Charles Townes

According to Postmaster Townes, customers can be more assured that their gifts will arrive in good condition if the following packaging tips are followed

A single item in a package should be cushioned with shredded paper, excelsior, compressed tissue paper. cloth, or expanded plastic foam. If two or more items are in the same carton, cushioning material should protect items from contact with each other, and each item should have its own individual inner carton.

Fiberboard containers, in cluding large soap, cereal boxes, etc. larger than the gift being mailed should be cut down to about the size of the gift to minimize shifting of contents in transit. However, breakable items should have at least one inch clearance between the sides of the boxes and the item to provide adequate room for

cushioning. Fiberboard should have 'pound test'' strength of at least 175. This is usually shown in the box maker's certificate on the bottom of

Fragile articles must be individually cushioned, and all four sides of the container should be padded with cushioning material.

Tape used to close containers should be reinforced and should cover and firmly secure all flaps.

When paper must be used for the outer wrapping, it should be at least equal in quality and strength to the kraft stock used for grocery bags. However, it is preferable that paper wrappers be omitted if the box itself constitutes an ade-

quate shipping container. Proper packaging is particularly important for books and records. Because of their weight, books should be cushioned so they cannot shift within the box. It is not desirable to ship more than 25 pounds of books in one package

The thin, long-playing records should be placed in a carton which is at least one-fourth of an inch thick.

Each package should contain the name and address of the person to whom it is being mailed inside the package as well as outside. An address contained inside is assurance that it will be received promptly even if the outside address should become lost or obliterated.

Be sure to put your return address on the package

And, finally, address the package correctly and legibly, so that it can be read at two feet. Be sure to include the ZIP code. Mail with the proper ZIP code is processed more rapidly. When addressing mail to a foreign country, be sure to spell out the country's name in full. Do not abbreviate.

Be sure to put only one mailing address on the outside of the parcel. Do not address on more than one

### **Social Security** Disability **Rules Strict**

The social security disability benefits program has stricter eligibility requirements than many other disability programs, Laura Peacock, social security district manager in Lubbock,

She noted that some programs pay benefits based on occupational disability; social security does not. Some programs pay benefits based on percentage of impairment; social security does not. Some programs pay benefits based on short-term disability; social security does not.

What social security does, Peacock added, is to pay benefits to severely disabled workers who have worked long enough and recent enough under social security and to certain members of their families.

To be disabled under the social security law, a worker must have a physical or mental impairment so severe that it prevents him or her from engaging in substantial gainful work for a year or longer or is expected to result in the worker's death.

The amount of social security work credit needed to qualify for benefits depends on the worker's age at the time he or she becomes disabled. For a worker age 24 or earlier, 11/2 years of credit is enough for a payment. For a worker in his or her 40's, almost seven years of credit is needed, and in addition, five years of work must be out of the last 10 years just before the proven onset of the disability. Payments cannot be made until five full months have elapsed. Pavment is made for the sixth full month of disability.

According to the Department of Health Resources, drinking water containing coliform bacteria in excess of the standard may constitute a potential threat to public health, and their presence in water is an indicator of bacteriological contaminaof the sample either from the water system or from a sampling error.

Additional samples and customer notification of the public when the standards are exceeded are required by law as a means of keeping the public informed.

Yuletide mailers can choose this year between two attractive Christmas stamps when applying appropriate postage to holiday greetings and parcels being sent through the mail.

A colorful design of a rural mailbox, crammed with letters and packages, will add a cheery touch to holiday mail and customers interested in history may choose the design of General George Washington kneeling in prayer during the winter of 777-78 at Valley Forge.

Both stamps are on sale currently at the main post office and all branches.

The Washington stamp pays tribute to the Continental Army which spent Christmas, marred by severe hardships and semi-starvation, at Valley Forge in Pennsylvania.

After an unsuccessful effort against the British at Germantown, Washington and his troops retreated to Valley Forge. Two days before Christmas, Washington wrote: "We have this day no less than 2,873 men in camp unfit for duty because they are barefooted or otherwise naked ... '

This design, by artist Stevan Dohanos, is based upon a painting by J. C. Leyendecker which appeared as a Saturday Evening Post cover in 1935. Mr. Dohanos also is noted for his paintings which appeared on more than 100 other covers

of the Post. A snowy winter setting provides the perfect background for the rural mailbox depicted on the other

Christmas issue. The designer is Dolli Tingle, of

Westport, Connecticut, who also created the popular needle-point Christmas Tree stamp of 1973.

Now a familiar sight, the rural mailbox was brand new in 1896 and represented an important link with the outside world for isolated farm families.

Today, rural mail delivery still provides a vital service. Rural carriers each day travel approximately 2.2 million miles to serve 13.8 million families along more than 33,000 rural routes throughout America.

Both stamps were printed by the gravure method.






Tree Safety In buying a natural tree,

check for freshness. Fresh needles will bend between your fingers. Signs of dryness include brittle branches and shedding needles. Tap the tree lightly on the ground to see if many needles fall off.

Don't depend on a healthy green color. Trees may be sprayed green to improve their appearance.

To set the tree up, place it in a sturdy holder with a wide base. Fill the holder with water and refill as necessary all the time the tree is in use. Set the tree a good distance from any heat

Get rid of the tree when the needles begin to fall off in large quantities. This is a sign that the tree is becoming dangerously dry.

Light Safety Be sure the lights are safe.

First, look for the UL(Underwriters Laboratory) label to insure pre-purchase safety checks.

Then check the tree lights and outdoor lights for frayed wires, loose connections, broken or cracked sockets and spots where bare wire is exposed.


Repair or throw out any damaged light set.

Indoor Tree Lights: In decorating with lights, fasten them securely to the tree, and make sure no lightbulbs are in direct contact with the needles or branches.

Keep curtains and flammable materials away from the bulbs.

Don't overload extension cords. More than three sets of lights on any extension cord invites danger.

Finally, keep the connection joint away from the water supply of a live tree.



Outdoor Lights: Don't try to use indoor lights for outdoor lighting. Make sure outdoor lights are weatherproof and the label clearly says they are for outdoor

Before leaving the house or going to bed, be sure all lights are turned off.

Remove outdoor lighting as soon as the holiday season is over. Even these lights are not designed to withstand prolonged periods of time in the elements.

Ornament and Plant Safety

Avoid placing breakable ornaments or those with small detachable parts on lower tree branches where small children or pets can reach them and knock them

Also, keep other decorations and holiday plants out of children's reach. Some traditional holiday decorations such as mistletoe and hollyberries, may be harmful






