John Tower, accompanied by Mrs. Tower and two assistants, Allen Balch and Fred McClure, was in Tahoka Tuesday morning of this week and spoke at the high school auditorium to students and townspeople.

The Senator and his party were met at the local airport by seniors Richard Cranford and Jayson Knox, and Mayor Mel Leslie and County Republican Chairman Larry Hagood.

Cranford led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance; Gerald Moore, Chamber of Commerce president, welcomed the visitors to Tahoka; Knox, speaking for

the group to the school; and Mayor Leslie introduced the Senator.

Tower named several vital issues that were of prime importance in the country at the present time, and after his own comments, asked for questions from the audience.






> Butter, vegetable oil and poultry broth are products commonly used for self-basting, and seasoning such as salt is sometimes included.

Since different processors use different basting products, consumers should check the label for products that best fit individual

To cook a self-basting turkey, place it on a rack in a roasting pan. If poultry browns early in roasting period, lightly cover breast and drumsticks with aluminum foil or moisten a thin cloth with fat and place over breast and legs to prevent overbrowning.

Follow package instructions for cooking time and temperature. Generally, for dry-roasting, turkeys are roasted at 325 degrees F. for about one hour per every two pounds for smaller turkeys-and about one hour per every three pounds for larger turkeys.

Boneless turkey roasts from three to ten pounds require from three to four hours of cooking.



1978 really guarantee a farmer anything? Is there a chance that target price payments will be made on 1978 crops? How and when can a farmer know how much of his total 1978 production will be eligible for either disaster or target price

Farmers who can't answer these questions "aren't ready to make planting decisions for 1978," says Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.,

To provide all available information related to the 1978 farm program, PCG is cooperating with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, also of Lubbock, in staging a series of three meetings

Meetings will begin at 1:15 p.m. at the Community Center n Lamesa on Wednesday, December 14; at the Agriculture Center in Plainview on Thursday, December 15, and at the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill in Lubbock on Friday, December

All who are interested in agriculture are invited to attend and take part in discussions, according to District Extension Agent Billy Gunter.

Elbert Harp, Executive Director of GSPA will explain and answer questions on the feed grain section of the Agriculture Act of 1977. Oscar (Cotton) Fanning, PCG Executive Assistant will lead disucssions on cotton program provisions, and Marvin Sartin, Extension Service Economist and Management Specilist will discuss the economics of cropping alternatives under the new law.

The Act of 1977 is not as easily understood as some we've had before," says Johnson, "but the dollars-and-cents importance of understanding it is just as great if not greater

"The allotment system is a complete departure from what we've become accustomed to, and will involve such strange erms as National Program Acreage, National Reduction Percentage and Normal Cropland Acreage, all of which will be confusing to producers until fully understood," the PCG

There have also been changes in the workings of the disster program and new regulations are in the making for he designation, care, use and cross compliance aspects of required set-aside acreage.

And, although not new, since the target price method of supporting prices has not been a factor in cotton producer ncome since its inception in 1974, "many producers still have something less than a clear conception of how it works and how they may benefit from it," Johnson stated.

CROUP IS STILL AROUND

A child may wake up suddenly, breathing rapidly, with great difficulty and coughing frequently. If it's the more common type of croup, its not usually dangerous and can be relieved by inhaling warm water vapor, either from a vaporizer or by steaming up the bathroom and letting the child sit in it for 15 to 20 minutes.

Another kind of croup is more dangerous. There already is a respiratory infection and a fever. But in addition, the child is lethargic, appears ill and does not respond at once to steaming. Your physician should then be called at once.



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

Time For Crop, Livestock Survey

The time is again at hand for the major end-of-year crop and livestock survey. These surveys provide the basic data for final 1977 state and county estimates.

From now into early January, many Texas farmers and ranchers will receive questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Some will be interviewed personally by the field staff. Data collected in this survey will provide the most accurate and unbiased picture of agriculture that is available for each county and for Texas. Individual reports are held in strict confidence and can be used only for state and county estimates.

Remember, it's these statistics which serve as the basis for determining allotments and payment levels to producers under various commodity programs.

This year's survey carries with it two other significant features: (1) the current supply/demand situation facing agriculture makes it imperative that the true production conditions be known so that producers can make proper management decisions; and (2) 1977 marks a decade of cooperative effort of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Statistical Reporting Service of the USDA in providing a more comprehensive program of statistics for Texas agriculture. Prior

to 1968, estimates were available primarily on a state basis and did not include some minor commodities. Now, county estimates are released on all commodities.

Texas producers are encouraged to promptly and accurately complete the survey form to reduce survey costs and to provide for more reliable estimates of Texas agriculture.

The next time you are inclined to say "I don't believe those government statistics," remember--they are only as good as you are in reporting the facts.

Farmers' Woes Brought To Public's Eve

"The American Agriculture Movement is doing an excellent job of bringing the farmers' problems to the public's attention. They are to be commended for their efforts in this achievement, according to A. W. "Dub" Anthony, Jr. of Friona, who is president of the national Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Anthony continued to say that the success of farmers drive to get parity must be recognized by all American people as being good for the nation--not just farmers. He said the facts that should be realized are: (1) Farmers cannot continue to produce below cost of production, (2) Government must stop closing its eyes to some of the essential costs of production, such as land, and (3) The farmers' economic condition is a forerunner of the overall economic state of the nation.

While the Food and Agriculture Act of 1977 was being written, only a handful of farmers showed any

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interest. At that time, GSPA, other commodity groups and farm organizations were pleading for help. But, everyone was too busy to write a letter to the White House or even to support the organizations, which were working with Congress on the bill." Anthony added, 'The law fell short of GSPA's pursuits. However,
