Justice Of Peace N. E. Wood Is Not Seeking Re-Election In '78

N. E. Wood, Justice of the Peace in Tahoka since his appointment in 1971, has announced that he will not seek re-election in the May 6 election.

"I appreciate the cooperation of the people, but feel as though it is time for me to step down," he said.

Wood came to Lynn County in 1926, and prior to becoming a public official he taught school some ten years—at Edith, Redwine, Garza County, and Joe Wakes schools, operated a service station, worked for the Soil Conservation Service, and farmed for a number of years. His wife, former Iola Nowlin, was a teacher also, having taught Tahoka schools for many years, retiring in 1976.

The turkey shoot, originally scheduled by Tahoka Lions Club for Saturday, December 17, has been postponed until a later date, according to Joe Bryan, Lions president.

Ray Mason, city administrator in Tahoka, told *The News* on Tuesday of this week that the total of building permits issued by the city in 1977 had climbed to \$1,078,172.

Mason also said that in January of this year, there

were 1,146 water connections, compared to 1,193 at the present time. Revenue from these connections are running between 97 and 98 percent of the amount billed, he said.

As a matter of interest, Mason said the city's annual

payroll is approximately \$110,000, with sixteen full-time employees.

City taxes are \$1.50 per hundred dollars valuation, based on 25 percent of market value. City property's assessed value is \$3,730,000.

Buying Toys For Children
Christmas is almost here, and children are making requests by the dozen. There are so many toys and games for children that it becomes a problem to choose toys and games which are suitable for a child. Nothing is more exasperating on Christmas morning than getting a game that only a college graduate can play—except maybe not having batteries for a toy.

The lists below are suggested toys and games for children of all ages. Children may like some of all of these at each age. Just because the toy isn't included for that age group, don't rule it out. Often the only difference is the level of difficulty.

Infancy (up to one year): Bath toys and sponges, crib mobiles, music boxes, rubber squeeze toys and balls, teething toys, texture pad.

Toddlerhood (one to two years): Baby walker, blocks, climbing apparatus, hammering sets, hardbound or cloth books, push and pull toys, sandbox and implements.

Two to Three Years: Art supplies (paint, playdough, etc.), blackboard, building blocks, bulletin board, equipment for outdoors, housekeeping toys, large picture books, lotto games, magnifying glass, painting easel, put-together toys, rhythm instruments, simple puzzles, transportation toys.

Three to Four Years: Balancing boards, blunt scissors, climbing apparatus, housekeeping furniture, pegboard and pegs, puzzles, records, table and chair sets, tools, tricycle, unbreakable dishes, wagons, zoo and farm animals.

Four to Six years: Note: The older pre-schooler will like many of the toys he liked when he was younger, only now he will find more creative and imaginative ways to use them. Ant farm, child's reference books, construction toys, equipment for store play, garden equipment, playhouse, puppet stages and puppets, simple board games, unusual live animals.

4-H Conservationists Take Action Our planet's lakes, rivers, streams, and oceans provide scenic beauty and recreation. But--more important--they contain the water that is vital to the existence of all life on earth.

The quality of this water is of major concern to young people in the national 4-H conservation of natural resources program. 4-H members recognize that the problems of water and air pollution, careless waste disposal, soil erosion, and endangered species of trees, plants and animals call for effective citizenship in conserving resources today and for the future.

4-H'ers 9-19 can learn-by-doing to take meaningful action on conservation concerns in projects and activities supervised by the Extension Service and supported by John Deere. 4-H conservationists work with local officials to help identify community problems and decide what conservation methods are needed.

Deere offers a variety of awards to recognize the accomplishments of 4-H members, clubs, and counties. Awards are arranged by National 4-H Council and winners are chosen by the Extension Service.

In addition to six national scholarships of \$1,000 each, one 4-H member per state can earn an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago each year. And four members per county are eligible for medals of honor.

Four clubs per county and 10 per state are awarded certificates of recognition. A \$50 cash award goes to the one county in each state reporting the most outstanding 4-H conservation program.

To whom does a prescription belong? Your physician writes you a prescription which you take to your pharmacist to be filled. The pharmacist compounds it according to your doctor's instructions, you accept the medication and pay for it. What happens to the slip of paper — the prescription — do you own it? Can you ask for its return or for a copy? Until your prescription passes to your pharmacist, it's yours. You decide whether it will be filled and who shall fill it. Once it is prepared, however, its custody passes to the pharmacist who is subject to requirements specified by state and federal law and by the physician. Energy—One More Reason For Tune-Ups

For the Lynn County farmer who hasn't figured his fuel bill lately, he may be in for quite a surprise. Growing fuel costs make management important, even if we weren't facing a fuel shortage.

Simple engine tune-ups can help keep escalating fuel costs to a minimum. A recent study of 50 spark-ignition tractors showed that a simple tune-up decreased the fuel consumption by more than 14 percent.

Such a tune-up includes maintenance and adjustment of air cleaner, ignition system, timing, carburetor and governor.

Spark-ignition engines should have a frequent tune-up for the sake of power efficiency as well as fuel conservation. Spark

plugs should be checked for fouling, excessive electrode wear and deposits.

Replacement plugs should "fit" the engine—a plug that is too "cold" will be subject to fouling and deposits, while one that is too "hot" will erode rapidly and may cause knocking and engine damage.

While engine tune-ups have always been essential to best profits in farming, now there's the added incentive of keeping fuel costs down.

Use A Living Christmas Tree

If you are tired of fighting the Christmas tree shopping crowd or bored with an artificial tree, try a living Christmas tree this year.

The main point to remember in the selection of a living tree is to choose a tree which will be suited for growing in your area after the holidays are over.

The Arizona cypress,

Deodar cedar, Japanese black pine and female Yaupon holly make attractive additions to Central or West Texas landscapes after Christmas after serving as eye-catching Yuletide decorations.

For the northern Texas counties, the hardy Scotch pine and the Norway pine do well. The Colorado blue spruce and a variety of junipers also make interesting living Christmas trees.

After you have chosen your tree, some basic helpful hints will keep it thriving through the holidays and will prepare it for planting later.

To keep your tree fresh, water twice weekly and use pine bark, peat moss or a similar media to retain the moisture around the root ball.

A living tree should not remain in the house for more than two weeks. Placing the tree in a cool location of about 65 degrees F. will keep it fresh and reduce the shock of relocation after the holidays.

One should place the root ball in a leakproof container or wrap the ball in a polyethylene film such as a large trash bag. Such a bag can also be placed under the tree's tub or box to prevent moisture damage to the

floor. Provide as much natural light as possible for your living Christmas tree. Lights on a live tree should be limited to small, delicate twinkle lights to prevent burn damage to the leaves and bark.

With a little care and imagination, a living Christmas tree will provide pleasure and beauty for years to come.
