# Hobby Club Meets At Grassland

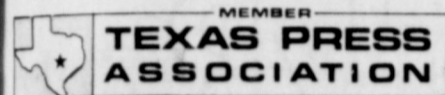

# A Visit With Your County Agent

### Still Time For Soil Testing

It's not too late to have soil samples tested. Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories at College Station, Lubbock, and Seymour are processing samples promptly and reporting results about a week after receiving samples. Recent cold weather and wet soils have delayed sampling in some areas so that a backlog has not developed in the laboratories.

The level of available nutrients in a soil is especially important for the efficient and profitable use of fertilizers. Soil tests have been developed to provide information about soil nutrients as a basis for determining if the soil level is adequate (high) or deficient (low).

Soils low in a nutrient have a high probability of producing increased yields when that nutrient is added in the fertilizer while a soil high in the nutrient will benefit little from adding more of the same fertilizer. A costly error in fertilization is to add fertilizers containing nutrients already present in adequate amounts. This does not contribute to increased yields and drives production costs up, something farmers can ill afford during this period of economic stress.

A good evaluation of soil nutrient levels greatly improves the chances for profitable returns from fertilization, so soil testing

should be a regular standard procedure in every farming operation.

More information about soil tests can be obtained from the county Extension office.

### Grow Your Own Garden Transplants

Use of transplants is one of the keys to successful gardening, and an individual can grow his own vigorous transplants indoors. However, care should be used not to start them too early.

This is a common mistake made by inexperienced gardeners. Transplants from seed planted too early become spindly, weak, tall, and yellow and do not do well when set out in the garden.

For the best survival and quick recovery after planting in the garden, transplants should be young, sturdy, and in good nutritional condition.

Usually four to six weeks is sufficient time to grow most transplants. Vine crops take two to three weeks to develop two to three true leaves while lettuce takes three to four weeks. Tomatoes need five to seven weeks to reach transplanting stage. These time requirements are at the recommended day temperature of about 75 degrees F, and a night temperature of 60

degrees F.

To determine planting time for transplants, figure back four to six weeks from the average last spring frost date, which normally occurs in Lynn County about April 1st. Seed of most spring garden varieties should be planted about this time. Some transplants such as cabbage, broccoli, lettuce, green onions, and spinach can be set in the garden four to six weeks before the last frost date.

When starting plants indoors, I suggest using a soilless or synthetic soil mix available at garden centers or nurseries.

Seed can be started in almost any type container such as flower pots, milk cartons, or cake pans. Be sure the container has holes for adequate drainage.

Once you've got the needed materials and planting time is at hand, fill the containers with the synthetic mix, firm it in well, and then water thoroughly. Space the seed evenly, cover lightly, and water again.

To improve germination, I suggest slipping the container into a plastic bag and placing it in an area at room temperature, but out of direct sunlight. Remove the bag when the seeds first sprout and place the container in sunlight.

Once the container has been removed from the plastic bag, water must be added to maintain good moisture. Frequent watering will be necessary, but use care to avoid saturation. After plants have two to three true leaves, daily watering may be needed.

When the plants are of adequate size and outside conditions are suitable for plant growth, transplant them into the garden area.

Model rockets offer much fun and adventure. They can actually fly more than 300 miles an hour and may soar up to 2,000 feet in the air. Model rockets are inexpensive, are fun to build, and exciting to launch. More than that, they can launch you to an exciting Space Age career. Many 4-H model rocketeers have become scientists, engineers, and mathematicians.

As a 4-H member, you can become a model rocket builder if you follow scientific principles, obey the safety code, and follow directions provided by your 4-H leader.

You might start your 4-H aerospace project with a simple model airplane and wind up flying the real thing. Every step of the way, there is an exciting phase of aviation to learn about.

If you choose to participate in the 4-H aerospace program, you will not only be building model rockets and airplanes, but will learn about structures, engine systems, launching and related aerospace technology.

## Sherry Etheredge Says...

Using excess hot water wastes energy--and costs money.

Four major users of hot water in the home are the dishwasher, clothes washer, baths and showers, and hot water heater.

An average dishwasher uses 14 gallons of hot water per load--so operate with a properly arranged full load to save energy.

For clothes washers with

variable water levels, match the water level to the load size.

Run washers having no water level adjustment with full loads of laundry to maximize efficiency.

Baths and showers are major users of household hot water.

Reduce the 36 gallon full-tub-bath to a low-level 12 gallon version--or install a flow restricting device in the

shower to reduce hot water use.

Check the thermostat of the hot water heater--are set for 140 degrees higher, but water may not be needed.

Consider adding insulation blanket to the tank of the hot water heater to flush the sediment out of the tank frequently for improved efficiency.

In some areas, three buckets of water need to be drained from the faucet at the end of the hot water tank.

If allowed to build, sediment prevents the tank from heating as efficiently as it can in a sediment tank.

### Tahoka, Wilson Show Growth In The Number Of Telephones

The percentage of telephone growth in Tahoka and Wilson in 1977 as compared to the 1976 growth somewhat exceeds the record growth of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, according to O. D. Hearn, Brownfield division manager.

"Tahoka gained 145 telephones in 1977, a substantial 98.6 percent increase over the 27 gained in 1976. The exchange gained 57 main stations (which could be equated to customers), a 78.1 percent increase over the 32 gained in 1976," Hearn said.

"Wilson gained 125 percent more telephones with 27 compared to 12 for this period. Main stations had a 350 percent gain with 9 compared to the 2 netted in 1976," Hearn added.

At the end of 1977, Tahoka had a total of 2,025 telephones and 1,189 main stations. Wilson had 357 telephones, which included 230 main stations.

General Telephone Company's record gain (105,967 telephones) was 25.7 percent and the main station gain (49,687) was 33.7 percent for 1977, compared to 1976.

"The company serves more than 1,367,000 tele-

phones and over 800,000 main stations in Texas, New Mexico, Arkansas, and Oklahoma," Hearn concluded.

Prescribed Reading By DAYTON PARKE PARKER PHARMACY

There are two ways to administer a prescribed eye medication to a dissenting infant or child. You may sit on the floor with the child's head firmly between your thighs. Next, place your legs over the lower part of the child's body and legs. With the youngster temporarily immobilized, your hands are free to gently separate the eyelids... pulling the lower lid down and the upper one up. With the dropper about one inch from the eye, place the medication into the lower lid in the prescribed quantity. Another method is to hold the dropper in your hand, place your forearms over the child's upper arms and immobilize his head by placing the heels of your hands against the cheeks of his face. Now you can gently place the drops on the lower lid. Eye medications should be administered at room temperature.

### STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Gov. Dolph Briscoe by executive order took the first step toward establishing a state-owned deepwater terminal for unloading imported crude oil along the Texas coast.

Briscoe activated the Texas Deepwater Port Authority after entering a finding that private enterprise has not come up with workable plans

for a superport.

Major oil companies united to plan Seadock—a nearly \$1 billion facility 27 miles off the Texas coast near Freeport. Federal restrictions and a limitation on profits upset the deal.

Hugh L. Scott, president of Seadock Inc., told a House committee the terminal could not be financed

privately in view of federal strings. He said he doubts even the state could finance the facility with revenue bond financing approved by a Senate bill passed during a special legislative session last summer.

Briscoe announced last week he will appoint the nine members of the Deepwater Port Authority authorized by the Senate bill.

Scott said Seadock is willing to transfer its pending port license from the federal government to the state.

Seadock spent more than \$20 million developing plans for the terminal.

Exxon, Mobil and Gulf pulled out of the consortium which proposed to build Seadock after proceedings to obtain the license. They provided 52 per cent of the project's financial backing.

#### Insurance Going Up

Cost of homeowners and other property insurance is almost certainly going up this year—but probably not as much as the 11.4 per cent statewide average recommended by the State Board of Insurance staff.

Chairman Hugh Yantis said he is hopeful of holding the amount of the increase below that level.

No decision is expected for several weeks.

#### Courts Speak

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the death penalty assessed a San Antonio man in a 1974 murder because the condemned man was not permitted to challenge credibility of a state witness who was his roommate.

The Supreme Court reversed a \$71,000 award to orphans of a couple killed when their car hit a Missouri Pacific freight train in Falls County nine years ago.

In another case, the high court found doctors who make diagnoses for insurance companies are not necessarily subject to malpractice suits when their verdicts prevent a patient from collecting a claim.

The Court of Criminal Appeals decided a constitutional amendment gives it authority to compel fast trials by writs of mandamus.

Divided 5-4, the Criminal Appeals Court upheld the 50-year prison sentence given a Houston man who shot and stabbed a narcotics agent.

#### Aging Grants Approved

The Governor's Committee on Aging has awarded 19 grants totalling \$5.6 million in federal funds to support meal programs and other social services for older Texans.

Nine existing nutrition projects received funds and three new group meal programs for the elderly were authorized.

Seven area agencies on aging, which function as focal points for the statewide network of services administered by the Committee on Aging, also received grants.

Grants to new meal pro-

grams included Alamo Area Council of Governments, \$192,679 (Atascosa, Banderita, Frio, Gillespie, Karnes, Kendall, Kerr, Medina and Wilson Counties); Killeen, \$25,000 for a model home for senior citizens; and Plains Area Agency on Aging, \$57,110 (Hale, Taylor and Garza Counties).

Chairman of the Cotton Subcommittee of the Committee on Agriculture, Charles Russell, National Council economist, will also speak at the session. His remarks at cotton export prospects and opportunities will be for 1978.

Presiding at the business session will be TCGA President Morris Jones of San Juan, Texas, and Vice President Don Craft of Plains.

A highlight for the ladies at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, March 11, in the Convention Center Banquet Hall will be "Harvestfaire" featuring presentations by five exhibitors on microwave and crepe cooking. Two winners will be given as door prizes.

For entertainment TCGA is bringing in "Gospel Opry" stars Jeannie Pruitt, Ronnie Profit and other groups to close out the meeting on Saturday night. The performance will be free at exhibitor booths on both days of the convention.

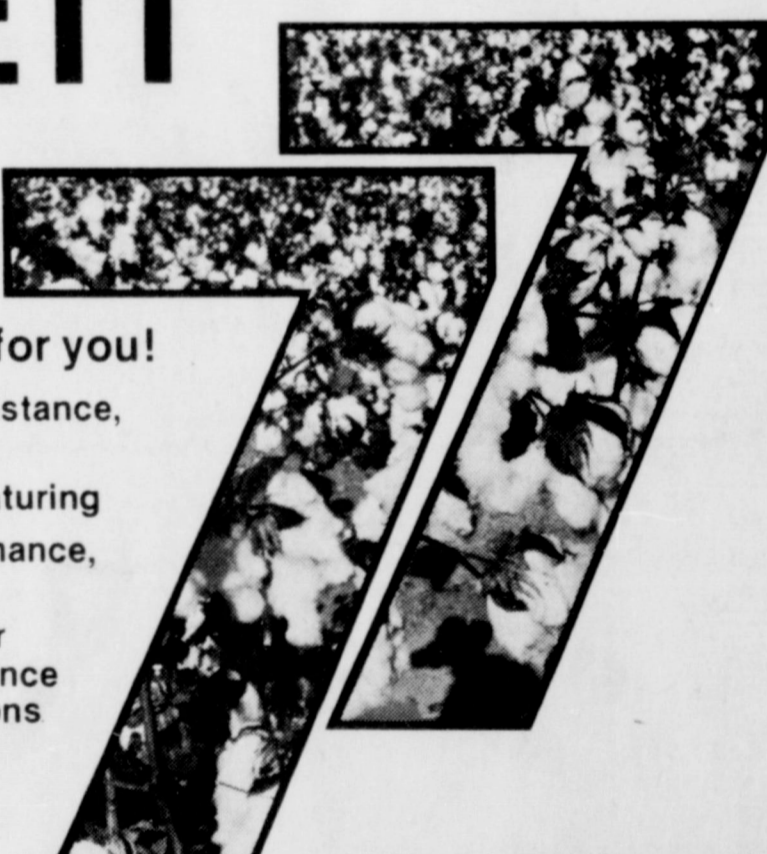

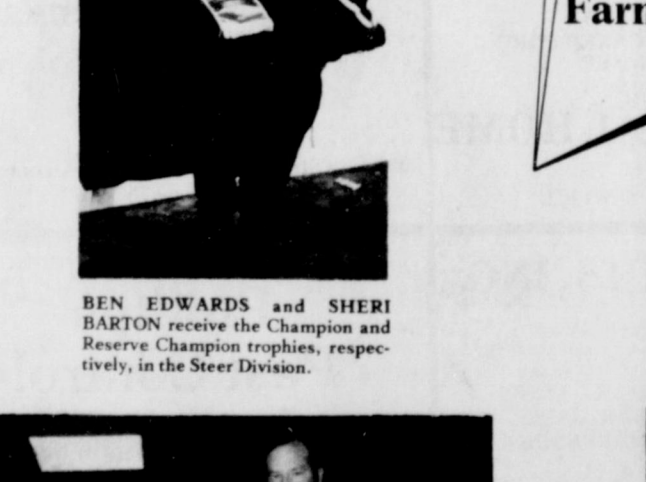
