Still Time For Soil Testing It's not too late to have soil

samples tested. Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratories at College Station, Lubbock, and Seymour are processing samples promptly and reporting results about a week after receiving samples. Recent cold weather and wet soils have delayed sampling in some areas, so that a backlog has not developed in the laboratories

The level of available nutrients in a soil is specially important for the efficient and profitable use of fertilizers. Soil tests have been developed to provide information about soil nutrients as a basis for determining if the soil level is adequate (high) or

deficient (low). Soils low in a nutrient have a high probability of producing increased yields when that nutrient is added in the fertilizer while a soil high in the nutrient will benefit little from adding

more of the same fertilizer. A costly error in fertilization is to add fertilizers containing nutrients already present in adequate amounts. This does not contribute to increased yields and drives production costs up, something farmers can ill afford during this period of

mic stress A good evaluation of soil nutrient levels greatly improves the chances for profitable returns from fertilization, so soil testing

should be a regular standard procedure in every farming operation.

Grow Your Own **Garden Transplants**

Use of transplants is one of the keys to successful gardening, and an individual can grow his own vigorous transplants indoors. However, care should be used not to start them too early.

This is a common mistake made by inexperienced gardeners. Transplants from seed planted too early become spindly, weak, tall, and yellow and do not do well when set out in the

For the best survival and quick recovery after planting in the garden, transplants should be young, sturdy, and in good nutritional

Usually four to six weeks is sufficient time to grow most transplants. Vine crops take two to three weeks to develop two to three true leaves while lettuce takes three to four weeks. Tomatoes need five to seven weeks to reach transplanting stage. These time requirements are at the recommended day temperature of about 75 degrees F. and a night temperature of 60

To determine planting time for transplants, figure back four to six weeks from the average last spring frost date, which normally occurs in Lynn County about April 1st. Seed of most spring garden varieties should be planted about this time. Some transplants such as cabbage, broccoli, lettuce, green onions, and spinach can be set in the garden four to six weeks before the last frost date.

When starting plants indoors, I suggest using a soiless or synthetic soil mix available at garden centers or nurseries.

Seed can be started in almost any type container such as flower pots, milk cartons, or cake plans. Be sure the container has holes

for adequate drainage. Once you've got the needed materials and planting time is at hand, fill the containers with the synthetic mix, firm it in well, and then water thoroughly. Space the seed evenly, cover lightly, and water again.

To improve germination, I suggest slipping the container into a plastic bag and placing it in an area at room temperature, but out of direct sunlight. Remove the bag when the seeds first sprout and place the container in sunlight.

Once the container has been removed from the plastic bag, water must be added to maintain good moisture. Frequent watering will be necessary, but use care to avoid saturation. After plants have two to three true leaves, daily watering may be needed.

When the plants are of adequate size and outside conditions are suitable for plant growth, transplant them into the garden area.

PHARMACY

There are two ways to administer a prescribed eye medication to a dissenting infant or child. You may sit on the floor with the child's head firmly between your thighs. Next, place your legs over the lower part of the child's body and legs. With the youngster temporarily immobilized, your hands are free to gently separate the eyelids . . . pulling the lower lid down and the upper one up. With the dropper about one inch from the eye, place medication into the lower lid in the prescribed quantity. Another method is to hold the dropper in your hand, place your forearms over the child's upper arms and immobilize his head by placing the heels of your ands against the cheeks of his face. Now you can gently lace the drops on the lower id. Eye medications should administered at room







Briscoe activated the Texas Deepwater Port Authority after entering a finding that private enterprise has not come up with workable plans

for a superport.

united to plan Seadock-a nearly \$1 billion facility 27 miles off the Texas coast near Freeport. Federal restrictions and a limitation on profits upset the deal.

Hugh L. Scott, president of Seadock Inc., told a House committee the terminal could not be financed

privately in view of federal strings. He said he doubts even the state could finance the facility with revenue bond financing approved by a Senate bill passed during a special legislative session last summer.

Briscoe announced last week he will appoint the nine members of the Deepwater Port Authority authorized by the Senate bill.

Scott said Seadock is willing to transfer its pending port license from the federal government to the state.

Seadock spent more than \$20 million developing plans for the terminal.

Exxon, Mobil and Gulf puiled out of the consortium which proposed to build Seadock after proceedings to obtain the license. They provided 52 per cent of the project's financial backing.

55's Still the Limit Fifty-five miles per hour

is still the speed limit. For the 13th time, the State Highway and Public

Transportation Commission set 55 as the top speed for travel on Texas highways. Each 120 days, the commission must re-examine the

limit as directed by the legislature in 1973. If the commission finds the federal law requires the 55 mph limit, it must follow

suit to prevent loss of federal highway funds. The federal law, passed during the 1973-74 oil embargo, is still in effect.

The new finding extends the Texas limit forward 120 days from March 16. Program Saved

The State Board of Human Resources rebudgeted \$4 million for free medical prescriptions for the poor.

At the same time, board members directed its staff and an advisory panel to figure out how to cut the program's cost without hurting the poor.

Funds will not be available in 1979 for another transfer to the program.

The money was transferred recently from funds appropriated for nursing home care of the mentally retarded. The latter had a lot of unspent money.

Welfare beneficiaries can get up to three prescriptions a month at state-federal exInsurance Going Up

Cost of homeowners and other property insurance is almost certainly going up this year-but probably not as much as the 11.4 per cent statewide average recommended by the State Board of Insurance staff.

Chairman Hugh Yantis said he is hopeful of holding the amount of the increase below that level.

No decision is expected for several weeks.

Courts Speak

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the death penalty assessed a San Antonio man in a 1974 murder because the condemned man was not permitted to challenge credibility of a state witness who was his roommate.

The Supreme Court reversed a \$71,000 award to orphans of a couple killed when their car hit a Missouri Pacific freight train in Falls County nine years ago.

In another case, the high court found doctors who make diagnoses for insurance companies are not necessarily subject to malpractice suits when their verdicts prevent a patient from collecting a claim.

The Court of Criminal Appeals decided a constitutional amendment gives it authority to compel fast trials by writs of mandamus.

Divided 5-4, the Criminal Appeals Court upheld the 50-year prison sentence given a Houston man who shot and stabbed a narcotics




