Experts said we would have 84 days of sand in 1978. Unless I've miscalculated, we only lack a few lucky can you get!

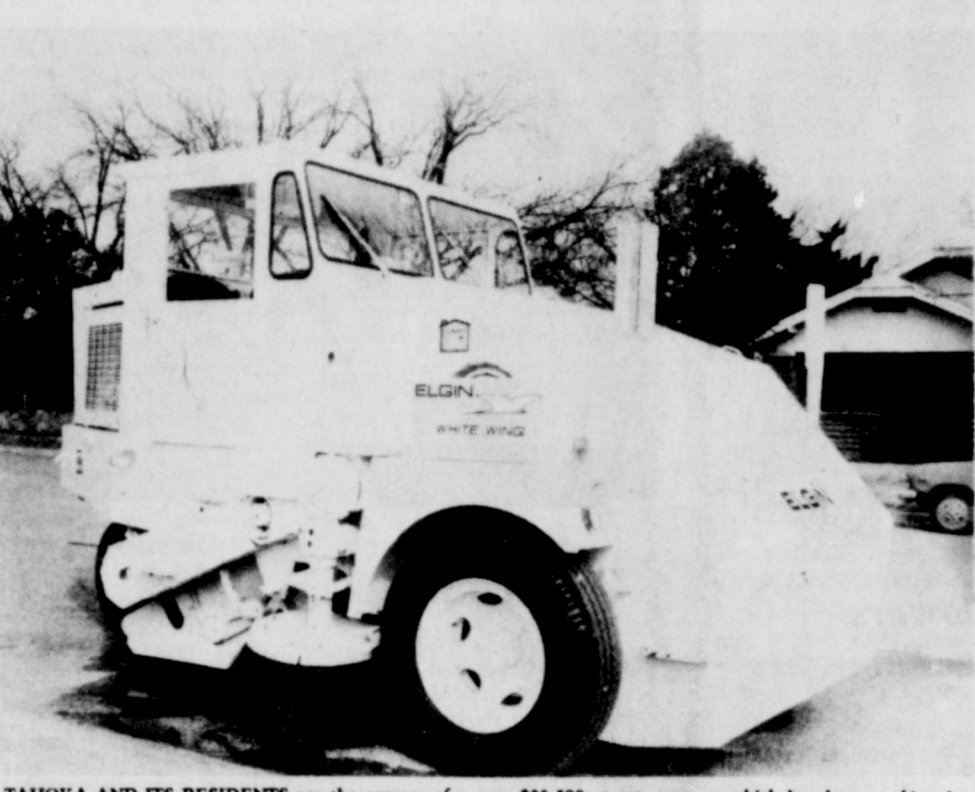

agricultural products, has introduced legislation to require imported beef to meet the same inspection standards as American beef, and has consistently advocated policies which move us toward a supply and demand economy that discourages rather than discourages production.

He was first elected to the U. S. Congress in 1974, and at the end of his first term was voted the most effective of the 75 first-term Democrats.

Krueger calls himself an "independent Democrat," for he says he is independent of power politics and narrow partisanship. He expressed his opposition to the Panama Canal Treaty.

His opponents in the Senatorial race are Republican Senator John Tower, and Joe Christi, Democrat, who was at one time chairman of the State Insurance Board.

Prescribed Reading

"Eat whatever you like and still lose weight." Sound far fetched? Perhaps not. Researchers at the University of Illinois Medical Center are working with a compound that prevents from one-quarter to one-half of the intestinal absorption of food calories and all. Originally developed for use in making x-rays of the intestinal tract, the substance is known as perfluorooctyl bromide. In tests, unrelated to weight control, it was found that lab animals injected with the chemical lost weight without any adverse side effects. Now, experiments are underway to determine if the compound is safe for human consumption and weight control. Testing will require two to five years and will involve patients who are at least 25 pounds overweight. Experiments will be conducted in hospitals where vitamin therapy and instructions on maintaining weight-loss will supplement the regime.

Veterans Not Applying For Benefits

Many eligible veterans residing in Texas are failing to apply for State benefits to which they might be entitled.

According to Sid A. Lowery, Veterans Service Officer for Lynn County, many veterans are still unaware of their possible entitlement to certain benefits provided through the State government of Texas.

A veteran residing in Texas is entitled to free Disabled Veteran license plates for his personal automobile if he has service-connected disabilities which are rated 70 percent or more by either the U. S. Veterans Administration or a branch of the Armed Forces of the United States. A veteran who has service-connected disabilities of 60 percent or more is entitled to free Texas drivers license.

Another benefit provided by State Law is a property tax exemption for veterans with service-connected disabilities of 10 percent or more, and for widows and widowers of veterans whose disability ratings of 10 percent or more were in existence at the time of their deaths. Also eligible for a property tax exemption is the spouse of a person who died or was killed during military service, and the minor children of such active duty deceased persons. The tax exemption runs from the first \$1,500 of the assessed value for a 10 percent rating, to a maximum of the first \$3,000 of assessed value for the 100 percent rating. The exemption for the spouses of deceased servicemen is the first \$2,500 of the assessed value.

Another benefit is free admission to all State Parks in Texas for veterans with service-connected disabilities rated 60 percent or more or suffered the loss of use of a lower extremity. All of these benefits are provided through laws passed by the State Legislature, and additional information on them, and others, can be obtained from your local Veterans Service Officer.

Snowden Makes Statement To Voters In Texas' 17th District

Jim Snowden of Tye, a Democratic candidate for U.S. Representative, District 17, was authorized to publish his statement to the voters as follows:

THEN: More than a century ago, fish and chips were eaten in England. The first commercially produced fish and chips were prepared by Joseph Malin in 1865 in his East London shop, "Malin's of Bow." 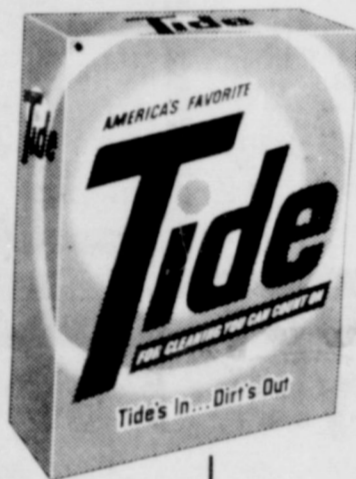

Tahoka's School Board Renews Teacher Contracts Last Week

At the March meeting of Tahoka Independent School District's Board of Education, trustees renewed the contracts of personnel recommended by building principals, and accepted the resignation of Mrs. Kathleen Hall, effective March 8th.

The same election team as that of the City was appointed to represent the school in the April 1st trustee election, and Mrs. Hazel Connolly was appointed absentee voting clerk, absentee voting to have begun March 13 and go through the 28th, at the City Hall.

Trustees approved the report of the 1978 Textbook Committee, and voted to advertise for bids for construction of an outside entrance to the northeast corner of the high school building, the room to be used to house a business manager and tax assessor-collector for the school.

A bid of \$455 from Farmers Co-op in Tahoka was accepted, the bid being

for excess tires.

The Board accepted Superintendent Jim Coulston's recommendation that the street in front of the high school officially be made a one-way street. He reported that he would ask to be put on the agenda for the City Council's April meeting, to ask that this be done.

PCG to Elect One Director

Lynn County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a Businessman Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Monday, March 20, at 6 p.m. in the Lyntegar Room at Tahoka.

Announcement of election arrangements comes from Joe D. Unfred of New Home, Lynn County Producer Director to the 25-county commodity organization, and Dwain Lusk of Tahoka, current Businessman Director. Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a cotton producer and the other a businessman. They are elected on alternate years to serve two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

Unfred and Lusk are urging all interested parties to attend and take part in the election in which both farmers and businessmen are eligible to vote. They explained that the election meeting was set at 6 p.m. to prevent its interference with the Farm Bureau political forum which begins at 7 o'clock the same evening.

A member of the PCG staff will conduct the election, present a brief summary of PCG objectives and activities, and answer any questions concerning the commodity organization and its work.

Sherry Etheredge Says...

Parents can help children cope with stress--and prevent harmful stress that can damage a child.

Teaching children how to feel successful and satisfied about the way they handle experiences is vital.

Parents can teach children to enjoy these feelings in four ways:

- Encourage striving for improvement, but teach children there is no such thing as perfection.
- Praise a child for gains made, in order to keep interest in improving alive, but never give children the idea that they must always prove themselves "worthy."
- Look honestly at parent goals and the child's goals, and measure them by the amount of effort they will require. Determine whether they are worth striving for--if not, don't waste your efforts.
- Encourage optimism by dwelling on the pleasant aspects of life.
- Provide chances for a child to succeed.

depends on the adults in their lives.

Of course, it is impossible to totally eliminate stress, and a small amount of stress is necessary--even happiness and success cause some stress.

Stress, simply defined, is the body's response to any demand made on it. However, too much stress or too intense stress can damage a child.

Sometimes parents unknowingly expose children to stress that carries harmful results into adulthood.

Parents often pressure children into conforming to parental expectations. When these expectations are very different from the child's abilities or preferences, the child may develop feelings of guilt, failure, and suppressed anger. This anger may surface years later in the form of suicide, dropping out of school, running away, and other destructive ways.

Warning signs of harmful stress in children are:

- Accident proneness.
- General irritability, which might show up in unusually aggressive behavior or very passive behavior.
- Stuttering and other speech difficulties.
- Grinding of teeth.
- Insomnia, which is usually a result of being "keyed up."
- Bedwetting.
- Upset stomach.
- Headaches.
- Loss of appetite or excessive appetite.
- Nightmares.

These signs indicate a need for parents to carefully guide their child into feelings of self-satisfaction by helping that child develop abilities to cope with stress.

Miss Marietta Montgomery presided at the meeting, and Mrs. W. T. Luttrell gave the opening prayer.

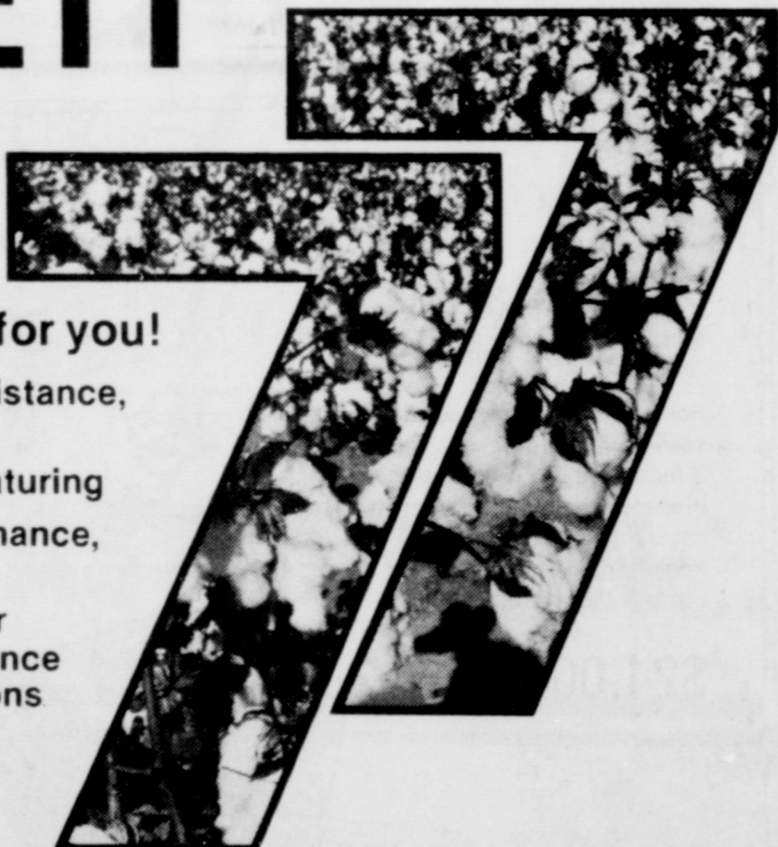
Following the short business meeting, Mrs. V. F. Jones gave the devotional.
