Bill Teague, vice-president of the Purex Corporation who spoke at commencement exercises at Lubbock Christian College last Saturday, said when he was in college, he had an English teacher who was entirely convinced that a thorough knowledge of Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales* would enable a body to completely master all the world's problems.

English teachers don't have a corner on the English frailty that "what concerns me concerns the whole town," or to put it more bluntly, "Like me or you just ain't lived!"

How often we become entrenched in our own little circle of activities, and we fail to recognize the world is big and we are oh, so small!

Saturday is the culmination of several months of campaigning, and we voters have the dear privilege of going to the polls and exercising a right, a word which has become battered and overused.

I feel so strongly that it is something more than an obligation. I owe it to myself and to my children to be a part of the process which sets a man to protect my interests where the vote is made.

I feel so strongly about the situation that I hereby establish a pre-requisite for voters—don't, unless you vote, and don't, unless you've studied the issues and the candidates' qualifications.

The grocer submitted the following article in *National Enquirer*: "Food costs less in real terms today than it did 25 years ago, according to the University of Georgia College of Agriculture. If you take the average increase in wages and apply the same percentage increase to 1950 prices, a pound of round steak would cost more than \$3.00. A pound of hamburger or chicken would cost more than \$2. A quart of milk would run 70 cents and a dozen eggs would sell for \$2."

How about this, from the latest issue of *Weekend*, courtesy of Larry Hagood: "Before a scheduled visit to Texas Instruments headquarters on his recent U.S. trip, Romanian President Ceausescu sent advance men to the Dallas office to explain his requirements. A red carpet had to be rolled out wherever he walked in plant, the agents said; welcoming posters had to be displayed along his route; female employees of Texas Instruments would have to wear miniature Romanian flags, and Ceausescu expected to be given a hunting rifle and a riding outfit, plus a mink coat and a gold watch for his wife. Texas Instruments officials refused to the whole list—and to scaled-down versions made by the Romanians in four subsequent meetings—but Ceausescu showed up anyway."

Hawthorne Ties Region I-AA Record In High Jump; Bound For UIL State Meet

Mark Hawthorne, junior at Tahoka High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marlin Hawthorne, will be at the State Meet in Austin on May 12-13, having won the Regional I-AA high jump event in Lubbock on April 28th.

He was the only performer of the day to tie or break a meet mark, when he leaped 6' 5 1/4" to match the high jump record set by Buddy Ward of Crane, in 1970. He has held his school record of 6' 3" since he was a freshman.

Young Hawthorne began his jumping career in the fifth grade, in summer track activities. That year he jumped 4' 4" and placed 4th or 5th in a state meet. By the time he was a 7th-grader, he was jumping 4' 10", and in the 8th grade, he won every meet except the district. In summer track that year, his best jump was a 5' 10" and he placed 6th in the state in the 14-15-year-old competition.

As a high school freshman, he won his first three meets and placed second in UIL District, with a 6' 2". At regional that year, he cleared the bar at 5' 8".

County, Precinct Contests Guarantee Good Turn-Out For Saturday Election

Unusually brisk interest in the Lynn County Judge's race, and in the Precincts 2 and 4 Commissioners' race this year, in the Democratic Primary, almost assures that area voters will defy a statewide prediction of a light voter turnout. The County Clerk's office reported Wednesday that 125 persons had voted absentee.

Polls at the ten voting places in the county will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. on Saturday, and results will be posted on a board on the north side of the courthouse when boxes are in, says C. W. Roberts, County Clerk, himself a candidate in an uncontested race.

A Republican Primary will

be held at the City Hall for the entire county.

Melvin Burks, school principal, and Bill Griffin, retired County Extension agent, are candidates in the Judge's race, while two candidates, Marvin Pierce and Lyndell Wood, are opposing incumbent J. C. Gandy, Commissioner in Precinct 2. Gandy was appointed in April of 1977 to serve the unexpired term of his brother, the late Dorman Gandy.

In Precinct 4, E. R. Blakney and J. T. Miller, both longtime county residents, are on the ballot for Commissioner.

The 28th District State Senate race has also generated considerable interest, with Tahoka native E. L. Short being a front-runner in the contest.

Short's opponents are Jesse T. George, Brownfield; and Delwin Jones, Don Workman, and Morris W. Turner, all of Lubbock.

Coaches for the track celebrity are Clayton McKinnon and Bruce Winn.

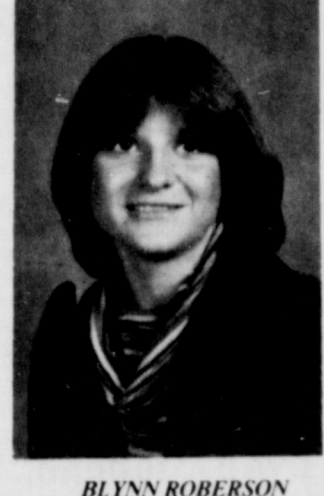
Hawthorne is a versatile trackster. He is active in the Future Farmers organization; he's on the varsity basketball team; and he plays football.

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Rudd Is On Appropriations Committee

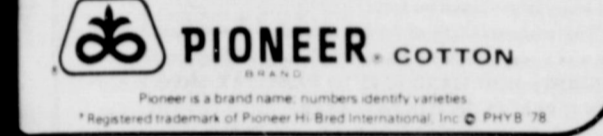

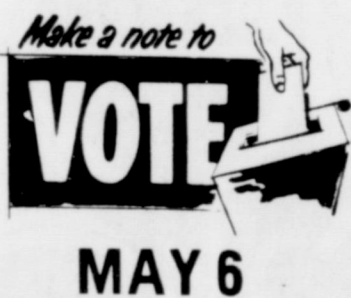

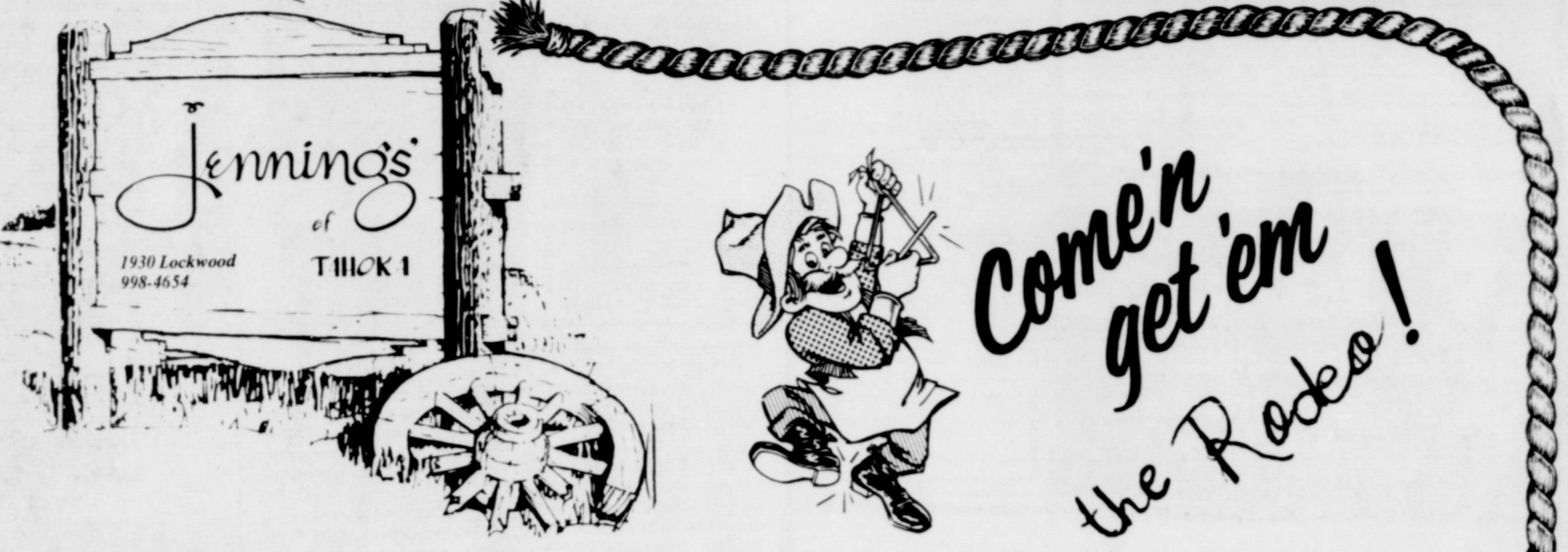

SPS Releases Beef Cattle Stats

According to Sam Thomas, manager of agriculture development for Southwest Public Service Company, 4,373,850 fat cattle were produced in the SPS service area for 1977. This production, revealed in a recent survey conducted by SPS, is the third highest in the history of the industry.

The survey which has been conducted since 1963 is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to production of fat cattle in the southern great plains area.

"During the 1977 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,734,740 head and is barely 10,000 head under the peak year of 1974 when 2,742,150 capacity was in use. This dropped to a low of 2.6 million in 1976 and present indications are that the 1978 year will see a new peak in feedlot capacity use," stated Thomas.

The survey also revealed that the 1978 feedyards doing custom feeding was one less than the preceding year, but that this represented the consolidation of reporting yards. The total number of yards surveyed continued to fall with a reduction of six from last year. This too reflects a consolidation, but is the eleventh year it has occurred. There were 274 yards counted in 1967, compared to 153 in 1978.

"The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community reached 8 billion dollars in 1977," Thomas stated, "and the farm sale value exceeded 2 billion dollars."

The survey also showed that the packing plant annual slaughter capacity jumped from 4,990,680 to 5.4 million head and the number of plants increased from 17 to 20. Thomas also stated that 589,000 of this capacity is now in use, but that this industry has made another estimated 8 billion dollar contribution to area business.

"The future of the feedlot industry appears to be the brightest of any period in its history, and this may not be good. Too many people believe this and with great majority acting together, adverse reactions can occur. The price being paid for feeder cattle is a case in point," emphasized Thomas.

Eventually the customer must be considered as to what he will do and we could have poor profits along with good prices if the customer refuses to go along with all this enthusiasm, Thomas said.

This survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area, concluded Thomas.

FDA says the warnings are needed because of widespread estrogen use and studies linking the use of estrogen-containing drugs to cancer of the uterus and to birth defects. Drug manufacturers are required to print the brochures and supply them to pharmacists and other dispensers of estrogen drugs.

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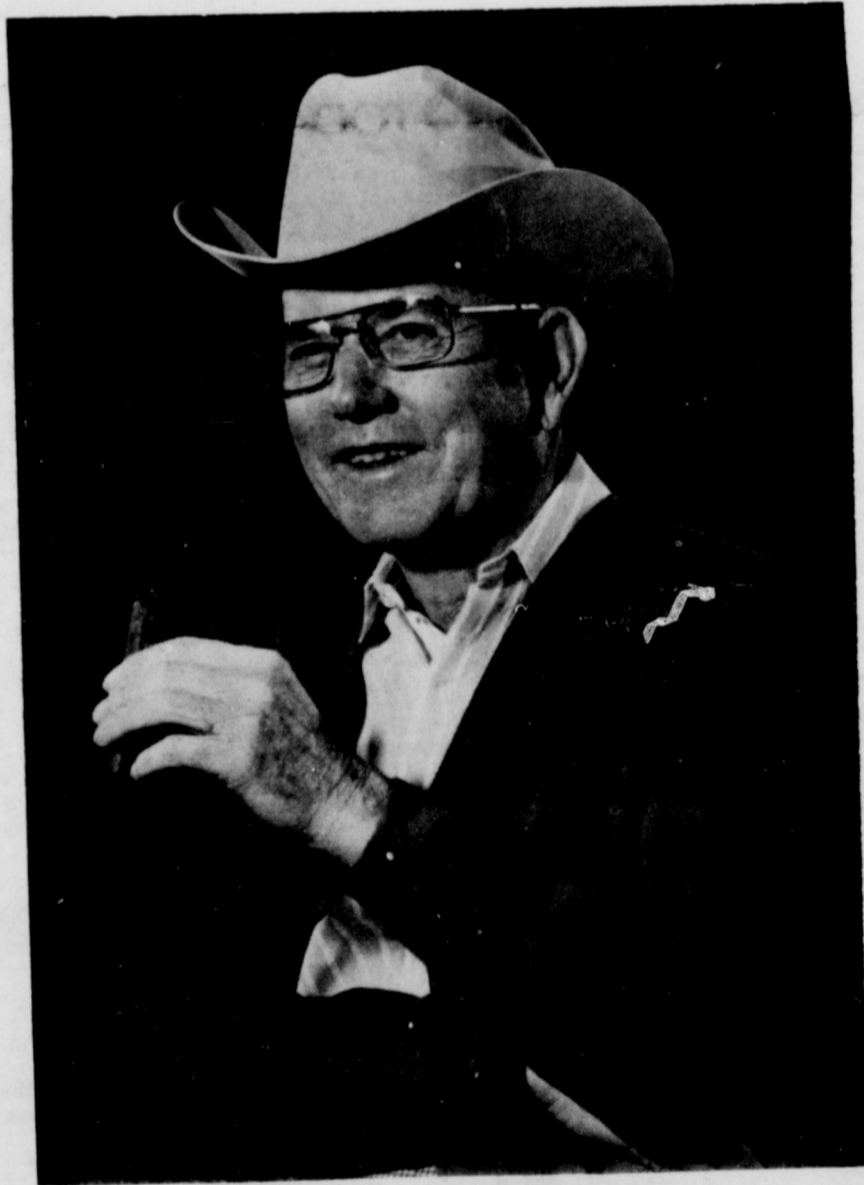

Pseudorabies In Swine Spreading

Pseudorabies, a virus disease of swine, cattle, and sheep, is spreading and becoming increasingly costly to U.S. hog producers.

A year-end survey of state animal health officials showed 1,256 cases of pseudorabies in 1977, compared with 118 in 1976, 225 in 1975, and 125 in 1974.

The cost of pseudorabies to swine producers in this country could be as much as \$21 to \$25 million annually, according to an economic impact study conducted by a special survey through the cooperation of the National Pork Producers Council.

More than 7,000 members of the National Pork Producers Council—every tenth name—were mailed questionnaires in July. Of the 2,421 valid responses, 42 percent reported that pseudorabies was a serious and costly problem in their community. Nearly 3.5 percent reported one or more infections during the survey period.

Although the nationwide dollar-loss estimates from the disease may be on the high side, movement of infected swine must be controlled or losses due to pseudorabies are expected to increase markedly.

Of the 1,256 cases reported last year by state animal health officials, 635 were confirmed in the laboratory and 621 diagnosed in the field. Most of the field-diagnosed cases, 515, were in Iowa. Only four cases of pseudorabies were reported in Texas in 1977.

Also known as Aujeszky's disease and "mat itch," pseudorabies affects cattle, sheep, dogs, cats, and other animals. In these animals, the disease is often fatal. In swine, pseudorabies causes abortions in sows as well as death in baby pigs. Since the disease can occur in adult swine with few, if any, visible symptoms, hogs serve as a natural reservoir for pseudorabies.

USDA licensed a vaccine for pseudorabies in swine last summer. However, most

states restrict or limit its use. Also, vaccinated swine cannot be differentiated from infected swine on the basis of tests available. This could result in restrictions on the movement of vaccinated swine.

Farm law changes approved April 26 by a House-Senate Conference Committee have the solid support of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock-based cotton producer organization.

If passed and signed by the President the bill, in particular, would bring the method of setting the cotton loan much closer to the method called for in PCG legislative policy adopted in January of 1977, officials note. In addition the new measure would put a four-year 48-cent minimum on the base U. S. loan, "which is still too low but is certainly better than the 44-cent loan we have now," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson.

The 1977 law required the Secretary of Agriculture to set the loan at the lower of two levels, one to be calculated from an average of U. S. spot market prices, the other from an average of the Liverpool "A" Index, a compilation of Northern Europe prices.

PCG has sought, since the 1977 Farm Act was first considered, to have the U. S. loan based solely on U. S. prices.

The legislation now pending still includes in the loan-setting process a calculation of both domestic and European prices, but the formula for each would be revised. And perhaps more importantly, Johnson points out, the new legislation would permit, but would not require, the Secretary to use the "A" Index calculation.

"While we still would prefer a law that doesn't even mention foreign prices in the U. S. loan calculation formula," Johnson continues, "if the new Conference Committee measure becomes law we will at least have a chance to convince the Secretary that the 'A' Index figures should not be used when using those figures would set the loan at a level below the level indicated by domestic prices."

The "A" Index calculation used to set the 1978 loan at 44 cents was equal to 90 percent of the average index for the first two weeks of October, as specified in the law. The new measure calls for this calculation to be based on the 15-week period from July 1 to October 15 each year.

Current law, the 1977 Act, calls for setting the loan at the lower of (1) 90 percent of the adjusted "A" Index average or (2) 85 percent of the three-year average of U. S. spot market prices. If the Conference Committee measure becomes law, the domestic calculation will be based on the previous five years, dropping the high and low years and averaging the remaining three.

Ninety percent of this three-year average of U. S. spot market prices would become the maximum level at which the loan could be set. The "A" Index computation would be the minimum, and the Secretary would have authority to set the loan at any point between the two.

Following the formula set out in the pending change, Johnson says, would result in the loan for 1978 being raised to 48 cents, the statutory minimum. For 1979, depending on what prices do for the remainder of this year, the loan would be anywhere between the 48-cent minimum and about 51 cents, he concludes.

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

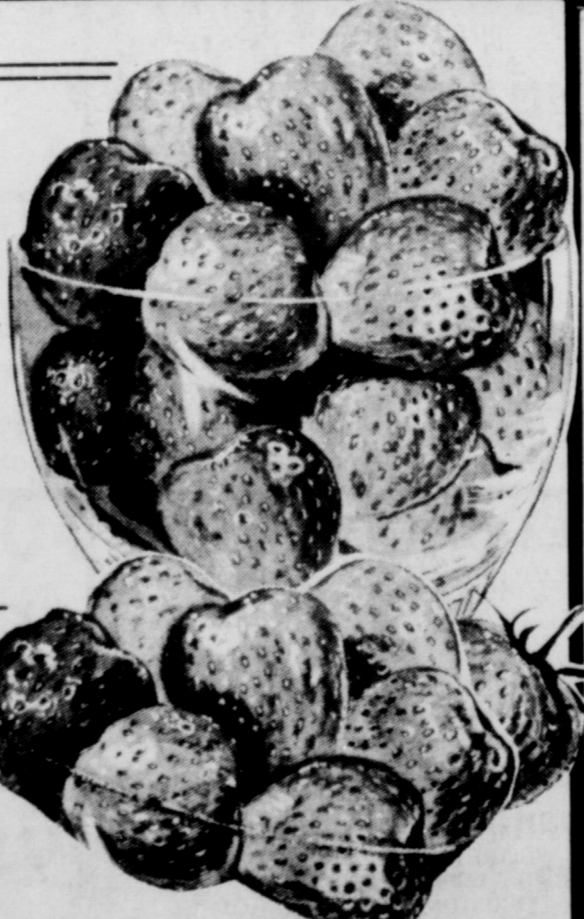
