## Lynn Countians Lean Toward Hill For Governor

### Short And Workman, Rhodes And Stenholm Set For Runoff

Tahoka's candidate for the Texas Senate from District 15, E. L. Short, will square off against Texas Tech graduate and close friend of Governor Dolph Briscoe, Don Workman, in the June 3rd runoff election. Workman came on strong as challenger for the runoff. Short nosed out three candidates, getting a voter nod in his home

county, 1,494 votes, and he led the ballot in Andrews, Dawson, Gaines, Garza, and Martin Counties.

Short had an official tally of 10,038 votes on Sunday, following the Saturday Primary, compared to 15,496 for Workman; 9,781 for M. W. Turner; 9,598 for Delwin Jones; and 6,380 for Jesse T. George.

The incumbent Governor Dolph Briscoe was defeated by Attorney General John Hill, by a wide majority, even in Lynn County where Hill had 1,183 votes, to Briscoe's 700. Former Governor Preston Smith had 322 votes in Lynn County.

In the 17th District Congressional race, Abilene lawyer A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes went ahead of Stamford farmer Charles Stenholm, in the Lynn County polls, by 42 votes. Rhodes had a total of 743, and Stenholm had 701, thus assuring a runoff.

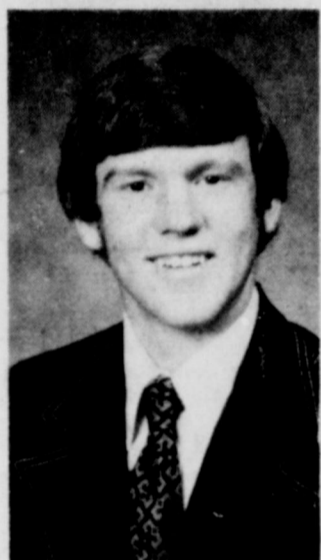
Rhodes carried each box in the county except New Home and Wilson.

Other candidates in that race and their Lynn County votes are as follows: Jim Snowden, 230; Crews McCulloch, 43; Jim Sharp, Jr., 120; Fike Godfrey, 111; and Jim Baum, 129.

All students in Tahoka schools will be dismissed at 1:30 p.m. Friday, May 12, and buses will run at that time, according to Jim Coulston, superintendent.

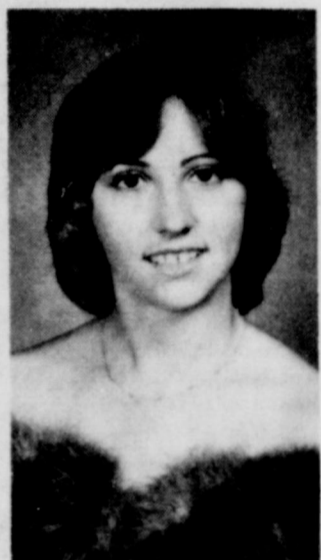
The early dismissal will provide faculty members with the opportunity to meet with Region XVII Education Service Center representatives.

### Burks Is County Judge; Blakney Wins Commissioner Position; Wood, Gandy Due Second Race

Melvin Burks, principal of Tubb Elementary School in Tahoka, won the County Judge's race by a landslide last Saturday, in the Democratic Primary, defeating retired County Agent Bill Griffin.

E. R. Blakney, New Home, defeated J. T. Miller of Tahoka by only nine votes, in the Precinct 4 race, and in the Precinct 2 race. Lyndell Wood will face incumbent J. C. Gandy in the June 3rd runoff. In that race, Gandy garnered 229 votes, compared to Wood's 190, and Marvin Pierce's 92 votes.

### Chamber Breakfast Is Tuesday

Tahoka Chamber of Commerce members will meet for breakfast at Tahoka Cafeteria next Tuesday, May 16, at 7 o'clock.

Burks had the lead in every voting box in the county, with the exception of Draw, and of Lakeview where there was a tie. He received a total of 1,443 votes, compared to Griffin's 816.

A total of 2,317 voters turned out for the Democratic Primary in the county, and 24 voted in the Republican Primary. [see breakdown of election results, elsewhere in this edition]

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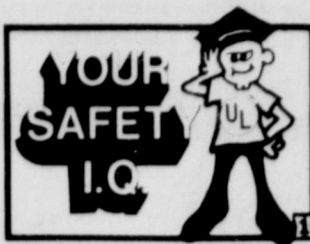

#### Sgt. Kelly Is Commended

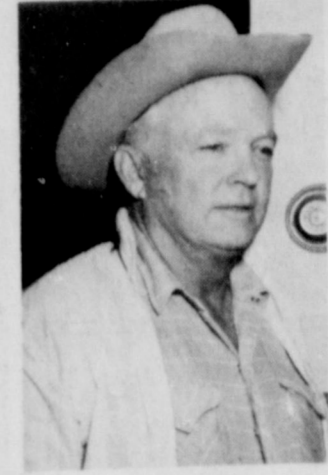

#### Lit Moore Will Attend Meeting On Soil/Water Conservation

Lit Moore, chairman of Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District, will be attending a statewide meeting in San Antonio on Thursday, May 18, to discuss the Resources Conservation Act of 1977.

George C. Marks, state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service, and Carl Spencer, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will co-chair the meeting.

"The act recognizes the need for public participation to insure that conservation programs are responsive to public needs," Moore said. Individuals and groups with an interest in conservation have been invited to attend one of the statewide meetings, the other one being in Stephenville on May 16th.

"One point I want to make clear is that districts in their

40-year history have assisted landowners in voluntary conservation programs on their farms and ranches. We do not advocate any other approach to farm and ranch land privately owned and that interests and welfare of owners must be served. Programs must be acceptable to them," he added.

Subsequent meetings also be held in each local and water conservation district. Interested persons are being encouraged to bring written or typed statements reflecting direction they think conservation programs should take in the future. Such statements will be accepted as a part of the record and considered fully.

"We hope public will insure an effective, workable conservation program in the future," Moore said.

Every day the heart pumps about 5,000 liters of blood, weighing six tons, through some 60,000 miles of circulatory system. To keep your heart in peak condition, give it a daily workout. A conditioning effect usually results from 20 minutes of exercise. If the exercise does not cause your heart to beat faster than 150 times per minute. If your heart rate goes above 150 per minute, you may need 12 to 20 minutes of exercise for conditioning to occur. As you condition your heart, you will probably find that it beats more slowly at rest. Begin slowly. Walk some each day, until you can build up to a brisk 1/2 hour walk. Well-groomed hands and contribute toward a pleasing, lovely appearance.

Regular care and weekly manicures will keep even the most beautiful hands attractive.

The basis for healthy skin nails is good nutrition. Surface care is also important.

Keep hands soft by washing frequently with soap and water.

When doing yard work, wear gloves to protect against blisters and possible damage to hands--most damage can be effectively done by wearing gloves, so hope public health officials are effective in their conservation program in the future.

Remove nail polish by using a non-acetone nail polish remover which will not damage the nail surface especially if used often or not washed off. Do not polish off--doing so strips top layers of the nail.

Use a chamois nail buffer to stimulate circulation, keep nails healthy, and promote growth. A buffer also polishes and shines unpolished nails for an attractive appearance. Consider leaving nails unpolished for a while to allow them to "breathe." A white nail pencil used under the nails can give a more attractive finish.

Apply nail polish to give color to the nail and cover white spots often caused by hits on the nail or cuticle area--these spots cannot be removed, they must grow off.

# WHAT IS PARITY?

There has been a lot of talk about Parity recently, but few people really understand the term. Parity is simply a measure of farm buying power. Here is an example of Parity that demonstrates what has happened to farm buying power in the last few years.

In 1973 a popular size and brand of diesel tractor was selling for \$14,189 and that same year cotton was selling for 65¢ per pound. It took 43 bales of cotton to buy the tractor.

Today, that same tractor costs \$27,487 — and that same grade and staple of cotton is selling for 45¢ per pound.

To buy that same tractor today it takes 122 bales of cotton. Simple mathematics tells us it takes 79 MORE bales of cotton to buy the tractor today — than it did as recently as 1973.

If it took the same number of bales — that would be PARITY.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

A provision requiring that exclusion or exemptions from advertised benefits be detailed in all ads.

Specification that buyers have 10 days to look over and reject an accident and health policy.

Prohibition against knocking competitors or using technical words.

Definition of "pre-existing condition" for which health benefits can be refused.

A ban against offering gifts in order to sell policies by a deadline.

Extension of regulations to pre-paid legal service and health maintenance organization (HMO) ads.

Legislature Changed

The Texas legislature will be somewhat different next year—but not much as far as personnel is concerned.

One of the smallest turn-over of modern times resulted from Saturday's elections, in spite of retirements of Senate Dean A.M. Akin of Paris and his House counterpart, Rep. L. DeWitt Hale of Corpus Christi, and mandatory redistricting in Fort Worth.

Speaker Bill Clayton said his reelection as House presiding officer is secure, and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby faced light opposition in his bid for a third term as Senate president.

Sixty-two incumbent representatives seeking re-election were unopposed, as were seven senators trying for new terms. Twenty-nine others, who drew no opposition in the primary will face challenges on the November general election ballot.

Courts Speak

In a dispute over sale of Cameron County land for a state park, the Supreme Court declined to order a law firm to discontinue representing one of the parties in the action.

Relying on rulings growing out of auto cases, the Third Court of Civil Appeals held in a suit for damage insurance a pilot was operating his airplane, even though he had stepped out of the plane to place wheelchairs. The plane moved forward and hit trees.

Horse race wagering opponents asked the Third Court of Civil Appeals to

order a trial on the issue of whether the State Democratic Party legally placed a betting referendum on the May 6 ballot.

The Court of Criminal Appeals dismissed indictments of a Jefferson County man because they did not set out the amount of drugs he was charged with delivering.

AG Opinions

Attorney General John Hill held the Texas Commission on Jail Standards lacks authority to promulgate a rule equalizing salaries of county jail personnel with those of law enforcement officers in the field.

The opinion noted commissioners courts have authority to fix salaries of jail personnel at a level lower than the pay of other county law enforcement officers of equal rank and seniority.

Hill also concluded two employees of Dallas County Community College accused of sexual harassment could see only part of a grievance filed against them by a female employee of the school. No violation of law was alleged.

In another opinion, Hill said the three-year statute of limitations for collection of unemployment contributions does not prohibit Texas Employment Commission from filing suit. The statute applies to a suit by the commission to recover an overpayment of benefits but does not apply to the deduction of overpayments from future benefits.

Short Shorts

J. Michael Irish of Lubbock is new president elect of the Texas Young Lawyers Association. Irish defeated Eduardo Rodriguez of Brownsville in written ballot.

Texas stood third in the U.S. with \$6.6 billion in cash receipts for its farm goods in 1977. Texas also has the most acreage—139.8 million—devoted to farming and ranching and the largest number—197,000—of farms and ranches.

Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation will accept bids May 17-18 for 57 highway improvement projects estimated to cost \$89 million.

A tax to finance the Texas Utility Commission produced seven times more than was necessary to do the job last year. Revenue was \$9.1 million, and the agency's budget \$1.2 million. The budget next year has been raised to \$3.85 million.

Texas officials ignored a deadline for developing "ombudsman" programs to help nursing home patients, in spite of warnings a federal grant may be lost.

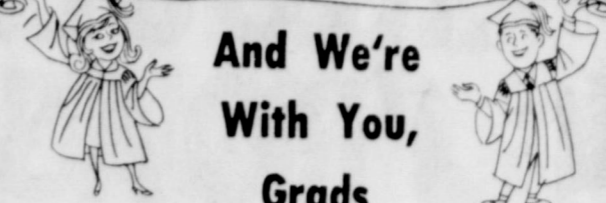

## Lynn County News



Lloyd Cline of Lamesa May 3 was re-elected for a second one-year term as President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a meeting of Directors in Lubbock. Incumbents Joe D. Unfred of New Home, Vice President, and Gary Ivey of Falls, Secretary-Treasurer, were also re-elected. The Board meeting and election followed the 25-county cotton producer organization's annual meeting where an estimated 400 farmers and cotton-related business people heard international cotton marketing specialist John McNutt and Dawson County farmer Donnell Echols speak on the potential for increasing exports of High Plains cotton. McNutt, Vice President of International Marketing for Cotton Incorporated, told the group that significantly more cotton can be sold to open-end spinning plants in Western Europe if the High Plains will produce more of the high strength varieties required by the open-end spinning system. He said producers might do well to consider planting 20 percent of their 1978 acreage to cotton types that normally produce lint with at least 90,000 pounds per square inch pressley strength. Echols, a PCG past president who took part in a Western European Export Seminar in January, confirmed that open-end spinners are interested in high strength cottons from the Plains and cited an example of one such mill which was highly pleased with its first trial run of High Plains cotton this year. However he cautioned producers against planting varieties without full knowledge of their yield potential on specific soils and under specific climatic conditions. President Cline, in his annual report, reviewed PCG activities for the past year including the continuation of open-end spinning research at the Texas Tech Textile Research Center. Concerning this work he blamed a lack of adequate funding for "moving too slow" to take maximum advantage of the opportunities "to enhance both volume and profitability of our sales of cotton to be used on the open-end spinning system." He emphasized this point by saying "PCG is your vehicle, so to speak, and it will take you where you want to go at whatever speed you and your elected Directors have the skill to drive it. But it can't take you anywhere unless you keep gas in the tank." Executive Vice President Donald Johnson echoed Cline's call for a broader base of PCG support, telling members "If we do the necessary research; if we get the results of our research in the hands of the right people; if we prevail upon these people to try our product, as you have just heard that one mill in West Germany has done, then we can exploit these new markets to the fullest." The meeting was concluded with a humorous and inspirational address by Millard Townsend of Lubbock, professional lecturer.

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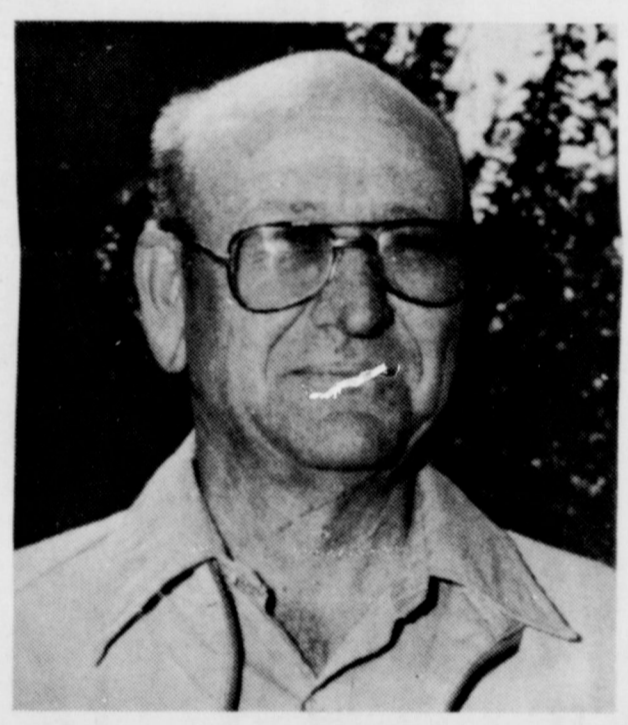

Club President Horace Rogers announced that Louis Rochester has been nominated as the upcoming Rotary District Governor, and Dr. J. Davis Armistead for the next year, 1979-80.
