The incumbent Governor Dolph Briscoe was defeated by Attorney General John Hill, by a wide majority, even in Lynn County where Hill had 1,183 votes, to Briscoe's 700. Former Governor Preston Smith had 322 votes in Lynn County.

In the 17th District Congressional race. Abilene lawyer A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes went ahead of Stamford farmer Charles Stenholm, in the Lynn County polls, by 42 votes. Rhodes had a total of 743, and Stenholm had 701. thus assuring a runoff.

Rhodes carried each box in the county except New Home and Wilson.

Other candidates in that race and their Lynn County votes are as follows: Jim Snowden, 230; Crews Mc-Culloch, 43; Jim Sharp, Jr., 120; Fike Godfrey, 111; and Jim Baum, 129.



some sealers speed drying. -- To discourage chipping, run a cotton covered manicure stick dipped in polish remover along the edge of the nail to remove a thin line of polish.

Also use the stick to remove smudges or "straying" nail polish.



The Texas legislature will be somewhat different next year-but not much as far as personnel is concerned.

of Corpus Christi, and mandatory redistricting in Fort

Speaker Bill Clayton said his reelection as House presiding officer is secure, and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby faced light opposition in his bid for a third term as Senate pres-

Sixty-two incumbent representatives seeking re-election were unopposed, as were seven senators trying for new terms. Twenty-nine others, who drew no opposition in the primary will face challenges on the November general election ballot.

Courts Speak

In a dispute over sale of Cameron County land for a state park, the Supreme Court declined to order a law firm to discontinue representing one of the parties in the action.

Relying on rulings growing out of auto cases, the Third Court of Civil Appeals held in a suit for damage insurance a pilot was operating his airplane, even though he had stepped out of the plane to place wheelchocks. The plane moved forward and hit

Horse race wagering op-ponents asked the Third Court of Civil Appeals to

order a trial on the issue of whether the State Democratic Party legally placed a betting referendum on the May 6 ballot.

The Court of Criminal Appeals dismissed indictments of a Jefferson County man because they did not set out the amount of drugs he was charged with delivering.

AG Opinions

Attorney General John Hill held the Texas Commission on Jail Standards lacks authority to promulgate a rule equalizing salaries of county jail personnel with those of law enforcement officers in the field.

The opinion noted commissioners courts have authority to fix salaries of jail personnel at a level lower

than the pay of other county law enforcement officers of equal rank and seniority.

Hill also concluded two employees of Dallas County Community College accused of sexual harassment could see only part of a grievance filed against them by a female employee of the school. No violation of law was alleged.

In another opinion, Hill said the three-year statute of limitations for collection of unemployment contributions does not prohibit Texas Employment Commission from filing suit. The statute applies to a suit by the commission to recover an overpayment of benefits but does not apply to the deduction of overpayments from future bene-







Lloyd Cline of Lamesa May 3 was re-elected for a second one-year term as President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a meeting of Directors in Lubbock. Incumbents Joe D. Unfred of New Home, Vice President, and Gary Ivey of Ralls, Secretary-Treasurer, were also re-elected.

The Board meeting and election followed the 25-county cotton producer organization's annual meeting where an estimated 400 farmers and cotton-related business people heard international cotton marketing specialist John McNutt and Dawson County farmer Donnell Echols speak on the potential for increasing exports of High Plains cotton.

McNutt, Vice President of International Marketing for Cotton Incorporated, told the group that significantly more cotton can be sold to open-end spinning plants in Western Europe if the High Plains will produce more of the high strength varieties required by the open-end spinning system.

He said producers might do well to consider planting 20 percent of their 1978 acreage to cotton types that normally produce lint with at least 90,000 pounds per square inch pressley strength. Echols, a PCG past president who took part in a Western European Export Seminar in January, confirmed that open-end spinners are interested in high strength cottons from the Plains and cited an example of one such mill which was highly pleased with its first trial run of High Plains cotton this year. However he cautioned producers against planting varieties without full knowledge of their yield potential on specific soils and under specific climatic conditions.

President Cline, in his annual report, reviewed PCG activities for the past year including the continuation of open-end spinning research at the Texas Tech Textile Research Center. Concerning this work he blamed a lack of adequate funding for "moving too slow" to take maximum advantage of the opportunities "to enhance both volume and profitability of our sales of cotton to be used on the open-end spinning system." He emphasized this point by saying "PCG is your vehicle, so to speak, and it will take you where you want to go at whatever speed you and your elected Directors have the skill to drive it. But it can't take you

anywhere unless you keep gas in the tank.' Executive Vice President Donald Johnson echoed Cline's call for a broader base of PCG support, telling members "If we do the necessary research; if we get the results of our research in the hands of the right people; if we prevail upon these people to try our product, as you have just heard that one mill in West Germany has done, then we can exploit these new markets to the

The meeting was concluded with a humorous and inspirational address by Millard Townsend of Lubbock, professional lecturer.



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
