Mrs. Elliott has resigned her position as Director of Business Affairs, effective May 26th. She is a native of Tahoka, and has served in her present capacity since November of 1963.

Mrs. Elliott attended Hockaday School and Southern Methodist University, in Dallas, and the University of Texas at Austin. She is the mother of two children--Mrs. Doug (Karen) Taylor, of Tahoka, and Kent, a student at Texas Tech. She has two grandchildren.

Mrs. McWhirter and Mrs. Redwine have taught 93 years, between them, and 79 of those years were in Tahoka schools, Mrs. Redwine having begun her tenure in Tahoka in 1934, and Mrs. McWhirter in 1943. However, both their careers had begun earlier.

The dry, parched land of Lynn County got its first hint of rainfall for the season last Thursday and Friday, ranging from an official .6 in Tahoka to as much as 2 inches in the Redwine-Draw

Some areas in the northeast and northwest part of the county also reported heavier amounts.

Reports are that irrigated land has been planted, and some cotton is coming up. Also, some dryland cotton has been planted, with hopes that more rain will come soon.

Generally speaking, cotton planted after the first of June runs the risk of not maturing before frost, and

Post Office **Positions** To Be Filled

The Clerk-Carrier Examination for the Lubbock Post Office will be open from May 30 through June 5, and it is estimated that the resultant register of eligibles will be used to fill approximately 44 career positions in the Lubbock Post Office during the next two years.

A passing score of 70 points on the examination places an applicant's name on a register.

The Veterans Preference Act applies to the Postal Service as it does to other Federal agencies. Starting salary is \$6.90 per hour, with increases to \$8.19 per hour, presently.

Persons who are interested may obtain application blanks at the Tahoka Post Office from May 30 through June 5th.

be prevented by a simple, first-aid technique; the Heimlich method. Unless the object is dislodged quickly, death occurs in 4 to 5 minutes. Any individual who is eating and is sud-denly unable to talk or breathe, could need someone to administer the Heimlich technique, as choking victims are often, mistakenly thought to be having a heart attack. Here's how it works. Get behind the victim. Make a fist, placing the thumb-side against the victim's abdomen, below the rib cage and slightly above the navel. Grasp the fist with your other hand and press in with a quick, upward thrust, repeating if necessary. The sudden elevation of the diaphragm compresses the lungs and increases air pressure, forcing the object to pop out of the windpipe.

Home Health **Agency Offers New Service**

Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or an RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for skilled care.

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of MBFA

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can

have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at beneficial rate based on one's individual financial

This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

Persons may discuss this with their physician or may call the Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number to call is 747-2814 in Lubbock, or in Tahoka, Thelma Raindl, LVN, 998-4859. Either party will be able to answer any questions one might have regarding the new service.

Mrs. Raindl indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. She adds, MBFA Foundation's motto is a Vision With A Task', and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation is privileged to serve.


The meeting was held as a result of the Resource Conservation Act of 1977 which recognizes the need for public participation to ensure that conservation programs are responsive to public needs.

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


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
