Yellowed news clipping, worn ragged by time, had its home many years on Zuma McWhirter's kitchen cabinet door, and its wisdom beauty speak simply of her philosophy of raising the short essay having been written by Waldo Emerson: "To laugh often and not to win the respect of intelligent people and the affection of children; to earn the appreciation of honest critics and endure the betrayal of false friends; to appreciate beauty; to find the best in people; to leave the world a bit better, whether by a healthy child, a garden patch, or a redeemed social condition; to know even one life has touched easier because you lived. This is to have succeeded."

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The proverbial "lump in my throat" is a reality I try to get wordy about the four employees of Tahoka schools who are retiring this year. It is no secret that I think teachers have a unique place in society, and Zuma McWhirter and Linnie Redwine have much more than a unique place in Tahoka.

They were my colleagues for a number of years, and I am in awe and respect I have for their ability is indescribable. Consider them close personal friends and can't get them from the housetop, with no reservations, many Tahoka young people, and some older people are much in debt to those ladies (that word is its strictest sense) for having given us so freely, for so many, many years.

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Mrs. Whittington devoted 34 years to students when she came to Tahoka, but having known her for the past eight years, I am convinced that her departure will leave just such a void in the school system.

She exemplifies one particular trait that a teacher cannot learn, that being the quality of compassion. A teacher who looks through the eyes of her students, and who loves him for what he has to offer, is a teacher who is hard to do without—and Mrs. Whittington possesses that rare quality.

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Mrs. Elliott, director of business affairs for Tahoka schools since 1963, is the kind of individual who imposes no imposition, and she tolerates absurd suggestions from people who have the best of intentions. Because of her incredible knowledge and her ability of getting along, she has spoiled the lives of administrators, board members, teachers, etc. by taking on all sorts of nit-picking tasks and some earth-moving problems, all pertaining to the business end of a school.

She never ceases to be amazed at her ability and her strength in the face of near calamity, many times. Her work has been done at home, in the evenings, because she was generous with her time and hours at the office.

I am humbly grateful for the multitude of lessons I have learned from her—not the least of which is patience—and I have some installments to pay on that lesson. Tahoka Independent School District has been fortunate in many ways, but perhaps the greatest is that of having had employees of such high quality.

Longtime Educator To Retire After 8-Year Tenure In Tahoka Schools

Mrs. Jess (Belva) Whittington moved to Tahoka in 1970, found her niche in South (now Tubb) Elementary School, to spend the last eight years of a 42-year teaching career, and at the same time found a place of honor and respect in the eyes of many second-graders and their parents.

During the past eight years, she has also earned the esteem of her colleagues, as well as administrators and board members in the Tahoka school system. She will be honored at a reception at 1 p.m. tomorrow, May 26, in Tubb Elementary Cafeteria, together with other retirees.

One of the eleven children of a Baptist minister and his wife, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Curry, Mrs. Whittington was born at Rule, in Haskell County, and she finished high school there. She received both a bachelors and a masters degree at West Texas State University at Canyon.

Her 42 years as a teacher have been spent as an elementary teacher for 30 years, and as a homemaking teacher for 12 years. She began her career in a rural school in Haskell County, and spent twenty years at Lakeview, in Hall County, where she and her husband were both teachers. He was drafted during World War II, and after his tour of duty, they returned to Lakeview, and he retired, because of ill health, in 1966, at which time they moved to Tahoka, and she continued to teach, at Burnet. Soon after her husband's death, Mrs. Whittington moved to Tahoka, built a new home, and she plans to (see Whittington, page 3)

Thirsty-County Receives Scant Rainfall

The dry, parched land of Lynn County got its first hint of rainfall for the season last Thursday and Friday, ranging from an official .6 in Tahoka to as much as 2 inches in the Redwine-Draw areas. Some areas in the northeast and northwest part of the county also reported heavier amounts.

Reports are that irrigated land has been planted, and some cotton is coming up. Also, some dryland cotton has been planted, with hopes that more rain will come soon. Generally speaking, cotton planted after the first of June runs the risk of not maturing before frost, and

the past two or three years, the first killing frost has come well before the normal date of November 1-10. Reliable sources say the county's cotton production for this year will be considerably lower than in the past three years, due to the unseasonably dry conditions.

 and support for the team.

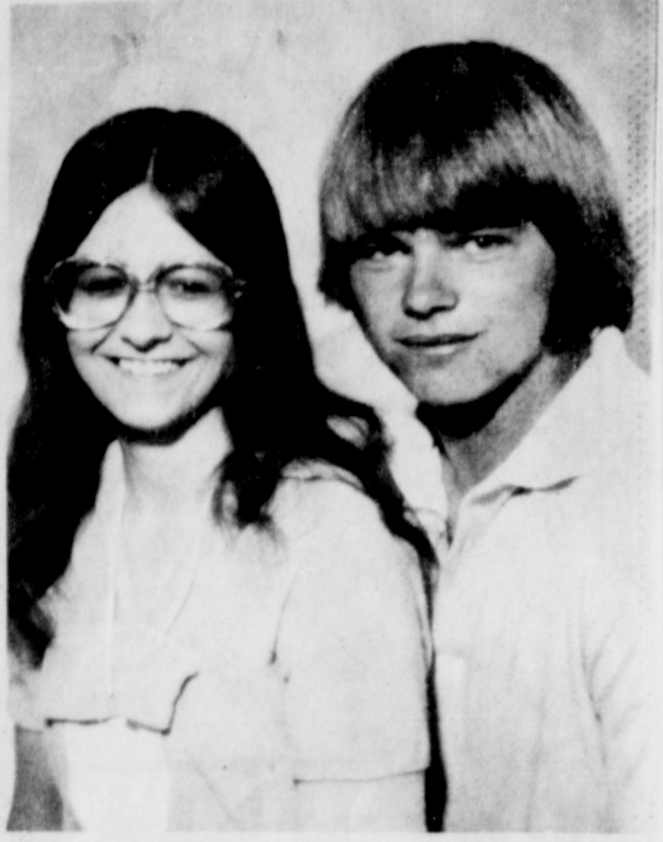

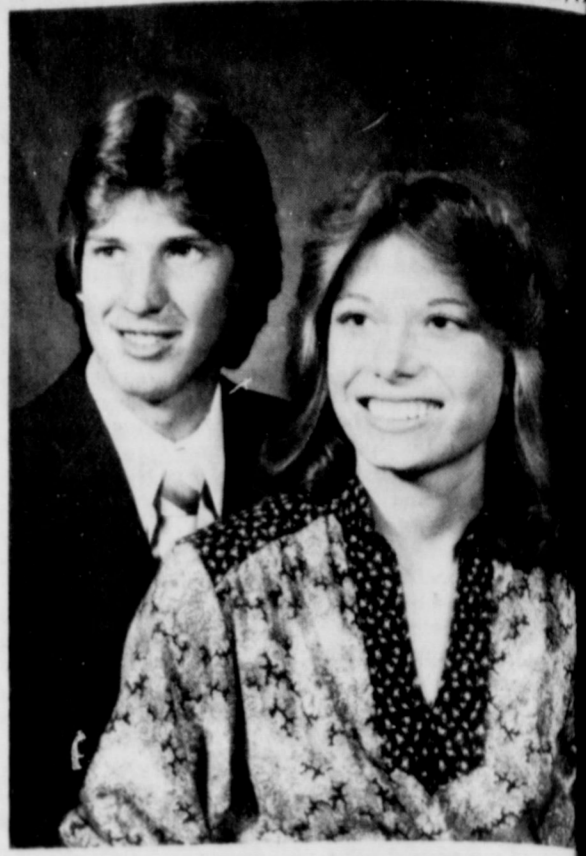
Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under the direction of White Funeral Home.

He rides an Appaloosa gelding and will be competing in Appaloosa during the summer months. He also participates in the Lynn County 4-H Club program.

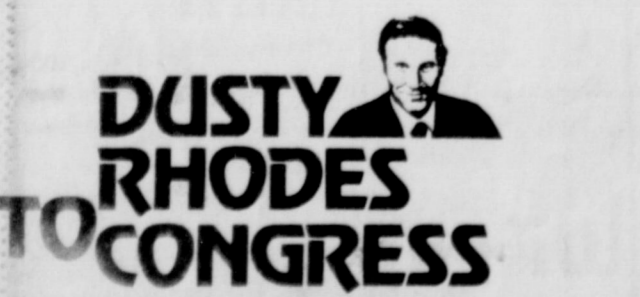

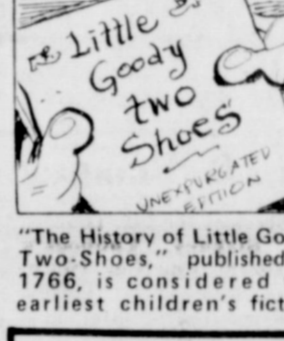

Home Health Agency Offers New Service

Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or an RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care."

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Homemaker Service, a division of MBFA Foundation.

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can

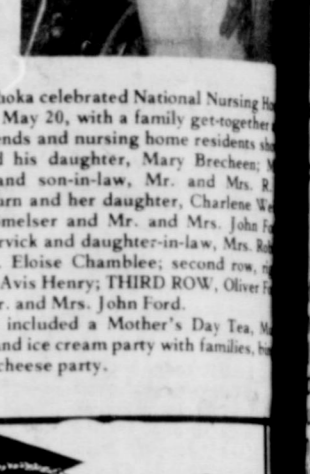
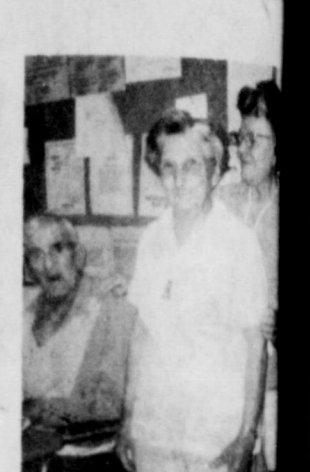
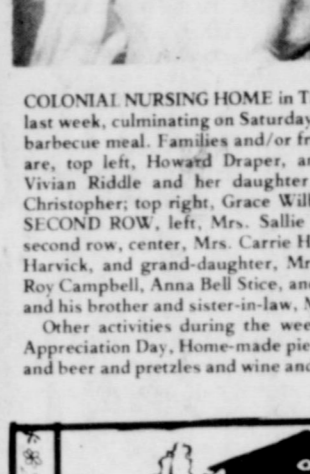
have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.

This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker services. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

Persons may discuss this with their physician or may call the Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number to call is 747-2814 in Lubbock, or in Tahoka, Thelma Raindl, LVN, 998-4859. Either party will be able to answer any questions one might have regarding the new service.

Mrs. Raindl indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. She adds, MBFA Foundation's motto is a "Vision With A Task," and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation is privileged to serve.
