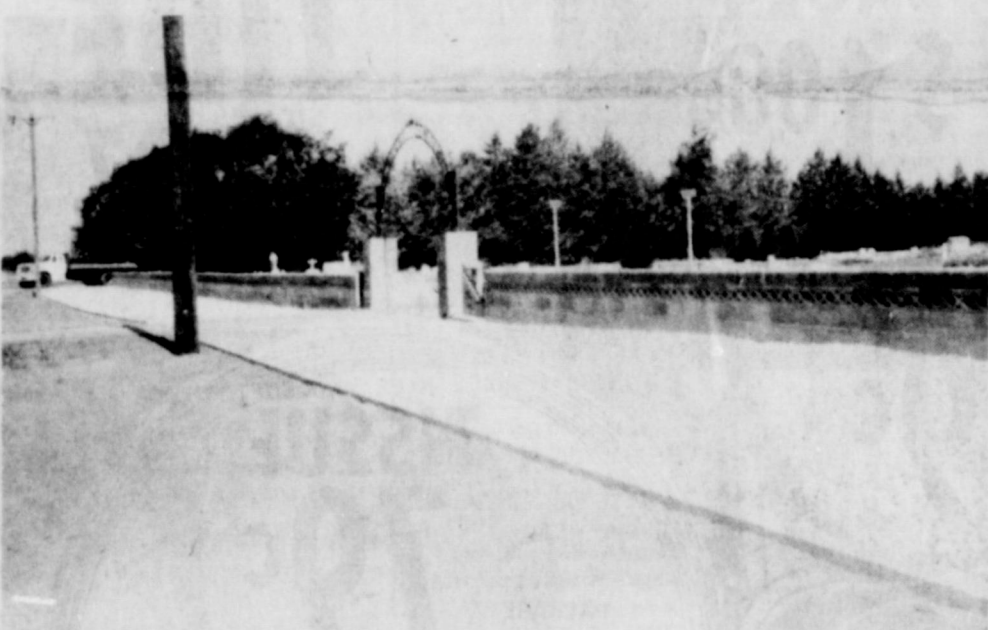

Primary Election Run-Off is upon us, and in this District will decide Saturday who will get them in the State Senate and the United House of Representatives.

It has been said about the rural versus the city, the pro's versus the con's, the big spenders the frugal, etc., when the deciding factor is who can best represent us in Austin and Washington.

Without a doubt, E. L. Short has already proven himself to represent us, and that characteristic, with his desire to be of service and his integrity, qualify him for the position. We need a Representative who can think to Washington, and after he gets there, state our thoughts in a way that will get our needs met.

As an individual, I am convinced that Dusty Rhodes is a man "of the people," and he has the help of one much-overlooked, but of great quality—experience. We need it to replace a man who has been there for decades.

The new Museum Building in Tahoka, formerly the old building, has been completely renovated and will have its maiden voyage, so to speak, this week when the Lynn County Art Association holds its annual show therein. The dedication of the facility will be June 24, and will coincide with the Old Settlers Reunion and the 75th Anniversary Celebration.

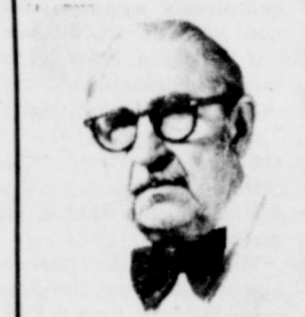

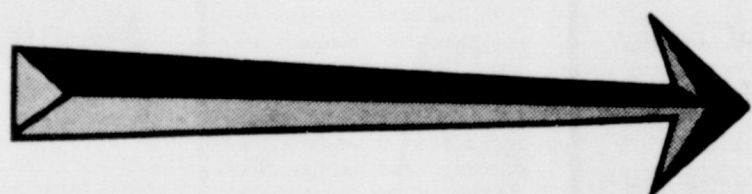

Gerald Moore Is Delegate To Hospital Association Meeting

The twenty-three hospitals in the South Plains Division of the Texas Hospital Association were represented at the 49th Annual Convention of the Association in San Antonio last week by Gerald Moore, administrator of Lynn County Hospital; Dan Powers, Brownfield General Hospital; and George Brewer, Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Over 7,000 people attended the San Antonio gathering and Exhibit Show.

Paul Harvey, nationally known newscaster, was the keynote speaker, followed by four days of educational meetings.

The majority of the meetings for hospital administrators were concerned with the skyrocketing cost of providing health care, and the ever-increasing federal legislation that contributes to the high cost of health

care.

It was pointed out that Texas hospital charges are 30 percent below the national average, indicating that hospitals in Texas are serious about cost containment.

Daniel Barker, chairman-elect of the American Hospital Association, stated that in the past ten years, the cost of health care had risen 194 percent, attorney fees had risen 200 percent, and the cost of merely operating the U.S. Congress was up 400 percent.

He stated that, like every individual and business, hospitals are a victim of inflation.

Barker also stated that to follow Great Britain and Canada down the path of national health insurance would be a tragedy.

Cotton Injury From Hail

In her usual fickle ways, Mother Nature keeps farmers guessing. About rain, about wind, or about temperate. Sometimes, though, it's not what's going to happen that a farmer is concerned about, but what has happened. A good example is hail and the damage it does to a crop.

Where, how much and how badly was the crop damaged are the questions a producer ponders in this instance, and finally comes the big one, "Will I have to replant?"

You don't make snap decisions when it comes to hail damage. It will appear much worse than the actual damage immediately after the storm. In the case of cotton, the plants have a remarkable capacity to recover.

Already this year, crops have been hit by hail, and no doubt more will be hit as the

season progresses. If a producer's crop suffers hail damage, he will have to consider several factors in determining whether to replant. Among these are growth stage, type and extent of injury and seasonal conditions.

A first point to consider is how much of the field was damaged. A hailstorm can reduce the plant population to only two seedlings per row foot in 40-inch rows, or about 26,000 plants per acre, and the crop can still produce a normal yield, unless, of course, the crop is poorly distributed or has long skips.

Another point in determining whether to replant is how much damage there was to plants. Plants having only traces of leaves will recover better than those with no leaves. A seedling with no leaves can still make a crop.

If the stem is intact, free of large breaks and the seedling has sound buds,

recovery is still possible, although it will be slower than plants having at least some leaves.

However, if the stem is shattered and the bark loosened or broken at points below the leaf buds, then recovery is impossible.

After a hailstorm, a sandfighter should be run as soon as possible to prevent sand injury to vital buds on stubs left in the field. Quite often, sand damage after a hail can do as much or more harm to young seedlings than the hail.

Any regrowth hinges either on the sound terminal bud (the growing point) or auxiliary bud located at the point of leaf attachment.

Because of the young seedling's ability to recover, hail injury in May or June will cause less yield loss than in July and August when the plants are more mature and replanting becomes impossible.

If the damage is suffered early, a crop can recover to the point that the injured plants are difficult to distinguish from undamaged plants. Also, young cotton that survives early hail damage is often more mature at first frost than a crop that has been replanted.

When a cotton field is destroyed, the producer has no choice but to replant, especially if the damage occurs early in the season. But in most hailstorms, the crop is usually only partially injured, making the decision more difficult.

Dear President Carter
and Fellow Americans:

What is happening to those great documents of American freedom—the very foundation of our Country—the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights?
