E. L. Short Wins Nomination For State Senate; To Compete Against Republicans In November

Last fall, some fifty or so people met in Tahoka, Texas, and heard E. L. Short say that he would be on the ballot in the May 6 Democratic Primary, for the District 28 Senatorial seat. Plans were laid, beginning that night, and they were given impetus when he came from behind, in the vote counting in the late hours of May 6, and secured a spot on the ballot in the June 3rd run-off. The rest of the story is one of excitement and of proving that people can—with dedication and effort. Our friends, E. L. and Dink Short, know without doubt that the nomination is a reality because they believed it could be done. The race is not over. He needs our help still, and needs to be told of our gratitude for campaigning fairly and fiercely in a wretched race that took its toll physically, mentally, especially, you name it. He is striving to be in a position to take our voice to the state—and he will, with our help.

Stenholm Wins Congressman Race; Poerner, Gandy Get Voters' Okay

E. L. Short, 52-year-old native of Tahoka, won the Democratic nomination for the Texas Senate from District 28, in the Primary run-off election on June 3rd, defeating Don Workman of Lubbock. Short garnered 51.9 percent of the vote, 14,176 votes, compared to 48.1 percent, 13,151 votes, for Workman. His home county gave him an impressive 1,370 votes, to his opponent's 340. Short said he was overwhelmed at the support given him by people throughout the 13-county 28th District, but was very humble at the turnout of supporters in Lynn County. "My only campaign promise—to start work immediately for the people—will be underway by July 1st," Short vowed Saturday night to a large crowd of jubilant well-wishers at his home. He will face Republican Joe Robbins of Lubbock, a state representative who did not seek re-election to that post in order to run for the

Senate, in the November general election. Short carried nine of the thirteen counties in the 28th Senatorial District, including the seven counties he represented in the legislature from 1969-76. Strategic locations in Short's campaign efforts, for the run-off, were Odessa and Lubbock, and he won in Ector County (Odessa) by a wide margin—3,055 to 1,942. Vote count in other counties which Short carried are as follows: Andrews, 345-224; Dawson, 399-343; Gaines, 1558-968; Garza, 580-503; Martin, 538-141; Terry, 491-444; and Yoakum, 956-724. Workman had 5,659 votes in Lubbock County, compared to Short's 4,021, and he also had the greater number of votes in Borden, Cochran, and Crosby Counties. Stenholm Defeats Rhodes Also in the June 3 run-off, in the race for U.S. Congressman from the 17th District, Stamford farmer Charles Stenholm, defeated

A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes, Abilene attorney, by a wide majority, and he will face another Abilene attorney, Republican Bill Fisher, in the November general election. In Lynn County, Stenholm received 1,019 votes, and Rhodes got 668. Commissioner Race J. C. Gandy, who was appointed Commissioner of Precinct 2 in April of 1977 to fill the unexpired term of his brother, the late Dorman Gandy, defeated Lyndell Wood in the run-off, by 272 to 191 votes. Poerner-Sadler In the only state-wide contest on the Lynn County ballots, Railroad Commissioner John Poerner, a Hondo surveyor, defeated Jerry Sadler in last Saturday's run-off, to win the nomination for an unexpired term on the Commission. Poerner had 500,848--70 percent of the votes--to Sadler's 211,248. In Lynn County, Poerner had 1,126, to Sadler's 546.

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce in Tahoka voted unanimously on Tuesday of this week to have a \$25-per-plate Fund-Raising dinner, an appreciation gesture, for E. L. Short, Democratic nominee for the State Senate. The affair will be Friday, June 30th, at Mel Leslie's ranch, and people through-

out the 13-county District 28 will be invited, as will dignitaries throughout the entire State. Plans are in the beginning stage, but Chamber officials say that many people throughout the county will be called to meet, hopefully this week, to make further arrangements.

Not Enough, Too Much Rain Plagues Farmers

Crop-planting rains did not come to Lynn County farmers at the best time; however, by Monday of this week, generally speaking, the county had had approximately two inches of rain overall. Some farmers had planted cotton, and some had waited until the rains came. Most irrigated farm land had been planted. Week-end rains boosted the total amount, and on Monday afternoon, a cloud north of Tahoka went east to Wilson and dropped a couple of inches of rain and mothball-size hail which hailed out some 10,000 acres of cotton, according to

Stanley Young, Lynn County Extension Agent. Farms at Gordon and New Lynn suffered lots of damage. An inch of rain fell in a short time in Tahoka on Tuesday morning, and when The News went to press on Tuesday night, clouds were threatening from the west. Farmers will plant cotton until the 15th of June if they can get in the field. Some farms at West Point had not been planted at the beginning of this week. Cotton planted late in May and in early June runs the risk of not maturing before a killing frost.

Two Longtime Businesses In Tahoka McCord Purchases Wharton Motor

H. B. McCord, Jr., a third-generation businessman in Tahoka, has purchased the assets of Wharton Motor, Inc. from Winston C. Wharton, who came to Tahoka in 1940, from Olney, as the Continental Oil Company agent and later expanded his business into a car dealership.

The change in ownership was effective June 1st, and the same employees of both firms will remain with the McCord firm. Jesse Dorman is sales manager for the business, and all new-car sales will be at the Wharton building on North Main. McCord's grandfather, R. B. McCord, bought the building which is now Bain's Army Surplus, at US 87 and US 380, in 1929, and operated a service station until 1930 when his son, H. B., Sr., moved in from his

Grassland farm and bought the building across the street south. In 1931, he became the Phillips jobber and acquired the Pontiac dealership in 1938. H. B. McCord, Jr. joined the firm in 1950, and his father died in 1972. Wharton Motor moved to its present location in 1944, and has been the Oldsmobile dealer since 1941, the GMC dealer since 1946, and the Buick dealer since 1965.

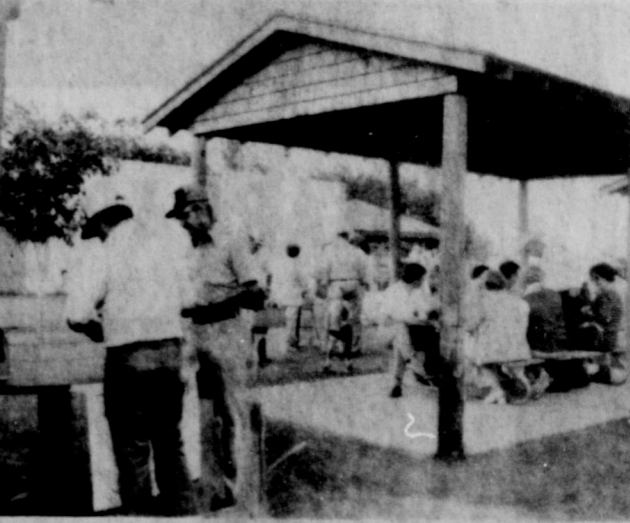
City Of Wilson Owns Museum; Available For Civic Meetings

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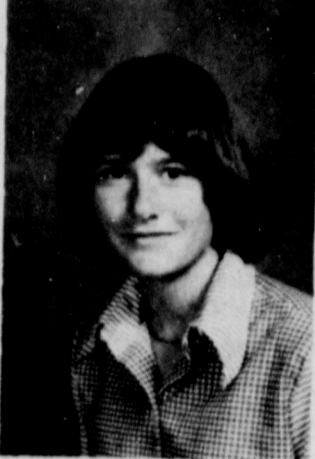

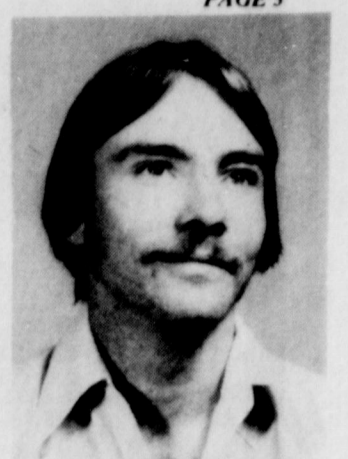

TDA Suit Alleges Company Delivered Short Weight Meat

HOUSTON—The Texas Department of Agriculture has filed suit against Glenn Snider, general manager of Swift and Co. operations here, for short weight on meat products delivered on bids to Harris County, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

The suit was filed in mid-April in Precinct No. 1 Justice of the Peace Kenneth M. Pacetti's court following a month-long investigation of weekly deliveries.

"We were given reason to believe that meat products being delivered were short weight from the weight listed

on invoices," Brown stated. "Our investigation produced information that would require us to file suit in accordance with the weights and measures laws we enforce."

The Texas Department of Agriculture administers laws on weights and measures on all levels of trade, from the amount of grain held in country elevators to the package of flour on the grocery shelf. Brown explained. Duties include checking package weights against the amount stated on the label to check-weighting large public scales.

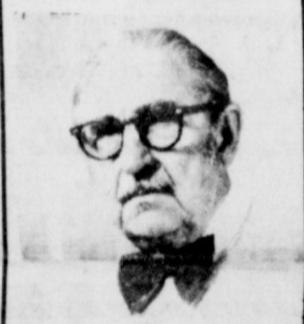

INDIVIDUAL MEAT LOAVES ITALIANO

- 1 cup NABISCO 100% Bran Cereal
- 1-1/2 pounds ground beef chuck
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 2 eggs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 1/3 cup water
- 1 (15-ounce) can tomato sauce
- 3/4 teaspoon oregano leaves
- 4 ounces mozzarella cheese, sliced

Combine first nine ingredients and 1/3 cup tomato sauce lightly, but thoroughly. Shape into six individual loaves. Place in a 13 1/2 x 8 3/4 x 1 3/4 inch baking dish. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (375 F) for 25 minutes. Combine remaining tomato sauce and oregano. Pour over and around meat loaves. Top loaves with cheese slices. Bake 10 minutes longer. Makes 6 (about 6 1/2-ounce) servings.

On Thursday morning, a breakfast cookout was held at the Tahoka Mini-Park, and a skating party and picnic that afternoon closed out the Camp for 1978.

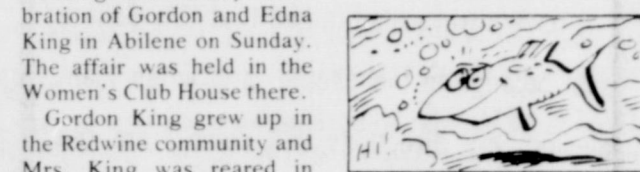

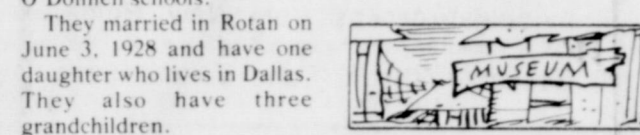

Dr. Wright Speaks To Rotary Club

"Spare Part" surgery is gaining much headway in West Texas and new research in this field of medical science is making possible many advancements in the field, Dr. Richard Wright, local physician, declared in a talk at the Rotary Club last Thursday.

He cited the fact that location soon of a Kidney Transplant Center at the new medical school and hospital in Lubbock is one of these important advances.

Some of the newer fields making transplants possible in patients include the replacement of bones and bone grafts, substitutions of arteries and veins, the dramatic transplant of the pancreas in diabetic patients, and even liver transplants, although the latter is very complicated.

Among other "spare part" transplants are blood transfusions, skin grafts, eyes, and artificial insemination. In most transplants, however, he said, is the difficulty in matching organs from the donor to the intended receiver.

Although arterial transplants are now common, he said the heart transplant program has not done well.

Under the 1969 Texas Anatomical Gift Act, a person may before death will his body or organs for use to aid others, or in certain cases, the family may give organs for transplant. He emphasized the importance of this in helping save lives of patients who might otherwise die or lose use of an organ.

V. F. Jones was in charge of the program and introduced the speaker.

Dr. Richard White called attention to the effort to secure funds for new Christmas decorations for the town.

In light of the discussions surrounding the liquid protein diet regimes, researchers are emphasizing the fact that potassium is essential for normal heart-muscle function and even small disturbances in potassium balance can be dangerous. Both minerals, sodium and potassium regulate fluid balance of the body. Sodium governs fluids outside the cells; potassium is found inside the cells. Together, they influence the acid-base balance of the body, through a complicated system that keeps the acidity or alkalinity of the blood within a very narrow range. Sodium or potassium deficiencies are rarely dietary in origin but usually occur only after prolonged fluid loss (diarrhea or vomiting.) Physicians may ask those who are using diuretic drugs (that cause water loss) to increase potassium in their diet, through foods such as bananas, oranges, prunes, meats, beans, leafy vegetables and whole grains. More about sodium next week.

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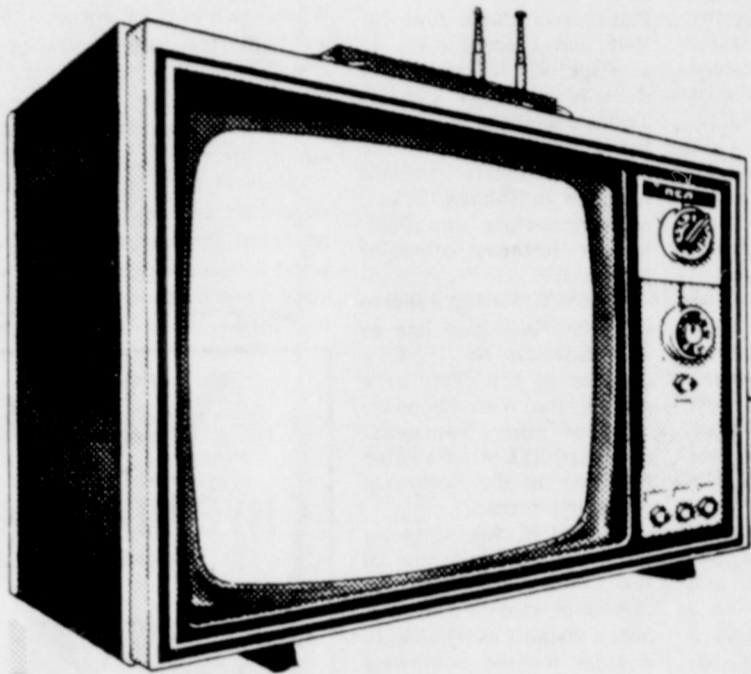
