Stenholm Wins Congressman Race; Poerner, Gandy Get Voters' Okay

E. L. Short, 52-year-old native of Tahoka, won the Democratic nomination for the Texas Senate from District 28, in the Primary run-off election on June 3rd, defeating Don Workman of

Short garnered 51.9 percent of the vote, 14,176 votes, compared to 48.1 percent, 13,151 votes, for

His home county gave him an impressive 1,370 votes, to his opponent's 340.

Short said he was overwhelmed at the support given him by people throughout the 13-county 28th District, but was very humble at the turnout of supporters in Lynn County. 'My only campaign promise--to start work immediately for the people--will be underway by July 1st." Short vowed Saturday night

Short carried nine of the thirteen counties in the 28th Senatorial District, including the seven counties he represented in the legislature from 1969-76.

Strategic locations in Short's campaign efforts, for the run-off, were Odessa and Lubbock, and he won in Ector County (Odessa) by a

wide margin--3,055 to 1,942. Vote count in other counties which Short carried are as follows: Andrews. 345-224; Dawson, 399-343; Gaines, 1558-968; Garza, 580-503; Martin, 538-141; Terry, 491-444; and Yoakum, 956-724.

Workman had 5,659 votes in Lubbock County, compared to Short's 4,021, and he also had the greater number of votes in Borden. Cochran, and Crosby Coun-

Stenholm Defeats Rhodes Also in the June 3 run-off.

in the race for U.S. Congressman from the 17th District, Stamford farmer A. L. (Dusty) Rhodes, Abilene attorney, by a wide majority, and he will face another Abilene attorney. Republican Bill Fisher, in the November general elec-

In Lynn County, Stenholm received 1,019 votes, and Rhodes got 668.

J. C. Gandy, who was appointed Commissioner of Precinct 2 in April of 1977 to fill the unexpired term of his brother, the late Dorman Gandy, defeated Lyndell Wood in the run-off, by 272 to 191 votes.

Poerner-Sadler

In the only state-wide contest on the Lynn County ballots, Railroad Commissioner John Poerner, a Hondo surveyor, defeated Jerry Sadler in last Saturday's run-off, to win the nomination for an unexpired term on the Commission.

Poerner had 500,848--70 percent of the votes -- to Sadler's 211,248. In Lynn County, Poerner

had 1,126, to Sadler's 546.

Department of Agriculture has filed suit against Glenn Snider, general manager of Swift and Co. operations here, for short weight on meat products delivered on bids to Harris County. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has announced.

The suit was filed in mid-April in Precinct No. 1 Justice of the Peace Kenneth M. Pacetti's court following a month-long investigation of weekly deliveries.

"We were given reason to believe that meat products being delivered were short weight from the weight listed

INDIVIDUAL MEAT LOAVES ITALIANO

1-1/2 pounds ground beef chuck

1/2 teaspoon garlic powder

3/4 teaspoon oregano leaves

1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

1 (15-ounce) can tomato sauce

4 ounces mozzarella cheese, sliced

1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese



In light of the discussions surrounding the liquid protein diet regimes, resear-chers are emphasizing the fact that potassium is essential for normal heart-muscle function and even small disturbances in potassium balance can be dangerous. Both minerals, sodium and potassium regulate fluid balance of the body. Sodium governs fluids outside the cells; potassium is found inside the cells. Together, they influence the acid-base balance of the body, through a complicated system that keeps the acidity or alkalinity of the blood within a very narrow range. Sodium or potassium deficiencies are rarely dietary in origin but usually occur only after prolonged fluid loss (diarrhea or vomiting.) Physicians may ask those who are using diuretic drugs (that cause water loss) to increase potassium in their diet, through foods such as bananas, oranges, prunes, meats, beans, leafy vege-tables and whole grains. 





range. Any practice that encourages earliness is the key to profitability in late planted cotton. Earliness can be achieved by replanting cotton on double rows or some narrow row pattern other than the standard 40-inch row width. Of course, this will require some arrangement for harvesting with the broadcast stripper. But any of the recommended varieties will mature faster by simply planting in double row. A ew days gained in earliness becomes important in late planted cotton.

As for planting rates in late planted cotton, research has shown that 60,000 plants per acre is an ideal plant population. This requires a planting rate of 18 to 22 pounds of good quality seed per acre. For double row cotton, 25 to 30 pounds of seed per acre is sufficient.

Residues of pre-emergence herbicides can be a problem in replanting especially in sandier soils, the agent cautioned. Caparol, Lasso, and Karmex can be leached downward by rainfall and can cause seedling injury in replanted cotton. Normally, this problem can be avoided by replanting in the furrows (not in the original bed). The preplant incorporated herbicides are not a problem in replanting

Later decisions concerning irrigation must also be considered after late cotton is up and growing. Because the yield potential for late planted cotton is reduced, fields having adequate moisture at replanting will probably not require additional summer irrigation. In fact, yields of late cotton can be reduced by too much water. Keep in mind that when yield potential is down, the need for water and fertilizer is reduced.

Growers in the fringe areas of these storms also face a tough decision: Should they try to save the existing stand or replant? All too frequently, this critical fecision is made the day following the storm when the extent of damage appears much worse than it actually Keep in mind that the otton plant has a remarkable capacity to recover from almost any adversity. It's important to wait two or three days and then critically

Cream has a milkfat content of at least 18 percent and is popular as a beverage companion, especially with coffee or hot tea. Cream is a popular topping for fruit compotes, desserts, and hot or cold cereals

Half and Half is used interchangeably with cream. It is a mixture of cream and milk with a minimum milkfat content of 10.5 percent, but not more than 18 percent.

The queen of the creams, as far as milkfat content goes is heavy cream, sometimes called whipping cream. Milkfat content must be at least 36 percent. It can be whipped into light, airy puffs, flavored and served as a complement to either desserts or meats, depending upon the seasonings added. Care must be taken to whip firmly, not churn, as the high milkfat content can easily become grainy.

Sour cream is a commercially soured cream. Its velvety texture, creamy white color, and slightly acid taste are used to enhance flavors of vegetables, meats.

The familiar dairy spread found on many tables is butter. It is made from churned cream and/or milk. Use it as a spread or in cooking or baking.

Ice cream is a favorite with young and old alike. It is a combination of frozen flavorings, cream, stabilizers, milk and sweeteners. Ice cream is delicious as a dessert or snack by itself, or used to dress up other desserts like cakes, pies, or cookies.

Counties Troubled

House Speaker Bill Clayton is surveying Texas counties on the extent of their increasing economic hardship due to indigent patients in public hospitals.

Many people who are not eligible for medicaid, the state program of medical assistance to the poor, still are not able to pay their medical bills, Clayton noted in a recent newspaper column.

In many cases, public hospitals are caring for residents of other counties which do not maintain hospital façili-

"The magnitude of the problems is increasing rapidly, and I feel that in the next session of the legislature we will see legislation introduced which will attempt to solve these problems," said Clay-

The speaker has sent questionnaires to the counties asking them to evaluate the problem, describe their policies for dealing with indigent patients and to recommend solutions to the problem.

Courts Speak

A divided State Supreme Court held couples can waive constitutional homestead rights of surviving wife or husband by a formal agreement before marriage.

The Court of Criminal Appeals threw out a life sentence conviction of a Dallas man for possession of heroin. Upholding the Beaumont

Court of Civil Appeals, the Supreme Court agreed a Conroe man and his mother cannot collect on a damage suit against a Shreveport bank whose chairman set up a loan and bank stock deal which resulted in heavy loss-

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed an aggravated robbery conviction and 50-year sentence given in a Belton court, but upheld a 20-year sentence for attempted murder assessed the same man.

The U.S. Supreme Court, in a divided verdict, concluded police armed with search warrants can enter newspaper or broadcasting station offices and seek evidence of crime, even though no staff members are suspected of

"Umbrella" Proposed

Sunset Advisory Commission staff members recommended consolidation of 27 licensing agencies under a single umbrella department. Savings of \$2 million a year were estimated through the melding of the separate agencies

A staff member further recommended standardized complaint processes and new consumer education programs within the licensing bodies.

The proposal called for centralized administrative services, record keeping, data processing and personnel services.

'Somewhat improved' but still 'less than optimistic.' That's the evaluation of High Plains cotton production prospects made by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. after rain, hail and windstorms during the last week of May and on June 1.

The same storms that washed, hailed or blew out cotton on an estimated 220,000 acres of cotton on the Plains brought the season's first planting moisture to another 700,000 or so acresthat otherwise would lav idle.

Much, but not all, of the cotton acreage lost will be replanted to cotton. Some, because of the late date and a short growing season, will go to soybeans, sunflowers or feed grains. How much will go back to cotton to some extent will depend on weather after June 1. The sooner fields get dry enough for planting, the more of the acreage that will be in cotton. "It is encouraging of course that most farmers finally got the

rain they had to have to plant," says PCG Executive Vice-President Donald Johnson, "but the absence of subsoil moistureto sustain the crop during the growing season leaves us less than optimistic about prospects for even average yields on farms; without irrigation.

Historically a little over half the High Plains cotton acreage has been on irrigated land, but available water for a good part of this acreage is inadequate for maximum yields without significant in-season rainfall

PCG's pre-season estimate of acres intended for cotton in the organization's 25 counties for 1978 was 3.7 million, about the same as 1977 plantings. "Now, even with the rains we've had," Johnson says, "it appears unlikely we'll get that much planted. and without an underground season we'll probably have an above average abandonment and below average yields."

With regard to the prevented planting regulations issued from Washington May 24, Johnson said PCG's protest had gotten "a lot of attention, some contradictory answers, and so far, nothing

So, the regulations making it extremely difficult for a farmer to qualify for prevented planting payments, for the time being, are still in effect

"However the last minute rains," Johnson notes, "greatly

reduce the urgency of getting these regulations changed. Most producers now can and will plant their land, but there will be some farmers applying for prevented planting eligibility." he adds, "and we are still trying to get clarification of exactly how that portion of the law is to be administered.
