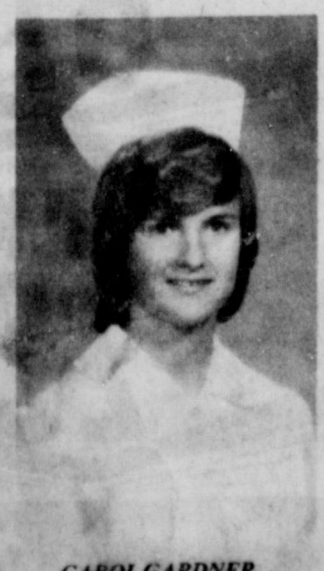
Mrs. Duke and her husband and children reside in Lubbock, and she served as Activities Chairman, as well as on the Convention Committee and the Executive Board at the school.

### Screwworms Detected In Lynn County

The first screwworm cases for the season were found in Lynn County during the week of June 19. "This report was received from the Texas Animal Health Commission," reported County Extension Agent Young.

Three cases of worms have been reported in Lynn County and several surrounding counties have also reported cases of screwworms. There were no reported cases in our area for 1977.

Young urged all ranchers to be on the lookout for possible screwworm infestations by continually checking livestock for suspicious wounds. All suspect samples need to be sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for positive identification. Collection kits and vials for mailing the samples can be obtained at the County Extension office.

### Booster Club 'Boosts' School's Athletic Program By Making Tennis Courts Possible

BY MARY BRECHEEN The sports program at Tahoka High School "took on" added dimensions last year when the Booster Club voted to build and pay for two tennis courts on the school's property south of Tubb Elementary and east of the Home Economics Building.

Prior to this year, when the courts were completed, the school had only one court. The city's recently completed courts helped the situation some; however, the need was critical, especially during the spring UIL competition in tennis.

Realizing that fact, and the fact that tennis is rapidly becoming one of the most popular sports, Tahoka's Booster Club felt that their efforts could not be spent in a way which would benefit more people.

Mike Williamson, tennis coach at Tahoka High, says that the additional courts have created much more interest in the tennis program. "Since we have the facilities," Williamson said, "we will certainly have a stronger program."

Cost of the courts was approximately \$15,000 (including the fence) for which

Special gratitude is due the merchants who provided the trophies for the tournaments.

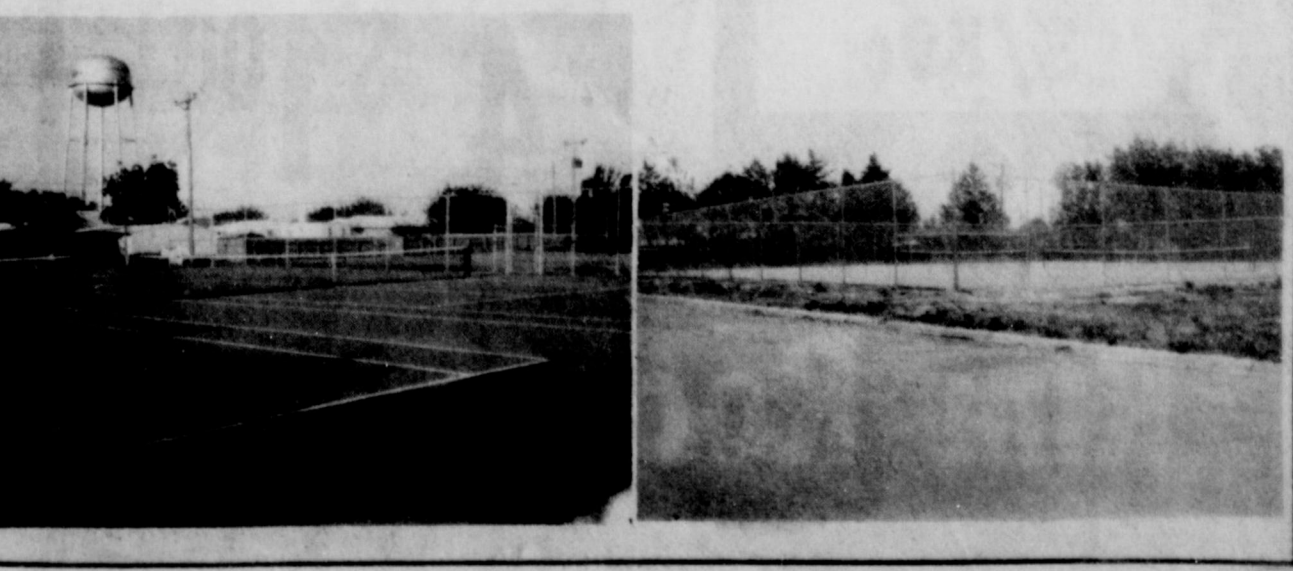
### O'Donnell Sets Annual Fete On July 4th

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# LYNN COUNTY'S DIAMOND JUBILEE

## June 24, 1978

Lynn County was organized in April of 1903, but the official celebration of the 75th Anniversary was postponed to coincide with the 44th Annual Old Settlers Reunion, traditionally held on the Saturday nearest the 24th of June, that day being the birthday of a pioneer, Mrs. J. S. Wells. The Diamond Jubilee Celebration was under the auspices of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and the Chamberettes, with Dr. Richard White as general chairman. One of the highlights of the celebration was the parade, some pictures of which are here, and the parade chairman was Miss Sherry Tilley. The day began with registration of pioneers and their descendants, at Tubb Elementary Cafeteria, followed by the parade, dedication of the Museum, bluegrass music, food booths, games, and a street dance at night.



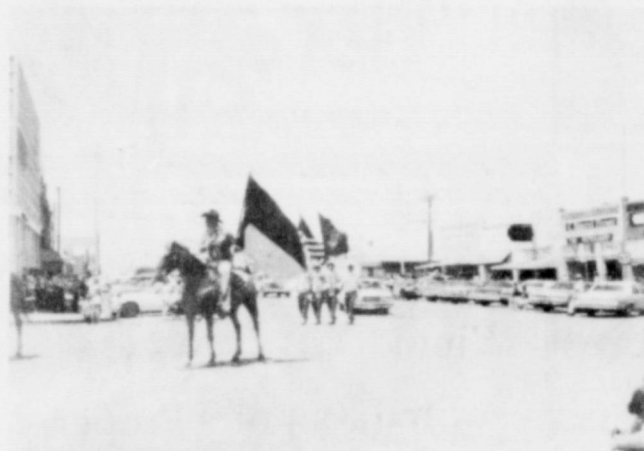

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## A Visit With Your County Agent

**Pesticide Safety Stressed**  
This season when you get into the act of using pesticides, 10 points of safety pesticide use are:

1. Keep all pesticides in original labeled containers and always avoid transferring to containers primarily used for soft drinks or fruit juices.

2. Enforce a "no-play" area for children when using pesticides. A couple of "no-play" signs will certainly be more effective than the "Oh no!" In there's really no reason anyone else to be in the area when you're mixing or using pesticides.

3. Pesticide safety actually begins long before you buy a regular pesticide for a job at home. It's based on a great amount of scientific knowledge developed by industry scientists, government agencies, fieldmen and many others. All knowledge is boiled into the wording you find on the container label. The label is a legal document and the directions must be followed. To fail to follow the directions is taking a needless and perhaps costly chance.

4. Never trust your eyes. Before using any pesticide, stop and read the label. If you can't or won't read the directions, you really shouldn't be using any pesticide. Each is scientifically designed to give best results at the exact rate on the label.

5. There are many different kinds of pests so it

takes many different types of pesticides with specific formulations for proper control. Thus, the homeowner can be selective in choosing—liquids, granules, powders, or dusts, depending upon equipment available and the nature of the pest problem.

6. Don't apply the aspirin theory—that if one is good, then twice as much will be better. It simply isn't true with pesticides and could cause poor results or other problems. Use only the recommended amount.

7. When handling concentrated materials, it's a good idea to follow the lead of professionals and wear gloves and goggles. This cuts down on the possibility of contaminating your hands or getting the concentrated material in your eyes.

8. When using a pesticide, apply only to the areas needing treatment and avoid walking through the treated areas as much as possible by spraying slightly to the side. If it is too windy to avoid drift, wait for a calmer time. The label will also tell you whether you should avoid making applications during extreme temperature conditions.

9. Proper disposal of all containers will avoid environmental eyesores and possible damage to the environment and wild creatures. The key to proper use and disposal of containers is in mixing only the amount of material you need to do the job. And remember never to

pour unused amounts of any such material down the drain. It could cause problems when it reaches a stream. Rinse empty containers three times and add each rinse to the spray application.

10. Final cleanup is important. Wash and bathe thoroughly and give special attention to cleaning and checking your equipment to make sure it's in good condition the next time you need it.

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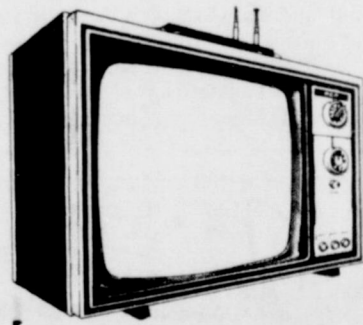
