## Tahoka's First Baptist Church Reviews Long And Busy History

In the days of the New Testament some worship services to our Lord were held in homes, the Tahoka First Baptist Church began in the same manner. From the files, research, and history compiled by E. I. Hill, it was learned that the church grew from meetings held in two homes—even before the days of the town of Tahoka. In the summer of 1902,

Rev. J. R. Miller began services in the home of W. C. Cowan, located seven miles south of Tahoka. About the same time, Dr. Pharr started preaching to a small group in the home of W. T. Fenn, who lived nine miles north of Tahoka.

Lynn County and the town of Tahoka were officially organized in April 1903. To mark the occasion of the new county and town, citizens erected a tent and held a great celebration on July Fourth. The Baptists secured permission to use the tent on the following day for the purpose of organizing a church. The two groups mentioned in the preceding paragraph came together on July 5, 1903 and constituted the "First Missionary Baptist Church" of Tahoka with sixteen charter members. On that day the church called Rev. Ira Parrack to be the first pastor.

In September of 1906 the church purchased lots on south First Street and in 1907 erected the first building on that site just one block east of the courthouse.

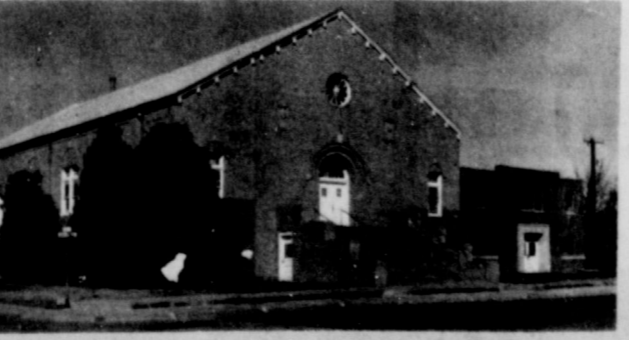
Approximately 20 years later in January, 1925, lots were purchased for the present location of the church, and the building on south First Street was sold to the Church of Christ. The Baptist Church held services in the district court room until completion of the church basement in August of 1925. A new auditorium was completed in September, 1938; and new educational space in August of 1955.

During the past seventy-five years the First Baptist Church has been led by twenty-four pastors and a large number of dedicated men and women. In the summer of 1947, the church started a mission in the home of W. A. Reddell in south Tahoka which became the Sweet Street Baptist Church.

For several years the church has sponsored the Mexican Mission in Tahoka. The first services for that congregation were held in June, 1959. A new mission parsonage was built in 1962, and a new mission church building erected in the spring of 1965 with help from many local people. Work began on the present auditorium and educational building in 1974, being completed and dedicated in September, 1976. After seventy-five years of Christian service in Tahoka, the First Baptist Church is looking forward to many more years of even greater service for Christ in this community.



THE FIRST CHURCH BUILDING built by Baptists in Tahoka was completed in November, 1907, and was located one block east of the present Court House. Rev. J. R. Miller, who has been referred to as the "real founder and father of the First Baptist Church" was pastor.



THE LOWER LEVEL of this building was completed in 1925 when Rev. B. N. Shepherd was pastor. The depression years intervened and it was thirteen years before the entire structure could be completed. The auditorium was built in 1938 under the leadership of George A. Dale. Another unit was added to this building in 1955 under the pastorate of Rev. Clifford Harris.



THE PRESENT MODERN ground-level sanctuary was completed in April 1975 during the pastorate of Rev. Jimmy A. Turner.

two mile stretch. Also southeast of Wilson, in the vicinity of the May farms, there was a like flood. Lakes in the areas drowned out some cotton.

West Tahoka received .56 inch on Friday, June 30, and 20 on Saturday, July 1, but East Tahoka and downtown received an inch or more.

Rain was also heavy in some southeast areas, and some north areas received an inch or more, while some northeast sections had light rain.

In the western half of the county, the showers were spotted, but many farmers received enough moisture to help.

Total for the year at the National Weather Service station in west Tahoka now totals 9.04 inches.

Most cotton is still doing well, especially in the areas where showers have fallen, but many farmers still need rain to carry the crop to the fruiting stage.

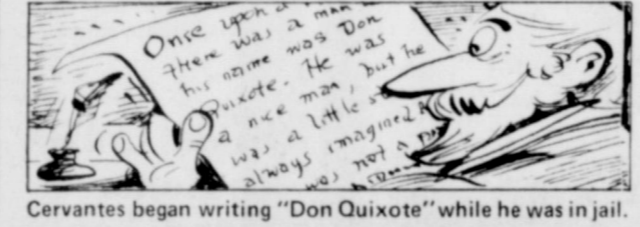

## A Visit With Your County Agent

### Control White Grubs in Lawns

May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. The females are laying eggs and the white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Lynn County will need to treat between July 15 and August 15. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth

of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs per square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sock or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the grubs into the soil.

Apply Diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is dry.

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where the grubs are feeding.

Further information is provided in the publication, "White Grubs in Texas Turfgrass" which is available at the county Extension office.

### Control Powdery Mildew in Gardens

Powdery mildew is a major disease problem of cantaloupes, cucumbers and squash, and home gardeners must be ready to begin a control program when the disease appears.

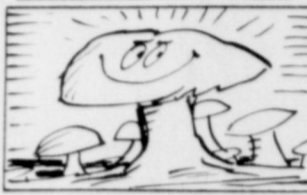
The disease is characterized by a white powdery growth on the upper surface of leaves. It develops rapidly under hot, dry weather conditions while most diseases prefer high humidity and mild temperatures. Once leaves become severe-

ly infected, they turn yellow and die. In severe cases, the fruit will be stunted and malformed.

The fungicides Benlate and Karathane have proven effective in controlling powdery mildew if applications are started as soon as the disease appears. Spraying must continue at five-to-seven-day intervals until the disease is no longer a problem. Adding a wetting agent to the spray will improve control.

Some vegetable varieties have resistance to powdery mildew. Among resistant cantaloupe varieties are Perleta, Top Mark, Gulf Stream and PMR 45. Resistant cucumber varieties include Poinsett, Ashley and Palomar. However, no varieties of squash have sufficient resistance to rely on this aspect alone for disease control.

Gardeners should use a combination of resistant varieties and fungicides to combat powdery mildew. When plants become diseased to the point that they cannot be recovered, they should be destroyed so as not to serve as a source of the further disease infection.

## Billy Whitaker Says...

### 4-H'ers Try Candid Camera Approach

If the snapshots in your family album tend to look like Grant Wood's well-known painting, "American Gothic"—meaning people stiffly posed and staring straight ahead—you might want to try a more candid approach to your photography.

Candid pictures feature people being themselves, behaving as if the photographer were not there. To take good candid photos, you avoid using flash and work with fast films and available light instead.

A telephoto lens lets you "move" closer to subjects without disturbing them and calling undue attention to yourself. Or, you can ask subjects to pretend you're not there, then focus and wait for just the right moment to press the shutter release.

The more candid pictures you take, the better your results are likely to be, according to boys and girls 9-19 in the National 4-H Photography Program. Conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and supported by Eastman Kodak Company, the program encourages young people to take and use pictures as a record of events and ideas, points out Whitaker, Assistant County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

### 4-H members learn-by-doing to appreciate photography as an art, science and communications tool.

Because he is deaf and his speech is not clear, 4-H'er Richard Norton, 19, of Greenwich, New York, began to use a camera to communicate with friends. He was progressed from still photography to film-making and now has eight movies and an animated film to his credit.

As one of six 1977 national winners in the 4-H Photography program, Norton received a \$1,000 scholarship donated by Kodak. ### STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Consumers, unhappy over soaring electrical bills, jammed a Public Utility Commission hearing to demand relief.

"The time has come for this commission to put up or shut up," said Mrs. Angela Moore of Houston, representing the Texas Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now at the special airing of consumer grines.

Spokesmen for the group (ACORN) called for establishment of lifeline electric rates.

"We are sick and tired of seeing preferential rates given to large electric users, while the people who can least afford it pay the highest per unit rate," said Mrs. Moore.

Lifeline rates provide a fixed low price for residential use of a stated number of kilowatt hours of electricity.

ACORN representatives argued conservation is difficult when one cent per kilowatt hour is charged for major usage and 10 cents an hour rates are levied on small users of electricity for home essentials.

The commission is studying alternative rate mechanisms.

It will make a report to the legislature as a result of its hearings and studies.

#### Agencies Aged

The Sunset Advisory Commission tentatively ordered switching regulatory functions of the state nursing home administrators' regulatory agency to the State Health Department after learning the little agency had never cancelled a license.

E.M. Lawrence, executive secretary of the Texas Board of Licensure for Nursing Home Administrators, acknowledged he had investigated none of 660 complaints against nursing homes.

The nursing home board goes out of existence Sept. 1, 1979, unless renewed by the legislature. The Sunset Commission will vote again in September whether to abolish the agency and 25 others set for review. The nursing home regulatory board was created nine years ago to meet federal requirements for licensing moving to Lubbock about two years ago. He was a Catholic.

#### Committees Meeting

Major legislative committees are scheduling hearings on tax relief measures here in preparation for either a special session or the 1979 regular session of legislators.

July 5, 6 and 7 meetings were set by the House Ways and Means and Constitutional Amendments committees on directives of Speaker Bill Clayton. A Legislative Council Property Tax Study Committee and a Joint Committee on Ad Valorem Taxation met last week.

Meetings this week will air proposals to fix state constitutional limits on state and local government taxation and spending.

The Ways and Means panel also will hear bills to eliminate the sales tax on home utility use; increase the inheritance tax exemption to \$200,000 and to finance construction at 17 institutions of higher education through other methods than the 10 cent state property tax.

#### Courts Speak

Upholding a 99-year penalty for aggravated sexual abuse, the Court of Criminal Appeals held that compelling a defendant to display a tattoo does not violate rights against self-incrimination.

The same court held a dying man's statement could be admitted in evidence in a Victoria murder case, reversed a life sentence in a Falls County burglary conviction due to improper jury instruction, and affirmed conviction of a Dallas man for aggravated robbery and attempted capital murder.

The State Supreme Court agreed to hear oral arguments in an appeal from lower court decisions that a Gulf Coast Waste Disposal Authority-operated plant is exempt from property tax-

ation. Pasadena Independent School district and Harris County tried unsuccessfully to collect property taxes.

#### AG Opinions

Attorney General John Hill said Upper Colorado River Authority may buy water from another district for distribution to its own users and store it outside its own boundaries in a reservoir.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

Information submitted to the Office of Consumer Credit Commissioner by a pawnshop licensee is public. And so are financial records of Hidalgo County Jobs for Progress Inc., a community action organization.

Workmen's Compensation carriers have no liability to the second injury fund for death benefits attributable to those deaths occurring after the fund exceeds \$250,000 in excess of existing liabilities and before it is reduced below \$125,000.

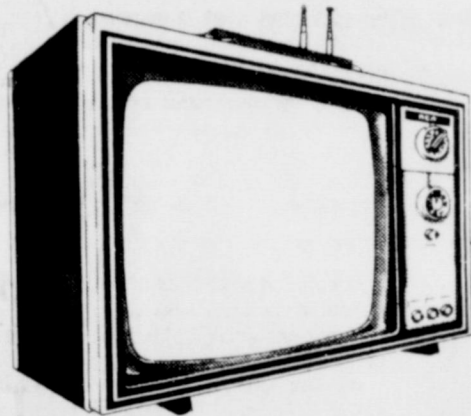

### Sherry Etheredge Says...

Going camping this summer?

Prepare your own convenience foods. Not only can you save money but you can save packing space as well. Also, you can save time and trouble when you're preparing meals at the campsite because convenience foods are easy to use.

For breakfast, the U. S. Department of Agriculture suggests three mixes you can prepare before you leave home. Each recipe requires non-fat dry milk, which is plentiful now, says USDA. Shop for the largest size package you can find at your market.

On cool mornings, waken your trouper with cocoa made from nonfat dry milk. Prepare this pre-mix by sifting together 5 tablespoons of cocoa, 5 tablespoons of sugar, 3/4 cup of nonfat dry milk solids, 1/8 teaspoon of salt. At the campsite, add 4 cups of hot water to the mix, and cook 3-5 minutes.

Stir even the sleepest camper with this delicious breakfast Corn Bread. Bring 1 cup sifted flour, 3/4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon baking powder, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1 cup corn meal and 1/2 cup instant nonfat dry milk in a clean, wide-mouth jar. When you're ready, blend dry mix with 1 beaten egg, 1 cup water, and 1/4 cup or 1/2 stick melted butter. Cook on hot grill like you'd prepare pancakes.

If your pack prefers a hearty breakfast, take along this pancake mix. Sift together 1-1/2 cups flour, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/2 cup

instant nonfat dry milk. Combine 1-1/2 cups water, 2 eggs, and 3 tablespoons melted butter. Pour about 1/2 cup batter for each pancake onto hot buttered griddle. When bubbles appear, turn and bake other side. Serve with butter and syrup, applesauce, cottage cheese or other toppings.

If you're merely looking for a breakfast beverage, what could be more suitable than nonfat dry milk? This milk powder is lightweight, easy to store, and convenient to mix at the campsite.

It contains about half the calories of whole milk, and may contain added vitamins A and D.

When buying nonfat dry milk, use the label as a guide. "Instant" describes nonfat dry milk that is made of large particles that dissolve more easily in water than regular nonfat dry milk.

To earn the "U.S. Extra Grade" shield, it must have a sweet and pleasing flavor and a natural color.

## Bill Clements Candidate For Governor

Jim Innes, campaign manager for Bill Clements, came into The News office Monday, July 3, and gave us the following information. He said his main objective right now was to organize the rural communities for Bill Clements because they need the support of the rural areas in the coming election. Mr. Innes is from Dallas.

Bill Clements has devoted his life to leadership and good management—the two qualities most important to the future of Texas.

Clements was born on April 13, 1917, in Dallas. He attended public school in the Highland Park School System.

Since childhood Clements has been active in the Boy Scouts of America. He served in various leadership roles in Boy Scouting and still aids the organization in any way possible.

Clements played on the first Highland Park High School team to win a district championship and was the first HPHS football player to be named to an All-State football team.

He graduated from high school during the Great Depression and was offered several university scholarships, but chose instead to help support his family by working in the South Texas oil fields.

After two years at Southern Methodist University, Clements went to work for a Texas oil field service company. He resigned at age 28 to establish his own business—The Southeastern Drilling Company. The company, now known as SEDCO, is a major international drilling contractor.

Clements' active participation in the Republican Party began in the 1950's when he worked as a poll watcher for the Eisenhower campaign and worked precinct door-to-door in support of the Republican Party cause. In 1964 Clements was State Finance Chairman for

George Bush's U.S. Senate campaign, and in 1970 he served as Bush's Dallas County Finance Chairman. 1971 saw Clements serve as Senator John Tower's state-wide Fundraising Dinner Chairman. During the 1972 election he was Co-chairman of the Republican Presidential campaign for the State of Texas.

For four years, 1972-76, longer than anyone has held that position, he managed the operations of the Pentagon as Deputy Secretary of Defense. He oversaw the daily operations of approximately 3 million defense employees, and administered the \$100 billion plus annual Department of Defense budget. Clements is currently a member of the Republican National Committee's policy committee on foreign policy and national security.

His wife, the former Rita Crocker, was Republican National Committeewoman from Texas in 1973-1975 after serving on the Republican National Finance Committee. She was the Organization Chairman of the Republican Party of Texas from 1966-1968.

Bill Clements has been working for the Republican Party of Texas for nearly 30 years.

The estimated farm-level value of the cotton crop from 25 High Plains counties in 1977, according to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, comes to \$825.7 million, up from \$675.4 million for the much smaller but higher priced crop of 1976.

The 1976 crop totaled 1,986,500 bales of lint and 794,600 tons of seed, valued at almost \$300 per bale of lint and \$100 per ton of seed.

The 1977 crop topped all previous yields at 3,215,400 bales of lint and about 1,286,000 tons of seed. But prices were down for both commodities, to an estimated \$228 per bale for lint and an average of about \$72 per ton of seed.

Estimates of average lint prices received by farmers on the 1977 crop were gathered by PCG from several knowledgeable sources. Guesses ranged from a 46-cent low to a high of over 49 cents and averaged 47.5 cents per pound.

The all-time high value for a cotton crop in PCG's 25 High Plains counties was reached in 1973 when lint and seed from 2,888,700 bales, plus farm program payments, pumped over \$900 million into the Lubbock area economy.

About the 1978 cotton crop, PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson says "It looks now as if we have about as many standing acres as we harvested last year, but the lateness of the crop, generally, and the continued shortage of subsoil moisture make it more than likely that yields will fall well short of those seen last year, and some of our present acreage could still be lost before harvest."

The 25 PCG counties in 1977, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, harvested an average of 424 pounds of lint per acre from 3,638,800 acres.

On price prospects for this year's harvest, Johnson notes that strong cotton exports coupled with doubts about the volume of production in the U.S. and other major producing countries this year "have given the market to date considerable underlying strength."

He cautions however that there is no certainty that current prices will hold or rise for the remainder of the year. "Rumors of poor crops in Russia and China could yet prove false and with the right weather the U.S. crop, including that from the High Plains, could also be a surprise.

"Even so, with the overall supply-demand situation, less than ideal crop conditions and the market's recent resistance to downward pressures, we have to be somewhat optimistic about prices this Fall."

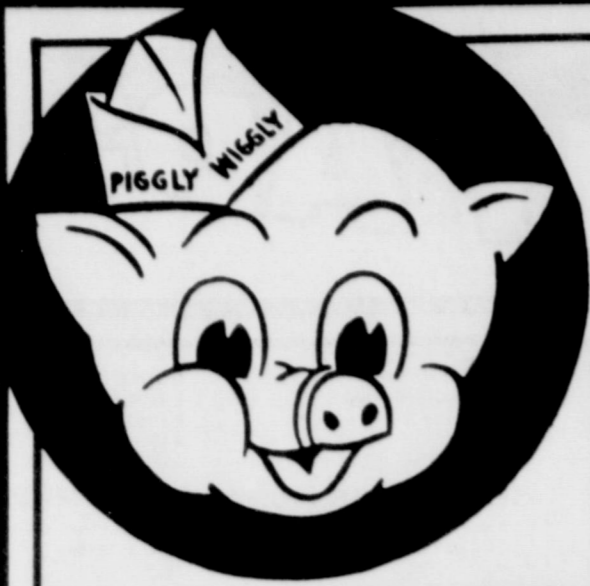
