need to look in our closets and make our choice as to what we want: no cotton prices, bad crops for our neighbors or going to the stores where cotton is in demand in large cities and buying cotton. A lot of man-made materials have to be pressed or sent to the cleaners. A lot of good cotton doesn't need ironing or pressing, so what price are you willing to pay?' questions Jo Carol Long.




