Pastor E. K. Sheperd says he will semi-retire after being a pastor for 41 years. It sounds like a good idea but with all the things he has planned for his semi-retirement it sounds like he may be just as busy as a full time pastor.

He says he is only changing to a different phase of the occupation. Now he plans to preach at revivals, supply for other pastors and teach study courses. "It's just a change to a different aspect of the job," Sheperd explained.

When he was growing up Sheperd wanted to be a barber or a railroad engineer so he went to college with those things in mind. He also added basketball to his desires and had made plans to play in college but at a revival at Wayland Baptist College in 1936 he felt called to be a preacher. That was his freshman year in college and he gave up basketball so he could preach and has been at it ever since.

The bus is available to any Senior Citizen whether they belong to the organizations or not. Anyone needing it's service, from Wilson, New Home, O'Donnell, Lakeview, Draw and any other community, wishing to use the bus should gather enough people (12) to fill the bus or near that number and then call the center and explain the plans for your trip.

The bus can be used for sightseeing, doctor appointments, or shopping excursions but cannot be used to transport groceries.

Be sure you have your trip planned and the date you wish to make the trip before calling the center. Do not call the center collect. Tuesday and Thursday have been designated for the bus to be used for O'Donnell residents but if you need the bus on one of those days call the center anyway and maybe something can be worked out.

Medicaid patients who use transportation provided by Ester Green are asked to keep in mind she is to provide medical transportation. That is trips to doctor's offices, hospitals and to have prescriptions filled. Everyone is asked to use the bus for running errands and save Ester for the medical service trips.

If you are a senior citizen and do not attend a regular meeting of one of the clubs, do check into joining. \$1 will make you a member at Tahoka and then you are eligible for various things in which the club is involved.

FmHa Explains New Loan Plan At Rotary Club

Types of loans available through Farmers Home Administration under the new regulations were explained by Bill Stewart, administrator of the local office at the Rotary Club last Thursday noon.

Stewart and family will continue to live in Tahoka when he becomes the new assistant administrator in the 14-county Lubbock area office on January 1. He introduced Ronnie Hardin, formerly of Littlefield, who comes here from Kerrville to succeed him. Stewart has been head of the local office for almost 16 years.

Stewart explained that emergency loans to farmers, who can not get credit elsewhere, for production losses prior to October 1, 1978, are possible at a low 3% interest rate, losses after this date at 5%.

However, in this day of tight money and high rates,

the rates on other type loans have been raised by the Credit Act pass by Congress from 6% to 8 1/2%.

He cited growth business of the local office from 80 loans made in 1963 to about 700 today, another estimated 450 will be made in the next month.

Stewart said the local office has completed a housing project in North Tahoka completed a year and a half ago by Tahoka Housing Authority on a project approved in the past week.

"Our object," he said, "is trying to provide a better place for our people to live in rural America." Dr. K. R. Durham was in charge of the program. Horace Rogers presided in absence of the president.

Legal notice to families who lived in public housing projects operated by the Housing Authority of the city of Tahoka or lived in public housing projects in any other city between March 16, 1971-September 26, 1975. If you rented a house or apartment from the Housing Authority or any other Public Housing Agency (PHA)

during the period between March 16, 1971, and September 26, 1975, you may be eligible to file a claim for a refund of part of your rent during that period if: 1. The wife or husband of the head of the household was present and dependent upon the head of the household for support and/or; 2. a dependent member of your family household was employed. If you believe your family falls within one of the categories described above, you may wish to continue reading this Notice in order to determine how and under what circumstances you may file a claim. On July 7, 1978, the District Court of the District of Columbia entered a Stipulated Order providing that the definition of family income for purposes of computing maximum rentals for public housing, as contained in a HUD Circular, which excluded spouses from the \$300 deduction for each dependent and excluded dependents from the \$300 deduction for each second wage earner, was invalid and violated the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended. The effect of this determination is that certain families who lived in public housing during the period from March 16, 1971, to September 26, 1975, may have been charged too much rent. Therefore, the district Court ordered HUD to establish a one million dollar fund for the payment of claims which current or former tenants of public housing may submit for a refund of any overpayments.

The District Court's Stipulated Order provides that, if valid claims exceed one million dollars, HUD has the option of having the Order dissolved in which case NTO and HUD may negotiate a modified settlement or proceed with further litigation. Thus, claimants should realize that the submittal of a claim determined valid by a PHA may result in full, partial, or no payment, depending on the total amount of valid claims submitted to HUD, or the final outcome of any further litigation. Any person wishing to receive a copy of the Stipulated Order or a claim form may do so by making their request known to a local PHA. Individuals wishing to submit a claim must fill in the claim form made a part of this Notice and submit it to the Public Housing

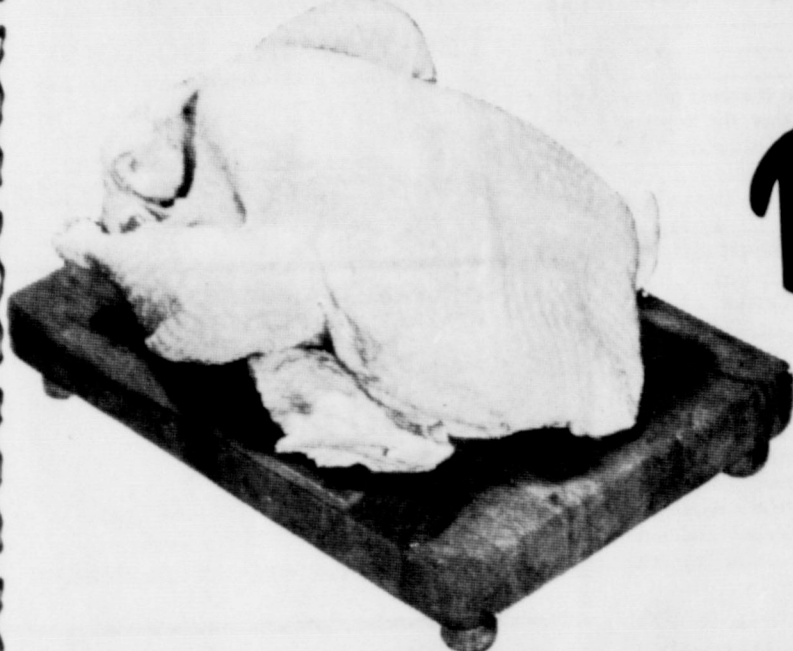

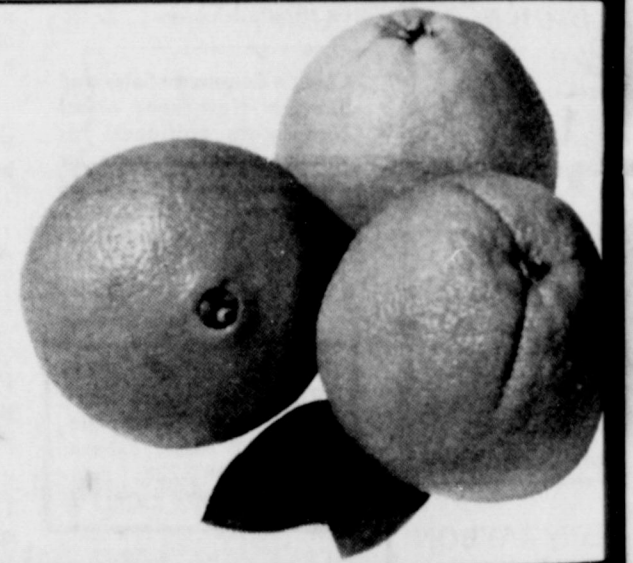
