



When the judges were again escorted into the auditorium the final tally was handed to Russ and he announced the new queen.



Job Openings With Census Bureau

The U.S. Census Bureau has a number of temporary jobs open during the next few weeks in Lynn County to help prepare address lists for use during the 1980 census.

Temporary census workers usually will work three to four weeks each and will be paid on a per-address collected basis. For an eight-hour day, the average worker will earn \$27 to \$30 per day plus 17c-per-mile for any driving done in a private vehicle. Applicants for the jobs must be 18 years old or over, a U.S. citizen, and pass a written test. The work involves driving or walking to compile lists of addresses of each dwelling unit in designated areas of the county. These address lists will play a vital role in taking the 1980 census. They will be used to produce mailing labels for the census questionnaries to be sent to each household in America on March 28, 1980. Then, a few weeks following the April 1 Census Day, census officials will use the address lists to determine which households have not returned their completed questionnaires. Census takers must then be sent to each non-responding household to collect the information required on the census form. The 1979 address collection activity in the county is part of a Census Bureau program involving 35,000 temporary workers nationwide to compile lists containing approximately 30 million addresses. Another 50 million addresses have been purchased from commercial mailing list companies. The Census Bureau is an equal opportunity employer. 



thunderstorm and tornado Distinctive development. features of severe storms. will be described as well as preferred areas for the formation of tornadoes. The remainder of the session will deal with a slide presentation of the storm features discussed in the film.

Watch Training

Information on tornadoes and severe thunderstorms is difficult to obtain across the Tahoka area for two reasons. First, the short-lived nature of tornadoes in the area makes it difficult to see many before they return to the parent cloud. Secondly, the large amount of open country in the area means that many tornadoes will not be observed. For this reason, the Civil Defense and National Weather Service have established local spotter teams to locate and report severe weather in their areas. In addition, amateur radio operators are being recruited to the ranks because of their expertise in the field of communications; and their ability to provide reliable, long-distance, interference-free, mobile spotter reports to the Weather Service. Such an amateur spotter team formed in the Tahoka area would be linked to teams already operating in and around Brownfield and Lubbock. Eventually, it is hoped, such a link could be formed to cover all of West Texas; and include in its scope not only severe storms and tornadoes but also flash floods and winter





Frostbite happens when ice crystals form on the skin or in the tissue and fluids under the skin. As the ice crystals enlarge, they take water from the skin cells and damage them. Frostbite occurs without warning pain. This comes later, when the frozen skin begins to warm. Wind and low temperatures can cause the occurance of frostbite in a matter of minutes. Symp toms begin with the skin looking ruddy. Then it pales and becomes glossy and finally looks white or greyish-yellow. The new first aid method for frostbite is to immerse the damaged tissue in water that is slightly warmer than body temperature, adding more warm water as needed. Immerse the frozen part for about 20 minutes before exposing it to room temperature. Fingers and toes may be exercised gently to restore circulation, but tissue damage can result if you walk on frostbitten feet.





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
