Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announces the approval of a \$271,660 loan to the Tahoka Industrial Housing Association by the Farmers Home Administration.

The rental housing project will consist of 12 units, all two-bedroom apartments, for a total of 10,180 square feet. This will also include a 400 square foot storage building. This project is the second phase of a previous facility for a total of 24 rental units to serve Tahoka and the surrounding area.

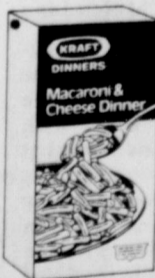

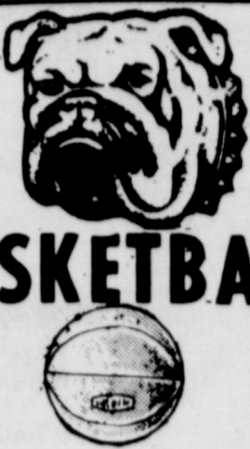

PCA Says Loan Available But Higher Rates

Recent figures show that Lubbock Production Credit Association loaned more than \$109.9 million for agricultural production in 1978.

According to Alton Strickland, Lubbock PCA president, the association is one of 30 Texas PCAs which collectively provided more than \$1.5 billion in short and intermediate term credit to Texas farmers and ranchers in 1978.

In noting the current inflationary pressures, Strickland said. "Although all types of production costs continue to rise and are going to increase more and more, we are confident that adequate credit for agricultural production will be available in 1979. Advantages & Disadvantages, Furrow Diking-Row Damming

Furrow diking or row damming or whatever it might be called has been getting some extra attention lately and a number of farmers have used it in Lynn County. While this practice does have good potential for holding extra rainfall, it should be pointed out that this practice is most effective

on contoured or level rows and has little or no effect when used up and down hill. Some of those observed in Lynn County were used up and down hill. Under normal rainfall conditions this practice used up and down hill will cause excessive soil erosion which will far outweigh any benefit from water storage. Regardless of where it is used, this practice will never replace a good system of parallel terraces on our "B" slope land, but rather should be used in conjunction with a system of parallel terraces.

If you plan to use the diking or damming practice this year you are asked to come by your local Soil Conservation office in Tahoka and let us work with you to set up a contour system on your farm. Be assured that the two practices will work better than the one.

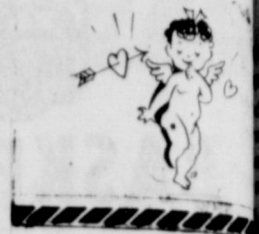

Cotton Prices Lower

High Plains cotton prices were \$1.25 to \$1.50 per bale lower the week ended February 8, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director at Lubbock's Marketing Services Office. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30-33, mikes 35-49 around 51.85 cents per pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 43 and 53, staples 30 and 31, mikes 35-49 brought about 46.55 cents per pound, Dickson said. Gins paid High Plains growers \$115 to \$130 per ton of cottonseed.

USDA's High Plains Marketing Services Offices graded 35,000 samples this week, bringing this season's total to 1,842,000. This compares to 2,926,000 graded by February 9 last year. Predominant High Plains grades this week were grade 41 at nine percent, grade 51 accounted for eight percent, grade 42 amounted to 39 percent and grade 52 was 21 percent. Thirty-four percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

Staple lengths were staple 31 at 32 percent, staple 32-40 percent and staple 33-12 percent, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. Micronaire was mostly in the desirable 35-49 range at 63 percent of the total. Thirty-six percent was lower, and one percent was higher.

DPS Seeks Recruit Applications

The Texas Department of Public Safety announced that it is accepting applications for the position of State Trooper to fill existing vacancies. Applications may be picked up at any DPS office. Entrance exams will begin February 15, at the Lubbock, Wichita Falls, and Amarillo DPS offices. Testing will be performed each Tuesday and Thursday at 9 a.m. and last most of the day.

The recruit school will begin June 12, and last for 18 weeks. The students selected will attend their Basic Police Training at the Homer Garrison Junior Memorial Academy in Austin. The curriculum will cover some 850 hours of Law Enforcement classes on a wide variety of such subjects as criminal and traffic law, human and community relations, investigative techniques, marksmanship, pursuit driving and physical training. During the training period the recruit will be paid \$876 a month.

Major C. W. Bell, Commander of Region 5, said, "To meet the general qualifications, both male and female applicants must be 20 through 35 years of age; of good moral character; in excellent physical condition; weigh not less than two pounds nor more than three and one-half pounds per inch of height; possess visual acuity no worse than 20/40 correctable to 20/20; and be a citizen of the United States. Educational qualifications are a minimum of 60 semester hours of college. The Department, an Equal Opportunity Employer, has been successful in recruiting women and persons from minority groups."

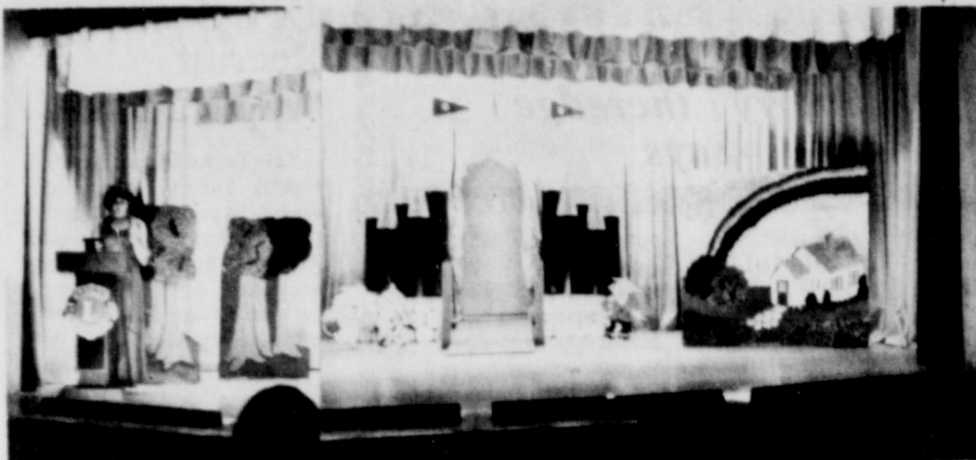

Lubbock and will begin with an introductory film outlining basic concepts of thunderstorm and tornado development. Distinctive features of severe storms will be described as well as preferred areas for the formation of tornadoes. The remainder of the session will deal with a slide presentation of the storm features discussed in the film.

Information on tornadoes and severe thunderstorms is difficult to obtain across the Tahoka area for two reasons. First, the short-lived nature of tornadoes in the area makes it difficult to see many before they return to the parent cloud. Secondly, the large amount of open country in the area means that many tornadoes will not be observed. For this reason, the Civil Defense and National Weather Service have established local spotter teams to locate and report severe weather in their areas. In addition, amateur radio operators are being recruited to the ranks because of their expertise in the field of communications; and their ability to provide reliable, long-distance, interference-free, mobile spotter reports to the Weather Service. Such an amateur spotter team formed in the Tahoka area would be linked to teams already operating in and around Brownfield and Lubbock. Eventually, it is hoped, such a link could be formed to cover all of West Texas; and include in its scope not only severe storms and tornadoes but also flash floods and winter storm events.

A Visit With Your County Agent

Take Advantage Of Good Weather And Soil Sample

Cold, windy weather has prevented Lynn County producers from soil sampling. Last month, the number of suitable days for field soil sampling was only 16. The result of this bad weather is that the normal backlog of soil samples has not developed in the laboratories this year. Presently, the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock is processing and reporting results about seven days after receiving the soil samples.

"Without the crop price outlook, the level of available nutrients in the soil is especially important for the efficient and profitable use of fertilizers." Soil tests have been developed to provide information about soil nutrients as a basis for determining if the soil level is adequate (high) or deficient (low).

Soils low in nutrients have a high probability of producing increased yields when the deficient nutrients are added by the fertilizer; while the soils high in nutrients will benefit little
