You can't beat the system. Our hands are there's no way to get around it. The rules don't allow it. The law prohibits the average person from getting a fair shake.

Most organizations have constitutions set up for the purpose of preventing someone from coming in and taking over a long standing organization and the United States is the same.

There are channels to use to be heard and when talking to some politicians you might as well be talking to a wall unless you learn how to talk about it. "The System" is not perfect but it can be made better through the proper channels but it takes perseverance and determination to stand out in the system.

The only thing is, the channels can collapse for lack of use and then the system is totally broken. How frequently are our available channels used?

Borden County To Elect PCG Producer Director February 26

Borden County cotton producers and agribusinessmen will elect a Producer Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at a 7:30 p.m. meeting on Monday, February 26, at the High School Conference Room, Gail.

Announcement of the election comes from Jarrell Edwards of Route 1, O'Donnell, current Borden County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Dan Turner, also of Route 1, O'Donnell, Businessman Director. Each of the counties in PCG territory has two directors, one a businessman and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms.

Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and businessmen are invited to the meeting. However, under new PCG By-Laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG staff member will conduct the election; PCG President Lloyd Cline will review recent PCG activities in Washington on behalf of South Plains cotton growers, and PCG Field Service Director Ed Dean will discuss the current status of PCG's Boll Weevil Program.

The Lynn County Livestock Show Association will open its annual show at the show barn in Tahoka on Thursday, February 22, 9:00 a.m. for weighing-in of all animals. The show will climax at 2:00 p.m. Saturday, February 24, with an Auction Sale and presentation of awards.

Last year the auction sale was a huge success with \$40,000 being paid for about 100 animals. Everyone, including parents, exhibitors and the association were very pleased and are hopeful that this year will show the same about of support for the young people in our county.

The sale has been deemed one of the most meaningful endeavors associated with the stockshow. If the sale nears the same mark as last year it will be giving larger cities a run for stock show sales.

People are encouraged to attend the show and support the youth of the county. They are also urged to attend the sale and bid on animals at the auction on Saturday.

Barrow judging will begin at 8:30 a.m. Friday, February 23, with the steers being judged at 6 p.m., Friday, February 23. Lamb judging will begin at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, February 24.

The committee has named Rudd to chair the subcommittee formed to review HB 64, which establishes a criminal history record system within the Department of Public Safety, and authorizes them to provide information to qualified parties. A tentative hearing has been scheduled for next week.

With the storm season coming on, the necessity of having trained spotters in the field becomes more important. Representatives of the local fire and law enforcement departments have been storm watching for years, and the training session served as a good refresher course.

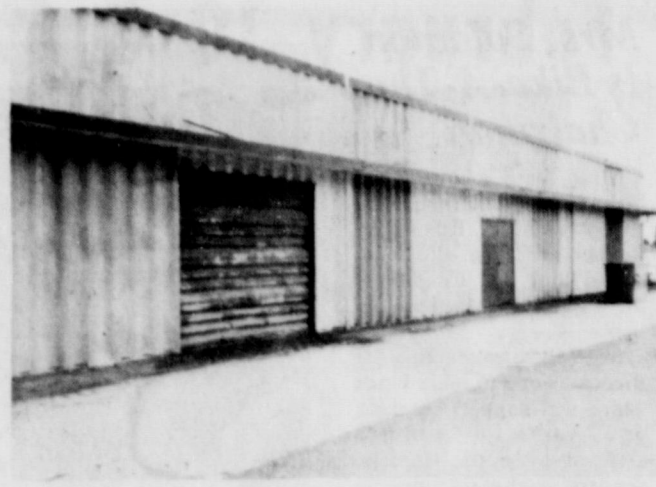
Extension Agent in Dawson County, will be the Showmanship judge.

be a percent of the total entries with a minimum of one animal per class in the sale. All animals must be entered for sale not later than one-half hour after the completion of the lamb judging. The exhibitor must take their own animal through the sale. All exhibitors are responsible for their animals, either premium sale or non-premium sale, until they are turned over to the proper superintendents.

Perhaps a new resolution could be quoted, "Forget about the past, live in the present, and live fully day by day." Stive to be more comfortable with today's management.

If you have a microwave oven, you'll discover it is not only a time saver but an energy saver, money saver and health contributor. Are you using your microwave oven to its fullest advantages to help you to do an efficient job in keeping with your style of life?

Here are some helpful tips to help you use the microwave oven with ease and confidence.

Re-crisp chips and crackers 45 seconds per plateful.

Wax paper provides a light cover for such foods as chicken, some fruits and roasts.

Plastic wrap will hold in heat and steam and make a tight cover. Vegetables and fish cook best with this method.

Microwave coffee makers and popcorn poppers are available. Popcorn poppers need no butter or cooking oil for popping corn.

Shelling pecans or similar nuts? Place 2 cups of nuts with 1 cup water in a 1 quart casserole. Cook 4 to 5 minutes. The nut meats slip out whole after cracking.

You can blanch almonds, hazelnuts or filberts easily. Bring 1 cup water to boil and drop in nuts. Cook about 1/2 minute then drain. Skins slip right off.

Obtain more juice from a lemon - microwave 30 seconds before squeezing.

One slice pie-a-la-mode can be microwaved 30 to 45 seconds to heat the pie without melting the ice cream.

Hard lumps of white or brown sugar can be softened. Place sugar in a dish or use sugar box or sack, if there is no foil; add a slice of bread or apple. Cover and heat 15 seconds or more. Moisture from the bread or apple creates steam to soften the sugar.

Last but not least, baby's bottle with milk, water of juice may be warmed. Be sure cap is loosely fastened and heat 15 to 20 seconds. Test.

Adapting recipes to microwave: generally, microwaving takes 1/2 the time of conventional cooking. But since some foods take a little less or more time due to density or quantity, it is a good idea to find a similar recipe in your microwave oven cookbook and make a comparison of time.

Cotton Prices Are Higher

High Plains cotton prices were around \$5.25 per bale higher the week ended February 15, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director at Lubbock's Marketing Services Office.

Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30-33, mikes 35-49 around 52.90 cents per pound. New crop lots of mostly grades 43 and 53, staples 30 and 31, mikes 35-49 brought about 47.60 cents per pound, Dickson said.

USDA's High Plains Marketing Services Offices graded 27,000 samples this week, bringing this season's total to 1,869,000. This compares to 2,931,000 graded by February 16 last year.

Predominant High Plains grades this week were grade 41 at eight percent, grade 51 accounted for 12 percent, grade 42 amounted to 37 percent and grade 52 was 22 percent. Thirty-five percent was reduced one grade because of bark.

Staple lengths were staple 30 at 10 percent, staple 31-33 percent and staple 32-41 percent, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Micronaire was mostly in the desirable 35-49 range at 62 percent of the total. Thirty-eight percent was lower.

Lynn County 4-H Club members participated in the San Antonio Livestock Show February 12-16, with Billy Whitaker Assistant County Extension Agent accompanying them.

The results were as follows: Lani Brown exhibited 7th place Middle weight Duroc; Patricia Davis exhibited 10th place Heavy Weight Poland; Lani Brown exhibited 11th place Light Weight Chester White; and Benny Gass exhibited the 14th place Heavy Weight Hampshire.

Billy Whitaker Says...

Assistant County Extension Agent

Getting a driver's license is a big step in the life of any teenager. And 4-H Wheels can help make that step a lot easier to take.

The Wheels pre-driver education course is part of the national 4-H automotive program conducted by the Extension Service and supported by the Firestone Tire and Rubber Company.

Wheels participants learn about their responsibilities as drivers, how using the family car will affect their parents' insurance rates, and what makes an automobile run. Their instructors are community volunteers - businessmen, safety officials and mechanics. "Classrooms" may be garages, auto dealerships, tire centers, police stations or anywhere the automotive action is.

Practical and technical know-how are stressed in all 4-H automotive projects and activities. 4-H members learn-by-doing about highway safety, traffic and motor vehicle laws, basic auto maintenance and the economics of buying and operating a car. 4-H'ers also explore vocational opportunities in automotive engineering, design, assembly and sales.

Automotive program members can earn annual awards donated by Firestone and arranged by the National 4-H Council. Recognition includes eight national scholarships of \$1,000 each, an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago for one member per state, and four medals of honor in each county.

Up to 10 certificates per state are awarded to clubs or counties that report outstanding over-all 4-H automotive programs. As many as two clubs or counties per state can win plaques of honor for outstanding automotive driving events.

Firestone also sponsors automotive safety and care events at the Western U.S. 4-H Engineering Event in Omaha, Nebraska, and the Eastern Event in Richmond, Virginia. Top individuals in the automotive events will receive shares of stock in the company.

1% Sales Tax Rebates Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has announced rebates to Texas cities of the local option one percent sales tax are up a whopping 36 percent this month over the same period last year.

Bullock said Texas cities will receive a rebate of some \$25.5 million this month, compared to a net payment of about \$13.7 for February last year.

The 1979 year-to-date payments for the city sales tax rebates have climbed to \$43.7 million, compared to a two-month figure last year of \$32.2 million, an increase of \$11.5 million.

Houston will receive \$5.4 million for this reporting period, compared to a payment of \$2.8 million during February of 1978, or an increase of about 30 percent.

Over 909 Texas cities will receive rebates as their share of the city sales tax. The sales tax is collected by merchants and sales tax permits along with the state and is rebated monthly in which it is collected by the Comptroller's office.

Prescribed Reading

PARKER PHARMACY

Almost everyone knows that a sneeze expels an irritant from the nose, but the far-reaching effects of a single sneeze are less commonly known.

Moisture surrounding the expelled particle evaporates rapidly, leaving the tiny nucleus floating in the air where it can invade and infect anyone who inhales it. One sneeze can project up to 4,600 particles into the air, 4,000 of which are still there 1/2 hour later. That one sneeze can also distribute up to 85 million bacteria. Covering a sneeze with the hand isn't very effective. Most particles still escape into the air, and the others lodge upon the hand from which they can also transmit viruses. A handkerchief or tissue control a sneeze best. If none is available, try to sneeze downward, where the expelled particles may possibly adhere to the floor or ground, decreasing their chances for becoming airborne.

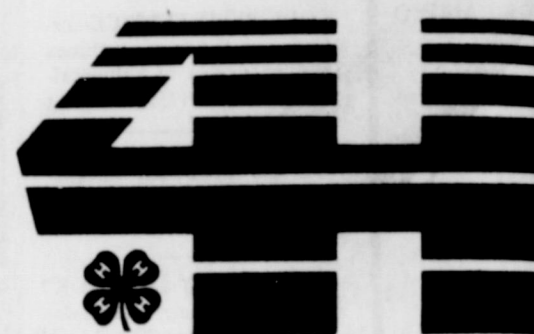
