#### Subcommittee on Diesel Fuel **Shortages In Agriculture** A Subcommittee on Diesel Fuel Shortages in

Agriculture, chaired by State Senator E. L. Short held its first meeting, Tuesday, March 3 in the State Capitol. The subcommittee of the Texas Energy Advisory Council was named by Lt. Governor Bill Hobby in response to a significant diesel shortage in the High Plains with potentially serious impacts on the agricultural industry

of the area. Several West Texas farmers, Farm Bureau representatives and members of the subcommittee presented an overview of the problems from an agriculture viewpoint and of the diesel supply situation. The Governor's Energy representative indicated to

the subcommittee the procedure adopted by them whereby farmers and distributors can apply for the special 4% state set-aside fuel allocation.

Farmers or distributors may request special allocations by submitting a letter stating the following information: 1. How much fuel they

presently have for the current month

2. How much additional fuel they need for month. 3. Who supplier has been

(name and address). 4. What use the fuel will be put to: Must expain in detail as to assurance that the fuel will be used 100% for agriculture.

5. Complete name, address and telephone.

This letter is to be sent to the following address each month fuel is needed: State Fuel Allocation Office: 7703 N. Lamar Blvd. Room 502; Austin, Texas 78752.

Krause has had special training in detection of users and dealing with the problem. He was born and reared in Lynn County, and is a Tahoka High School graduate.

Another of his surprise statements was that most of the students using drugs are in the 8 to 14-year old range and include children from all walks of life, white, black, and brown.

Use of marijuana and the sniffing of glue, paint, gasoline, etc. are the most prevalent, but students have run the course in using Hallucinogens (LSD and PCPO, barbituate, amphetamines and opiates).

The entire community especially parents, should be on the look out for symptoms such as redding of eyes, personality change, evasiveness, drop in grades, poor school attendance, temper outbursts. wearing long sleeve shirts, choice of associates, and stealing to finance their habit.

The speaker briefly reviewed the history of drug usage back to before the birth of Christ. He emphasized the fact that students. parents, school officials and every citizen should recognize the fact that students, parents, school officials and every citizen should recognize the drug problem, take means to discourage drug use, for continued use is certain to become habitforming. He also illustrated how hard it is for officials to trace down and get

convictions on drug distributors.

He also had a display of the various forms of habit. forming drugs. Clint Walker arranged the program. President Monte Dodson inducted three new members into the Rotary Club. Frank Barrow, the new bank president; Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton, and Deputy Stanley Krause.





naturally control greenbugs. Therefore, producers should inspect their wheat and other small grain fields closely during March to determine greenbug population levels.

Control measures should be based on the size and condition of wheat and number of greenbugs present per foot of row.

Greenbug populations decline just as rapidly as they build up once beneficials become active. Parasitic wasps, lady beetles, nabids, lacewings and spiders are important beneficials which help control greenbug populations

During the first two weeks of April, 1978 in the Rolling Plains, lady beetle and parasitic wasp populations increased to the point that it was difficult to find greenbugs in wheat fields by April 15.

So, once beneficial populations begin to increase, they usually reduce greenbug populations significantly in a few weeks.

By being able to identify beneficial insects that aid in greenbug control, producers can often determine when they are controlling greenbugs and can therefore avoid the cost of an unneeded insecticide application.

Additional information on greenbug control is presented in the publication, Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghum and Small Grains", available at the county Extension office.
