



Rain Showers Afford Some Help To Land

Rain showers Tuesday morning, afternoon, and night covered parts of Lynn County, but Tahoka recorded only .08 of an inch.




Mrs. Wharton was a member of Pi Beta Phi Sorority, the American Contract Bridge League and First United Methodist Church.







Bullock Tells Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said local one percent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for April were up over the same month last year.


Bullock said city allocations statewide for April totaled \$34.9 million, compared to \$20.1 million during April of 1978.


The 1979 payments to date to cities reached \$135.2 million this month, compared to \$121.6 million over the same 4-month period last vear. The sales tax is collected

by merchants and other tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to some 916 Texas cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

O'Donnell's net payment this period was \$816.85. Their 1979 payments to date total \$2,690.37 and their 1978 payments to date totals \$3,753.91. The percent change to date is -28%.

Tahoka's net payment this period is \$5,260.30 and their
