County Helps Tornado Victims Near Wichita Falls



TAHOKA RESPONDED like the rest of the county, generously, when it came time to help the 20,000 homeless people whose homes had been destroyed by a killer tornado that ripped through the city of Wichita Falls and the surrounding area. Financial aid is still needed to help people through the period before funds are available from government and state sources.

BAGS AND PILES of clothing and other items fill the entry of Rim Rock Grocery for the third time. The items are being collected for the tornado victims in the Wichita Falls area.

It seems every part of the country has its own form of weather problems to deal with. Some places must contend with floods, earthquakes, hurricanes, and in this state many times tornados are a very real danger to life and property. Whenever such a disaster hits an area other parts of the country join hands to help out with whatever they can.

Mr. E. A. Howle and Lawrence Harvick loaded a van with the collected items and drove it to the city last week. Then Monday of this week Mr. and Mrs. Howle again made the trip with another van load of goods for the Wichita Falls area.

Falls, eight days before the tornado hit the city. Twenty-three of the families from his former church had their homes destroyed and he and Dennis Haley and Eddie Askew went to help out with whatever they could do for the people.

Lynn County has extended a helping hand to the area in much the same way many other towns and cities have done. It seems most people are anxious to help because they feel the situation could easily be reversed and besides, they like helping other people.

School children were also given an opportunity to help out by donating canned foods. It was announced on the loud speaker one morning and the response the next day was overwhelming. Two men, one of them being Superintendent Jim Coulston, took the food items to the area.

They area will need financial assistance to help people through the time before government or state aid can be rendered because of paperwork. People must continue to live even though the large amounts of money from such sources as government will take days or weeks or months to be dispersed.

Over 4,000 homes have been completely destroyed and 20,000 people are left without a place to go. According to Mr. Howle there are large piles of debris in the area because citizens are not allowed to burn anything because of the pollution problem so it will all have to be hauled away.

Some of their personal items looked fine but they were forbidden to use them because bits of insulation and asbestos had been imbedded in the items. One very unusual sight he reported was the mesquite bushes that had been chopped off about two feet above the ground and the bark completely stripped from the branches. Then

from the stubs of the bush pieces of insulation and asbestos were hanging. He said it was truly a weird sight. The niece and great niece of Mrs. Sue Shaver of Tahoka were killed in the tornado that hit Vernon last week. Her niece was Donna Shelton and the great niece was Donna's three year old daughter, Lou Ann.

Senator E. L. Short, Chairman Of Diesel Fuel Committee

Lt. Governor Bill Hobby, Chairman of the Texas Energy Advisory Council and the Council's personnel are assisting Senator E. L. Short in reaching a solution to the diesel fuel shortage in West Texas. Short was appointed Chairman of the Special Subcommittee of Diesel Fuel Shortage for Agriculture by Lt. Governor Hobby.

Short stated, "Farmers facing a diesel fuel shortage may begin to find some relief soon." "I have received word that diesel fuel may be available in the Gulf Coast region and that transportation can be arranged as soon as the Governor's Fuel Allocation Office is able to process enough applications for a given location."

Short has been working with the Texas Motor Transportation Association and they have agreed to lend their assistance as a clearing house to facilitate any transportation problems. Milton Holloway, Executive Director of Texas Energy Advisory Council has assisted us in getting a meeting set up Thursday, April 12 at 9:30 a.m. with people in the U.S. Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Extension Service, Texas Motor Transportation Assn. and the Texas State Fuel Allocation Office.

PLEASE, GOD, I'M ONLY 17

The day I died was an ordinary school day. How I wish I had taken the bus! But I was too cool for the bus. I remember how I wheeled the car out of Mom. "Special favor," I pleaded, "all the kids drive." When the 2:50 bell rang, I threw all my books in the locker. I was free until 8:40 tomorrow morning! I ran to the parking lot, excited at the thought of driving a car and being my own boss. Free!

It doesn't matter how the accident happened. I was goofing off--going too fast. Taking crazy chances. But I was enjoying my freedom and having fun. The last thing I remember was passing an old lady who seemed to be going awfully slow. I heard the deafening crash and felt a terrific jolt. Glass and steel flew everywhere. My whole body seemed to be turning inside out. I heard myself scream.

Suddenly I awakened; it was very quiet. A police officer was standing over me. Then I saw a doctor. My body was mangled. I was saturated with blood. Pieces of jagged glass were sticking out all over. Strange that I couldn't feel anything.

Hey, don't pull that sheet over my head. I can't be dead. I'm only 17. I've got a date tonight. I am supposed to grow up and have a wonderful life. I haven't lived yet. I can't be dead.

Later I was placed in a drawer. My folks had to identify me. Why did they have to see me like this? Why did I have to look at Mom's eyes when she faced the most terrible ordeal of her life? Dad suddenly looked like an old man. He told the man in charge, "Yes, he is my son."

The funeral was a weird

experience. I saw all my relatives and friends walk toward the casket. They passed by, one by one, and looked at me with the saddest eyes I've ever seen. Some of my buddies were crying. A few of the girls touched my hand and sobbed as they walked away.

Please...somebody...wake me up! Get me out of here. I can't bear to see my Mom and Dad so broken up. My grandparents are so racked with grief they can barely walk. My brother and sisters are like zombies. They move like robots. In a daze, everybody! No one can believe this. And I can't believe it.

Please don't bury me! I'm not dead! I have a lot of living to do! I want to laugh and run again. I want to sing and dance. Please don't put me in the ground. I promise if you give me just one more chance, God, I'll be the most careful driver in the whole world. All I want is one more chance.

Bullock Tells Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday said local one percent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for April were up over the same month last year.

Bullock said city allocations statewide for April totaled \$34.9 million, compared to \$20.1 million during April of 1978.

The 1979 payments to date to cities reached \$135.2 million this month, compared to \$121.6 million over the same 4-month period last year.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to some 916 Texas cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.
