## Eyesores Kill Prospects, Chamber Members Told

To get people to clean up their property so Tahoka is better was a primary objective of discussion at the meeting of Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, as it reported that this is one of the first and toughest facing the city if people attract new business industry which will help the business and pay taxes.

Chambers said committees have been named to compile information and be ready to answer any questions an industrial prospect might have in visiting the city. He also said members of the Texas Industrial Commission who conducted the seminar in Austin are expected to visit Tahoka soon in a

follow-up to see if the local group is functioning as suggested.

Winston Wharton, chairman of the chamber's beautification committee, commented that "vacant lots are sometimes pretty hard to get cleaned up, but a business owner ought to have enough pride to clean up around his own property."

Some of those present said many persons who own lots which have grown up in weeds both in residential and business areas might clean them up if they could obtain the services of someone with a shredder. It also was suggested that the city may be asked to enforce an existing ordinance requiring

lot owners to keep their property mowed and cleaned up.

## Home In City Is Robbed, Vandalized

Bedsprings and window drapes were slashed, paint was sprayed on the walls and some clothing was stolen from a home in Tahoka last Thursday night.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. J. Dudley (Buck) Martin was burglarized while the couple was away in the evening, police were told. Some of Mrs. Martin's clothing was stolen from a closet. The vandalism was mostly in two bedrooms and a bathroom, according to police.

Tahoka Police Dept. also investigated three vehicle accidents and a pig theft during the week. Two pigs weighing between 60 and 70 pounds each were reported stolen from Willis Pennington in the southeast part of town Sunday night.

Also there have been several power calls at Lynn County Hospital during the last week or so.

Last Friday at Lockwood and Main a 1972 Chevrolet pickup driven by William Underwood of Tahoka and a 1976 Chevrolet pickup driven

by Arthur Whitley of Tahoka collided.

On Sunday at Ave. O and N. 6th a 1978 Mercury driven by Robert Lewis Warren of Tahoka and a 1979 Chevrolet driven by Patricia Sarten Glisson of Rt. 5, were involved in a collision.

On Monday afternoon a parked 1974 Chevrolet pickup owned by Stuart Rice, Rt. 1, Wilson, was struck by a 1979 Chevrolet driven by Mrs. W. R. Warren, 1727 N. 6th. The mishap occurred in front of Bray Chevrolet Co. Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. was investigating three burglary reports, a missing cotton trailer and a Sunday night shooting in O'Donnell.

A young Mexican male was shot in the leg with a .22 pistol as a result of a dispute in O'Donnell. No arrest was made and the victim was treated by family members.

The Alan Nettles residence north and west of New Home was reported burglarized last Saturday, with a television set, clock-radio and jewelry box listed as missing. Also on the Saturday a burglary was reported at the Lyndell Woods residence east of the Tahoka cemetery, with guns, a gun rack, stereo and two guitars among missing items.

Tahoka Co-Op Gin reported a cotton trailer with the letters "RM" painted on it missing sometime since the end of last ginning season.

## More Rain

Moderate to heavy showers have covered Lynn County during the past week, but rainfall in west Tahoka has totaled only .57 inch, bringing the month's total to .93 inch and for the year to 17.61.

Showers Wednesday before daylight missed Tahoka.

Hail damaged cotton southeast of Tahoka in the Draw-Redwine area Monday, including the Joe Brooks, Roy LeMond, and Freddy Martin operations.

Up to two inches of rain were reported at Draw, and an inch or more in the Grassland, New Lynn, Wilson areas and west of West Point, almost an inch at West Point to New Home. In fact, the showers have covered the county.

Farmers now say they hope for warm, dry weather to permit this year's late crop to mature. With a dry fall and late frost, the county could harvest a bumper cotton crop.

## Gin Holds 44th Meeting

The 44th Annual Stockholders Meeting of the Tahoka Cooperative Gin was held in the Tahoka School Cafeteria Thursday, August 16.

Approximately 100 members and guests were served a meal of fish and chicken.

Two directors were elected to three year terms, and one for one year to complete an unexpired term.

Although only 3,530 bales of cotton were ginned last year, a net profit of \$9.64 per bale was shown.

## Schools Here Looking For Fewer Students

The vacation is over and about 1,000 youngsters will go back to classes Friday as Tahoka Public Schools begin the fall term with fewer students than they had last year.

Supt. Jim Coulston said the anticipated 1,000 enrollment in all schools would be about 100 less than the total at the beginning of school last year, a factor which has cost the school some funds in the form of state aid in the coming year. "Most of the loss has been in the junior high and elementary

grades," Coulston said. Buses are scheduled to run Friday on regular timetables and routes and classes will

## Title I Funds Available for Lynn County

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Charles W. Stenholm announces that Lynn County has become eligible for \$13,528.60 additional Title I funds under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act as amended by Public Law 95-561, Financial Assistance to Meet Special Educational Needs of Children. These funds will enable the local educational agencies to provide more effective programs of instruction, especially in the basic skills of reading, writing and mathematics to meet the special educational needs of educationally deprived children. The school districts within the County will be receiving additional information from the Texas Education Agency as to their eligibility for these funds.

## Museum Receives Historical Items

Tahoka Pioneer Museum has received a number of important historical items during the past two weeks.

The daughters of the Will Montgomerys, Miss Marietta, Mrs. Paul (Grace) Kiser, and Mrs. Lois White, have acquired a pioneer organ, pews, and other items which they plan for a church chapel as soon as a booth is built for the display. Through Bryan Wright, who farms much of the Henderson-Chambers land east of town, J. C. Powell Jr. of Los Angeles has donated a large picture of Mrs. W. Ed (Fannie) Henderson, the first Tahoka postmaster, an early day abstract, a number of documents revealing early day history, and \$200 in cash.

The J. R. Chambers family came to Lynn County in 1902, followed soon after by their son-in-law Ed. Henderson. The Chambers filed on land adjoining present Tahoka, and a while later Mr. Henderson bought up two sections adjoining the Chambers land.

When Lynn County was organized in April, 1903, Mrs. Ed (Fannie) Henderson is said to have suggested the name "Tahoka", from Tahoka Lake, as the name for the county seat. She became Tahoka's first postmaster, and her husband opened the

IS NOT TOO unusual for me to have to eat my pies, but this week I not only ate them in a matter of speaking, but enjoyed it. Last week I mentioned something about a grasshopper pie and how bad that sounded, so one of these pies this week presented me with one which she made. I almost said "baked," but it didn't seem to be baked. The pie was delicious. Full of calories, as the Mrs. Robert Abbe Sr., said in a clever poem presented along with the pie. And that is what makes it good, of course, because as anyone over (around the waist) knows, the more calories, the better something tastes. The poem she presented:

Are you the kind of person who, at the end of a tiring day... says the olive from a Martini throws the juice away? A grasshopper pie is smooth as silk with a taste of chocolate and mint... the calories in each small piece would not look good in print! 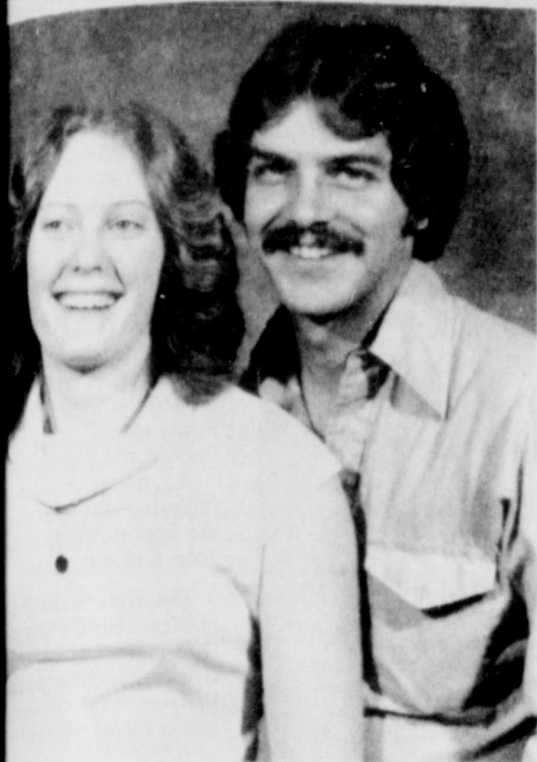

### County Sets Hearing On 1980 Budget

### Clean Tahoka Is Urged By Speaker

In order to attract more new citizens and industry, a cleaner town is an important factor, Hospital Administrator Gerald Moore declared in a talk before the Rotary Club last Thursday noon.

Moore was one of the group of Tahoka men who attended a meeting in Austin recently with Texas Industrial Commission representatives. A clean town was emphasized at a meeting as one of the top priorities industry sets in selecting a location. Others, he said, include availability of labor, good schools and churches, recreation facilities, quality of citizenship, etc.

Moore's talk, however, dealt principally with the unsightly appearance of many streets, alleys, lots, vacant business buildings and run-down houses, and vacant lots.

He illustrated his talk with a number of slide pictures he had taken of unsightly scenes around town. He emphasized that none of the pictures were taken of premises of minority races, but that all of them were white/Angleo properties.

Moore also emphasized that in such a town as Tahoka, the City can do only so much because of finances involved and that private

citizens need to exercise more effort to clean up and keep property presentable. A number of Tahoka Rotarians on Tuesday night attended the annual Lubbock Intercity meeting at which James L. Bomar Jr., president of Rotary International, was the principal speaker.

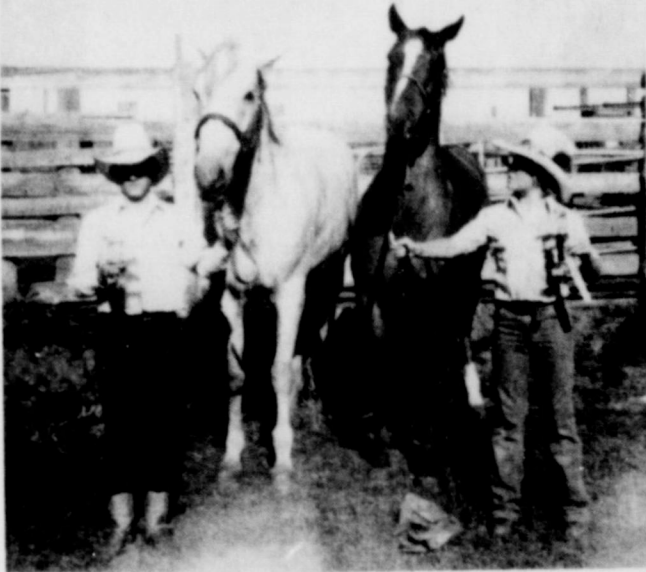

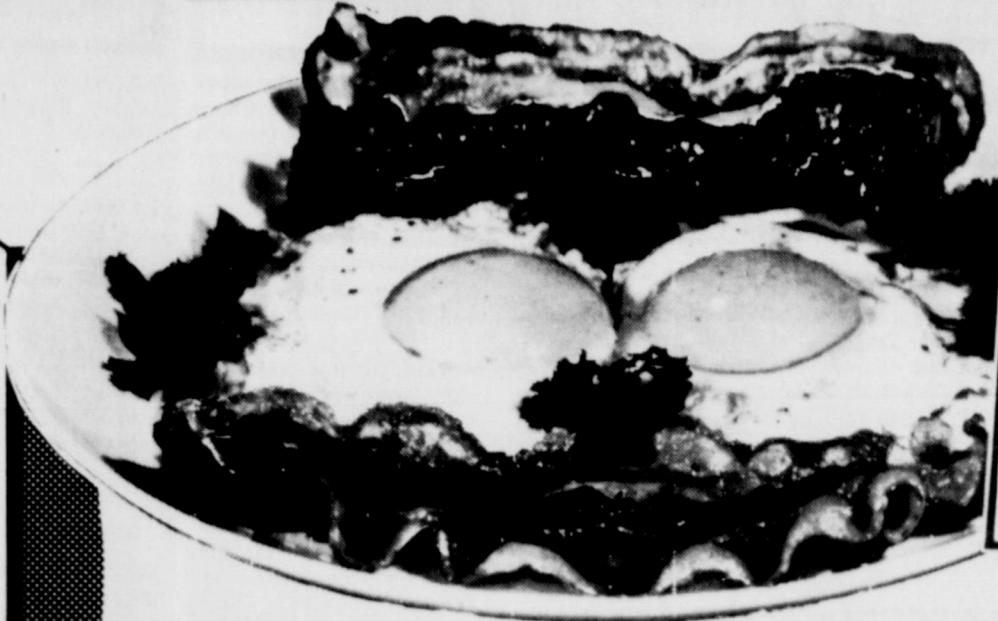
