joy the game with Seminole Oct. 19 when the Indians took a 14-0 first-period lead, then hung on to win 20-12. Seminole, in turn, was upended by Slaton week before last 17-7, and it was

Slaton's turn Friday night. Coach Ed Cook's Tigers had beaten eight opponents, had a non-conference tie with Littlefield, and were favored by folks outside Lynn County to win it all over Tahoka Friday. It was not to be, however.

A lot of Tahoka seniors, led by Tackle Doug Barham, End Brad White, and backs Clifford Oages and Todd Brown perhaps played the best games of their careers Friday, and so did just about everyone else on the Bulldog squad. With some of the players wearing pieces of a red Slaton windbreaker tucked into their waistbands, the blueclad Dogs went after everything red on the field with ferocity.

Some had expected the game to be a close matchup between Tahoka's Oages and Tracy White and Tiger running backs Jesse Titus and Lance Bownds. Bownds and Titus carried 12 times each, with Bownds gaining just 10 yards and Titus 75. White, just a junior, ran 31 times for 111 yards and Oages carried 21 times for 84

vards. Oages' over the 1,000-yard mark for the year, leaving him with a total of 1,055 on 168 carries. The average of 6.3 per carry led the Tahoka team, but White did have more yards, gaining 1,140 in 209 carries,

an average of 5.5 per carry. White scored 98 points, including 16 touchdowns for the year, while Oages had 9 TDs and 58 points. Brown scored 48 points.

Slaton took the opening kickoff, moved to a couple of first downs, and then Titus missed a 49-yard field goal try, with Tahoka taking over on the Bulldog 31. Tahoka, which wound up with 18 first downs in the game to just 6 for Slaton, got three of them in a row before having to

punt over the goal line. The first quarter ended with no scoring, and a Tahoka drive stalled early in the second on the Tiger 31. Slaton Quarterback Kevin Johnston hit End Troy Moses on a 37-yard pass play that was to be the Tigers' biggest gain of the game, down to the Tahoka 25. Titus then ran 11 to a first at the 14, and later Bownds ran 13 for an apparent touchdown, but a holding call set Slaton back to the 29. Willie Ray Mitchell then intercepted a Johnston pass at the 4 to halt what was to be Slaton's only threat.

After Tahoka punted out, Danny Thompson recovered a Slaton fumble to set the Bulldogs up at the Slaton 46. Brown raced 15 yards in the ensuing drive and then Oages ripped 10 to a first and goal just inside the 10. With just 4 seconds left in the half, Brown hit End Johnny Alvarado in the end zone with a 6-yard pass. A running try for points by White was stopped and the Bulldogs led 6-0 at halftime.

Good Runbacks Mitchell took the second half kickoff back 28 yards to the 48 and although Tahoka was stopped later, the Dogs maintained good field position for the rest of the game, keeping Slaton in a hole.

Later Tahoka moved 58 yards to score, with the biggest gain a 22-yard scamper by White. Oages got the TD on a 14-yard, fourth down run, going around left end. Kevin Elmore kicked the point and it was 13-0 for Tahoka over the shocked Tigers, who had trailed in only one game all

Tahoka threatened again in the fourth period, but Slaton held at the Tiger 14. Late in the quarter, Bulldog linebacker Jacky Jolly intercepted a Johnston pass and returned it 27 yards to the Slaton 11. The Tigers, however, held at the 4 with just 39 seconds left. In a desperate attempt to score, Slaton lost the ball inside its own 10 on a fourth down incomplete pass, and with 3 seconds left in the game Tracy White scored from the 1. Elmore kicked again to wind it up at 20-0.

About an hour later, in Brownfield, Slaton drew the lucky number to get the right to represent district in the playoffs. This dimmed Tahoka's jubilation, but didn't change the outcome of

efforts ever by a Tahoka team, and the third year in a row for the Bulldogs to beat Slaton and throw the district into a tie.

On defense, Jolly, Barham, Brad White, Tracy White, Oages, Luchion and Danny Thompson and just about everybody in blue played well, and the offensive line did a great job of moving out the Slaton front line.

School Audit Report Approved

Annual audit of funds for the Tahoka Independent School District was presented to the school board last Thursday night with the bottom line showing total assets, including physical property, of \$2,353,277.

The school board approved the audit report presented by Orland Gilbert, CPA, with the Lubbock firm of Bolinger, Segars, Gilbert and Moss.

The board approved additions to substitute teacher list including Mrs. Janet Owen, Mrs. Janie Isbell, Mrs. Connie Barnes, Mrs. Charlsie Clark Tekell and Karen Kellen. Also given approval was the textbook committee.

In addition, the board approved a leave of absence for Mrs. Becky Taylor, voted to join the South Plains Area Assn. of School Boards, heard reports on finances, status of the Lynn County Appraisal District, and voted to have an existing bus completely overhauled and renovated rather than buy a new school bus for next year.

Volunteers are asked to help put up new Christmas lights downtown, with a work time scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday at the courthouse square.


'If enough people show up, it won't take long," said a representative of the Chamberettes, who purchased the lights for the city from project funds.





Mrs. Hagood was assisted by Mrs. Newton Starnes and Mrs. Emil Phrol in serving refreshments to a large number of members and


Mrs. Starnes gave the opening prayer. Marietta Montgomery was in charge of the program.

reach their peak with some late varieties ripening in late fall and winter.

When buying pears, select those that are clean, bright and the right color for the variety. The Bartlett pear becomes yellow with a red blush, d'Anjou turns greenish and Bosc turns a yellowish-brown.

Avoid damaged, soft or wrinkled fruit. Don't buy the cooking variety (Kieffer) to eat fresh--it will have a gritty

Fresh pears are low in sodium which makes them an excellent addition to a low-sodium diet. They also serve as an ingredient for fruit salads, preserves or ellied fruits, cakes and pies. Here is a recipe for including this autumn favorite in vour menu:

Pear Pie

11/2 cups sugar 1/4 to 1/3 cup flour 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg 4 tablespoons butter or margarine

2 uncooked pie crusts

Cotton Grades and Mikes Decline

White grades accounted for 48 percent of samples graded the week ended Nov. 15, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director for USDA's Cotton Divison Offices on the High Plains. This compares with 75 percent white grades a week earlier, Dickson said. Mikes 35-49 accounted for 15 percent - down from 20 percent a week earlier.

Perdominant grades for the week were grade 31 at 13 percent, grade 41 - 30 percent, grade 32 - 21 percent and grade 42 - 29 percent.

Mikes 35 - 49 accounted for 15 percent, 33 - 34 was 15 percent, 30 - 32 was 38 percent, 27 - 29 was 29 percent while 26 and lower accounted for three percent. Breaking strength averaged 87,000 pounds per square

Prices paid growers for their 35-49 mike cotton ranged from 775 to 1100 points over 1979 loan rates. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 33, mikes 35-49 around 56.35 cents per pound - up .0 points from a week earlier. Lower mikes brought 300 to .00 points over '79 loan rates, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Services.

Gins paid growers 105 to 125 dollars per ton for cottonseed.

Bullock also announced that 923 Texas cities would share \$25.8 million in rebates for the month of November.

He said 19.9 payments to date now total \$398 million, compared to allocations of \$349.8 million through November of last year.

Net payments to cities during November of last year totaled about \$19.8 million. Dallas will get a check this month for \$3.5 million, bringing this year's payments to \$46.7 million, an increase of 14 percent over

last year's rebates. Houston's check for November will be \$4.9 million, pushing its yearly total to \$81.4 million, up 11 percent. Fort Worth will get \$1

million, bringing that city's payments up to \$15.6 million for the year, a increase over 19.9. San Antonio will receive \$1.4 million this month. That

city's rebates this year have been \$21.7 million--a percent increase over 1978. The optional, one-percent city sales tax is collected with the four-percent state sales tax by merchants and

businesses and rebated on a monthly basis to the cities by the Comptroller's office. City of Wilson has net payments to date of

\$2,828.30. Tahoka's net payment this period is \$1,545.59 and payments to date \$37,263.00. O'Donnell's net payment this period is \$589.68 and net payments to date, \$8,911.60.

"Strong and vigorous opposition is expanding rapidly to the unreasonable and punitive interpretation and enforcement of the Farm Labor Contractor Registration Act (FLCRA) . by the U.S. Department of Labor's Wage-Hour agents."

This is a quote from Don Smith, Executive Vice President of the Texas Independent Ginners Association (TIGA) which has been among the leaders in seeking relief from unrealistic application of the law by the Department.

In the TIGA newsletter "The Gin Whistle" Smith goes on to say the wholesale indignation of the industry and a large number of legislators may be having some beneficial effect. 'Although no official action has been announced to change a deplorable situation," he says, "it is now understood that Wage-Hour agents in their future inspections of cotton gins will be looking for violations of the Fair Labor Standards Act rather than issuing the hotly contested notices of FLCRA violations.'

FLCRA was enacted by Congress to require registration of farm labor contractors, or crewleaders, and thus curb unscrupulous exploitation of migrant farm workers.

Primarily the law makes it illegal for anyone to recruit or transport workers for a fee unless they are registered under the Act, and establishes a penalty for any employer who uses an unregistered crewleader. And, it is the only law on the books that prohibits the hiring of undocumented aliens.

The Department of Labor came under fire for the way it was enforcing the Act following its interpretation of the law to define virtually all farm workers as "migrant" workers and almost all farmers, ginners and other agricultural employers as "farm labor contractors."

Under those interpretations both farmers and ginners on the High Plains have been either cited for FLCRA violations or threatened by attorneys for Texas Rural Legal Aid, Inc. (TRLA). In at least one instance an attorney for TRLA has called on a producer to pay penalties far in excess of what would appear to be justified by the provisions of FLCRA. TRLA accused the same producer, notes Ed Dean, Field Service Director of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, of violating the minimum wage law after the Labor Department's Wage-Hour Division already had checked his records and found no fault. Earlier this year the Department of Labor's unwarranted

actions under FLCRA were discussed with some 60 legislators and their staff at a "Congressional Awareness" breakfast sponsored in Washington by the National Council of Agricultural Employers (NCAE). Dean, a director and member of the NCAE executive committee, goes on to say that PCG and NCAE have continued to take an active part in the effort to modify the Department's actions.

TIGA attorneys and cooperative gins' attorneys also have been in constant contact with Labor Department officials and legislators in the same effort, as has the Washington staff of the National Cotton Council, the Texas Cotton Ginners Association and others


