SURELY the gopher isn't a creature peculiar to the Tahoka area, but I never had any experiences with gophers until we moved here. And it took me some time to recognize their presence out in the alley behind our house.

Not long after we moved to Tahoka, I did begin to notice some holes in the ground in the alley. I didn't really give it much thought, although I did have some vague kind of notion about moles or gophers or something (I don't know much more about things that live under the ground than I do about trees and flowers).

These holes kept multiplying until I caught myself adopting an attitude of deep reverence as I looked out the trash, since I was walking on holes.

When I finally mentioned to some friends that I had found all these holes in the alley, I quickly received a lot of information, advice and cheerful predictions.

"Those are gophers," said one. "There are lots of them around here...hard to get rid of." Another said:

"They probably are in your yard by now. They'll eat your trees, ruin your shrubs, louse up the soil, bite your dog, scare your wife..."

This gave me visions of those four expensive traps we set out and watered so often being eaten by the roots. I sure heard some stories in a neighborhood about gophers in my neighborhood and where in this area. Like the one which ate the rubber hose a neighbor left in a gopher trap next door. And how the man across the street shot a couple of them after waiting patiently for hours by the holes. And how one at the football field ate the 20-yard-line marker and a gopher trap into his hole and the superintendent lost his trap forever. And how one man ran water into a hole for five hours without getting it up.

And how gophers loused up some of Mike Orr's trees, and how they probably would move the dirt under my house and it would wind up in a hole. But especially about how hard it sometimes are to get rid of.

Tom Coulston said to get a trap, put it in the hole where the dirt is freshest and then pull the varmint alive in the trap and shoot him. He did that himself, he said, and it worked great, except that he threw his trap all to pieces.

My wife tried to buy a trap, but Whitaker's was temporarily out of them, she was so she went to Tatum Bros. and asked a man if he knew how to get rid of a gopher. He finally told her he did.

"You get a gopher trap"--she tried to tell him she had any traps in town, but he paid no attention--"and you catch the gopher and pull him out of his hole," the man said.

"Then," he continued, pointing to a bottle on a shelf, "you give him a teaspoon of this." I thought that was pretty funny, but she didn't get his name. She did get some poison from the though, and apparently it has done the trick. I haven't seen any fresh dirt for a week or so.

PROBABLY nothing we could say here would have any influence on the ultimate outcome of the situation, but we're angry enough at those thugs to make a couple of observations, anyway. For one thing, if the thugs holding the Africans hostage are really students, they sure don't seem to spend much time in class.

The good thing which has come out of all this is the situation has unified American feeling like it has since World War II.

We understand there's not a lot we can do until the hostages are freed or worse. Or maybe there we can't help thinking what a more proud nation, like Israel, would do if some of their people were seized and held hostage. We suspect they would have done considerable mopping up of the rabble by now.

Suspect In Armed Robbery Here Nabbed

A suspect in the June, 1978, armed robbery of Woods Jewelry in Tahoka was arrested last week in Pasadena, Calif., and officers from here went after the prisoner this week.

Lynn County sheriff's deputies Carlos McCleskey and Stanley Krause went to Los Angeles and picked up the prisoner, Charles Austin, returning him to the Lynn County jail Tuesday.

Austin, 26, has been a fugitive since he was linked in July 1978 to the robbery here, and was indicted in December of 1978 for robbery, along with two female suspects alleged to have been in on the robbery.

The suspect, believed to have been living in Lubbock at the time of the robbery, was arrested in California on information obtained by Lubbock Police Dept. last week.

Varsity Girls Cagers Look For Improvement

The Tahoka High School varsity girls basketball team looks back on last season with no joy, but this year's quintet is determined to improve considerably on that record, and the coach and fans already can see promise in the play of the girls.

Coach Sandy Oliver has two returning starters from last year's team, two other letterpersons back, and four more girls on the varsity squad expected to give a lot of help.

Miss Oliver, who played guard at Rule High School and forward at Abilene Christian University, was in her first year of coaching last season, and this year intends to see that the girls do better than the 1-22 record turned in. It doesn't help that Tahoka is in the same district with Slaton,

which has won the state Class AA girls championship the last two years. But the coach and players are working hard to be more competitive, and are anxious for fan support.

The returning starters are 5-5 junior Lani Brown, who plays guard and forward, and Amy Porterfield, 5-7 junior post. Two other returning lettermen are 5-4 junior Cathy Meeks and 5-9 Starrlyn Knox, a senior.

Brown, Porterfield and Meeks are starters, along with senior Charlene Bryson and sophomore Lynia Payne. Senior Lisa Perkins and sophomore Andra Draper also are on the squad.

Miss Oliver coaches the 8th, 9th, junior varsity and varsity girls teams and Paul Pierce coaches the 7th grade.

Payne scored 13 in the second game loss by 55-41 to New Home, and had 10 against Morton in the opener. Lani Brown scored 11 in the 60-43 loss to Morton.

Tahoka's freshman girls beat Morton 57-20 as Pam Ashcraft scored 25 points and Julie Roseberry 23.

The varsity girls will play

against Christ the King girls in the first round of the New Home tournament at 10 a.m. today (Thursday).

Another returning letterman is senior Todd Brown. Other seniors on the squad this season are Doug Barham, Ricky Chapa, Lyndell Martin, Ralph Huffaker and Lance Bevers--plus Brad Hammonds if his knee gets in shape, Williamson said. Only other junior on the squad is Jacky Jolly.

Fast Break "We have some speed, so we'll fast break this year," the coach said. "We'll press full court on defense and run a 2-3 zone-type defense after we set up...With four

starters back, we could have a good year, and it really will help the kids a lot if we get good support from the community."

T.A. Bell coaches the 7th and 8th grade teams, Greg Manship the junior varsity and C.D. Bradshaw the freshmen.

The varsity opened the season with a 67-40 win over New Home last week as Scott scored 20, Tracy White 17 and Bryson 11 points. The Bulldogs will play Christ the King at 11:30 a.m. today in the first round of a tournament at New Home, following the Tahoka girls' game against CTK at 10 a.m.

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Sherry Etheredge Says . . .

Clay cookware revives in popularity on the homefront. With the renewed interest in clay cookware, more people are interested in its advantages and disadvantages.

ADVANTAGES
Enthusiasts claim that the self-basting action allows use of less-tender cuts of meat with excellent results. The heat of cooking releases steam from the damp clay and the cover holds in the steam as well as the food juices.

In addition, little or no oil or gravy is needed—a plus for weight watchers.

DISADVANTAGES
One disadvantage is the pots may stain.

Most manufacturers recommend against the use of soap to clean since soap may clog the pores of the clay. A soapy taste may linger in the cookware.

Also, sudden temperature changes may cause cracks. Cold pots put into hot ovens or hot pots placed in a refrigerator could cause problems.

Homemakers who use

Mexican or imported pottery for similar cooking should consider that such cookware is somewhat different. The glazes often used will affect the water retention and absorbency—and thus the steam effect during cooking. Also, test the glaze to determine the absence or

presence of lead. A home test is to fill the cookware half full of water and allow it to overnight.

If there is any difference in the glaze below the line, use the dish only for non-acid foods only.

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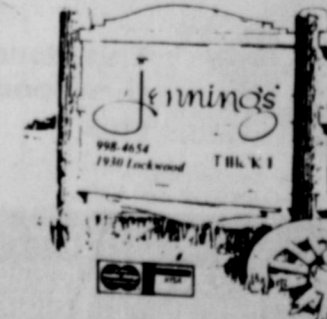


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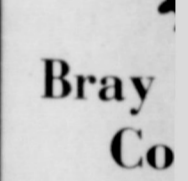

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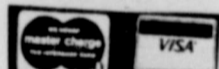

Support Urged For Recovery Act: National Cotton

Council President Hoke Leggett has urged adoption of a measure that would provide 10-5- and 3-year depreciation by businesses of investments in buildings, machinery, and transportation equipment, respectively. He said that without a tax write-off as proposed in the Capital Cost Recovery Act it would be virtually impossible for the cotton industry to obtain the huge amount of capital required in an effort to meet the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's cotton dust standard. He added that the act "may make it possible to reduce dust levels in the expensive fashion dictated by OSHA, greatly increase our productivity, and continue processing of cotton in this country."

IIC Membership Grows: Three countries—Argentina, Egypt, and Sudan—have announced they will join the International Institute for Cotton. The additions bring IIC's total membership to 14 countries. IIC works to increase use of cotton on a worldwide basis.

Cotton Meetings Set: The futures market and cotton dust will be explored during two special meetings at the Beltwide Cotton Conferences sponsored by the National Cotton Council and other groups in January in St. Louis. A special panel of cotton producers, economists and commercial firms will discuss how to make the futures market work for farmers on January 7. The dust seminar on January 8-9 will include a discussion of

biological and engineering research to reduce the amount of plant trash in cotton. Speakers will include both European and U.S. experts.

And Cotton Yesterday: In 1919, the town of Enterprise, Ala., erected a monument in honor of the boll weevil.

Cotton Grades And Mikes Decline

White grades accounted for 25 percent of the samples graded the week ended Nov. 22, down from 48 percent a week earlier, according to Paul R. Dickson, Area Director for USDA's Cotton Division Offices on the High Plains.

Light Spotted grades amounted to 73 percent, up from 52 percent a week earlier.

Micronaire range 35-49 made up nine percent for the week, down 15 percent last week, Dickson said.

Predominant grades for the week were grade 31 at nine percent, grade 41 - 14 percent, grade 32 - 32 percent and grade 42 - 37 percent.

Predominant staples were staple 31 at 32 percent, 32 - 44 percent and 33 was 11 percent.

Mikes 35 - 49 accounted for nine percent, 33 - 34 was 12 percent, 30 - 32 was 39 percent, 27 - 29 was 36 percent while 26 and lower accounted for four percent.

Breaking strength averaged 86,000 pounds per square inch.

Prices paid growers for 35 - 49 mike cotton ranged from 800 to 1175 points over 1979 loan rates. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and better, staples 30 - 33 mikes 35 - 49 around 56.60 cents per pound - up 25 points from a week earlier. Lower mikes brought 250 to 750 points over '79 loan rates, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Gins paid farmers 105 to 130 dollars per ton for cottonseed.

A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

Applying fertilizer this fall in preparation for next spring's crops could be an attractive option this year.

To avoid possible problems in getting fertilizer applied next spring, you may want to evaluate the merits of fall fertilization.

Reports indicate current inventories of most fertilizer materials have declined and could remain below normal during the winter months.

Distribution of these decreased supplies places a burden on an already strained transportation system. And waiting until near planting time for needed fertilizer materials could upset your production schedule.

Results of numerous research and demonstration studies show little difference in yield from fall versus spring fertilization. Except for applying nitrogen, fall fertilization practices would be similar to spring applications.

When applying fall nitrogen

for spring crops, use an ammonium source after the average daily soil temperature is below 50 degrees F. Most of it will remain in this form during the winter months. Clay particles hold the ammonium ion to prevent leaching, and it is not subject to denitrification as is the nitrate ion.

Store spray equipment properly for the winter, and it will be ready to use next spring.

First, wash the sprayer thoroughly. Then apply a light-weight oil, such as a summer oil used in spraying ornamentals. The oily film will prevent rust and corrosion that might otherwise occur.

With hose-on sprayers, thoroughly wash all parts, including any screens or strainers.

Since sprayers are costly, a little time spent now for care and maintenance will assure that they will be ready for the next growing season.

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Remember: Compare the "estimated MPG" to the "estimated MPG" of other cars. The response to roll call was "any garden dream for the coming year?" Mrs. G.H. Hines took first place floral arrangement with her arrangement of "Mum's the Word".

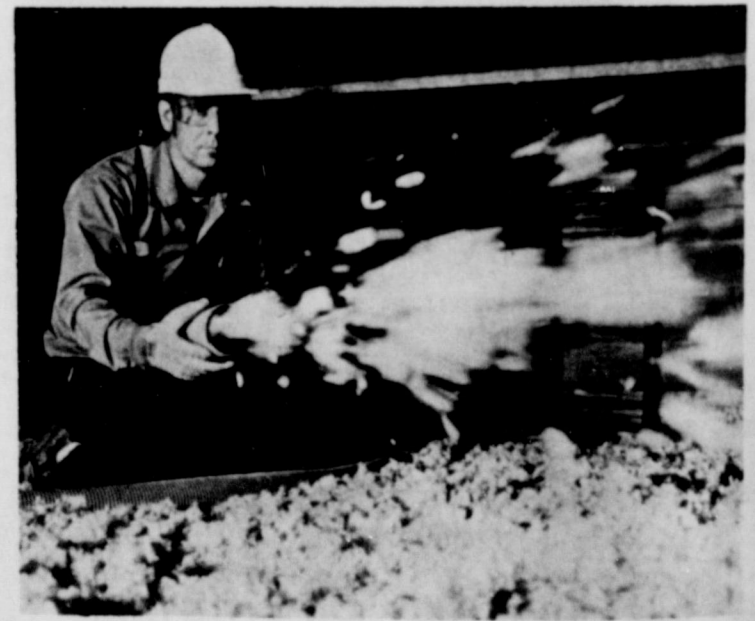
