

Dogs Zap Slaton, Aim At Denver City Tonight

The Tahoka Bulldogs hung onto a chance to win the district boys basketball title by beating Slaton 62-46 here Tuesday night, setting up a crucial makeup game at Denver City tonight (Thursday) to see who will get to play Frenship to see who will get to play Seminole for the district championship.

That's about as confusing as the district football race was last fall, but at least the four teams still in the running won't have to draw numbers against Slaton, since the Tigers are out of the picture. Here's the way that game's winner will play Seminole for the first half title, and is out of the second half race with two losses, but

will wait around to see which team wins the second half before the winners of the two halves play for the district 5-AA title.

Game Canceled
Frenship owns a 6-1 record in the second half of play. Tahoka and Denver City are 5-1 and had to cancel a game earlier because of icy roads. Now that game has a definite bearing on the outcome of the district race, so it will be made up tonight at Denver City, with the winner to play Frenship next week, probably at a neutral site, and that game's winner will play Seminole for the title. Bi-district is week after next. So the Bulldogs have a chance—all they have to do is

win every game they play. Still, it definitely can be done, and Coach Mike Williamson said this week he hopes a good crowd of Bulldog fans will make the trip to Denver City tonight to give the boys some vitally-needed support in the hostile environment. "We need all the help from the fans we can get," he said.

Girls Play, Too
Tahoka fans also will have a chance at Denver City to give a boost to the junior varsity boys, who play at 5 p.m., and to the varsity girls team, which will be trying to close out the season with a win. Though vastly improved this season, the girls have just two victories, and have lost

several games after leading in the fourth period. The varsity girls play at 6:30, and the boys showdown with DC starts at 8 p.m.

The Bulldogs blasted the Slaton Tigers here Tuesday night. Tahoka led 16-6 after the first quarter and remained ahead for the entire game. Senior Kenny Scott led the scoring with 24 points, followed by Charles Bryson with 12, Brad White 10, Jacky Jolly 8, Clifford Oages 4 and Ricky Chapa 4. Bryson had 14 rebounds and 3 steals.

The varsity girls had a rough time in the Slaton game, trailing at the end of the first quarter 21-4. The final score was 87-31. Lynia

Payne was high scorer with 12; Cathy Meeks had 6, Amy Porterfield and Andra Draper 3 each, Lani Brown, Starr Knox and Charlene Bryson 2 each and Lisa Perkins 1. Payne and Bryson led the rebounds. Meeks and Porterfield led in steals. It was a low fouling game with 15 being whistled against each side. Slaton remains unbeaten in district play.

On Feb. 8 the Tahoka boys varsity team defeated Frenship 44-40 to stay in the running for second half district leaders. The Bulldogs have only one loss in this half of district play. It was a close game that kept the spectators in an uproar. Tahoka took the tip-off but

was behind 6-10 after 1st quarter of play and trailed 19-21 at intermission. The end of the 3rd quarter Tahoka was leading 30-29. Tahoka made 8 points in the 4th period to Frenships 9, making the score 38-38 at the end of the quarter.

The Bulldogs entered the 3 minute overtime determined to win and scored 6 points to the opponents' 2, winning the game 44-40. Kenny Scott was high pointer with 17. Charles Bryson scored 11, Brad White 8, Clifford Oages 4, Jacky Jolly 2 and Richard Payne 2. White led in rebounds. Tahoka had 17 fouls to Frenships' 16.

Tahoka varsity girls lost to

Frenship, 35-45. Tahoka outscored Frenship on field goals, but made only 6 on their free shots. Frenship hit 90% of their free shots which were plentiful as Tahoka was whistled for 26 fouls to Frenships' 16. The closest Tahoka could get to Frenship was a 5 point gap in the 4th quarter. Meeks, Brown and Bryson all fouled out in the 4th quarter. Lani Brown led the scoring with 11 points, followed by Cathy Meeks and Amy Porterfield with 8 points each.

Starr Knox had 4 points and Charlene Bryson and Lisa Perkins 2 each. Knox led in rebounds and Brown and Porterfield led in steals.

Over-65 Tax Break Voted By County

Lynn County Commissioners Monday voted to allow a \$3,000 tax exemption for persons 65 and over in the county, starting with the 1980 taxes, and also voted a \$1,000 exemption to totally disabled veterans.

Persons who qualify should make application for the exemption at the county tax assessor's office before April 1, it was noted. Commissioners specified, however, that anyone who qualified in both categories could

not get a total of \$6,000 in exemptions; only one \$3,000 exemption will be allowed.

County Judge Melvin Burks presented a bleak financial report to the commissioners, noting that part of the 1980 budget under which the county now is operating was spent in the last three months of 1979. "We're going to have to learn to say no to more requests for funds," he observed.

Commissioners discussed at length with Gerald Moore,

Lynn County Hospital administrator, the need for a new ambulance and the fact that operating an ambulance

service is a losing proposition for the hospital and county. No action was taken on the need to replace the 1972 model ambulance.

Bill Hartsfield, a represent-

ative of Blue Cross, and Jim Solomon of Clint Walker Agency presented proposed plans of group insurance for county employees. No action was taken on either plan.

County Demo Slate Ready For Primary

With the deadline passed for filing, 12 persons have filed for county offices on the Democratic ticket, subject to the vote in the primary May 3, according to Thalia Burks, Democratic County Chairperson.

For sheriff's office there will be a two-way race between Robbie Roberson and Stanley Krause. Sheriff Norvell Redwine did not file for re-election.

George McCracken is unopposed for re-election as tax collector, and Jimmy Wright is unopposed in seeking the office of county attorney, now held by Gerald Huffaker. Mrs. Burks also is unopposed in seeking the county Democratic chairman spot.

Incumbent commissioner of Precinct 3, Bart Anderson, is seeking re-election, and is opposed by David Massey.

Five persons are running for the Democratic nomination in Precinct 1. They are Melvin Edwards, George Wright, Eldon Gattis, J.L. Hyde and Lawrence Harvick. No Republican candidates filed for any of the offices.

Pickup Rams Fence, Garage, Storehouse

A spectacular crash of a pickup into a home here headed three accidents investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week.

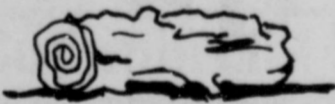

More information on slow cookers:
 Favorite family recipes can be adapted for the slow cooker, but the major change will be in cooking time. It takes about six to eight times longer in the slow cooker. Also, since liquids in a slow cooker do not boil away, reduce stew liquid by half. Meat should be browned and drained before adding to the slow cooker because it does not brown as usual. Also, it is surprising that vegetables cook slower than meat--so cut them into small pieces and place in the

bottom in liquid. Spices should be added during the final hour of cooking because their flavor power may increase. Concerning safety of slow cookers, The agent said that according to the Food and Drug Administration, food cooked in slow cookers is safe to eat as long as it reaches an internal temperature of 140 degrees F. for one and a half to two hours, or 150 degrees F. for only 12 minutes. But researchers have found that not every brand of slow cooker will reach the recommended internal temperature of 140 degrees F. Consumers should compare brands with this in mind before buying one.

Homemakers can check the temperature of food cooked in a slow cooker. The best way would be with a meat thermometer when cooking a roast. This will indicate if the roast reaches the recommended internal temperature of 140 degrees F.

Some consumers have expressed concern about the nutritive value of foods cooked in the slow cooker. Most cooking affects the nutritive value of food to some extent. But so far there has been little or no research to prove how slow cookers affect it.

Nutritionist do question the nutritive value of foods with heat-sensitive vitamins--that's vitamin C and B-vitamins--because heat destroys these vitamins. Increasing the size of meat and vegetable pieces for slow cooking does help them retain nutrients.

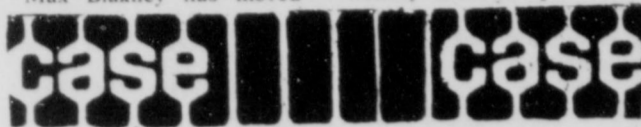

Last summer's foreign trade missions sponsored by USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service, and producer sponsored groups apparently paid dividends. Over eight million bales have been sold for delivery this marketing year ending next July 31.

High Plains Cotton Division Offices graded 57,000 samples during the week ended February 7. This brought the season's total to 2,361,000, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. About 1,830,000 had been graded by this date one year ago.

Predominant grades for the week were grade 32 at 19 percent and grade 42 at 45 percent.

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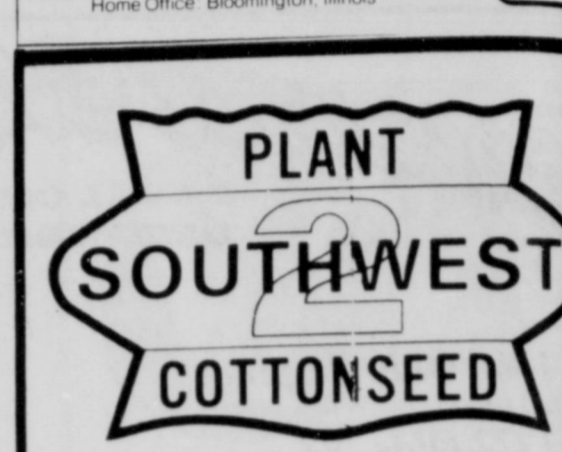

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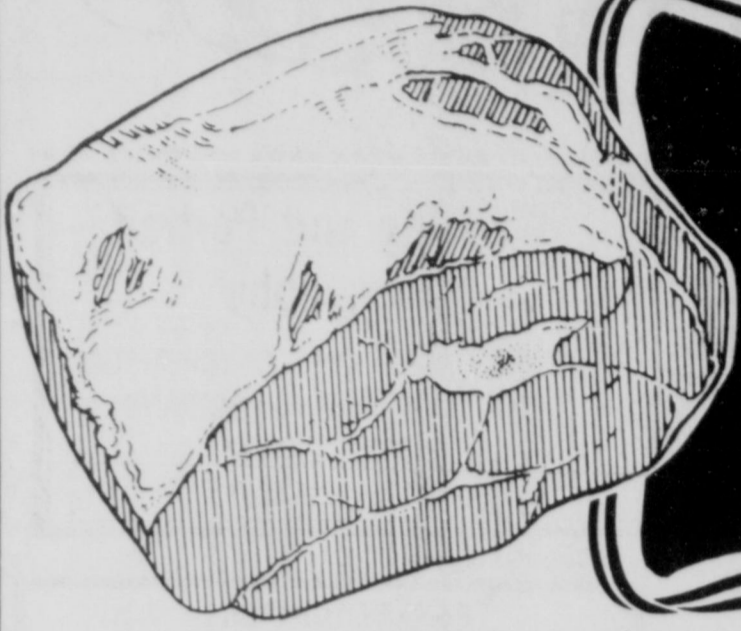
