Pay Increases Voted For Teachers Here

Resignations from Band Director Don Wise and assistant football Coach C.D. Bradshaw were accepted by Tahoka School Board last Thursday as trustees extended contracts of all others in the system and voted to pay additional \$200 per year above state schedule to all teaching personnel. All teachers in the system now draw \$400 over schedule, which means that

starting this fall they will be paid \$600 above. Coaching bonuses vary, but they also will receive the \$200 increase.

A school calendar was adopted, with school to start Aug. 22 (teachers on Aug. 19).

Trustees approved transportation bus routes for next year and voted to join with the county in appraisals of personal property for tax purposes. Also approved were a contract with Thomas, Love, Hays and Schaffner to prepare the 1980-81 tax roll, and a routine addition to the policy manual giving definitions of student conduct and discipline.

Supt. Jim Coulston told the board that a representative of the Texas Dept. of Health recently conducted an inspection at the schools here, and then sent a letter to the school commending the staff and maintenance director Mauricio Marez for the excellent condition of facilities here in meeting all health agency requirements. Also approved were a report from the textbook committee and a proposal to pay expenses of Vocational Office Education students and sponsor to a state convention in Dallas.

Marlin Hawthorne presided in the absence of board president Bob Haney. Other board members present were Mrs. Bettye Green, Joe Brooks, Tommy Lawson and Jay Dee House.

One home burglary in the county, a traffic accident and a theft in the city were investigated by officers during the last week. On Friday a 1980 station wagon driven by Beverly Durham Wright of Tahoka struck a parked 1978 Ford owned by Nickalos Saldana Jr., 1010 Ave K. The mishap occurred at 1428 N. 7th. Police issued one ticket for parking in roadway and one for careless driving. A 1976 Pacer was discovered 5 1/2 miles south of Tahoka on U.S. 87 and the sheriff's office learned it had been stolen in Lubbock.

ENJOY PARIS IN JUNE

European Trip Price Includes Many Extras

Traveling is more fun when you're with folks you know, and the group planning to make a "trip of a lifetime" visit to Europe in June will be made up mostly of people from Tahoka and the surrounding area, so they'll at least have common backgrounds.

The Lynn County news is sponsoring a 15-day trip to five European countries in June, and the price of \$2113 per person includes airfare from Lubbock to Dallas, then a non-stop Braniff 747 flight from Dallas to Paris, France. After that the group will have

their own bus and own tour guide familiar with Europe's languages, customs and history, and with plenty of sightseeing included, the trip will be educational as well as fun.

Persons interested in more details are invited to contact tour host Dalton Wood, publisher of the Lynn County News, who will be leading the trip along with his wife, Lenda. The Woods have been tour hosts for two other trips to Europe.

A deposit of \$150 assures a place on the tour. Some will want to make their deposits

on Friday, March 28, when the Woods will host a trip party in their home at 2106 N. 8th St. in Tahoka. Everyone is invited to that party at 7:30 p.m., where there will be refreshments, the trip will be explained with a map, and questions will be answered. There's no obligation to sign up at that time, however, and anyone may attend.

Also at that meeting, pictures will be made free for anyone needing a passport photo. "If a person is even halfway considering going overseas in June he or she should go ahead and get a birth certificate located, and make application for a passport," Wood said. No shots are needed.

Passports, good for five years, may be applied for in Lubbock at \$14 each. Passport application forms are available at the News, and will be available at the party March 28.

Also included in the basic price of the tour is all luggage handling, two meals per day on most days, good accommodations in first class hotels with private bath, a tour of the Chillon Castle in Montreux, Switzerland; a sky ride to the top of Mt. Pilatus near Lucerne; a gondola ride in historic Venice, Italy; an evening of entertainment and cheese fondue at a night spot in Lucerne, where the program usually includes authentic yodeling, singing and playing of the remarkable Alpine horn; sightseeing trips to such places as the Notre Dame cathedral, Eiffel Tower, Arc de Triomphe, and Louvre in Paris; sightseeing and wine tasting in beautiful Vienna; the Glockenspiel and other attractions in Munich, and time for shopping in the major cities.

Wood noted that the dollar has gained considerably against Swiss and French francs in the last week, and hopefully that situation will hold true in June.

It should be an exciting trip which will be remembered always for those who go.

Appraisal Contracts Approved

Tahoka I.S.D., O'Donnell I.S.D. and Lynn County have contracted through the Jim McMorris Agency of Hereford with two men to appraise farm personal property in Lynn County.

The 1979 act of the 66th Legislature, Chapter 841 section 11.01 provides that all real and tangible personal property that the State of Texas has jurisdiction over is taxable if located in the state longer than a temporary period.

Under this law all farm personal property is taxable and in order to comply with new tax laws and to be fair and ensure equality for real estate owners all taxing entities must be sure that farm personal property is on the tax roll. The McMorris Agency will assess commercial property.

The Law does not provide for taxing of household personal property or intangible property except in certain circumstances.

Don Wages and Jake Moore are in the County working with farmers this week and will be here until farm personal property appraisal is completed.

ACCORDING TO THE BIBLE



BIBLE Answers for BIBLE Questions:
By DOUG CARTER

Question: How are we saved?

Answer: In a nut shell it is by the Grace of God, through our obedience to His Word.

I know that most of the world believes that you are saved by "faith" alone, but this is not according to the Bible. The problem we humans have is that we let our feelings and emotions, and opinions stand in between ourselves and the word of God. In many instances we let our opinions stand as "gospel" instead of His gospel shaping our opinions. First, we have to establish within ourselves that we will abide by God's word ONLY, and understand that only by our trust and obedience in His divine revelation can we have salvation (read II Tim. 3:16,17; II Peter 1:3,4; Jude 3). We must understand that during the judgement we are going to be judged by the Word (Jn. 12:48). Too often we "explain away" the word of God so we can "fit it" to the style of living we like best.

We can find many instances in the Bible where men believed (or had faith) in Jesus as God's son. But without their Obedience to His word - to activate their faith - they did not receive God's Grace for their salvation. The rich young ruler believed Jesus was God's Son, but he failed to obey the command that Jesus gave (Matt. 19).

Look at John 12:42, "Nevertheless even of the rulers many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess it lest they should be put out of the synagogue." These had faith, but they refused to obey Christ. Remember what James said, "The Demons also believe and shudder. But wilt thou know O vain man, that faith apart from works is barren?" (Jas. 2:14-20). Paul did not contradict James when he wrote, "for by grace have ye been saved, through faith; and that not of yourselves it is the gift of God, not of works that no man should glory (Eph. 2:8,9). Paul was warning the Jews about trying to justify themselves and "earn" their salvation by their works of the Law. James is not speaking about the works of the law - but of faith. James clearly says that we are justified by works of faith. For example, Hebrews 11:8 tells us that it was by faith that Abraham obeyed when he was called of God. We obey God because of our faith. It is a faith that has been "activated" - and we have the desire to do what God tells us in His Word. While we are doing these things, we must understand that we are not justified by works, but we have salvation only by the Grace of God. It is by faith that we do God's will and when we obey God, this allows His grace to fill our lives. But there is more and we will discuss it next week.

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A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

In selecting plants for easy maintenance indoors, select only those that can endure the kind of light they will receive in your home.

Most indoor foliage plants have similar requirements. They want ample natural light from a north or east window location plus a light,

well-drained soil. Foliage plants with brightly colored or variegated red, purple, cream and yellow leaves (like croton) generally require more light than those with green foliage (like the rubber plant). Artificial light may supplement daylight or be the sole source of light.

The following plants that are fairly easy to grow in the home plus their light requirements:

Rubber plant, widely known and used as a

houseplant; needs good light, but can exist in a poorly lighted situation for short periods.

Fiddle leaf fig, most sweet-tempered of all houseplants; love it, hate it, ignore it, still it thrives; needs good light.

Dracaena, many varieties and types do well indoors; prefers indirect light of high intensity.

Dieffenbachia dumb-cane, requires moderate light without direct sunlight.

Chinese evergreen, does best in moderate to good light; easy to grow.

Ferns, well adapted for growth at low light intensities; strong lighting can cause damage.

Screw pine, needs indirect light of high intensity, but keep it out of direct sunlight.

Philodendron, will survive where lighting is dim, but does better in higher light intensities.

Sansevieria (Snake plant), is tough; can be grown in adverse areas in the home where lighting is poor and humidity low; requires little water and cannot stand overwatering.

Pothos, commonly called "house ivy"; likes indirect light of high intensity, responds to artificial light.

Nepthytis, thrives on indirect light of either high or low intensity.

Jade plant, nearly indestructible; tolerates poor growing conditions, but does like plenty of light.

Peperomia, many interesting varieties; medium light; do not overwater; usually easy to grow; decorative.

Color the Landscape With Annuals:

April is annual time, the time to set out bedding plants of your favorite flowers, reminds Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Annuals do best in sunny, well-drained soils, although some will also brighten shaded pockets in the garden or landscape.

The wise gardener will use large areas of the same color of the same type of plant for unity and

Drastic changes in land and water usage as proposed by U.S. Dept. of Agriculture under a new act of Congress were discussed by Eual Davis of the local Soil Conservation office at Rotary last Thursday.

Briefly, under this new Resource Conservation Program, compliance with its provisions by farm operators in mandatory for participation in other government farm program such as price supports.

Objectives of the proposed changes would be to reduce erosion and preserving prime farmlands, improve water quality, conserving water, improving fish and wildlife, including the preservation of wet farmlands from destruction by agriculture and other

a dominance of color.

Ageratum, begonia, alyssum, vinca, balsam, impatiens, caladium, and geranium plants all grow well in filtered light or light shade.

The three most popular annuals are petunias, marigolds and zinnias.

However, the begonia is also growing in popularity. This hardy annual prefers light shade.

At the time of transplanting extra care should be taken to prevent injury to the plant roots. Growing plants may be easily transferred to your garden bed by slicing downward in the soil between plants that come in bands, trays or flats.

Mulching around annuals helps keep down weeds and conserves moisture.

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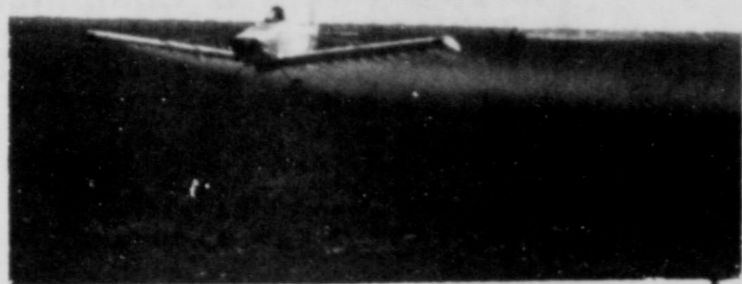
