



City Manager Carl Reynolds explained that when such items are wedged into the dumster, they don't fall out when they are turned upside down. "Then someone calls us and complains that the dumpster hasn't been emptied," he said.

If the items are cut up into small portions and put into trash bags before being placed in the dumpsters. there's no problem, he said.

Other alternatives are to stack such items near the dumpsters (without blocking the truck access to the container) until such time as the city makes a trash collection run just for that purpose, or the citizen may carry them to the dump

ACCORDING TO THE BIBLE



BIBLE Answers for BIBLE Questions By DOUG CARTER

Question: How are we saved?

Answer: In a nut shell it is by the Grace of God, through our obedience to His Word.

I know that most of the world believes that you are saved by "faith" alone, but this is not according to the Bible. The problem we humans have is that we let our feelings and emotions, and opinions stand in between ourselves and the word of God. In many instances we let our opinions stand as "gospel" instead of His gospel shaping our opinions. First, we have to establish within ourselves that we will abide by God's word ONLY, and understand that only by our trust and obedience in His divine revelation can we have salvation (read II Tim. 3:16,17; II Peter 1:3,4; Jude 3). We must understand that during the judgement we are going to be judged by the Word (Jn. 12:48). Too often we "explain away" the word of God so we can "fit it" to the style of living we like best.

We can find many instances in the Bible where men believed (or had faith) in Jesus as God's son. But without their Obedience to His word - to activate their faith - they did not receive God's Grace for their salvation. The rich young ruler believed Jesus was God's Son, but he failed to obey the command that Jesus gave (Matt. 19).

Look at John 12:42, "Nevertheless even of the rulers many believed on him; but because of the Pharisees they did not confess it lest they should be put out of the synagougue." These had faith, but they refused to obey Christ. Remember what James said. "The Demons also believe and shudder. But wilt thou know O vain man, that faith apart from works is barren?" (Jas. 2:14-20). Paul did not contridict James when he wrote,

for by grace have ye been saved, through faith; and hat not of yourselves it is the gift of God, not of works that no man should glory (Eph. 2:8,9). Paul was warning the Jews about trying to justify themselves and "earn" their salvation by their works of the Law. James is not speaking about the works of the law - but of faith. James clearly says that we are Justified by works of faith. For example, Hebrews 11:8 tells us that it was by faith that Abraham obeyed when he was called of God. We obey God because of our faith. It is a faith that has been "activated" - and we have the desire to do what God tells us in His Word. While we are doing these things, we must understand that we are not justified by works, but we have salvation only by the Grace of God. It is by faith that we do God's will and when we obey God, this allows His grace to fill our lives. But there is more and we will discuss it next week.
