#### SPS, Cities Compromise On Rate Hike

Bert Ballengee, executive vice president of Southwestern Public Service Company, announced last week that Southwestern Public Service Company and the Steering Committee representing South Plains and Panhandle cities have reached an agreement on the Committee's recommendation of its member cities concerning SPS's 1980 rate case. The Steering Committee recommended the following: municipalities in the SPS Texas service area set the revenue deficiency at \$31,923,000; rates to correct this deficency should become effective with the May billing cycle; there will not be any differential in the summerwinter rates and the Public Utility Commission should eliminate the requirement to show the fuel cost adjustment as a separate item on

Ballengee said that SPS accepted this proposal for three reasons. "We have settled because of SPS's need for immediate relief in order to maintain its current construction program and the quality of service our customers require.

"Our original request was projected for two years; however, present economic uncertainties on the national scene make it very difficult to project exactly what will happen in the future. By accepting less, we may have to ask for additional rate relief sooner than previously anticipated. By implementing the rates in May, we will hopefully be able to save our financial bond ratings which are vital to our customers' long range benefit," Ballengee concluded.



South Plains residents should be on the lookout for itinerant home improvement contractors that may offer great prices for doing people's roofs, paneling, drive ways, etc. Your Bureau has already received calls indicating that the itinerant nome improvement companies are starting up their annual operations

These unethical peddlers prey especially on the elderly and the low income person. Their work is usually poor and when something goes wrong after the job, the contractors have fled the South Plains.

Consumers are advised that if they are considering having home improvements done to their property that they deal with local contractors that can be found if something goes wrong. Also, get estimates and check out contractors with references from the company and finally, check the reliability of the company through your Better Business Bureau.

Some favorite sales tactics of these itinerant groups are for example

Offering to do a job below cost if the home can be used as a show home for advertising pruposes.

The old pitch that the contractor had just completed another job and will do a project for the consumer at cost rather than having to carry the excess materials from the first job back to his warehouse in whatever city. Coming to your home uninvited

While eggs are sold by the

dozen, you can buy them by the pound, if you realize that a dozen Large eggs weigh 1-11/2 pounds; Medium eggs, 1-1/3 pounds and Small sizes, 11/8 punds, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). By comparing these weights against price per dozen, Large eggs at 60 cents a dozen would cost only 40 cents a pound, say economists with USDA's Food Safety and Quality Service. That's very reasonable for a pound of high

protein food. Generally speaking, if there is less than a seven cent price spread per dozen eggs between one size and the next smaller size in the same grade, you will get more for your money by buying the larger size.

Egg size has nothing to do with quality. Shell color does not affect quality, nutritive value, flavor or cooking performance but is determined by the breed of hen.

Quality refers to interior condition and appearance of the shell, say FSQS egg graders. In U.S. Grade AA (or Fresh Fancy) eggs, the yolk covers a small area; the white is thick and stands ghigh; the yolk is firm and high. Variations in temperature while the eggs are stored cause egg whites to become thin.

In U.S. Grade A eggs, the volk covers a moderate area; the white is reasonably thick and stands fairly high; they yolk is firm and high. U.S. Grade B eggs are good for general cooking and baking; the white spreads out more in these eggs.

When you boil them for Easter decorating, cook at low to moderate temperatures so eggs will not be "tough

One should always cook eggs correctly. If you cook shelled eggs in an aluminum pan, the color of the eggs will darken; this is not harmful however. Glass, porcelain, enamel, stainless stell or any cookware with a non-stick finish are all suitable for reparing eggs. If eggs are boiled or cooked too long, the yokes become hard and turn a greenish-gray color.

It is best to buy eggs for hard-cooking several days ahead, since storage allous the air space at the large end of the egg to expand and makes peeling easier. One can puncture the egg with a pin at the center of the large end, penetrating only the shell; this will let air escape and will help prevent shell from cracking during cook-

Immediately remove saucepan from heat and cover tightly. Let eggs stand in hot water, covered 15 min. for hard-cooked eggs, one minute for meduim soft-cooked eggs. After time limit, pour off hot water and run cold water over eggs to stop them from cooking and also make peeling easier.





BIBLE Answers for BIBLE Questions: By DOUG CARTER

Ouestion: How are we saved?

Answer: (Part 2) As we stated last week, we are saved the Grace of God through obedience to His Word. Prompted by His love and mercy God sent Jesus Christ into the world to die for the sins of mankind (Isa. 53; Rom. 5:8). His grace is offered to every person, but we must accept it. Our acceptance begins by having Faith in God and His Son, Christ Jesus (Rom. 10:17; Heb. 11:6). When we have Faith, of believing and trusting Christ, we will be moved to do the things commanded by God. It was by faith that the walls of Jericho fell down - after the Israelites had marched around them for days, as commanded by God (Heb. 11:30). This is the type of faith you must have to have salvation. The faith that is obedient. But what does God tell us to do?

Don't you think it is not worthy that the Ethiopian eunuch did not argue with Philip? He saw the water and wanted to be baptized (Acts 8:36). Philip told him that he could only if he had complete trust in Jesus as the Messiah and that he brought salvation. And then the eunuch confessed the Lord and was baptized for the remission

Please do not let some pre-conceived idea stop you from obeying God as the Bible says we must do. I would count it a previlege if you would allow me to study God's Word with you



Your household, and all others in the area, will receive something in the mail this Friday -- a questionnaire from the U.S. Bureau of the Census for the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. District Manager of the census here, urges that you envelope with blue lettering. The census questionnaire for your household will be delivered by address, not on the basis of name. Below the address will be a telephone number to call if help is needed in answering any questions. With the questionnaire will be a yellow instruction guide that gives examples on how to fill it out, and a brown, pre-addressed.

mailing it back. The 1980 census symbol -- a pencil inscribed "April 1" filling in the zero of "Census -- appears on the envelope with this message: "This envelope contains your official census form. Please fill it out and mail it back on Tuesday, April 1.

The manager asks that you pay particular attention to this message, because April 1 is Census Day, the day of the official count of the U.S. population. That is why it is essential that every questionnaire list all persons in the household on that day, and does not list anyone who moved away or died a day or so before, but does include anyone who just moved in, or a baby born on that day. The mother and baby are to be listed even if they are in the






#### Conference Set In April

African Swine Fever Alert African swine fever (ASF) is once again threatening the United States.

The alert comes in the wake of a reported outbreak of this contagious, often fatal viral disease of swine in Cuba's Guantanamo Province. ASF

affects only swine; it does not affect people

With ASF only 90 miles from the Florida keys, every American swine producer should be concerned and should keep a close check on USDA inspection activities

U.S. swine producers who remember hog cholera -- a disease eradicated here in 1978--will note that ASF and to state or federal animal

Deadline

at ports of entry have been stepped up since 1978 as a result of ASF outbreaks in Brazil, the Cominican Republic and Haiti. Imports of live hogs, fresh pork and uncooked pork products from ASF-affected countries are prohibited. An earlier Cuban outbreak

ASF in 1971 was eradicated by the drastic but effective measure of destroy ing all swine affected and adjacent areas. According to recent reports, the same depopulation procedure combined with stiff quarantine actions is being followed

Although ASF affects no animals other than swine, it can be transmitted via food aste when uncooked pork scraps from infected animals are fed to swine

Some of the signs of ASF are abortions, high fever, reduced appetite for food and water, tendency to lie down, depression, labored breathing, coughing and discolorations--blotchy or diffused redness--on ears, snout and abdomen of white or light-colored hogs.




