County Voters To Elect Sheriff, Commissioners

With a lot of interest in county races for sheriff and two commission spots, Lynn County voters will go to the polls Saturday in the Democratic primary which also will include several contested statewide races. There are 11 voting boxes in the county for the Democratic primary.

Republicans also will have a

Saturday, at the city hall in Tahoka, but there are no local candidates on the ballot, so the Democratic nomination winners will automatically be elected in the general voting in November.

nomination for county commissioner of Precinct 1 is likely, with five candidates seeking the spot now held by Ed Stone, who is not a candidate. Condidates for the job are George Wright, Eldon Gattis, J.L. Hyde, Melvin Edwards and Lawrence Harvick.

There also is a contest for

the Democratic nomination for commissioner of Precinct 3. where incumbent Bart Anderson is opposed by

David Massey. Further confusing the issue on the county commission races is a recent federal court ruling giving new boundaries to Lynn County precincts, but everyone will vote at the same box they have in the past

Other contested races on the Democratic ballot include the race for railroad commissioner between John Poerner and Buddy Temple; and another railroad commission contest between Jim Hightower and James E. Nugent, and races for court posts. There is a non-binding presidential preference referendum on the Democratic ballot, where voters may mark Jimmy Carter, Edward Kennedy, Jerry Brown or "uncommitted." Each of the 11 Democratic voting precincts in the county will have a precinct convention at 2 p.m. Saturday, and the county Democratic con-

vention will be at 10 a.m. May 10 in the courthouse. Republicans also will vote for Ronald Reagan, George Bush or "uncommitted" and will have a contest on one of the nominations for railroad commissioner, where candidates are Hank Grover, Billy Kidd and John T. Henderson. The GOP precinct convention will be at p.m. Saturday at city hall.

Election judges in each of the involved voting precincts will determine as voters enter polling places which kind of a ballot each voter shall use. Only four voting boxes are affected by this change. Box 1 in South Tahoka, Box 2 in Wilson, Box 6 in North Tahoka and Box 9 in West Tahoka.

At Box 2 in Wilson and Box 6 in North Tahoka some voters will not be permitted to vote on the race for Commissioner of Precinct 1, because they are no longer in Commissioners Precinct 1. At voting Box 1 in South Tahoka those people living South of South 4th and West of Ave. J will receive a ballot for Commissioners Precinct 3 race as will those people voting at West Tahoka (Box 9) who live south of Highway

All polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. as required by law.

The voting box at New Moore (Box 10) has been reinstated and these people will vote at the New Moore Community Building.

Two changes in polling places should be noted this year. Voting Box 5 at Draw has been moved from the Church to the Paymaster Gin Office and voting Box 6 in North Tahoka has been moved to the Tahoka School



Immunization **Clinic Slated**


