# Tahokans Stunned By Trooper's Murder

Jerry Don Davis, a young Texas Highway Patrolman who grew up in Tahoka, was shot to death about midnight Sunday after he had stopped a car for speeding just inside the south city limits of Slaton on U.S. 84.

The senseless slaying of Davis, 25, left friends and acquaintances in Tahoka stunned.

"He was a real fine young man...he practically grew up in those aisles out there," said pharmacist Dayton Parker. Davis' mother worked for Parker Pharmacy for several years. The young man's father was employed by the highway department office in Tahoka.

**Services Held**  
The parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Davis, now live in

Lubbock, where funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Caprock Church of Christ. Pallbearers were fellow troopers and burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park.

A 1974 graduate of Tahoka High School, Davis began his law enforcement career as a teenage dispatcher with Tahoka Police Dept. He joined the Department of Public Safety Jan. 10, 1979. He first was assigned to the driver's license division and later to the highway patrol.

He also had worked for the Texas Tech Police Dept., Abernathy and Slaton Police Depts. and for the Swisher County Sheriff's Office.

As of Tuesday, officers still had not apprehended the Lorenzo man charged with

the murder of Davis. Still at large was Billy Wayne Alexander Jr., 21. Davis was found slumped over the wheel of his patrol car, shot once in the right cheek with a .357 magnum pistol. He was holding Alexander's driver's license in his right hand when he died, a DPS spokesman said.

**House Searched**  
Although Alexander's last

known address was Route 1, Lorenzo, he apparently was living with a woman in Lubbock, officers said. That

residence was searched Monday afternoon and about 30 pounds of a substance believed to be marijuana was found. There was evidence of a hasty flight from the house, with lights and television left on.

Two men, ages 18 and 28, who were with Alexander in a late-model Thunderbird

drivers are Tahoka residents. Three wrecks were investigated by DPS in the area Monday, two of them at the same intersection of FM 211 and U.S. 87.

Two young Tahoka residents were hurt as a 1956 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jesus Antu, 16, of 1924 S. 8th, overturned on U.S. 380 3.7 miles west of the Tahoka city limits. Antu was treated at Lynn County Hospital for bruises and abrasions. A passenger, Macario Alvarado Jr., 15, was listed in critical condition at Lubbock General Hospital, reportedly in intensive care Tuesday from injuries suffered in the wreck.

Monday morning a 1976 burr truck driven by Jesse Hyde, Rt. 2, Wilson, headed east on 211, overturned after

pulled over by Davis, were taken into custody for questioning. They were apprehended about 5 a.m. at a private residence near Union Gin about five miles south of Slaton.

A 23-year old Lorenzo man believed to be with the other three also remained at large Monday night. The driver's licenses of all four men were found in the trooper's patrol car, police said.

Davis apparently pulled the Thunderbird over about 11:20 p.m. and issued the driver, presumed to be Alexander, a citation for driving 85 mph in a 55 mph zone.

The trooper radioed dispatcher Gary Gilbert to run routine checks on the car and the driver and was told the license plates on the car had

been stolen from another vehicle in Lubbock. He asked for a backup unit from the Slaton Police Department, but later cancelled the request, apparently thinking he had the situation under control.

**No Answer**  
Davis then asked for a check on a .357-caliber magnum pistol. When Gilbert attempted to contact the trooper again, Davis did not answer.

After about five minutes, Gilbert called the Slaton Police Department and asked them to check on the trooper. Slaton police, meanwhile, had received a report from a passerby that someone was slumped over in a DPS car.

Slaton officers went to the scene and made the grisly discovery.

The Thunderbird, which DPS officers later discovered had been stolen in Levelland, was found about 4:30 a.m. parked in the garage of a rural residence about a mile west of the intersection of U.S. 87 and FM 41, about 13 miles from where Davis was killed, said Criminal District Attorney John T. Montford.

A .357-caliber magnum pistol was found in the car, but a search of the house turned up no clues as to the whereabouts of the occupants of the vehicle.

Slaton police Sgt. Mike Savage said two of the car's passengers fled the shooting scene on foot, but he declined to say whether they were the same men detained for questioning.

Some reports have indicated Davis was murdered with his own weapon, but DPS spokesman Larry Todd in Austin said the revolver was still in its holster when Davis' body was found.

Assistant District Attorney Hal Hensley said Davis' .357-magnum, the standard weapon of most law officers, had not been fired.

## Gunshots, Arson, Wrecks Reported

Gunshots in the middle of the night in Tahoka, four vehicle accidents and a case of suspected arson at O'Donnell were among things which kept law enforcement officials here busy during the last week.

In the early hours of Saturday morning there were several reports of gunshots fired in the vicinity of S. 7th and near the county barn. Exactly what was happening was not clear, but officers did get a description of two vehicles in the area and had a slug removed from a

resident's home struck by gunfire.

Arson was believed to be the cause of a fire which destroyed P&D Products at O'Donnell early Sunday. Deputies found evidence that locked file cabinets had been broken open in the farm equipment manufacturing firm. There was no estimate of the loss.

The John Edwards Shop at New Home was burglarized Friday night, when battery cables and wrenches were stolen.

Dustie Cook of Tahoka

reported a purse stolen from her car. Among items missing were \$8 in cash and a Texas Instruments watch.

Two cases of Cokes were reported stolen off a Cola-Cola truck outside Summit Venture Foods one day last week.

A collision at Ave. P and Lockwood last Wednesday involved a 1967 GMC pickup driven by Milton Brown and a 1978 Chevrolet driven by Gale Heaton Parker. Both

## Special Education Students Get Valuable Training

A new training center in Brownfield is giving area students who have learning disabilities a chance to learn a vocation and get experience in useful occupations.

The new Vocational Adjustment Training Center (VAT Center) is located on the Brownfield High School campus and serves special education students from nine area school districts, including Tahoka and O'Donnell in Lynn County.

Tahoka sends six students to the cooperative center five days a week under the program paid for by federal money. A bus picks up students from O'Donnell and then those from Tahoka, takes them to the center and then returns them in the afternoon. The youngsters learning the various skills

such as sewing, carpentry and working with tools, operation of machinery and other activities, love the program, according to teachers who work with them.

**Well Accepted**

The center was built especially for the purpose it is being used for, and with 48 youngsters coming to the center daily it already is near the capacity it was designed for. Already there is discussion of possible expansion, since acceptance of the program has been greater than anticipated.

"It's great that this program offers the boys and girls a chance to learn something really constructive," a teacher said. "They are mostly doing well, and many will be able to take what they have learned here and go out and get a job where they can be productive, helping themselves and doing a good job for their employers."

Don McWhorter is supervisor and shop teacher; Beth Duggan is domestic skill instructor, and Lynn Pudney is vocational adjuster coordinator and job placement

officer, also working with academics.

Aides include Pat Perry, Irene Cavazos and Carolyn Patton.

Part of the education involved is learning the proper use of the dishwasher, stove, mixer and commercial washer and dryer. The students do all the laundry for the Brownfield Middle School, giving the girls experience in that type of equipment.

**Make Items**

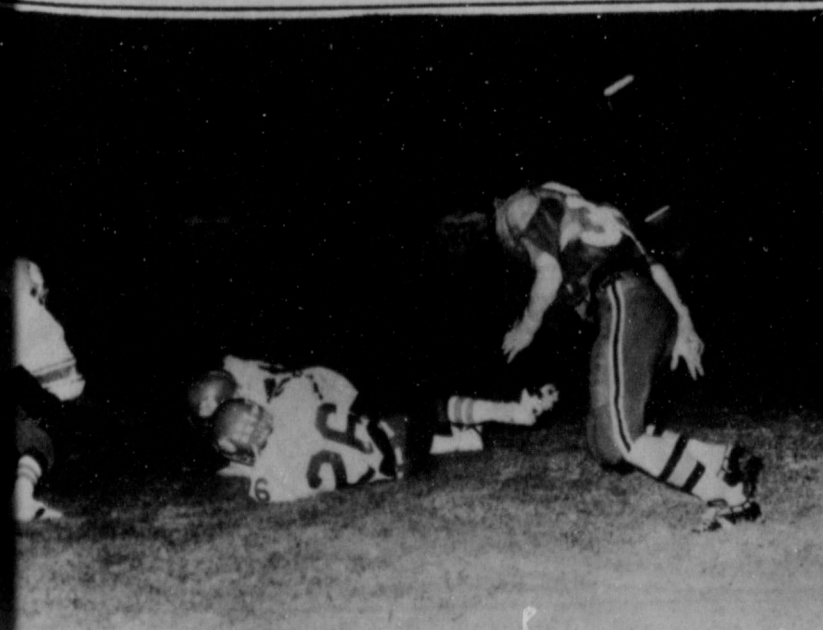
In the sewing center, the girls have made dolls, quilts and other items, and the boys have made wooden wheeled toys in the shop, with different ones doing different jobs in an assembly-line fashion. These items are being sold, and a special sale is planned in December. The students hope to earn enough from the sale of the items to attend the Special Olympics in Lubbock.

Vocational Office Education students donated a cash register to the center, and the students there are learning how to make change and operate this register.

Among other courses are upholstery, learning to take blood pressure, care for infants and even application of makeup for girls. The students plan to plant a garden in the spring.

Boys in the center made the sewing cabinets and walls for the shop, and learn safe operation of such power equipment as drills and saws.

The public is invited to visit the center any time, and visitors come away impressed by the worth of the program and by the skills demonstrated by the students.

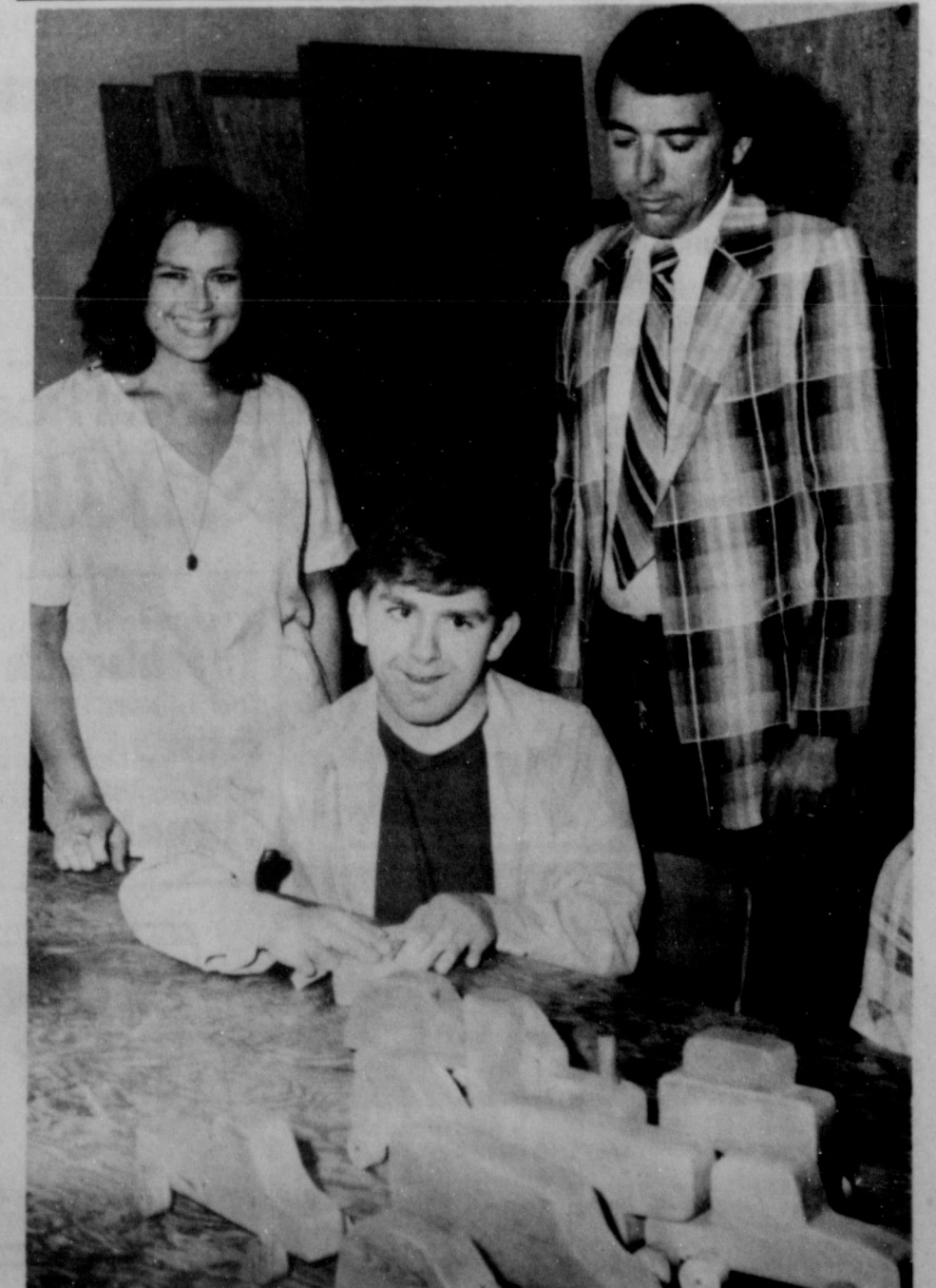

They suggest planting native drought-resistant plants such as oak, sage, yaupon, magnolia, mesquite or other shrubs.

Also, limit the size of your lawn by careful landscaping and limit the water you put on the grass and shrubs.

Other yard-saving suggestions: fertilize your lawn twice a year; control weeds; aerate your lawn and add organic material to sandy or clay soils to help them better absorb water.

**Rains Halt High  
Plains Cotton  
Harvest**

Last week's rains halted High Plains cotton harvesting, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. Most of the heavy rains were recorded in western and southern counties with 12 to 14 inch measurements around Dawson County.

Some harvesting was reported as early as Thursday in sandy areas, Bennett said. Growers should be able to get back into fields having tighter soils by the middle of next week.

Harder-to-kill second growth generated by recent rains has been reported in most counties served by Lubbock's Marketing Services Office.

About 1,000 samples were graded at Lubbock during the week ended Oct. 2. This brought the season's total to 2,000, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Predominant grades during the week were grade 42 at 50 percent, grade 32 accounted for 22 percent and grade 52 made up 12 percent. About 16 percent of the samples were reduced one grade because of bark.

Staple statistics showed staple 31 was predominate at 39 percent during the week. Staple 30 was 28 percent and staple 32 accounted for 13 percent. Average staple was 30.7, up from 30.4 one week earlier.

Micronaire readings in the base range of 35-49 accounted for 85 percent. Seven percent miked in the 50 to 52 range while 53 and above amounted to six percent. Average mike for the week was 45, up from 44 one week ago.

The new permanent office at Lamesa graded 85 samples during the week ended Oct. 2, according to Don Lewellen, Area Director. This brought the season's total for Lamesa to 420.

Tahoka I.S.D. is using the TABS results to diagnose needs, to plan for teacher in-service, and to strengthen the school's academic program.

## Sherry Etheredge Says....

October 5-11, 1980 has been proclaimed National Consumer Education week by President Jimmy Carter. Consumer education has helped many Americans to improve their lives - by learning to become better shoppers, by understanding how the market functions, and by developing participatory skills in government decision making. There are many more Americans who could benefit from consumer education.

A cost-saving plan for grocery shopping? Impossible, you say? It can be done.

Start your own plan during National Consumer Education Week, Oct. 5.

For economy, plan meals around the less expensive foods from each of the four food groups--the milk group, meat group, vegetable-fruit group and cereal-bakery products group.

Some general tips suggested to find good buys and cut an expensive food budget to a cost-saving plan are:

Compare prices at the store. Unit pricing, now used by many stores, allows cost comparison of a food in containers of different sizes and of various brands and grades.

In unit pricing, the cost of a single unit such as an ounce, pound or quart of a food is shown, usually on the shelf just below the food. From the items that will meet your needs, choose the one with the lowest price per unit.

To find the best buys among

types and cuts of meat or among raw, frozen or canned vegetables, compare the cost of an amount needed for a family meal or the cost of the serving.

Another hint for homemakers: watch for specials in the newspaper ads and at the store. Stock up on good buys for the family's likes if storage is available. But don't overbuy--waste "leaks" the budget away fast.

Cut cost when shopping for meat group foods by selecting the cuts, grades and types of meat, poultry and fish that provide the most cooked lean for the money spent. These give best return in nutrients for the food dollar. Consumers can set a top price limit for dinner meat or set an average amount as a goal, allowing for some higher and some lower cost items.

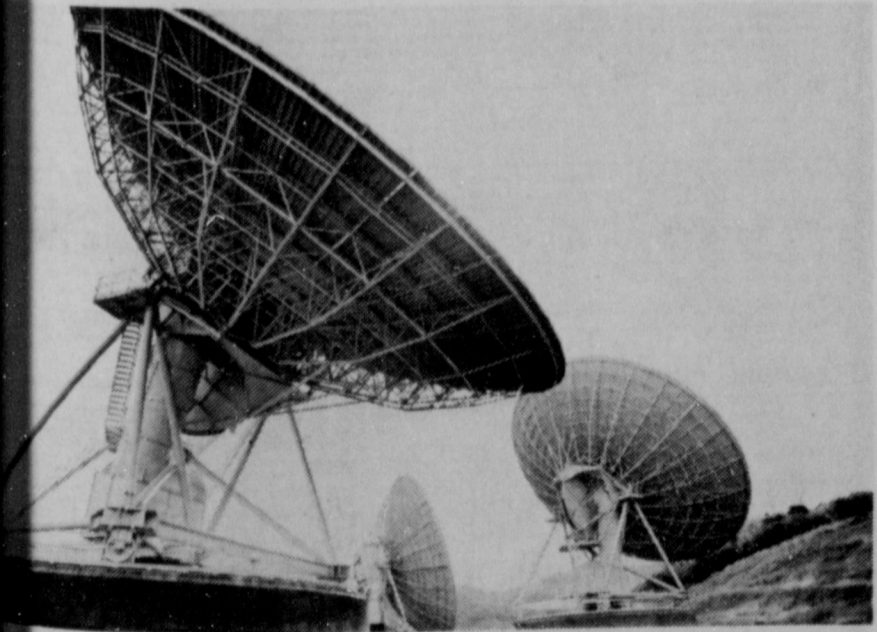

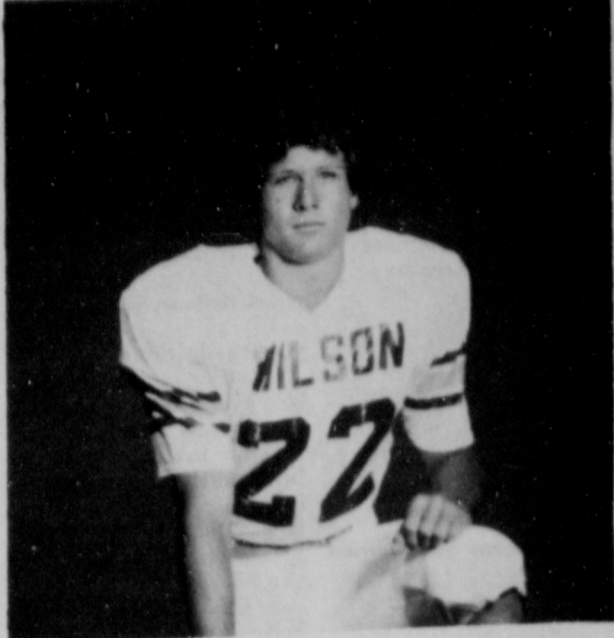
## Wilson Homecoming Activities

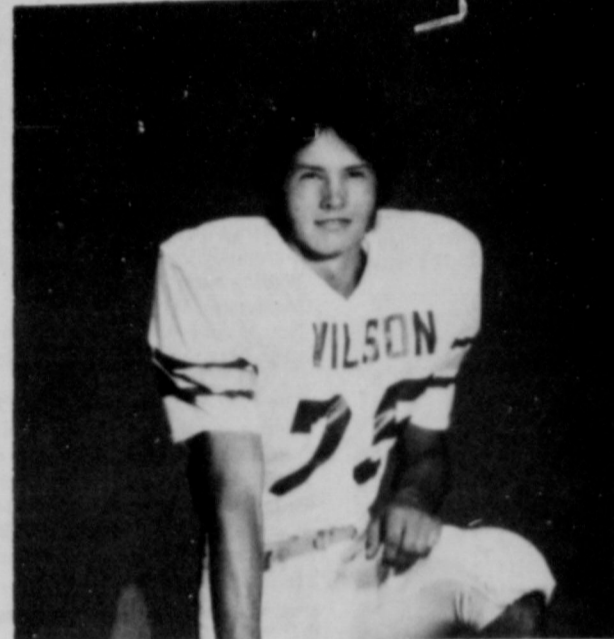

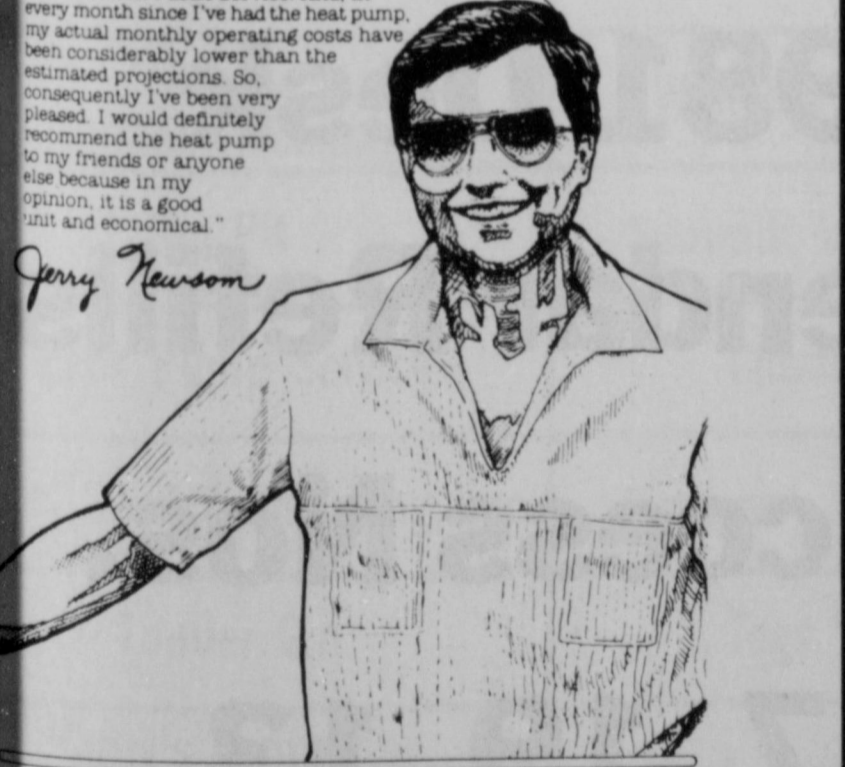

# Rudd Discusses Nine Proposed Amendments

"Citizens of Texas will vote on nine Constitutional Amendments, passage of which can have great effect on all of us in the future," Jim Rudd of Brownfield, State Representative from this 77th Legislative District, declared in a talk at Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday.  
 All citizens are urged to inform themselves on the proposed Amendments, he advised. He said he voted for some of them, but thinks others should not be approved by voters.  
 No. 1 on the ballot will be SJR 35, which would "permit the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city...on a shared basis to serve the public convenience." The measure would allow banks to better compete with savings and loan associations, but would prohibit long-standing prohibition of branch banks and possibly force small banks out of business and increase higher costs to customers for banking services, Rudd said.  
**Court Matter**  
 HJR 97, No. 2 on the ballot would "authorize appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused." This one would give the prosecution in criminal cases right of appeal and would lessen the tendency of some judges to rule in favor of the defendant in order to avoid appellant review of their decisions, but could also be used as a further delaying of decisions.  
 No. 3 is HJR 98 "requiring a single appraisal and a single appraisal within each county for ad valorem tax purposes." Already, 215 of the 254 counties have joined the appraisal district plan. This amendment would make joining mandatory, but it delegates appraisal authority to appointed persons rather than elected officials.  
 No. 4 is HJR 18 which would permit legalized bingo game gambling on a local option basis by churches and other non-profit organizations for charitable purposes. Rudd thinks this would be a foot in the door for promotion of race horse and other gambling interests.  
**Fiscal Control**  
 No. 5 is HJR 86 which would "grant to the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law." This could be a long range solution to spiraling government costs, but the governor already has veto power and the amendment could open the door to political abuse by the governor.  
 No. 6 is SJR 9 which would "authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advise and counsel of the Senate." This, too,

could open the door for political abuse by a governor, although it could prove a saving of time and expense from method presently in use.  
 No. 7 is HJR 121 "authorizing counties with a population of 5,000 or less to perform private road work." It would not apply to any county in this district.

Gerald Huffaker was in charge of the program, and Dr. Richard White presided at the meeting in absence of the president, Carl Reynolds.

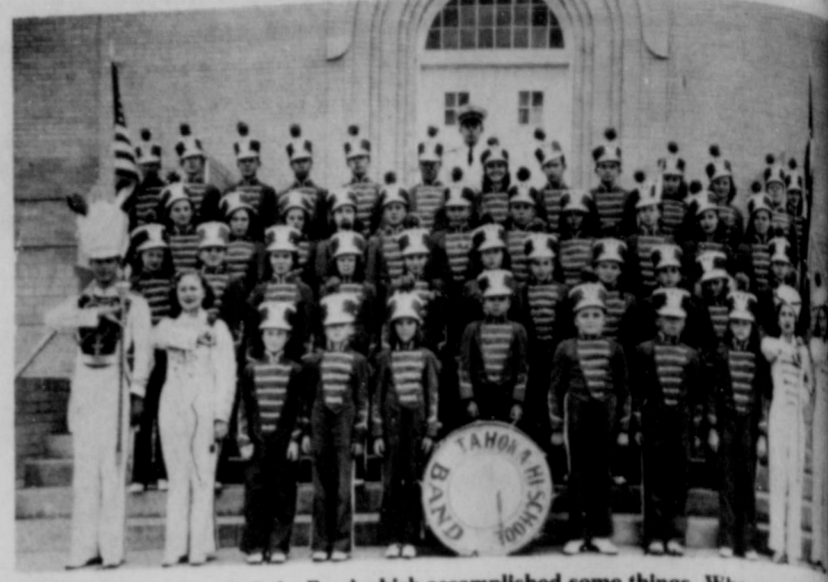

### Vandalism Of Phones

Coin Telephones continue to be a prime target for vandals, costing General Telephone, and ultimately General Telephone customers, over \$1 million a year, or almost \$2,600 daily, in labor costs alone.

O.D. Hearn, Brownfield Division Manager for General Telephone, said the company has around 10,000 coin telephones in its four-state service area.

"On any given day, one in four of these coin telephones is out of service," Hearn said, "and in most cases of the out-of-service is caused by vandalism. In a large number of the vandalism cases, the damage is apparent, but in others the damage cannot be seen, such as broken wires, removed parts or jammed coin chutes."

"The person trying to use an out-of-order phone is not the only one affected even though that person is the one irritated at the time. The public phones are there for public use and the cost of maintaining and repairing these phones is a part of our expenses paid by all customers."

The company's objective for coin telephones outlined by Hearn is to keep them available for use 24 hours a day, often for emergencies.

"We realize our coin phones must be operational as customers use them for business and regular telephone service as well as emergencies. We also realize that out-of-order coin phones cause frustration. Even though vandals are the culprits in most cases, General Telephone gets the blame."

"The company is working to solve some vandalism problems by replacing the standard box-type phone booths with more vandal-

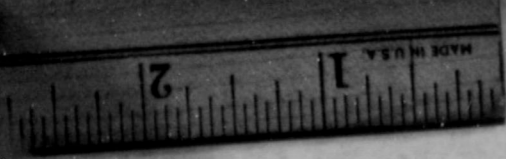

## 1981 Wheat Program

1. No set-aside.
2. Normal Crop Acreage - may not exceed NCA on farms with wheat planted for those farms to be eligible for program benefits. (NCA Crops: wheat, rye, oats, barley, upland cotton, grain sorghum, sunflowers, soybeans, and corn.)
3. Off-Setting Compliance- Owners and operators must not exceed the NCA on other farms they own or operate that have wheat planted.
4. Target Price - Minimum of \$3.81 per bu.
5. Loan Price - Minimum of \$3.00 per bu. Finals will be announced later.
6. Payment Limitation - \$50,000 for deficiency.
7. Disaster Provisions - Legislation still pending.

## 1981 Feed Grains, Soybeans Programs

Comments have been requested on the 1981 feed grain and soybean programs. The provisions for these programs are to be announced by Nov. 15. You should comment on required

set-aside, adjustment of target, planted crops not to exceed NCA, and reduction in prior year planting to be eligible for program benefits. Comments should be sent to: Mr. Jeff A. Wells, Director Production Adjustment Div., Room 3630 S Bldg. P.O. Box 2415, Washington, D.C. 20013

## Disaster Payments

The following steps must be completed before payments can be made:

1. Unharvested grain or cotton must be reported before plowing up and reported destroyed when completed.
2. Harvested grain or cotton that has a low yield must be reported within 15 days following completion of harvest on each farm. Production must be turned in before payment can be made.
3. All forms mailed to you must be signed and returned

before payment can be made.

## Emergency Livestock Feed Program

Oct. 1 begins a new feeding period and will require filing a second application for this feeding period. To be eligible you must have at least 40% loss in feed and be purchasing and feeding above normal. The amount of assistance is one-half the cost of the feed not to exceed 3 cents per pound of grain equivalent.

**Disaster Loans** It has been announced that Lynn County producers are eligible to apply for loans from SBA and FmHA. Applications for loans based on 1980 losses can be made at the FmHA Office in Tahoka until June 18, 1981. SBA loans can be applied for at the SBA Office, 720 Texas Ave. Lubbock, Texas or call 762-7481 by Feb. 12, 1981.

## Clark papers

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.)—The U.S. Supreme Court papers of the late Associate Justice Tom C. Clark have become the property of The University of Texas Law Library.

Justice Clark, who served on the Court from 1949 to 1967, held two degrees from UT Austin (B.A., 1921, and LL.B., 1922). He was the only Texas and UT graduate ever to have served on the U.S. Supreme Court.

His Court papers will be of value to legal scholars because his tenure on the bench came at a time of social upheaval in the U.S. Many of his papers reflect the issues with which the Court was faced.

## Mason Named As Director

T.B. Mason of Rt. 4, Tahoka, was re-elected Monday night, to the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors. Mason represents zone 2 of the district and is serving his third 5-year term as director.

As one of five individuals serving in the district board, Mason will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

The Lynn County district was organized in January 1942. Today there are slightly more than 3000 districts in the nation.

A booklet is available at the SCS office in Tahoka which describes the conservation movement from the beginning to the present. The booklet is free.

## Stenholm Receives Award

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has been named to receive the National Association of Independent Businessmen' (NAB) "Watchdog of the Treasury Award" for voting against unnecessary federal spending during the 96th Congress.

Stenholm scored 100 percent on NAB's "Economy Voting Record" (EVR), an index of congressional attitudes toward economy in government.

Thirty-five Senators and 179 Representatives (41 percent) qualified for the award, with only 62 Representatives scoring 100 percent.

Stenholm has also been awarded the National Federation of Independent Businessmen' "Guardian of Small Businesses" award for his voting record on issues effecting the country's independent businessmen.

Agency head Eula Bingham, explaining the stay, said there is "widespread misunderstanding of how an effective respirator program should work." To correct the situation, she said a meeting will be set with representatives of cotton textile workers, their unions, and others to develop guidelines for proper use of respirators. The effective compliance date for the mandatory respirator program is postponed until Dec. 15.

**Exports Reported:** Exports of 109,900 running bales of upland cotton during the week ended Sept. 25 brought the season's total to 779,000. Almost half, 51,300 bales went to China. New sales for current marketing year delivery were 41,900. Major buyers were Japan, 22,500; Hong Kong, 7,600; and Korea, 6,700. The season's commitments total 3,301,400.

"Though it is difficult to estimate, a gain of cents to five cents per pound may be available by improving the harvesting and ginning of cotton from present varieties."

That quote from a "West Texas High Plains Market Development Pre-scan Study" caught the eye of officials at Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. The study, done by the Texas Agricultural Market Research and Development Center in cooperation with others, says estimating possible price is a matter of judging the price discount buyers on the area's cotton because of problems with content and variability of other quality components.

Improved use of plant defoliants and harvest scheduling and better harvesting equipment can help reduce the problem of barkiness and trash report contents, and could obtain for the High Plains access to as much as four percent to seven percent more of the domestic mill market and a larger share of foreign markets as well.

A wealth of information on cotton quality production for years has been available to producers through Federal and State Extension Services, PCG publications, and in a very few years it would definitely boost the image of High Plains cotton in the textile world. Farmers would uniformly adopt recommended practices.

The most recent compilation of information on this subject is found in five pamphlets on harvesting, processing and handling cotton for maximum acceptability as a textile fiber, published by Cotton Incorporated (CI).

"If growers will follow some of the simple steps in these pamphlets," states CI's Dr. William L. Director of Processing Research, "they will have more efficient and productive harvest while maintaining the reputation of cotton."

The pamphlets, being made available to extension offices, ginners and implement dealers, are "Why Buy Cotton," "Harvesting," "Eliminate Lint Contamination," "It's Still Your Cotton," and "Cotton Handling and Storage." They can also be obtained by writing CI at Box 30067, Raleigh, N.C. 27605 from the PCG office in Lubbock.

"The price discount suffered every year by Plains cotton is strong evidence that overall improvement can be especially profitable to our PCG reasons, "and we are urging producers to use every year to use every tool at their command to deliver a top-quality product to mill customers here and abroad."

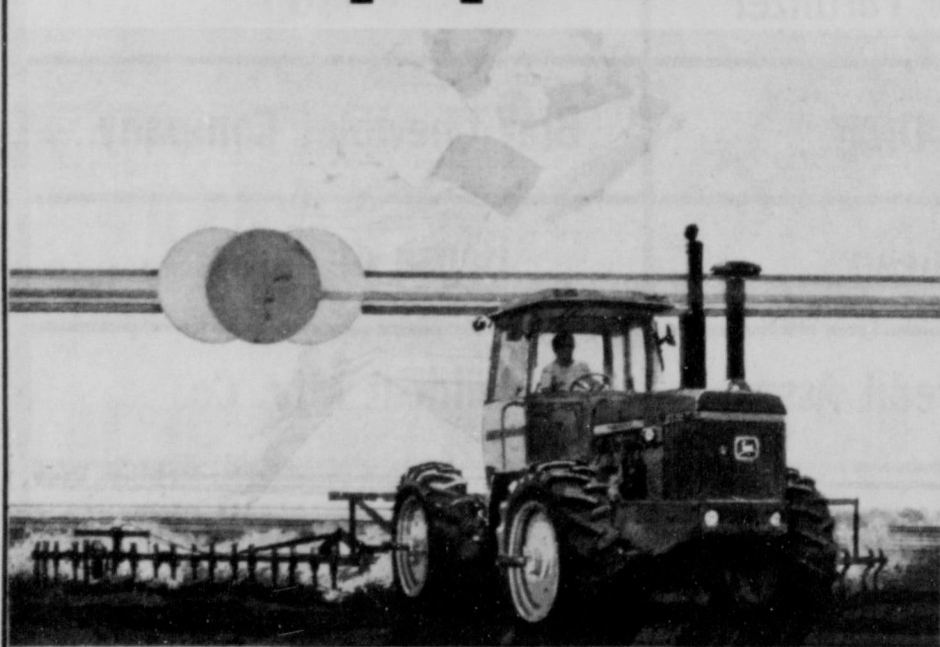
