

#### **Enrollment Down** In Tahoka Schools

Enrollment in Tahoka Public Schools was reported at 883 last week, compared to 940 at the end of last school year, according to school officials.

In high school, the total was 271, compared to 310 last year. It was noted that Tahoka is now classified AAA, but that a drop in enrollment below 265 would drop the school into AA classification.

#### No Answer

Davis then asked for a check on a .357-caliber magnum pistol. When Gilbert attempted to contact the trooper again, Davis did not answer.

After about five minutes, Gilbert called the Slaton Police Department and asked them to check on the trooper. Slaton police, meanwhile, had received a report from a passerby that someone was

slumped over in a DPS car. Slaton officers went to the scene and made the grisly discovery.

The Thunderbird, which DPS officers later discovered had been stolen in Levelland, was found about 4:30 a.m. parked in the garage of a rural residence about a mile west of the intersection of U.S. 87 and FM 41, about 13 miles from where Davis was killed, said Criminal District Attorney John T. Montford.

A .357-caliber magnum pistol was found in the car. but a search of the house turned up no clues as to the whereabouts of the occupants of the vehicle.

Slaton police Sgt. Mike Savage said two of the car's passengers fled the shooting scene on foot, but he declined to say whether they were the same men detained

Some reports have indicated Davis was murdered with his own weapon, but DPS spokesman Larry Todd in Austin said the revolver Tahoka, towing a cotton was still in its holster when

Assistant District Attorney Hal Hensley said Davis' .357-magnum, the standard weapon of most law officers, had not been fired.

# Special Education Students Get Valuable Training

A new training center in Brownfield is giving area students who have learning disabilities a chance to learn a vocation and get experience in useful occupa-

The new Vocational Adjustment Training Center (VAT Center) is located on the Brownfield High School campus and serves special education students from nine area school districts, including Tahoka O'Donnell in Lynn County.

Tahoka sends six students to the cooperative center five days a week under the program paid for by federal money. A bus picks up students from O'Donnell and then those from Tahoka, takes them to the center and then returns them in the afternoon. The youngsters learning the various skills

such as sewing, carpentry and working with tools, operation of machinery and other activities, love the program, according to teach-

ers who work with them. Well Accepted

The center was built especially for the purpose it is being used for, and with 48 youngsters coming to the center daily it already is near the capacity it was designed for. Already there is discussion of possible expansion, since acceptance of the program has been greater than anticipated.

"It's great that this program offers the boys and girls a chance to learn something really constructive," a teacher said. "They are mostly doing well, and many will be able to take what they have learned here and go out and get a job where they can be productive, helping themselves and doing a good job for their

Make Items In the sewing center, the girls have made dolls, quilts and other items, and the boys have made wooden wheeled toys in the shop, with different ones doing different jobs in an assembly-line fashion. These items are being sold, and a special sale is planned in December. The students hope to earn enough from the sale of the items to attend the Special Olympics in Lubbock.

Vocational Office Education students donated a cash register to the center, and the students there are learning how to make change and operate this register.


Among other courses are upholstery, learning to take blood pressure, care for infants and even application of makeup for girls. The students plan to plant a garden in the spring.



#### Water conservation is an important step to lawn preservation

COLLEGE STATION - In the face of an extensive drought, what will happen to the yard, many a Texan's prideand-joy?

Official of the Texas Water Resources Institute at Texas A&M University say several steps can save useless outdoor water waste.

They suggest planting native drought-resistant plants such as oak, sage, yaupon, magnolia, mesquite or other shrubs.

Also, limit the size of your lawn by careful landscaping and limit the water you put on \$ DATES the grass and shrubs.

Other yard-saving suggestions: fertilize your lawn twice a year; control weeds; aerate your lawn and add organic material to sandy or clay soils to help them better absorb water.

# Rudd Discusses Nine Proposed Amendments

"Citizens of Texas will vote on nine Constitutional Amendments, passage of which can have great effect on all of us in the future,' Jim Rudd of Brownfield, State Representative from this 77th Legislative District, declared in a talk at Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday.

All citizens are urged to inform themselves on the proposed Amendments, he advised. He said he voted for some of them, but thinks others should not be approved by voters. -

No. 1 on the ballot will be SJR 35, which would "permit the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or city ... on a shared basis to serve the public convenience." The measure would allow banks to better compete with savings and loan associations, but would circumvent long-standing prohibition of branch banks and possibly force small banks out of business and increase higher costs to customers for banking services, Rudd said.

Court Matter

HJR 97, No. 2 on the ballot would "authorize appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused." This one would give the prosecution in criminal cases right of appeal and would lessen the tendency of some judges to rule in favor of the defendant in order to avoid appellant review of their decisions, but could also be used as a further delaying of decisions.

No. 3 is HJR 98 "requiring a single appraisal and a single board within each county for ad valorum tax purposes." Already, 215 of the 254 counties have joined the appraisal district plan. This amendment would make joining mandatory, but it delegates appraisal authority to appointed persons rather than elected officials.

No. 4 SJR 18 would permit legalized bingo game gambling on a local option basis by churches and other non-profit organizations for charitable purposes. Rudd thinks this would be a foot in the door for promotion of race horse and other gambling interests.

**Fiscal Control** No.5 is HJR 86 which would grant to the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law." This could be a long range solution to spiraling government costs, but the governor already has veto power and the amendment could open the door to political abuse by the governor.

No. 6 is SJR 9 which would 'authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advise and councel of the Senate." This, too,

could open the door for political abuse by a governor,

No. 7 is HJR 121 "authorizing counties with a population of 5,000 or less to perform private road work.' It would not apply to any county in this district.

**Questions Need** 

No. 8, SJR 36, would authorize the "change of name of the Court of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appelate courts." This is designed to lower the case load of criminal cases appealed by authorizing the Courts of Civil Appeals to make decisions on criminal cases. But, present Civil Appeals court justices are supposed to be experts in civil law and not necessarily in criminal law, and advisability of the change is questionable, he said.

No. 9 is HJR 54 and would allow "spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property." The amendment would allow married couples to make separate property agreements. It would simplify conversion of community property, but could be confusing for both married persons and administration of the law.

For further information. Rep. Rudd said voters should consult their bankers, lawyers, or write him at Brownfield for more detailed information.
