The Tahoka Garden Club will again sponsor the Christmas Decoration Contest. There will be three categories; window, door, and overall. Three places will receive ribbons.

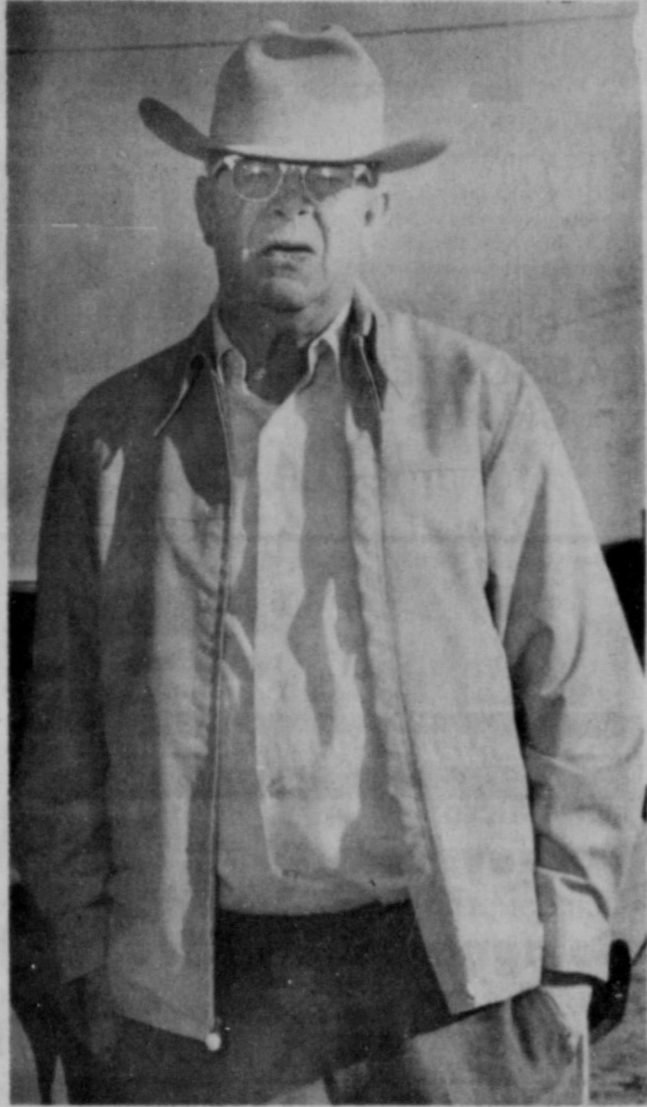

SHERIFF NORVELL REDWINE Retiring After 44 Years

Booger Redwine Ending Long Career As Lawman

Norvell "Booger" Redwine, sheriff of Lynn County for all but four of the last 28 years, will close out a long and respected career as a law enforcement officer as he retires Dec. 31.

His service as a lawman spans more than 44 years since he started out in 1936 shortly after his father—a Lynn County deputy sheriff at that time—was shot to death by a prisoner in the county jail here.

For most of those years Redwine has been county sheriff, first being elected in 1952 and beginning his term in 1953. But in 1964 he chose not to seek re-election, so was out of the office from 1965 to 1969, when he ran again in 1968 and was elected.

Lots Of Experience

Over the years he also has served in the Texas Highway Patrol, Texas Rangers, as a deputy, special officer and investigator for the Office of Price Stabilization.

Although his father was shot down in the line of duty, Redwine himself was never a gunman's target. "I've been fortunate," he said. "I've never been shot at, and I never had to shoot anybody."

He has, however, had some tense moments in making arrests. For instance, when he and another officer took an armed bank robber from a motel room in Lubbock some years ago, the man made a try for a pistol under a blanket on the bed. "But we grabbed him before he could get it," the sheriff said.

Born In Tahoka

The son of F.E. and Vesta Redwine was born in 1914 in a house located where the present home of Mrs. L.I. Gattis now is situated at 2021 Lockwood. "My dad set out that hackberry tree in Mrs. Gattis' front yard," he commented. The future Lynn County sheriff was one of five children.

He was about nine years old when he got the nickname that was to stick with him from then on. The nickname came from an older cousin, Ed Sanders, who would team with the youngster Norvell in gathering

cattle by horseback on F.E. Redwine's ranch west of Tahoka.

"In the summer when we'd leave the house, I'd be riding a gentle horse and Ed would ride a bronc. When we got out there he'd make me trade horses, putting me on that bronc and warning me not to get off because I couldn't get back on," Redwine recalled.

"Well, he'd go off somewhere for a long time and then when he came back I was always mad because I'd had to stay on the bronc without a drink of water and no rest all that time. He'd tease me and say, 'You're the ugliest little devil I ever saw—ugly as old Booger Red himself.'"

Well-Known Rider

The sheriff explained that Booger Red was a well-known bronc rider in those days (the early 20s) and was supposed to be unusually ugly.

Booger's dad, F.E. (Ed) Redwine, was Lynn County sheriff from 1914 to 1918 and later was in the real estate business "until the depression got him." The elder Redwine then became a deputy sheriff and was serving under Sheriff B.L. Parker on March 6, 1936, when tragedy struck.

Redwine had gone upstairs to the top floor of the courthouse in Tahoka—the old jail is still up there on the now unused floor—to lock up a prisoner. The man grabbed the deputy's .45 pistol and shot the officer five times.

"I was working at Smith's butcher shop and was called over to the jail," Booger said. "They were carrying him out and I asked him how bad he was hurt. He said 'Pretty bad, I'm afraid.'"

Taken To Lubbock

Borden Davis, who now operates a frame shop in Tahoka, took the wounded man to Lubbock in a hearse which doubled as an ambulance. The shooting was late in the afternoon, and the deputy died 8 hours later, in the early morning hours of the next day. His slayer later died in the

electric chair for the crime. Mrs. Vesta Redwine died in 1977 at the age of 87.

In May of 1936 young Norvell Redwine, 22 years old, took a job as deputy under Parker, serving in his first law enforcement job for 15 months. He then joined the Highway Patrol, serving for four years and one month in Shamrock, Amarillo, Pampa, Lubbock, Abilene and Big Spring. In those days he was assigned a motorcycle, an Indian model, sometimes with a sidecar so two officers could patrol together.

Joins Rangers

Redwine joined the Texas Rangers in September 1941, serving until January of 1948. He ran for sheriff of Lynn County in 1952 and was elected over four other candidates. In 1957 he married the former Linnie Tippit Finch, who later retired after 47 years of service as a teacher in the Tahoka school system. Booger said he didn't know what he would do after he retires, but that his wife already has been talking about visiting some folks outside this immediate area.

After one term out of office, Redwine ran again in 1968, was elected, and has been sheriff ever since, respected by citizens in the county and area and also by fellow law officers in the state.

He notes that there have been many changes over the years in administration of law enforcement and is not sure that all of the changes have been good. But he is grateful for a rewarding career and feels it is time to let someone else take over. Experienced Deputy Stanley Krause has been elected sheriff and will assume that office Jan. 1. "Any success I've had in law enforcement has come from the cooperation of other law enforcement agencies and from the citizens who have given me support through the years," Redwine said. "I credit this success, if any, to those fine people."

Tracy White, the Bulldogs' star running back, made first team on offense and in the defensive secondary. Tackle Marty Lindsey made first team offense, and on the No. 1 defensive team were linebacker Jacky Jolly and down lineman Luchion Thompson. All four are seniors.

Others on the first offensive

team were Holly of Post and Troy Moses of Slaton at ends, Mason of Post at tackle, Keck of Slaton, Perez of Frenship and Rocha of Roosevelt at guards, Gomez of Roosevelt at center, Kevin Johnston of Slaton at quarterback and Caraway of Roosevelt and Titus of Slaton at running backs.

On the second offensive team were Johnny Alvarado at end, who also made the second team on defense; Richard Payne at tackle and Jolly at guard. Kevin Elmore was listed on the second team as placekicker.

On the second team defense also are Freddy Garcia, James Wells and Mark Hudlin.

Rainfall Delays Harvest

Rain Sunday and Monday, preceded by four days of morning fog and light drizzle, totaled .82 of an inch in Tahoka and further delayed farmers from winding up harvest of the light

1980 cotton harvest. Rain was lighter in some areas of the county, but up to two inches were reported in some sections of the east and northeast areas. Hail in some areas, especially near New Lynn, did some damage to cotton still on the stalk.

Farmers have done little harvesting since the snow storms of Nov. 15-16 and 24-25, from which a total of 1.32 inches of moisture was gauged by the Tahoka weather observer. This was the biggest November snowfall ever recorded here.

Normal moisture for November, averaged over a 50-year period is about .7 of an inch, and for December the average normal is only .6 of an inch.

This last rain brought the year's total in Tahoka to 16.57 inches. But amount of annual rainfall not always is indicative of a good crop year, since last summer was probably the hottest and driest on record.

But, farmers say this fall moisture almost insures some kind of crop for next year.

Coach Reviews Cage Program

Tahoka High Athletics Director, A.D. Shaver discussed the current basketball program in the local school at the Rotary Club Thursday.

He predicted coach Dean Minor's varsity boys team will have a good season. Minor coaches the fast break, run-and-shoot type of ball, which excites the spectators. The boys have speed and quickness, and he thinks they will develop into a good team. The classes will have their parties as originally planned for Dec. 19.

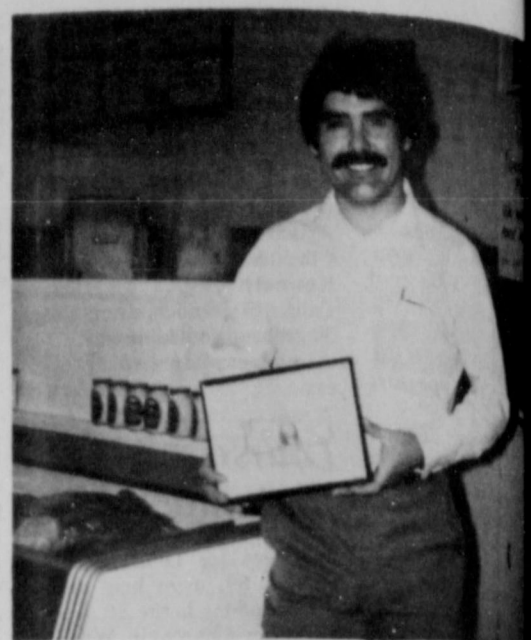

In the last several years my estate has grown and I like to leave as much as possible to my heirs. A way to eliminate insurance policy proceeds from a taxable estate?

By eliminating any insurance proceeds from the estate by assigning the policy ownership to the beneficiary. In assigning the policy ownership you must give up all rights or incidents of ownership to the policy. 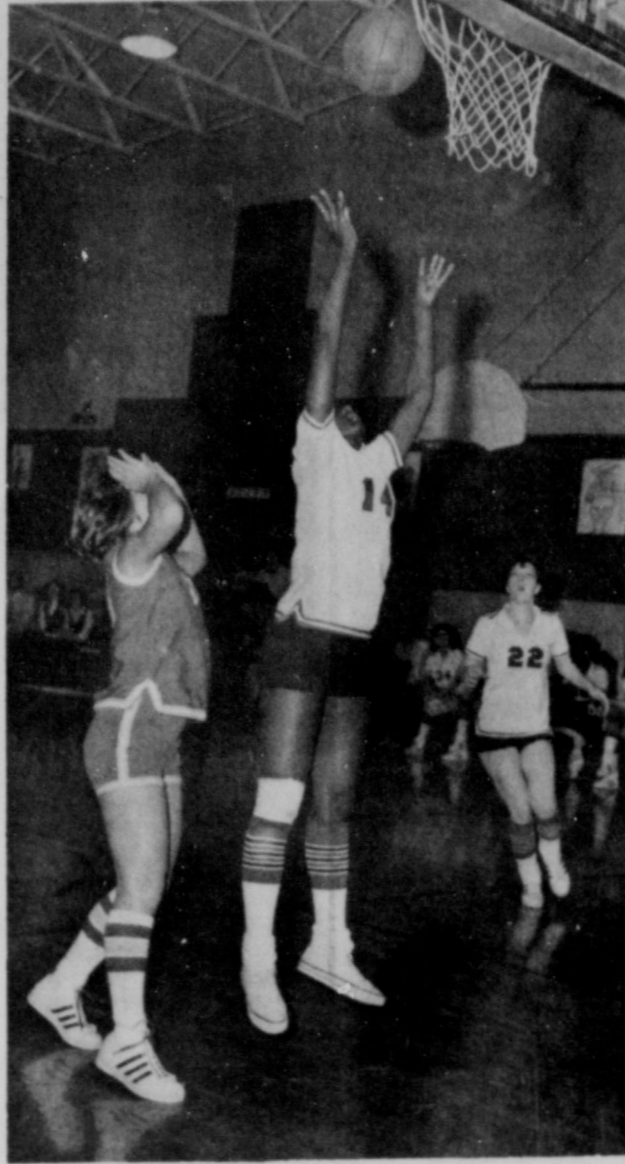

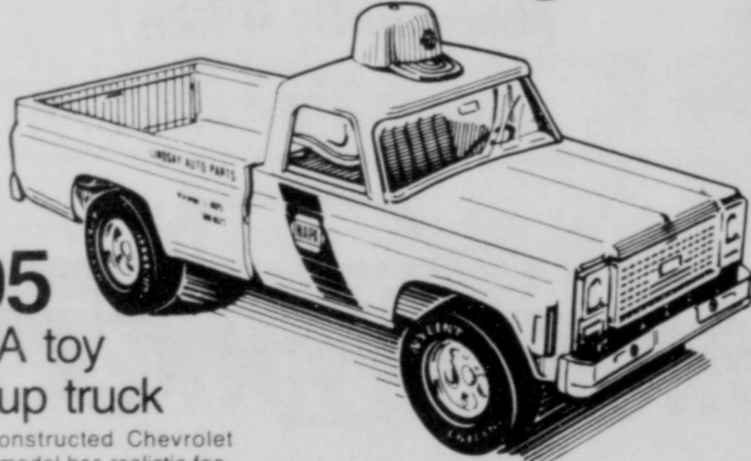

Drivers Forgetting To Give Cars Checkups Pay Heavy Penalties

If you are a patron of the self-service gas station, you probably know how easy it is to overlook the under-the-hood checks of vital fluids and components on your car.

Listed here are a few of the penalties that might befall the car owner who fails to check his car or have it checked regularly:

Brake fluid: When you are out of fluid, you are out of brakes. Check it monthly.

Engine oil: When oil gets too low on the dipstick, vital internal parts of the engine may be damaged. Major repairs are expensive. Check it at least weekly.

Automotive transmission fluid: Low fluid can cause clipping, erratic operation, eventual overheating and damage to the transmission. Check it monthly.

Anti-freeze/coolant: Coolant loss can result in sudden engine overheating and possible severe damage to the engine. It should be checked weekly. Check hoses, too.

Power steering fluid: You'll get a warning squeal from your power steering pump when it reservoir gets low. When the fluid is gone, so is your steering assist. Note: You will not lose your steering, but it will become noticeably harder to turn the wheel. Check it when you check your transmission fluid.

Drive belts: A broken belt can affect the operation of your electrical system, cooling system, air conditioning and/or power steering. Check belts at least once a month.

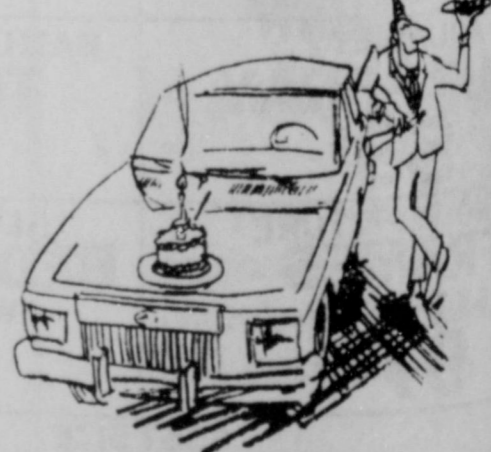
Battery electrolyte: If your car has the conventional type of battery on which you can remove the caps to check fluid, check it monthly. A dry battery won't last long.

Once you've closed the hood there are still other checks to make, including windshield wipers and tires. Additional checks and services, while required less frequently, do nevertheless demand regular attention.

A good way to remember to schedule complete maintenance services like tuneups is to key the date to your birthday. Then, on an annual or semi-annual basis, repeat your preventive maintenance program.

4-H Bakers Get Head Start On Holidays
You'll have more time to enjoy the Christmas season if you get a head start now on holiday baking, say 4-H members involved in the bread program.

These youth offer a few suggestions for holiday baking:
--Yeast breads and rolls freeze well. For best quality, freeze food as soon as it cools after baking.

--Wrap the baked product in moisture-vapor-resistant or moisture-vapor-proof material or place it in a freezer container. Exclude as much air as possible from the package.

--Most baked goods will hold quality well in a freezer at a temperature of 0 degrees F. or below. Maximum storage times are three months for white bread or plain rolls and two months for cinnamon rolls.

Bake plain and fancy yeast breads and freeze for family meals and holiday parties. And remember that home-baked products make welcome gifts.

4-H projects and activities encourage girls and boys 9-19 to prepare and serve a variety of wholesome, delicious breads. 4-H members learn-by-doing how breads and cereals contribute to good health, how scientific principles are related to bread making, and how grain products reflect people's cultures around the world.

4-H'ers in the bread program are eligible for recognition provided by Standard Brands, Inc. and arranged by the National 4-H Council. Awards include six \$1,000 scholarships at the national level, and expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago for one 4-H'er per state, and four medals of honor per county.

More information about the 4-H bread program and other activities is available from the county Extension office.

Cold Weather Tips For Hauling Livestock

Hauling livestock during cold weather can be both dangerous and costly unless certain precautions are taken. Certain steps should be taken in handling and transporting cattle, hogs, sheep and goats during the coming winter season:

1. Make sure animals are recovered from the stress of sorting and driving before loading them.
2. Check your vehicle closely and make sure it is in good repair. Eliminate drafts where possible. On long hauls, cover the side of the vehicle that is exposed to prevailing winds.
3. Provide a non-skid floor on the bed of the truck or trailer, or use wood shavings, sawdust or sand.
4. Make sure the loading chute is safe. A safe, properly constructed loading

chute will reduce animal stress.

5. Use partitions for mixed loads and to keep animals from piling in case of a sudden stop.
6. Use suitable persuaders for moving animals to reduce excitement and stress.
7. Understand animals and what makes them react the way they do. Allow them time to adjust to a new environment.
8. Don't overcrowd the vehicle. Overcrowding increases bruising, crippling and death during transit.
9. Get on the road once the animals are loaded.
10. Always check the load after the first hour on the road.

Following these simple precautions can make livestock hauling safer this winter and can cut losses to your pocketbook.

Social Security

The Social Security Office in Lubbock announced today that persons in this area who do not have the correct address on their Social Security or Supplemental Security checks may have them delayed. Delivery of mail by the post office department gets the best service when the correct address and zip codes are shown on the check.

If you want fastest delivery of your check, notify the Social Security office of any change of address as soon as possible to avoid delay in receiving your social security check. 95% of delayed checks or checks not received on time is due to a wrong address on the check, and the post office will not continue to forward checks indefinitely.

Cotton Harvest Resumes

Harvest weather returned to Texas' High Plains Thanksgiving Day when skies cleared following last week's snow. Temperatures hovered around freezing but snow began to melt, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director at USDA's Marketing Services Office in Lubbock.

Some harvesting resumed Sunday on sandy soils in southern High Plains counties. Sample receipts reached a low of 5200 the day before Thanksgiving. Receipts at the Lubbock office climbed to the 15,000 range by Thursday, Bennett said.

Some area gins managed to stay busy with seed cotton from modules.

Lubbock's office classed 141,000 samples during the week ended Dec. 4, as the classing staff declined to 44, down from 60 a week earlier. Lubbock's night shift terminated Friday.

The season's total graded at Lubbock surpassed 785,000. This compares with 504,000 classed by the same date last year.

Predominant grades during the week were grade 42 at 60 percent, grade 52 - 14 percent and grade 32 - 10 percent. About six percent were reduced one grade because of bark, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service.

Staple 32 was predominant at 44 percent. Staple 33 was 29 percent followed by staple 31 at 15 percent. The week's average staple was 32.3, up from 32.1 a week earlier.

Micronaire readings of 35 - 49 accounted for 66 percent. One percent miked higher while 33 percent miked lower. Average mike for the week at Lubbock was 39, unchanged from one week ago.

Average one-eighth inch gage breaking strength at Lubbock was 22.4 grams per tex, down from 23.5 a week ago.

High Plains growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 30 and 31, mike 35 - 49 around 74.70 cents per pound, up 30 points from last week. Mixed lots of mostly grades 41 and 42, staples 32 and 33, mike 35 - 49 brought about 81.10 cents.

Gins paid growers \$115 to \$130 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$120 to \$125.

Policies directing the state's largest farm organization were adopted by more than 1,200 delegates from 213 organized county Farm Bureaus during this meeting. Recommendations on national policies were also approved. These policies will advance to the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting to be held Jan. 11-15 in New Orleans.

Speakers featured at the convention included Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart, TFB president; Mayo J. Thompson of Houston, noted free enterprise advocate; Warren Newberry of Waco, TFB executive director; and Donald Hebert of Waller, TFB secretary-treasurer.

County leaders also attended several special conferences during the convention. Conference topics included

COTTON TODAY

Cotton Farmers Win: The requirement that farmers and ranchers in 1981 remain within their Normal Crop Acreage (NCA) to be eligible for target price protection, price support loans, and disaster assistance has been blocked. An amendment to the agricultural appropriations bill denies funds to administer or enforce the NCA requirement. The amendment was strongly supported by the National Cotton Council. Under the measure, now awaiting President's signature, cotton producers who exceed their NCA in 1981 will remain eligible for all program benefits on cotton, wheat, feed grains, soybeans, and

rice. Exemption Granted: Senate Appropriations committee has agreed to an amendment that exempts farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers from the Farm Contractor Registration Act (FLCRA), despite labor lobbying.

Exports Reported: Textile exports were valued at 91,500 million September, up 4.2 percent from August. The total for the year to date Sept. is 846,000 equivalents, 17.5 percent higher than the same year earlier. Net new year delivery are 2.3 billion. Total exports, orders, for the year 3,649,200 bales.

Dust Research: Congress has approved \$975,000 for increasing production for cotton dust

energy, farm program, taxes, transportation, meat production, and Farm Bureau services.

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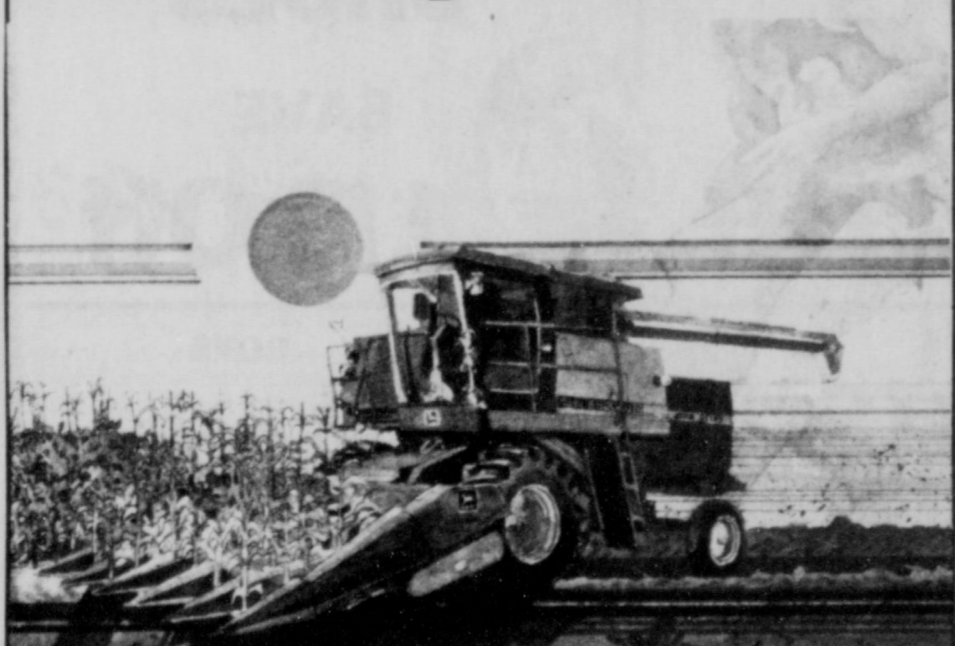

Few VW owners know it, but Adolf Hitler played a prominent role in the creation and initial production of the world famous "bug". In the early 30's, for propaganda reasons, Hitler wanted to promote a "people's car". He insisted that it must be a four-seater for families and get 40 MPG.

Ferdinand Porsche, the great sports car designer, and Karl Rabe conceived an original design essentially the same as the one we know today. The car was immediately nicknamed - you guessed it - "the beetle". Hitler wanted to call it the "Strength-Through-Joy Car", but the name didn't catch on, thank goodness. The VW company was formed in 1937 with funds from the German government; but it took a while to gear up, and only 210 VW's were manufactured before the plant shifted to war production.

During WW II, VW produced the Kubelwagen, a kind of bug-shaped jeep. The plant also turned out an amphibious watertight VW with snorkel and propeller, called the Schwimmkubel. Honest.

A final note - After WW II, several auto makers from the Allied side were offered the bombed-out VW plant. An advisor to Henry Ford II reportedly said it wasn't "worth a damn".

Texas ranks first in the nation in 1980 in total farms and ranches with 159,000 Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

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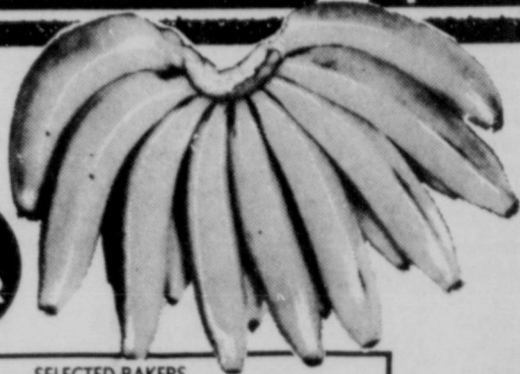
