THE Central Texas Live Stock Association has petitioned the governor to take action to prevent the importation of cattle from Missouri during the prevalence of pleuro-pneumonia in that state.

THE general round-ups in Oldham and adjoining counties will commence on June 15, at the lower end of the range and work up the river to the New Mexico line. The usual resolution was passed concerning Southern cattle.

THE general impression prevails that the territory tributary to Colorado City, as a shipping point, will turn out more beeves than usual by 25,000 head. The run will start in May with a few shipments, will increase in June and be running heavy by July 1.

It is strongly advocated that when ever stock are discovered to be afflicted with contagious disease, that for the good of the industry the whole stock be killed. It is also recommended that in each instance at lesst one vet erinary surgeon be sacrificed to make the others keerful.

COL. NORMAN J. COLMAN, commis sioner of agriculture, has a circular letter to Texas stockmen in this issue requiring attention. Mr. H. M. Taylor, agent for the bureau, will shortly be here to urge stockmen to furnish the commissioner with the data required.

"My attention has recently been diected to the fact that various states and territories have prohibited the inthe alleged danger that they will communicate a fatal disease to the native cattle of such states and territories. Such prohibition is very detrimental to the cattle industry of the whole the chief of the bureau of animal industry, and by many cthers acquainted with the subject, that the cattle from a considerable part of this state do not communicate such diseases and are not sources of danger to the cattle of other states. Therefore, to secure rel'able but abundant information as to the limits of that part of Texas from which cattle may be safely taken to other states without restrictions, I hereby request the cattlemen of the following counties to send answers to the questions hereto appended directed to the bureau of animal industry, department of agriculture, Washington,
