This latter is called "Para" grass; is hardy and kills out even Bermuda grass; it is very highly spoken of by Mr. Brahan, who thinks it would prove to be a very useful grass for Texas. 

Editor Texas Live Stock Journal. This country on the mountains presents just now a most attractive appearance. Indeed this may be said to be its normal condition. Last year when other parts of the state were suffering from drouth, we were favored with regular and abundant rains, that gave us good grass to go into the win-

We have no rain in winter to rot the grass, so our stock are and always have been fat, all through the spring, and so far this summer we have had no rain, and water and grass are all that could be desired.

Our ranges not being fully stocked, cattle are held pretty high here, but many have been brought in from lower Texas.

The following prominent stockmen have recently come to this country and located permanently; Hon. E. R. Lane, R. M. Gano, R. J. Carr. Mr. Crawfield, Mr. Scott and a number of others that are as yet doing business on a smaller scale.

Several good ranges can be had in this country by parties that wish to purchase, but free grassers are not wanted, and better not put in an appearance here. I say this for their benefit. Ensilage Without Silos.

Mr. James Hunt, of the firm of Amos & Hunt, of Westbury-on-tyne,

has given an exposition of his new process of stacking silage without a silos at the exhibition hall of the sanitary and Economic Association, Glou-Mr. Hunt said he had been asked to explain his systen of making silage without a silo, and to give a practical demonstration, and he had with pleasure consented to so do. Last summer for the first time he experimented with Prompt information given by mail or a stack in connection with a friend of his, Mr. Amos, when they cut and out together 30 tons of rough grown grass which at the lower end of the county was called skimmings-rough, sour stuff, which the cattle had left. At that time he milked 20 cows, and he did not care much whether they spoilt the grass or not, as they knew they were improving the ground by taking it off. He should not have done this but a neighbor of his had a contrivance in his head for giving stacked material the necessary pressure to form silage. It was obvious that by simply putting into a stack a quantity of green stuff it rapidly fermented, and by loading it with heavy dead weights of any kind there would be the greatest difficulty in preventing it from toppling over, especially with a high Proprietor. wind.
