Prices for Texas cattle are about 10 @15 cents lower than last week. Canning kinds have lately been selling about as low as at any time this year, but even now ordinary Texas beeves are not selling as low as Robert Strahorn and others sold good heavy cattle less than ten years ago. The market to-day is fairly active at the decline. All sold and the market prospects rather better. Sales of Texas cattle to-day 32 cows, averaging 618 pounds, \$2 00; 22 Texas cows, averaging 597 pounds, at \$2 15; 25 do do, 697 lbs, \$2 15; 24 do do, 744 lbs, \$2 30; 87 do do, 801 lbs, \$2 50; 24 do do, 816 lbs, \$2 52; 25 do do, 824 lbs, \$2 65; 22 do do, 901 lbs, \$2 70; 74 do do, 818 lbs, \$2 75; 84 do do, 864 lbs, \$2 75; 25 do do do, 837 lbs, \$2 75; 22 do do, 928 lbs, \$2 80. ST. LOUIS MARKET LETTER.

Not Enough to Go Round—Dealers Losing Money.

EAST ST. LOUIS, ILLINOIS, } Nov. 3, 1885. }
Regular Correspondence Texas Live Stock Journal.

Chicago, Kansas City and other points were flooded with stock the past week while "Poor Old St. Louis" was given the go by, so to speak, and at times did not have enough of a supply to make a market. It seems country shippers have got it in for us and we are getting it. "Getting it" is, not getting any stock. This is stating plain facts—the truth—which I deal in exclusively.

Offerings were comparatively small, and consisted mainly of mixed range stock, some Texas and some Indians; but mainly the latter, as the run of Texas cattle is about over for the season. Of course, some droves will be coming in right along, but not many. Prices are low down, and range from \$2 to 3 30 per 100 lbs, according to quality. Indians barely bring more, although there were some good heavy ones offered the past week. The demand from the different classes of buyers was by no means large, and sellers had to do a great deal of urging in order to effect transfers. Every body that had anything to do with cattle the past fortnight or so lost money, and heavily too. Yesterday offerings were small and chiefly of half breeds and Indians. Market slow and prices unchanged. To-day receipts moderate and market steady.

The hog market is slow and prices have come down; the range at present being from \$3 to \$3 50 per 100 lbs for common to good. Indian and Texas hogs scarce and the few that came in brought from \$3 25 to 3 50 per 100 lbs. They were choice corn fed. Grass hogs are not wanted.

A few car loads of Texas horses came in the past week and were slow of disposal at a range of from \$40 to 35 per head. Good Texas mares for breeding purposes are wanted at \$55 per head.

RATTLE.

CHICAGO MARKET LETTER.

Bright Prospects for Cattlemen—Undesirability of Booms—Cattle, Sheep and Horses.

UNION STOCK YARDS, CHICAGO, Nov. 2, 1885 }

The month of October showed some remarkable figures, not only in the cattle market, but in the hog trade. There were 188,000 more hogs received than last year, and the run was the largest on record for October. Cattle during the month arrived to the extent of 181,829 head, and the great bulk of the receipts consisted of Texas and far Western cattle. It was a red letter month for low prices. Losses to shippers were never greater and the whole trade was demoralized.

D. C. Wagner, who has just returned from a trip through Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota, says he never saw men so anxious to sell their stock. The late low prices so frightened them that many will cut loose all they can ship as soon as possible. They are waiting for the range cattle run to subside.

Men who bought stocks of cattle on the boom have been squirming badly, and are the ones in fact who have done about all the "able-bodied" kicking.

Prices have lately been very low, but they have been very much lower in the past. These bad downward movements in prices are only the direct, natural results of booms such as burst upon Texas in the spring of '83. Such movements make "oodles" of money for the fellows who sell out on the very top of the boom, but those who buy have to suffer and the general trade is injured more than benefited by these booms. The reason is clear enough. The booms last, perhaps a year or two, and the never failing depression which follows always lasts twice as long and the loss more than doubles the gain.

People are now feeling blue over the cattle outlook, but if the signs of the times are of any value, the trade is on a more solid basis than it has been in five years, and while there is not likely to be a repetition of the '83 boom—I sincerely hope for the permanent good of the trade there will not—the profits on legitimate beef raising, I feel confident, will increase the coming year.

Robert Strahorn and Horace Tucker of the Illinois Central railway and party have returned from their Texas and Mexican trip.

Mr. Ferris, the Chicago representative of the Missouri Pacific, says the sheepmen of the West will have to kick a good many years before they succeed in getting the roads to put on double deck. But this is mere talk. It depends altogether on how far the sheepmen kick. It is suggested that a way by which the sheepmen may make money and at the same time discipline the railroads is to pool their stock and resort to the drive.

The condition of the sheep market has not been very encouraging of late, especially for shippers who are compelled to use single decks.

Colder weather has had but little effect upon the woolen goods trade as yet, but people who have held off during the long warm fall are now scurrying to get winter goods.

Horses are selling low, in sympathy with everything else. Some Shetland ponies lately sold here at about \$125 per head. The demand is very limited.

The heavy draft horse business is not exactly being overdone, but there is sharp competition between breeders, who are now very numerous, and draft horse breeding is not now the bonanza it was a few years ago.

OUR ST. LOUIS LETTER.

As a Wool Market—The Sheep Market Will Not Justify Shipments.

St. Louis, Missouri, Nov. 2, 1895.

Regular Correspondence Texas Live Stock Journal.

Our receipts of wool are quite regular, running from 25,000 to 110,000 lbs per day. This is doing well considering the season is about over. The receipts of 1895 will double those of 1894. How is this for high? Our commission merchants started out at the beginning of the year to "boom" this city as a wool market and they have succeeded most admirably. Enough of success for one year and the good work has not fairly begun. Wait for next year's returns. The bulk of the receipts now coming in of fall clips and the quality not very good. Plenty of buyers are around, but they must go slow in their operations from the fact the wool markets of the world are not in the best of condition. In the East a determined effort is being made to down prices but so far it has not succeeded. Prices at this point did not fluctuate much, and the market may be called slow and prices unchanged. However, a large amount of wool changes hands daily. Common and inferior wools are dull. Good staple about steady.

Only those parties who had sheep on the market the past week can realize how dull the market has been and how demoralized prices are; values are still demoralized. All the eastern markets were again flooded with sheep and prices in New York are nearly as low as at this point. Sheep are quoted there at \$1.75 to \$3.25 per 100 lbs in extremes. This is nearly our range. While there is a difference of 1,500 miles between St. Louis and New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Illinois are crowding the markets with sheep with no apparent let up. Can it be possible that all the wool growers in the middle states are going out of the business? It looks that way. If I were a wool grower I would stick as the chances for better luck in the future are quite favorable to say the least. This bit of advice is tendered to the Texas stockmasters.

It is useless to give sales as the prices are so insignificant, the range being from \$1.30 to \$3.25 per 100 lbs, with the bulk of orders going at \$2.00 to \$2.50 per 100 lbs. Texas sheep sold at from \$1.50 to \$2.40 per 100 lbs.

The New Mexico Quarantine to be Continued.

SANTA FE, N. M., November 1.—The committee of the Stock Growers' association, appointed to call upon Governor Ross to present the views and memorials asking for a continuance of the quarantine to keep out Texas fever and pleuro-pneumonia, called on the Governor, and after lengthy discussion of the subject, that official stated that he had changed his views, and would continue the quarantine in force indefinitely. The Stock Growers' association will carefully and energetically look after all violations of the quarantine law, and funds are already being raised for that purpose.

Last week the cattle sold to the Kentucky Cattle company, of Blasco Canon, Crosby county, about 6000 head went forward. They were sold in lots of 400 to 2500 head by D. L. Middleton, John Merchant, Lark Hearn and others; very good ones and two, and passing inspection here before going on to delivery in the company's pasture in Crosby county.
