We could give a great many more careful experiments in proof of the economy of cooking, but this must suffice. 

No Small Potatoes.

Mr. W. W. Powell, who is out at Murphyville, Presidio county, Lin charge of the "Ranche Almyra" belonging to his brother, E. M. Powell of this city, just to show us that grass is not the only thing that grows in luxuriance and abundance out there, has sent us in a coloseal specimen of the Bermuda variety of sweet potatoe. It measures 14 inches long, 7 inches through and 22 inches around in the middle and weighs 121 pounds. How is that for West Texas? He says that it is merely a fair sample of the pile it was taken from, but he does not state whether he himself did any of the hoeing. He is an old agriculturalist and says most all kinds of crops can be succesfully raised in the rich valleys out there. Mr. Haley, whose ranch adjoins him, he reports as farming a large tract and quite successfully raising corn, oats, etc. in abundance and has a full supply of all kinds of vegetables for his use or to furnish to others all through the year. He speaks enthusiastically of the fine sheltered range through that country. The grass, he reports as in fine condition and says that no matter who goes short this winter, that they, out there, are solid and will have plenty, as the rains out there of six or seven weeks ago made. that all right and the grass having grown so fast and matured so rapidly, that the danger of frost coming and catching it "sappy," is removed. He states that the cattle on the range are rolling fat and in fine fix, and large shipments of fine cattle, to the markets of St. Louis and Chicago going on all the time; Murphyville being a ship. ping point of considerable importance. Debt Kills More Texas Cattle Investments Than Hard Times.

The principal fault that has led to troubles in connection with Texas investments has been the very common desire to acquire "the earth !" It has led to difficulties innumerable: it has amounted to a disease, a disease that is often incurable. As in New York City the animal can hardly be called "human" without \$100,000; so in Texas, men have been known to blush, when admitting their landed posessions to amount to less than 100,000 acres. A stock of cattle under 10,000 is admitted to be "small," and the ownership of less than a county overrun with sheep is hardly respectable. Men would almost rather own no land than a few thousand acres, and men who could have managed to carry a few hundred cattle properly, or derived good income from a few thou sand sheep have swamped themselves by acquiring the control of larger numbers. The disorder is too common, and many good men found, to use common parlance, that they bad "bit off more than they could chew." The disease has not been limited to old nor young, or rich or poor, neither has it been limited to individuals. Cattle companies have had it, and sheep companies all suffered severely and some succumbed to the malady.

The programme followed was to buy land part cash and pars on long time, and stock on comparatively short time; on long time interest at 10 per cent, on short time 12 to 18. This on investments requiring the use of working capital and run by men a little more inclined to be liberal than otherwise in their mode of life and general business transactions. Briefly speaking of such cases, the only chance of success was the maintenance of high values; a slight decline in beef, or nials of the most prominent men in sheep or wool caused embarrasement; a heavy decline meant absolute ruin.
