



In mule raising, the revenue is derived safely and surely, if the ranchman or farmer, does actually raise the mules, which he can do if he attends to business. A weanling mule is worth from \$25 to \$35, so is a threeyear-old beef steer, according to where

he is raised and his condition. A cow is worth \$16@\$20. A Texas common mare, is worth from \$16.00

\$25.00. With a good jack, and one hundred mares, to raise 75 mule colts; to be sold as yearlings at \$35.00 would furnish \$2,625 for profit and expenses. With 100 cows, to produce 90 yearings, at \$10.00 would bring \$900 for profit and expenses.

The same acreage and feed required for both. The investment would not differ many hundred dollars. With a good thoroughbred bull of any breed and graded cows, the profits might come nearer alike, but if all bred the same way, the calves would have to be sold at low figures. The calf, to find certain sale must be matured for the butcher. It takes three years. The mule can earn his living at two.
