About the Pioneer Association and its Officers.

The meeting of the Northwest Texas Cattle Raisers association to be held at Weatherford on March 9th, will be the ninth annual gathering of that SON, Importers & Breeders of French Draft Horses, have on hand a fine selection of Stallions & Marcs, full blood and high grade. kind had ever been in operation. For the year 1883 the protective and detective force caught for members of the association 550 head of cattle, and the entire expense for same year was

\$10,500.00. For the year 1884, the number of cattle caught was 853 head, and the entire expense for the year including several hundred dollars paid as rewards and attorney's fees was \$15,163.81. For the year 1885, 1,125 head of cat-

tle were caught belonging to members of the association, and the entire expense for same time was \$16,826.63. When it has been possible to do so cat-tle captured have been returned to the range where they belonged, all those captured in the markets and at shipping points remote from their accustomed ranges have been sold, and the proceeds placed to the credit of owners on the books of the association which can be seen at the annual meeting of each year, at which time settlements will be made with members. This is in obedience to orders and instructions of the executive committee.

The first year of the existance of the executive committee and protective and detective force was more an experiment than otherwise; at the close of that year and at the annual meeting of the association the executive committee made report to the association, recommending the plan as being the best means of protection to members of the Chester White. Identify the plan as being the best means of protection to members of the association, and recommended that the same be enlarged on, and that the service could be made much more effective by the prudent expenditure of more money. As the expense has been in

creased each year, the benefits have been correspondingly increased. The increase in the number of cattle caught each year is not chargeable to an increase in the number of thieves or depredators throughout the range country, but to the improvement in the service. Much time is required to organize a system of protection of this kind and get it to working successfully, and there is still great room for improve-

ment of the association. In several instances each year there has been a sufficient amount of money realized from the sale of cattle caught in the markets (to say nothing about the number returned to their ranges) to pay the assessment charged against the owner for one year, and leave a balance to his credit of from \$200 to \$400. Owing to hard times and a general depression of business among cattlemen the last year, some few, and but

few, members refused to pay the assessment charged to them for the year 1885; in most of these cases or at least in some of them sufficient cattle were caught in the markets and sold to satisfy the assessment and leave a balance to the credit of the members of from twenty-five dollars all the way up to two hundred dollars.

The association has made few changes in officers. The first president of the association, Colonel C. L. Carter, retired after seven years faithful service, and was succeeded by Colonel C. C. Slaughter, one of the charter members, and one of the most successful stockmen of the state. The secretary, James C. Loving, was elected to office in February 1877, and has been re-elected by unaniminous voice at each succeeding meeting; at the second annual meeting he had to assume the duties of treasurer, and in 1883 was chosen by the executive committee as secretary, and chief of the detective work, and has continued in office to this day. Mr. Loving accepted the position, knowing the responsibility and unpleasantness of the task. To him more than any one man is due the benefits of this association in its legitimate sphere of action. He has kept the association expenses down to the lowest limit to ensure proper protection from theft, has kept the work free from, troublesome litigation, has employed \$15.00. and discharged the working force; and

Sheep raisers ought to be grateful for one thing and that is that there is such a good demand for mutton. The demand is growing and the outlook for mutton raisers is very encouraging. Prices for mutton are higher than one year ago while prices for all other classes of live stock are lowets.

At the same time, between the refusal | in his country. of railroads to carry either live or dressed sheep at living rates, and the men who are monkeying with the tariff, and those who are inventing new material to take the place of wool, there is the most urgent need of sheep raisers watching their interests more closely than ever before.

The latest report of a stumbling block in the path of sheep raisers comes from France. A while ago it was stated that a Frenchman had discovered a new textile which was destined to take the place of wool, at least in large measure. The matter created quite a stir among wool growers who asked to have the authorities at Wash-

ington make an investigation.

Accordingly United States Consul Williams of Rouen, France, was re quested to make a complete investigation of the matter and report at his earliest convenience. His report has just arrived at the state department He says that the new textile is called Berandine, from the name of its inventor, a Maestricht workman named Berande. The French have made very glowing official reports. Mr. Williams says that in the opinion of experts who have since made careful examinations of this textile it is safe to say that it is not likely to take the place of wool, or even the poorest quality of waste wool or cotton. Its presence in a mixture of textile material increases the difficulty of spinning to such an extent that in no instance could it be spun fine. Its use in fabrics of mixed threads diminishes its value by imparting roughness and harshness to the touch. The consul thinks that while this textile may take a modest place hereafter, it is not at present calculated to diminish the price of wool. Berandine claimed by experts to be the direct product of certain peat grounds, and thus cheaper by far than any other known raw textile material. The consul draws the conclusion that the inferiority of the textile surpasses its cheapness, and thus places it low on the list of textiles But, of course, it is subject to improve ment by inventive skill, and may in the future be an important element.

Notwithstanding all of the drawbacks to the sheep trade it is in a very satisfactory condition.

It is only those who have failed to furnish water that have suffered losses, and they may yet learn that it is cheaper to sink wells and make tanks than to skin bogged and famished stock. It began raining Saturday night and has contined almost ever since, four days, with several good hard showers to make stock water. The grass can almost be seen growing, and no more propitious season was ever before the stock interests than the present one promises to

Several buyers are here, the most prominent of whom are Major Seth Mabry and Ike Pryor. Some trades have already transpired, which are noticed under their proper head, and the probabilities are that others will be consummated during the coming week. The rain will have the tendency to stiffen the holders, many of whom will drive themselves unless they can get what they ask. There is a tendency among the drovers to let yearlings alone, as the loss is too great, and twovear-olds are more in demand. Quotations based on actual transactions are \$8,00 for straight Texas lower country yearlings, and \$12,00 for two-year olds. Many ranchmen are not disposed to sell at those figures, asking a dollar more for yearlings, and two dollars more for two-year-olds.

Weekly Horse Trade.

The horse market has been somewhat more active for the past week than it has been for several weeks previous. Transactions have been mainly in cow ponies for the spring drive, with prospects for increased activity for several weeks to come. The supply is taken up as rapidly as they arrive if held at reasonable figures. Large numbers are en route some of which have already been contracted for. Sales of mares and mules were light, with light retail trade. The mare trade will follow close on the heels of saddle horse trade about the first of April. 





The Wool Trade.

exhibit any startling, features between now and May. There is a steady falling off in receipts at the great markets, sales decline in yolume and prices are generally kept dark by dealers. Quotations are about the same.

Eastern reports contain reference to the usual troubles-strikes, washouts, sariff, etc .- but nothing can disguise the fact that wool is in short supply as compared with previous years, and that business activity depends on greater selections. Foreign wool seems to largely of carpet wool.

Free Wool-Free Trade.

The Bulletin of the Philadelphia Textile Association, a paper in the interest of woolen manufacturers, publishes a list of the imports of raw material and manufactured goods to the United States from Bradford, England, the seat of worsted and silk manufactures. The list comprises camels hair, mohair, noils, manufactured goods, wool, woolen goods, worsted and mohair yarns. The Bulletin goes on to say that the showing is not a pleasing one to American manufacturers; stating also that although wool has advanced in price the manufactories have not been able to make corresponding advances in finished work, by reason of Bradford competition and from other foreign centers. The Bulletin says as follows:-

"But, while this table has anything out pleasant revelations for the manufacturer, it has also food for reflection on the part of the wool grower."

"We have declared before, that the latter was suffering more in consequence of the imports of wool in the form of goods, than from the imports of manufactured wool."

"This table shows an importation o wool from Bradford of 8,000,000 lbs. in sound numbers; but those familiar with the goods coming from the same source, will recognize in them wool to the amount of 18,000,000 lbs. at least. But the wool grower will tell us that 99,000,000 lbs. of the latter came in during the calendaryear of 1885. We grant it, but 75,-900,000 lbs. of this was carpet wool; a wool affecting the price of the Amerivan very little, if any. Only 24,000,000 lbs. of clothing and combing were imported: but in the form of goods, at least 40,000,000 lbs, came in.

We mention these facts, not to prove that the duties on wool are high enough to secure to the grower a sufficient renumeration for his laber, -we question very much that they are-but, to show him that he is wronging both himself and his best friend, the manufacturer, when he claims that the latter has a greater measure of protection than himself."

This is the fair way to put the matter, and it is the way sheep, raisers understand it. The writer in intimate acquaintance with many sheep growers and able to speak for hundreds more can say in good faith that they wish for no change in the duties on manufactured goods, and never advocate the policy of retaliation unless from fear of being overreached by the manufacturing interests in the advocacy of two poli enes, one for the manufacturer and one for the wool grower. The manufacmrer's papers talk fair, but cannot conwol the manufacturers. The Manufacmrer's association also talks fairly, but whenever the subject is up in congress some load talking "free lance" comes on advocating something the reverse of the "fair talk", and something the severse of protection for the wool grower, and the same proportionate protec-Biori for the manufacturer. Then those who are unable to obtain adequate probection for the wool grower are justifird in the supervision of a matter only pertially understood, on the ground that both the influstries should be metod the same measure.

The tariff tinkering, together with hard times generally, has about ruined one generation of wool-growers, who politically could not gain their ends. They found that for good they were not strong, they were unable to restore the miff of 1867, but they found how strong they could be to destroy all tar-Ms. This they are able to do without anything in the shape of organization. The wool growing interest-the same as a newspaper-may struggle very hard and fail of accomplishing any good, set is powerful for evil. The wool. growing interest of this section now asks for peace. Give us peace, but if our business is to be legislated away wiece by piece, we will cast it to the dogs, and with it the whole system that as a support to our prosperity is in constant sanger of being juggled away. The mool industry is not to be trifled with its present basis, and would prefer See trade and immediate ruin by a sudden collapse, to starving to death by lowering values each year.
