## SAN ANTONIO.

Don't be afraid to water your stock, as it will not decrease its value as it does that of corperation stocks.
BeEF cattle are worth now $\$ 2.10$ less per 100 lbs . than they were in 1884 , or a decrease of 40 per cent. Has there been a corresponding reduction to the consumer, and if not who gets this gain over what was then a good and sufficient profit?
A practical Texas ranchman gave it as his opinion that overstocking was the curse of Southwest Texas. When yearlings were sold it made not so much difference, but now that beeves have to be matured, it will be found to be good economy to have fewer cattle and fatter.

Now is the time for the wool buyers to work the undervaluation, ring waste, worsted importations and shoddy rackets, but our wool growers have heard the songs till they have lost all their charm, and it is either what they consider a fair price or consignment East that they demand.
What has become of the sub-committee of the refrigerator committee of the Texas Live Stock association that was assigned to the duty of canvassing Southwest Texas? It should be remembered that oarsmen that rest on their oars drift back to the place of starting, it not below.

The argument for the Houston refrigerator should not be based on jealousy of Chicago or any other point, but on practical business enterprise. Without Chicago what would have become of the ten thousands of immature and ragged cattle that necessity forced on the market? But if they can be shipped thousands of miles by rail to
an inland city and slaughtered and canned at a profit, why cannot they be shipped only hundreds of miles to a seaboard, where they have the ocean and the great markets of the world open to them, free from railroad exactions and monopoly? Every argument from a practical standpoint is in favor of a refrigerator on Texas tidewater, and Houston comes forward with the best offer, which should decide the matter as a starter. A successful refrigerator at Houston will force the establishment of others, and Chicago will soon be a market of the past as far as Texas is concerned, not from petty and unworthy jealousy, but for good practical buçiness reasons.
Col. T. H. Zanderson of this city, an extensive wool buyer, is in favor of a law requiring shoddy goods to be stamped as such. The oleomargarine bill is a fair precedent for such action but there are not so many wool growers as butter makers and consequently less influence to secure it.

The Pecan Trade.
The prospects for an early and large pecan trade at San António are very good at present. Already some 500 pounds have been received in this city, and indications are that fully 250,000 to 400,000 pounds will be shipped from this city during the season. Prices open at from 5 to $5 \frac{1}{2}$ cents per pound, but future prices will be largely governed by size and quality, and may reach 7 cents. The counpletion of the S. A. \&A. P. railroad to Kerrville will open a large territory to this market, trom which a very fine quality are usually shipped.

The San Antonio wool markes is as yet in an embryo state. The aggregate amount of wool now in store will reach about 2000 sacks, the great majority of which is yet in iucomplete clips. No new arrivals of buyers are noted since last report, leaving Mr. Hellemann alone and single-handed as

fully 2 cents apart. The failure of I. Efron \& Co of this city, among the largest wool buyers for several years past, will probably be used for bearing purposes, and may have the effect to delay the opening of the market a few days. The condition of the wool is about the average of fall clips, and the staple generally is good. In two weeks
the warehouses will be full, and some trading should have taken place.
At this date and under the present quiet state of things, it is impossible will be. men are indisposed to sell at the prices heretofore mentioned. The cheap feature of the cattle trade still exists in a certain way, without the demoralization ascribed to the market a month or two since. Quotations are impossible in the present stage of the market, and a few sales will have to be made before any figures can be ascertained. At present buyers and sellers are about two dollars apart.

Owing to special efforts of interested parties all over the North and West in spreading Texas fever reports duting the past summer, the trade of feeders next winter promises to be very light in the Southwest. Ranchmen, who are credited with good business foresight, are preparing to feed all stock large enough for beeves, and not depend on a market except in the stock yards in St. Louss and Chicago.

It seems to be the general impression that the interstate commerce commission gave an adverse decision to the petition of the Burton Stock Car company, asking to be relieved from discriminations and put on the same footing with other transportation companies. Such is not the fact, but for the present the effect is the same. The commission took the matter under advisement, leaving things in their present state.

Dr. W. K. Lewis of Colorado City writes: "Daring the past/summer I have made a series of experiments with the commonly called loco plant; the particular species was the astralagus mollimus, which is proved beyond a doubt to be a strong opiate, so much so as to render the present noxious plant very serviceable medicinally as a narcotic or anodyne. I have used the
tincture to substitute tincture of opium and continue to do so with very satis factory results.

The vessel that recently loaded at Galveston with 1500 dressed beeves from the Columbus refrigerator and destined for Liverpool, finished out its cargo with cottonseed oil cakes. It is domestic extravagance to send half fat beeves to England and cottonseed oil cake to fatten their domestic animals to enter the market in competition with our own. An embargo should be placed on the export of a single pound. We have cattle enough to eat every ounce of cottonseed, and cottonseed oil cake produced in Texas, and could save at least 25 per cent. by feeding it.

Every quarantine proclamation and Texas fever racket tends to stimulate our stockmon to renewed efforts towards securing entire independence of all Northern markets, until you can find many of our largest and most enterprising ranchmen, who consider that the closing of all Northern markets would be a godsend to the industry in Texas. We would then slaughter our own beeves and sell them in the European markets from vessels loading on our own coast, and thus divide the enormous profits that the Northern men have been making off us these many years back.

Another fright about Texas fever turns out to be a false alarm. We take
from the Denver Range Journal the following report of the case :
"Last May James A. Hutchings and F. C. Long purchased, near Muskogee, I. T., a small herd of cattle, and brough them up here to feed. Three or four persons lost cows that had passed over the trail of these cattle, and the symptoms being somewhat similar to the Texas fever, Daniel Hart had Hutchings and Long arrested. The trial lasted two days and was quite exciting. Over fifty witnesses were in attendance, and seven lawyers took part. The jury was out about five minutes and brought in a ver
dict of "not guilty." The State sanitar dict of "not guilty." The State sanitary commission's chairman came down, and cattle sound.'

## Saving Time.

As showing that the railroads are commencing to appreciate the live stock business at its real worth, we are glad to note that the Missouri Pacific railroad is watching every corner and not only furnishing reports of runs, but of transfers also. The time consumed in transferring stock from Twentysecond street, St. Louis, to the National stock yards, Ill., in the month of August averaged 1 hour and 16 min 7 tes, and the least time was 40 minutes. There were 98 runs. The transfers from Lesperance street to the National yards consisted of 26 runs. The leas time consumed was one hour and the average time was 1 hour and 35 min utes. The transfers to the Union yards from Twenty-second street amounted to 41 runs and the average time consumed was 48 minutes, the least time being 20 minutes. Stockmen who have known of delays without number between St. Louis and East St. Louis will be glad to learn that the railroad authorities are doing their level best to keep the movement uniform and to insure speed in transit and prompt delivery.

Fleming's sister went to the door and was shot and killed Johinson fled, but was captured in At anta and while on his way back to Leeds, in charge of officers, was hung by a mob who boarded the train ana took him from the guard.
The gulf Tuesday, the third and worst day of the storm, was high, but no damage was done at Galveston. Just at sundown when the gale was blowing furiously, a small, three-mast schooner could be seen with a strong glass from the piazza of the Beach
hotel, struggling in the billows about four miles from shore. Texas stockmen intending to move their herds into the territory will do well to look at both sides of the question before making a move.
