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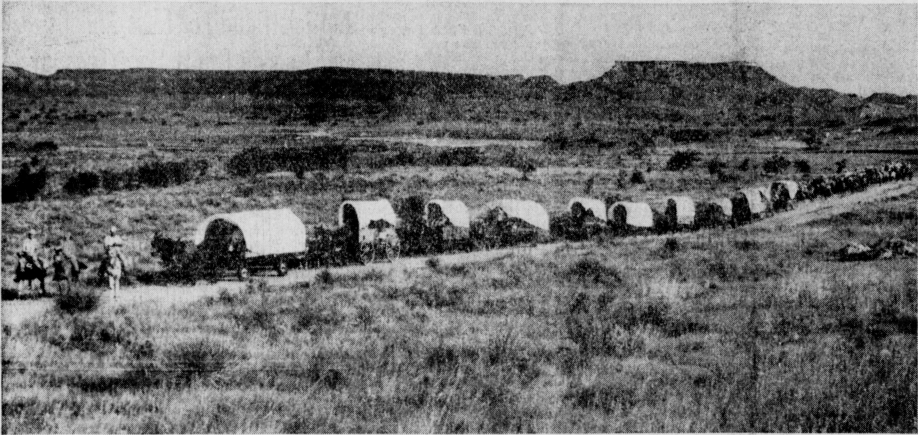

## Celebration Expanded to Four Days

### Elaborate Shindig To Include Friday; More Events Planned

Muleshoe's big Fourth of July has expanded into a four-day event, it was announced Saturday by Vic Benedict, general chairman of the big shindig.

"We just had too many events scheduled to crowd it into a three-day affair," Benedict explained. "So we're starting it Friday and will run the show through Monday evening."

Benedict heads the Chamber of Commerce committee which is sponsoring the affair.

As planned now, the celebration will get under way Friday afternoon, July 2 when members of the Bailey County Historical Survey committee will dedicate a historical marker. A plaque is to be mounted to the old Muleshoe Ranch cookhouse, three miles west of Muleshoe on FM 1766. Cecil Davis heads the society here.

The old cookhouse was recently designated a state historical site. Vera Engeling heads the dedication committee.

The dedication services will be followed by the first gathering of pioneers and old settlers who will start registering at a downtown location to be named later.

The registration will be followed by a hospitality time for the pioneers.

Actually the entire day will be devoted to celebration activities; starting at 10 o'clock coffee stops will be set up at all five highway entrances to Muleshoe. City, county and DPS officers will be asked to help in

stopping passing travelers and welcoming them to Muleshoe. The Rotary club, and Future Homemakers of America will serve as hosts to "extend a warm welcome to Muleshoe."

Another big moment comes at 2:30 p.m. Saturday when a huge parade, billed as the biggest ever staged in Muleshoe, will take place. Featured will be mules and mule-drawn wagons, along with modern transportation.

Antique cars, marching units, floats, novelties, police and fire vehicles and old-time farm machinery will be seen in the parade. Sponsors hope to find an early-day steam tractor or two to join the parade.

First performance of the junior rodeo is slated for 4 p.m. at the new Muleshoe Roping club's arena east of town.

Then a big buffalo and beef barbecue is slated for 7 p.m. in the lots south of the high school stadium. The barbecue will be served by the Jaycees and Jayceeettes.

Continuous entertainment, meantime, is being planned at See Celebration, Page Eight

## Ladd's Boys Supply Drinking Water

Bailey county fire department played two major roles in the Hale Center tornado disaster - it provided electricity for the emergency headquarters, and the pumping power for water to the hospital, but their over-all role included many other services ranging all the way from errand-running to rescue operations.

"It was one big mess," Earl Ladd, chief, summed up Friday, still bleary-eyed from the grueling experience of 14 hours of continuous duty at the storm-torn city 60 miles east of here.

But the chief was high in his praise for the cooperation given and for the "immediate aid which Civil Defense units, police, industry - everybody gave after the storm struck."

And on top of all that, the department had to hurry home for possible duty here: the Muleshoe area itself was under a storm alert Thursday afternoon. Accordingly, an emergency coordinating board was set up here.

"We learned a lot," the chief said, "and got a lot of good experience which will stand us in good stead if ever such a tragedy strikes in this area." The organization meeting Thursday night was attended by the mayor, county judge, city manager, sheriff, DPS, chief of police and fire chief.

### 3 Scholarships Given By Bank

### Farm Limits Basic, Tulia Editor Says

An "absolutely free" agriculture is preposterous," Tulia Herald Publisher H. M. Baggarley said Thursday night, told the Bailey County Farmers Union here Thursday night.

The session was held in Muleshoe State Bank community room.

"We had an absolutely free agriculture back in the Roaring 20's," he said, "and the farmer was at the very bottom of the totum pole while everybody else was prosperous. Wheat was 20 cents a bushel, for example."

The widely-quoted Tulia newsman traced the history of agriculture from the 20's through the Roosevelt days and present farm program.

"The farmer today is not in a good way," he said, "He is definitely a minority group, and his voice in agriculture is indeed weak. Even some organizations that pretend to speak for the farmer are adding their voices to the battle to eliminate farm controls of all kinds. That would mean a return to the sort of farm economy which we had in the 20's."

### Maybe It's Auto Age, But Horses Still Popular!

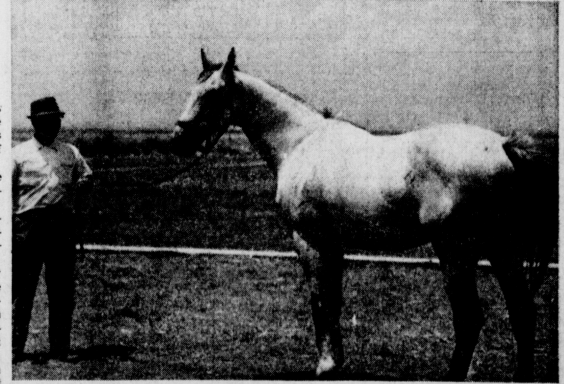
Gray Flyer, whose bloodlines are more impressive than those of the Mayflower descendants, is roaring the sandhills east of Muleshoe these days.

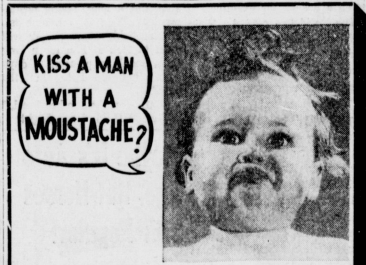

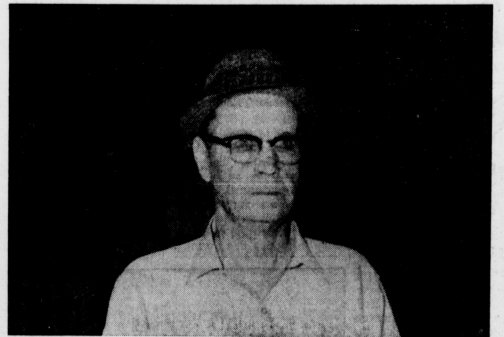

"There are those who say that agriculture should be on a voluntary basis also, like industry. We know from experience that such a plan will not work; the farmer would be back in the same position as he was in the '20's. He would overproduce cotton this year, wheat next year, and so on, and in every case, the bottom would fall out of the market for that particular crop."

Of the farmer's position today, he pointed to the big cities as "clamoring for reduction of the farm subsidy and for the abolishment of the farm control program entirely."

He added: "There are many today who think that the farmer is responsible for the high price of food, and that the subsidy program should be eliminated to reduce food costs. Such thinking is false. While the farmer would receive much less for his food, the cost to the consumer would be little if any lower than today."

He also charged that "corporate farming which would reduce the number of farmers (as advocated by some organizations) in the nation to 1 million, would not increase farm efficiency. And it would mean the absolute destruction of such towns as Tulia, Muleshoe and Friona. Once the family farmer has been eliminated, the entire economy of farm towns like these would fold up permanently."

got there was to report to the coordinating officer. Mayor Willie Dyer who, himself, was in a state of shock; he had just lost his business, a drugstore.

"They were trying to operate the coordinating office in the WOW hall by the light of one little bulb; first thing we did was haul out our emergency generator and provide ample lighting for the entire building. Then we reported to the fire chief and told him we had 800 gallons of water available if they needed it. Fortunately, there were no fires, however.

"So, from then until daylight, we ran errands - lots of them. Mostly we took food to the schools where an emergency center had been set up. As soon as it got light, we joined in the rescue work. Supposedly a young girl was missing in a trailer house, so we made a thorough search for the girl. However, she had escaped. We did, however, have one odd experience: We turned over a bathtub in a wrecked residence and found a kitten under the tub, unscratched and very much alive. She evidently hadn't lost more than one or two of her nine lives."

"After we had determined that the girl was caught in the debris, we reported back to the chief and were told that the hospital was running out of water. A Plainview business had sent down three tank trucks of treated water, so we hooked our pumps to the tank trucks and then to the hospital water system and provided pressure water for the hospital's use until the city service was restored at about 1:30 Thursday afternoon.

"I figure the hospital must have used between 3000 and 35

00 gallons of water during the time we did the pumping. Their equipment uses a lot of water.

The chief was high in his praise of volunteers. "There was no panic, but the local people, many of them, were in a state of shock. There was some looting by outsiders, but it was minor. A fully-trained Civil Defense unit from Amarillo and another from Canyon were of great help. And industry sent in all kinds of heavy equipment. I've never seen industry rally to quickly and so thoroughly to aid a stricken town. There were PayLoaders, truck, bulldozers - everything needed."

Singleton Funeral Home of Muleshoe sent an ambulance to aid with taking injured people to hospitals.

Chief Ladd says it will be several days before the clean-up work can be completed. "Of course the collapse of the city hall handicapped work by the Hale Center department," Ladd explained. "Hale Center lost all three of its fire trucks in the tornado.

"Of the storm itself, Ladd decried the damage as "extensive, but to say the least." He said the tornado cut a strip all the way across town, and he estimates that half of the business section, was a total loss. "And many other buildings in the business district also were damaged."

He said that between 200 and 250 residences would be written off as a total loss, and many others were damaged.

Among those who suffered heavy loss were Mr. and Mrs. E. T. Harrison who lost a large grocery store which also included living quarters. They were in the cellar at the time, so were uninjured. Mrs. Harrison is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Carter, Muleshoe. This was the second time they had suffered loss; in Plainview two years ago a grocery they owned was destroyed by fire.

Flyer, who stands 16.1 hands tall, all is by Airborne, by Thoroughbred, People want his bloodlines even in rodeo horses."

"So horse racing will continue to be a major entertainment source," he concludes.

Incidentally he points out that the word Thoroughbred is strictly the name of a breed of horses; there can be no Thoroughbred pigs, for instance.

Kerr's stallion qualified and ran in the \$100,000 stake races. Now, at 10, he's used exclusively for breeding purposes, but apparently he has the same prepotency as his ancestors - his colts are top colts, and one of his offspring is in training in Juarez. That son, incidentally, is considered one of the finest 2-year-olds in the racing business.

Kerr, who came originally from Illinois, has always been interested in fine horseflesh. He started riding for pay when he was only 12 years old, and the racing blood fever somehow got tangled up permanently in his system; he still loves good horses the races. Of course professional racing was short-lived for Kerr; by the time he was 16, he was too heavy for the sport of kings. "And that day," he admits dolefully, "was one of the saddest days in my life, the day I got too heavy to ride."

Kerr says that this may be the automobile age, but horses were never more popular. "The racing industry as a whole is growing throughout the country," he claims, "and more people are owning - or wanting to own - horses today than ever before."

He points out that there are 50 percent more horses in Bailey and Parmer counties today than there were five years ago, adding that there would be more if Texas permitted parimutuel betting.

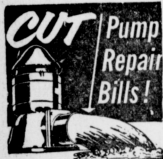
Final event of the big four-day celebration will come late Monday night, July 5, when the fire department again presents a mammoth fireworks display.

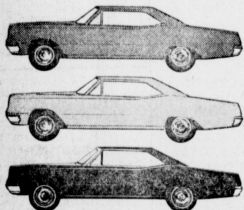
