Country roads are bad in Illinois and the pastures in some cases are so soft that farmers are unwilling to turn stock into them.
The demand for young cattle to feed is very strong.
The sheep market is all right. Prices are booming. The opinion of many good sheepmen now is that prices for sheep must remain good for at least a couple of years yet. The breeding stock is not plenty and most of the wether flocks have been cut down to yearlings or at least twos.
The conflct between the city and state authorities over the disposition of lump-jawed cattle continues and every animal in the least degree affected is condemned. There is a good deal of professional jealousy between the inspectors, and they say some pretty hard things about each other. Disinterested persons ars disposed to believe that in such cases both sides tell the truth.

The death of Val B. Dickey in this city at the age of thirty-five was another example of overwork and exposure on the cattle range.
Cattle exporters are again moving freely and are buying more cattle than usual at this season.
The market last week declined 25 c in the middle but recovered later, and this week opened with the decline regained, prices being fully as high as one week ago.
Hogs hold their own well, and to-day sold at $\$ 4.20 @ 4.50$, or the top of the season, being the highest since July. Sheep booming. Muttons, \$5@6.25 corn-fed Westerns, $\$ 5 \cdot 40 @ 5.95$; lambs, \$5.50@7.

Let the corn crop be carefully preserved as food for

May.
The following is recommended by the Live Stock and Western Farm Journal: Take soft soap 2 pounds, palm oil 1 pound, cruce carbolic acid 1 pint, Amer2 gallons of water. Apply by parting wool and pour along the back from the spout of a sprinkling can.
There is no other domestic animal so sensitive to the abuse of man as the pregnant Merino ewe. When she is
half starved she has no flow of milk, half starved she has no flow of milk,
and her maternal instinct dies. The meanness of her owner is reflected and magnified in her unnatural behavior toward her offspring.
The Homestead:-The most frequent causes of disease in the flock are over-
feeding, underfeeding, icregularity of feeding, want of water, drinking impure water, impure air, dampness and
overdriving there would be but little complaint of the frequent troubles, difficulties and losses in keeping sheep.
The ewe of the mutton breeds will endure scant feeding during pregnancy and lactation better than the Merino ewe. Let the shepherd never forget that the paramount function of the latter is woolbearing; and that if only half fed nature will rob the lamb to reed the fleece. if there is any surplus she will bestow it on the milk.
Stock Grower:-Mr. J. H. Hayward of Denver has just returned from the San Mateo country, in Western New Mexico, where he had been to buy sheep for a Denver party. He desired to obtain abot 3000 head, but could get them for nothing less than three dollars. He offered three dollars for a thousand head-the pick of the fock, but was re fused. He came home without sheep.
The Homestead:-Do not overstock
the sheep pasture. It not only causes scarcity of pasture and a deficient sup-
ply of nutriment, but it also causes the sheep to take up much sand and earth into their stomachs with their food, which gives them an unthrifty appeardeath. well. If the pasture is not closely cropped, the herbage becomes hard, unpalatable and indigestible, and sheep do not thrive. 'Twenty-four hours' gras for a sheep and eight days' grass for a steer."
Joseph Field of Lampasas sends the following to the American Wool Reporter: The sheep in this part of the state are in better condition than I have year, for the simple reason that we have had scarcely a cold day the whole winter to daté. Grass is as green now as it usually is the latter part of March, and owing to the immense crops raised here last year, sheepmen have fed heavier than common, hence the good condition of the sheep. The percentage of ewes bred last fall was much larger than for the past two or three years. The high prices paid for our spring,clip, and the supposition that the tariff agitation was over, led most growers to breed all their ewes, and then the farmers, of whom a
great many bought small (from 50 to 200 great many bought small (rrom 50 to 200
or 300 ) flocks of ewes, all of which they bred, will, with good weather during March for lambing, make a large in crease percentage of lambs this year
We usually raise lambs dropped, which is about 75 per cent. of ewes bred. There is a good demand at present for feeders on a basis of $\$ 2$ per head after shearing. For the past two or three years up to last spring excepting good muttons, which are al ways salable; but since then there has been considerable inquiry for sheep of all kinds, which fact is entirely due to the 22 and 23 c paid for our wool last spring.

Several large ranchmen in Southwest Texas are contemplating the cutting up of their pastures into farms, and selling off to small tillers of the soil, reserving enough to carry on stock farming on an improved scale. This disposition on their part is one of the most encouraging signs of the coming prosperous condition of Texas. Less and more valuable land, is the proper element of wealth and strength.
To the contrary belief notwithstanding, our Mexican cousins are not so slow as some think. They "catch on" to anything that accrues to their benefit with wonderful ease. The latest proof of their civilization is the quarantine racket of the Northwestern cattle inspector. A scare was gotten up in the City of Mexico against American hogs, and a
quarantine was established, which was ostensibly revoked, but the inspector on the frontier gets in his work on inspection fees just the "same like Melican man" of New Mexico and other fly quarantine inspection agents.
As the Stock Journal predicted at the time of the appointment of Captain McNeel , as commander of a ranger force for the country Southwest of San Antonio, it has already resulted in much good to the stock interests. Captain McNeel, following clews, went to the Eastern cotton states, where he has succeeded in finding many horses that have been stolen from the ranches and shiped direct without passing through the San Antonio market. Some startling arrests may be looked for soon, in which the names of "highly connected"' parties may figure. Forbearance has ceased to be a virtue.

## Union Stock Yards of San Antonio.

For some time past negotiations hav been pending looking towards a combination of the scattered live stock inter ests, and the establishment of union yards, and at last it has so far succeeded as to the joining of the forces interested in the San Antonio stock yards and Dr. Amos Graves, and the organization of the Union Stock Yards company. The grounds selected are at the crossing of the Sunset and the I. \& G. N. railways southwest of this city, and comprise some fifty acres. Work is already progressing clearing the ground, preparatory to building the pens and necessary buildings. The new company includes all the members of the former stock yards company and others, and the business of the San Antonio stock yards will be transferred to the union yards as soon as completed. This is probably one of the strongest combinations of practical stockmen and dealers that could possibly be made in this section of country, and its success is considered preordained.

Gould's Private Wild West Show. Jay Gould and party, who have been making quite a tour through Mexico, returned via Eagle Pass, arriving in San Antonio on Saturday, April 5. After riding about the old city and noting the extensive changes in progress, it was his intention to have left on Sunday, but those live and enterprising horse dealers, J. E. Price and Thos. H. Gilroy, with blandishments so well used on horse buyers, induced the party to lay over another day in order to witness an impromptu Wild West show at the Traders' National Stock Yards. Ac cordingly, on Monday morning the party, including Miss Gould, took seats on the gallery of the second story of the office of the stock yards, where some of the most expert cowboys and breakneck riders, including Dave Allen, the pock-marked negro who rides without saddle or bridle anything with hair on, rode wild mules and horses, and threw the rope in every conceivable manner, to the great edification of the distinguished party and the especial delight of Miss Gould, who seemed to enter heartily into the spirit of the exciting scenes. All expressed themselvès greatly pleased and well paid for the delay of 24 hours, which means much to a man whose time is as valuable as that of Jay Gould. Although these scenes

Men who represent a credlt of $\$ 300,000,000$ are able to help themselves, and can, if they only will, wield a power vastly greater than that of the so-called "Big Four." If we submit to having our market controlled by men who represent less than one-tenth of the credit which we do, the fault is ours,-and let us not stultify ourselves by making any more complaints.

## A Great and Serious Crisis

is already at hand. The Indian Territory is being closed against us, and the market for our young cattle is being shut off. Added to this, the quarantine regulations bear more and more heavily upon us, and the time is perhaps near at hand when we shall have no market worth having, unless we provide it ourselves. It is only a question of time: and the longer we wait the more seriously we may expect to be crippled.

We are informed that a definite, practical and well-digested plan will be presented to the convention, by men interested in making it a permanent success, and that it does not require the stockman to do more than should reasonably be expected of him. in view of all the circumstances of the case.

We earnestly hope the convention will be largely attended and that such action will be taken as will restore our great industry to its former prosperity.

freights are possible, which is only to be at a seaport. The transportation of live stock enters very largely in determining the profits of the business, and the closer the market the better it is for the producer. There is no good reason why a very large portion of the stock of Texas should go beyond 200 miles or a twelvehours run to market. This desirable end can be attained by getting deep water at Aransas Pass and establishing refrigerators, and then you are practically as near to the Atlantic city and European markets as is Chicago, and much nearer to the New Orleans, Havana and other Southwesrern markets. It is worth the effort, and it is to be hoped that the Corpus Christi meeting will be attended by the practical stockmen of the entire state.

w. Horr, Wellington, the following recol of 1 , O., reports Daw, which won the milk test for quantity at the Ohio state fair of 1889 . Mar jorie Daw calved March 5th, 1889, and gave in the month of May 2200 1bs io oz of milk; best day 74 lbs 7 oz . With no better feed than the other members of the dairy to which she belongs received, she gave in the ten months ending with January 5 th, $1890,15,232$ lbs 7 oz of milk, an average of a trifle over 50 lbs each day. This record is quite remarkable in view of the fact that Marjorie Daw is due to calve March 17th, 1890. In less than six consecutive years this model dairy cow has given 74,28 I lbs $\mathrm{I}_{3}$ oz of milk, or, with milk at even the present low factory prices, has given $\$ 742.81$ worth of milk. When to this sum the value of her six calves are added it will be seen that she is rather a profitable cow to own. This record may be said to be characteristic of the Bawndale dairy. The cows most valuable to dath breeder and dairyman are those which year in and year out make large but phenomerial milk flows.

## NORTHERN CATTLE.

The result of the Winter Weather in the Manitoba Country.
A telegram from Calgary, Monitoba, dated April 3, says: Though the winter at Calgary has beaten her record for long and severe cold and snow, the ranchmen's losses will not, except with a very wet, cold spring, be serious. From this town south to the High river, there was, up to the middle of last week, fully tw7 feet of snow all over, but as the cattle drifted back into the foral hinsw fall may prove a matter of congratulation, and holding out proimises, as it does, of a good crop and plenty of hay for the ensuing season. The fact that for the ensuing season. the fact that they are at the present time gathering shows that cattle, as a whole, through the country where they are working for a large supply, between North Fork, Sheep creek and the High river, to within fifteen miles of McLeod crossing, have come through well. Should the spring open up unfavorably, it is expected that there will be considerable losses amongst these, though on the other hand a good spring wirl undoubtedty help an but the worst through successfully. pects. Three years ago this same Pincher Creek county was buried in snow Sheep creek is now in the same condition, being then entirely free. Altogether this winter goes far to prove the statement made by an old Westerner, after years of experience? "The longer I live here the less I can tell you. I never saw two winters alike, and Inever saw two consecutive winters strike in the same place."

A Mare Needs Attention.
Spirit of the Times.
The mare will generally receive the horse some time between the seventh and twelfth days after foaling, and it is important to attend to that, as she does not remain in season long when suckling, and it is more safe ta conceive at that period than at any other time. While suckling, the mare should do no hard work, and if she is taken off he pasture at all she should be well fed at very short intervals, and the foal fed with her and allowed to suck very often. The mare has no large, retentive udder like the cow, no capacious stomach to hold a day's supply af food, no power at any time to go without food safely, so that when she has to eat and digest for two, all her wants should be very liberally and very frequently supplied. It is in every way better to leave her for the first few months in a good pasture to attend to her own requirements. The foal can be weaned at four months old but it will tell against its growth and size, so that, unless it is a pony that you want to keep small, it is better not
weaned until six months old weaned until six months old.

## FORT WORTH.

The readers of the Stock Journal who can spare the time (and it will be time well spent), should prepare to attend the meeting at Corpus Christi and back up the refrigerator enterprise Work, not talk, counts.

A JUST estimate of the value of refrigerating plants in Texas will lead cattlemen and those interested in the cattle industry to attend the meeting at Corpus Christi on the 30th of this month. We are in the bog-hole, and we need to be pulled out.

Next week the Stock Journal will publish the prospectus of the Hammond Refrigerating company, to show what profits there are in the refrigerating business. It shows a profit of 6 per cent. on $\$ 1,700,000$ mortgage debentures; 8 per cent. on $\$ 1,700,000$ preference shares; and 16 per cent. on $\$ 2,350,000$
ordinary shares being an average profit of nearly 12 per cent. on a capital stock of $\$ 5,750,000$. In addition to these profits, there is shown a surplus. of \$70,000.

Now why can't Texas reap a share of these profits by doing its own refrigerating?
Attend the rineeting at Corpus Christi for the benefit of Texas stockmen.

## THE REFRIGERATORS.

The Representatives of Cattlemen Meet and Proceed to Organize.
The committee appointed by the Cattlemen's convention to investigate the refrigerator plants in Texas and to examine their contract with an English syndicate for 150,000 dressed beef carcases annually, with a privilege increase the same, together with a committee of twenty-three appointed by the first named committee, met at the Pickwick hotel Thursday for the purpose of taking final action on the proposition to start up the refrigerators in Texas.
There were present at the meeting the following gentlemen: H. B. Sto̊ddard of Bryan, Charles Goodnight of Goodnight, Ike T. Pryor of Austin, J. M. Mathis of Goliad, J. H. P. Davis of Richmond, R. E. Stafford of Columbus, H. M. Ehrenwerth of Columbus, G. A. Levi of Victoria, R. E. Maddox of Fort Worth, A. L. Matlock of Texline, S. B. Burnett of Fort Worth, T. T. D. Andrews of Fort Worth, A. P. Bush, jr., (by proxy) of Colorado City, A. J. Dull of Philadelphia and E. J. Sandmeyer of Columbus.
A temporary organization was effected by the election of H. B. Stoddard as chairman and E. J. Sandmeyer as secretary.
Committees were appointed on charters, by-laws and prospectus, and one to confer with representatives of New Orleans, Galveston and other cities interested in the location of a cooling house. The question of refrigerators was fully discussed and the determination arrived at that they were the only solution of the beet cattle problem. The labor of the meeting was not concluded on Thursday and an adjournment was had until Friday morning at 9 o'clock.
At the meeting Friday good progress
was made, and while full proceedings could not be had, the meeting being held with closed doors, enough was learned for all purposes. It was decided to organize a company with a capital of $\infty$, which will include Columbus, with the headquarters of the company at Fort Worth.
The Dahlman refrigerator at Fort Worth will not be used, but a new one will be built with a capacity of 500 beeves per day
Chas. Goodnight will be president of the company, and the books will be open for subscription as soon as the charter has been filed at Austin, which will be in a few days.
The good work has commenced in earnest, and it will not be finished until Texas will afford her own market for her own cattle. The cattlemen mean business, and a good work has been done by the committee, which was composed of level-headed business men. The new refrigerator will be located at the Union Stock Yards, and work on it will commence in a short time. The parties proposing to build it are men of big capital, and will lease it to the company to be formed, on a basis of 6 per cent. on the capital invested in it.

A marked improvement in the tone of this market has taken place within the past week, and it is steady and firm today, with fair inquiry from both Eastern and domestic buyers. In fact indications at present warrant the opinion that it will be quite active for the remainder of the present season. The receipts of the spring clip, with the exseption of one small lot, have been sold up to to-day's quotations, which are as follows:

Twelve months scoured, XX, 52@54c; do. X, 48@52c; do. No. I, 45 @ 47 c ; eight months scoured, XX , 50@52c; do. X, 47@49c; do. No. I, 44@ 46c. Fall scoured, XX, 45@47c; do. X, $43 @ 44 \mathrm{c}$; do. No. I, 40@42c.
The receipts of this port for to-day amount to 3910 pounds, and for the week ending to-day at 4 o'clock' p. m. foot up to 22,092 pounds. The receipts of the season amount to $5,812,928$ pounds, against $4,874,917$ pounds for the year previous at this date, therefore showing a gain for this year so far over the season of 1888 and 1889 of 938 ,oII pounds.
The sales and shipments for the past seven days amount to 15,330 pounds, and for the season show a grand total of $8,601,335$ pounds, against $8,06 \mathrm{r}, 043$ pounds last year at this time, therefore leaving a balance in favor of this year of 540,292 pounds. The reports to-day show a stock on hand of 351,665 pounds against 73,882 pounds at this date last year.

## Prices Advancing.

The Stock Grower is glad to be able to announce that the long-looked for advance in cattle prices is beginning to be apparent. The activity in trading for wethers is to be followed by an increased demand for steers.
The southern part of the territory is just now full of steer buyers, who for the past thirty days have been snapping Mip every bargain in sight. All winter train after train has been shipped from Southern New Mexico and Arizona, and now the report comes from below that that section is pretty well cleaned out of old steers.
The northern half of the territory has done but little yet in the steer-trading line, and we can now see the disadvantage that this portion of New Mexico labors under. Those of the south are not dependent on the summer grass to round up, and therefore can deliver so much earlier than the cattlemen of the north. The winter has been so open that the stockmen of Grant and Dona Ana counties have been able to gather and ship at any time. The buyers all want the steers early, the earlier the
better.
Arizona has been visited by California buyers, who have taken considerable
stock westward, and it is safe to say the stock of aged steers in that territory is getting low. Southern New Mexico is about in the same fix, and so the northern sellers can expect a lively demand shortly.

Early grass is what we want now, so that the round-ups can get to work and the steers be gathered in time to suit the buyers.
