### GAIN IN AGRICULTURAL POPU-LATION.

The published report of the census of Texas shows an increase in ten years of 813,187, a gain of 36.3 per cent, one of the largest increases made among the states. This increase has been, comparatively speaking, almost wholly confined to the country districts. Few if any of the towns of the state showed an increase in population at all commensurate with the gains recorded in the country. Only 67 towns in the state are reported as having a population of more than 2000 and less than 25,000, while San Antonio, Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and Galveston are the only cities having
