THE TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF CATTLE RAISERS

Great Gathering of the Stockmen of the Southwest at San Antonio for the Silver Jubilee of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association— Business Dispatched Rapidly.

FORT WORTH CHOSEN AS NEXT MEETING PLACE

El Paso put Up Good Fight but was Defeated—Volume of Trading Was Small—Buyers and Sellers Could Not Agree on Prices Although There Was No Lack of Cattle for Sale—Entertainment of the Cowmen.

The twenty-fifth annual session of the Texas Cattle Raisers' association which was held in San Antonio last week was, in point of attendance, one of the greatest meetings ever held by the organization. The cattlemen from every section of Texas were there as were likewise those of the Indian Territory and Oklahoma while New Mexico, Kansas and Missouri were also well represented. All the big markets had special delegations on the ground. The people of San Antonio fully redeemed their pledge to give the cowmen an enjoyable time during their visit. Entertainments of various sorts, including an artillery drill at the government post, a Mexican supper, and a dance were provided, and the visitors were made to feel that every courtesy could be extended by the city as theirs.

The business sessions of the convention were brief but full of work. There were no unnecessary delays or long-drawn-out discussions over any question. The cattlemen knew what they were there for and they took action without waste of words or time. About noon on Wednesday, the second day of the convention, the last business session was concluded.

The convention elected the following officers for the ensuing year: President, Murdo McKenzie; First Vice President, W. W. Turney of El Paso.

Second vice president, John T. Lytle of San Antonio. Secretary, J. C. Loving of Fort Worth. Treasurer, S. B. Burnett of Fort Worth.

After a close contest between Fort Worth and El Paso the former was chosen as the place of meeting. Resolutions were adopted:

Urging the passage of the Davidson live stock sanitary commission bill. Commending the state ranger service and recommending its continuance.

Urging the legislature to pass the maximum rate bill. Recommending the passage of bills pending in the legislature making changes in the brand regulations for Texas.

Calling on congress to provide an additional assistant in the department of agriculture who shall have immediate charge of affairs pertaining to the live stock industry.

Commending the faithful service of Secretary J. C. Loving and expressing sorrow that he was prevented by illness from attending the convention.

Extending sympathy to Eli Titus, live stock agent of the Santa Fe railroad, who was reported ill.

Expressing appreciation for the work done by the National Live Stock association.

Urging the passage of the mineral survey bill.

The convention brought to San Antonio scores of men who had come to sell and the buyers were also on hand but the amount of trading which took place was very small. A few trades were made but buyers and sellers in the main failed to agree on prices. Cattlemen demanded from \$2 to \$3 more per head than the buyers would pay, though the prices asked were somewhat lower than were paid for cattle of the same grade last year. Many of the cowmen became convinced that Northwestern buyers were in a combine to keep down prices and they went home determined to hold their cattle for another year. In the few trades made prices were in many cases withheld, one party or the other objecting to their being given out.

THE PROCEEDINGS. President R. J. Kieberg presided during the first day's session of the convention which met at the Empire Hotel. In the absence of Secretary Loving, who was ill, Assistant Secretary Colson acted as secretary.

Rev. J. A. Harris, pastor of the First Baptist church of San Antonio, opened the session with a very impressive prayer.

Mayor Hicks being out of the city on account of ill health the address of welcome was delivered by Robert L. Ball of San Antonio, who said in part: Ladies and Gentlemen: It is with some embarrassment that I appear to extend to you the cordialities of our city, because of the fact that our city distinguished and popular mayor, Mayor Hicks, by illness, has been prevented from doing this honor. His health, unfortunately, is in a very precarious condition at present and he is off for a short vacation.

On behalf of the cowmen of San Antonio, Tex., we welcome you with joy, because you are of our own kith and kin. We claim San Antonio to be, of right, the cowmen's town, and in welcoming the convention of cattlemen we feel that it is only receiving unto ourselves a part of our own family. Many changes have crept into the industry of the cattle business since its organization was effected twenty-five years ago.

The Northwestern Texas Cattle Raisers' association was born and had its inception in the little town of Graham, Texas, and everything that pertains to the cattle industry of that state of Texas as is being fostered and helped and benefited by the existence and exercise of the wholesome regulations of this association. I grant you there was a time when I could say: Well, I don't look to your association; I can take care of myself. That time is passed. We have a newspaper at every good market to which our cattle are shipped, and in that way discourage cattle stealing. So I say there is no one who is interested in the cattle industry, raising cattle, that is not receiving some benefit. Now I am not saying that in censuring you, I simply do this to call your attention to those gathered here, who come here to this meeting. And I say all those who come here will give us a helping hand.

It is not only the duty of a man to improve his opportunities, but it is his duty to improve those of his fellow men; and permit me to say that the days of the longhorn in the land are few and full of trouble. He then elected officers, and stated that under the present by-laws of the association it became necessary to elect officers every year, and that no one should be elected longer than two years consecutively.
