Increased rates for all classes of mail except parcel post and international mail will go into effect January 7, Postmaser Spencer Beavers reminded postal customers today. "Even with the new rates of six cents for first-class mail and 10 cents for air mail, postal service is still a real bargain," Postmaster Beavers declared, "For six cents you can send a letter to any of the 50 states, to any United States returner or possession, to Canada or Mexico, or to an American serviceman stationed anywhere in the world." Postmaster Beavers pointed out that the new rate for post cards will be five cents and for air mail post cards eight cents,

He said the added cent in the letter rate is a 20 percent increase compared to a 24 percent boost in the rates for

mailing newspapers and magazines and a 34 percent hike for
advertising circulars, "occupant" mail, and other material
in the third-class category.

The new rate of six cents
per ounce for first-class mail
applies up to 13 ounces and
the new rate of 10 cents per

to seven ounces, Under the
class all air mail over seven ounces
will be merged into a single
category.

Another rate change that will effect the general public is the increase from four to six cents for the first two ounces of individual pieces of third-class mail. Unsealed greeting cards may be sent at this rate, Post-master Beavers said.

He emphasized that the new rate on unsealed greeting cards will not go into effect until January 7 and until then they can be mailed at the old rate of four cents.

Fostmasters Beavers also noted that effective January 7 special handling will be available on third-class parcels weighing between eight and six-teen ounces. 

# Railway Adding New Freight Cars: Alliliate to Handle Cannon Jet Fuel

The 1968 capital expenditure program for Santa Fe Railway and its controlled affiliated companies will approximate 882 million, John S. Reed, president, has announced, The Santa Fe's capital expenditures for 1961 approximated \$81 million.

Plans call for taking deli-very of approximately 1,850 new freight cars and 40 high-capacity road freight diesels.

Work will continue on a new \$12 million terminal improvement at Kansas City, Kan, including a new automatic retarder operated freight classification yard. Important modernization projects will be started in yards and servicing facilities at several other points on the system. Other major improvements will include renewal of 389 track miles with continuously weld-

ed rail, plus an additional 51 miles of welded rail to be used in the Kansas City, Kan, yard project.

A 712-mile microwave system will be installed between Wellington, Kan, and Silsbee, Tex, also linking Oklahoma City, Fort Worth, Cleburne, Temple and Somerville, Tex, and connecting with Santa Fe's existing 2,450-mile network between Chicago and the west

coast, Computers will be in-stalled to effect further mo-dernization of data processing functions in four of the sys-tem's centralized station ac-counting bureaus and to coor-cinate them with Santa Fe's large data processing center at Topeka, Kan, Additional piggyback and highway equipment will be pur-chased for Santa Fe Trail

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
